Highlights from the October 13 Meeting:

- Jim Conner, Director of Teaching and Learning, presented an overview of the [district's success on the local report cards](#).
- KayLynne Schaller, AW Junior High - Penta Family Consumer Sciences Teacher and student FCCLA representatives shared their [successes from the National Leadership Conference](#).
- The Board recognized the Certified and Classified Staff Members of the Year.
- Semi-annual Board Policy updates were approved in alignment with state law and as recommended by Neola.
- The Board approved the [District Calendar for the 2026-27 school year](#).
- More than \$20,000 in donations were accepted from individuals, boosters groups and community partners.
- Board members provided apologies and clarifications on faith-related concerns and social media activity, along with plans for continued professional development and progress.
- During the public comment period, community members shared their perspectives and called for continued responsibility and strong leadership from the district.

Tax Reform Discussions Could Impact School Funding

Lawmakers at the Ohio Statehouse are continuing discussions about state tax reform, including proposals that could change how schools are funded. While some legislators are calling for the elimination of property taxes, which may sound appealing, these changes could shift the burden of school funding to local income taxes instead.

Several bills are currently under consideration:

HB 186 – Reduce School District Property Taxes

- Caps property tax growth at inflation levels.
- Provides only a temporary backfill for schools, leaving long-term funding gaps.
- Does not adjust the state funding formula, meaning districts could face a “double loss” — less local revenue and less state aid.

HB 335 – Limit Inside Millage Revenue Increases

- Limits local tax growth tied to inflation, excluding new construction.
- Could force districts back to the ballot more often to maintain funding levels.

HB 129 – Millage Floor & Fixed-Sum Levies

- Restricts the renewal of existing emergency and substitute levies.
- Removes rollback credits for many levies after one renewal, meaning future levies could cost taxpayers more.

We are closely monitoring these developments to understand how potential tax reforms may affect Anthony Wayne Local Schools and our community. We will continue to share updates as more information becomes available.

Navigating Changes: New Laws Supporting Student Success

New state laws are bringing some important changes to our schools this year including updated expectations for attendance, new guidelines for informing families about their child's education, and the new ban on cell phone use during the school day. An overview of these new rules is provided below, and we will continue to share updates as they are available.



HB 410: Chronic Absence and Habitual Truancy

Ohio has updated its school attendance laws, shifting the focus from punitive measures to early intervention for excessive student absences. A student is now considered chronically absent if they miss 10% or more of the school year—including both excused and unexcused absences. HB 96: Student Cell Phone Ban

With the passage of House Bill 250, the state issued a ban on student cell phone use during the school day, set to take effect January 1, 2026. AWLS chose to adopt the policy early -- effective at the beginning of the school year. AWHs Communications Intern Giana Cortez spoke with students and staff about how the change is shaping daily life at the high school. [Read her story.](#)



HB 8: Parents' Bill of Rights

Ohio's House Bill 8, known as the Parents' Bill of Rights, requires schools to adopt policies ensuring parents are notified about, and can review materials related to, their child's education and wellbeing. The law specifically mandates parent notification of changes to a student's mental, emotional, or physical health, and allows parents to review or opt out of instruction containing sexuality content.

In response, the District has increased communication with families in these areas to keep them informed and actively involved in their child's learning and wellbeing.

Kindergarten Enrollment Changes for 2026-2027

Starting with next school year, [children must be five years old by August 1 to enroll in kindergarten at AWLS](#). Previously, the cutoff date was September 30. The shift to an earlier cutoff is intended to support the long-term academic and developmental readiness, ensuring that children have the best possible foundation for success in kindergarten and beyond.

Kindergarten enrollment for the 2026-2027 school year begins March 1, 2026.



Generals for Generations Foundation Update

E-Bikes: Popular and Potentially Dangerous

Electric powered bicycles are becoming a popular way for students to get around, but we've also seen an increase in unsafe riding behaviors such as speeding, not wearing helmets, and ignoring traffic laws. These actions put riders, pedestrians, and drivers at risk.

Every Day Counts! Tips for Strong Attendance Habits

Ohio's new attendance laws emphasize identifying and supporting students before absences become a barrier to learning. When students show up to school every day, they build the habits, connections, and confidence that lead to lifelong success.

Families play a key role in helping students build those habits. Talk with your child about your expectations for attending school each day and why consistent learning matters. Here are a few ways families can help support strong attendance:

Plan Ahead: Avoid scheduling vacations and appointments during the school day whenever possible and reach out to your child's school if challenges—such as chronic illness, transportation, or other barriers arise.

Establish Routines: Set out clothing and supplies the night before, and keep consistent bedtimes and morning schedules.

Stay Engaged: Get involved in school activities, and communicate with teachers about schoolwork or attendance concerns.

Access Resources: Encourage your child to take advantage of school meals, health and mental health supports, and enrichment opportunities like sports, clubs, and music.

Support Learning: Remind your child that each day builds on the last, and regular attendance helps them stay on track and achieve long-term success.

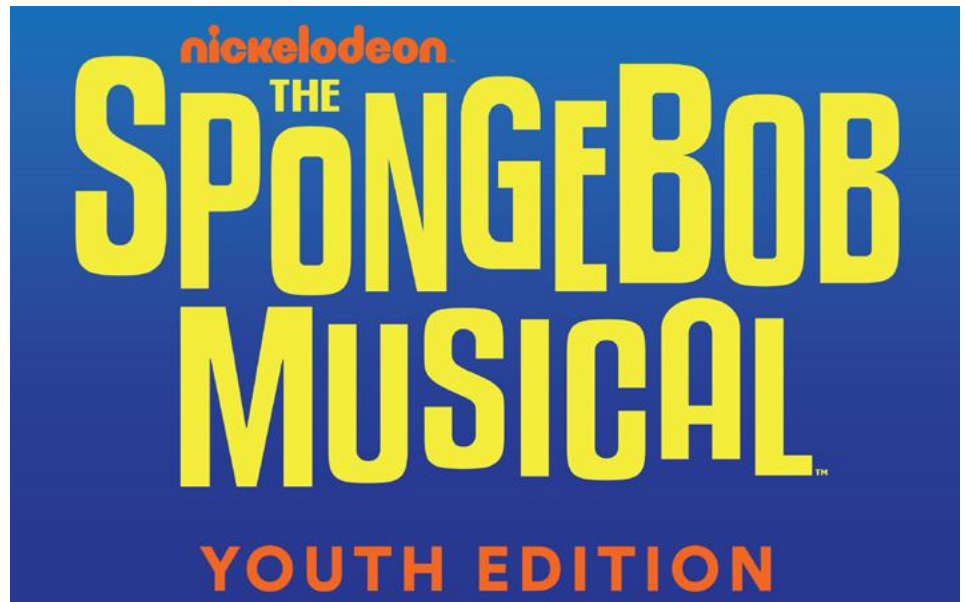
The Waterville Parents Association hosted its third annual Generals March, a day of physical activity and fun.

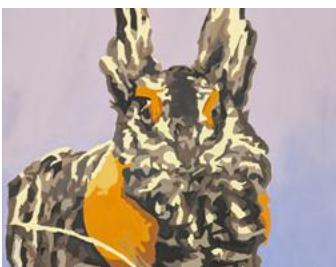

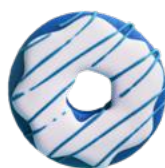
