Respecting the dignity of each person, St. Vincent de Paul Georgia brings hope and help to those in need so they may achieve stability and move toward self-sufficiency.


Dear Friends.

SERENA

"I had to choose between my husband and the safety of my children", says Serena when asked how she became homeless. "It was awful. We were living in my car. I had to take my 3 children into the bathroom at Walmart each morning to wash them up before taking them to school."

During the day, she used the internet on her cellphone to search for help. She found it in a rare shelter for women and children in a suburb of Atlanta. At the shelter she received assistance with childcare and searching for a job. She was hired by a temporary agency and went to work at a local school system in the cafeteria. They soon hired her full-time and she was able to move into her own apartment. Although she is paying in excess of 75% of her income on rent, getting a second job or a better job is difficult because she can't afford to pay for after-school childcare for 3 children.

SVdP has helped her with rent and utility assistance as well as gift cards for food to help her transition to independent living. Serena has hopes of starting her own commercial cleaning business that one day may be her full-time job.

I have had a lot of people help me these past two years.

I just feel really blessed to be where I am today.





OUR 2019 IMPACT

St. Vincent de Paul Georgia played an important role in poverty relief and prevention across the state of Georgia in 2019. Last year, SVdP Georgia's 73 Conferences, 4 Family Support Centers and 12 Thrift Stores assisted more than **119,000** people with more than **\$19 million** in financial support for housing and utilities, food, clothing, medicine, career or tax assistance, transportation and many other forms of help and hope.

 Since 2011, St. Vincent de Paul Georgia has partnered with local grocery stores including 37 Kroger stores, select Sam's Club and Aldi stores, and the Atlanta Community Food Bank to collect meat, produce and non-perishable items.
 Last year, through this program, St. Vincent de Paul Georgia's Conferences and Family Support Centers collected and redistributed more than 827,058 pounds of food to those facing hunger.

Sandra thought she had "made it". She was living in a nice apartment with her husband and their two boys. She was proud of their home and the envy of her extended family "back home". Then her husband left and moved in with another woman and everything fell apart. He refused to pay child support for the boys and left her holding a lease she could no longer afford. She earns \$1500/month as a veterinary assistant and her rent was \$1384. We helped her with rent assistance and Christmas gifts for her boys in addition to helping her create a plan for her future. She moved into a less expensive apartment, got a second job she can work from home, and visits a local food pantry monthly to stretch her budget. She now has a lawyer working to get her child support payments.
