

when disaster strikes in places like Haiti, where gang violence in Port-au-Prince has plunged 1 million people into an emergency level of hunger.

Our faith-based partners in Haiti are providing meals at safer locations on La Gonâve island, where World Hope International partners with the island's only hospital, and Léogâne, 29 miles southwest of Port-au-Prince. Without you, we can't respond immediately to people in need as we have in Haiti, Israel or Gaza.

hanks to generous sponsors, World Hope International's newest, fastest and most rugged water drilling rig recently arrived in Sierra Leone. It means 500,000 more vulnerable children and their families there will gain access to clean water in the next five years.

An assembly and training team from PAT-Drill arrived in Makeni, the largest city in the Northern Province of Sierra Leone. Two days later, our drilling team knew how to use the PAT-Drill model 501 and V900 Atlas Copco Compressor mounted on a Mercedes-Benz Zetros 2236 4×4 chassis.

Borehole drill training included crushing through 32 meters of solid granite at Masanga Hospital in the Tonkolili District of the Northern Province.

As part of WHI's WASH (Water, Sanitation & Hygiene) vision in West Africa, World Hope will ramp up support in more than 15 districts in Sierra Leone and Liberia.

In addition, WHI will expand WASH investments, including 77 more health care facilities and 149 more schools. These investments will accommodate the needs of the most vulnerable, including people with disabilities, the poorest households and women and girls.

World Hope will get more clean water to more people in West Africa in the next five years as part of a new WASH campaign. Let the Son Shine in With Solar-Powered Projectors

eople in Sierra Leone are learning about Jesus because a group of traveling pastors is using the power of the sun to reveal the Son.

The Rev. Andrew Kargbo, a WHI staff member in West Africa, has trained evangelists in seven districts to use a solar-powered film projector to show *The Jesus Film.* In November alone, the pastors showed the film to 5,165 villagers in 20 communities that have World Hope borehole water wells; more than 1,660 of them turned to Jesus!

The problem is that Kargbo and his team need new, more rugged projector kits that will hold up against bumpy backroads to remote villages across Sierra Leone and Liberia. The solution is Vista 1000 + Solar kits. Each kit has: a projector, speakers,



a lithium battery and a solar panel. Only with you can people in Sierra Leone and Liberia see *The Jesus Film*.

La Gonâve Wesleyen Hospital Gives Hope, Care to Haitians in Crisis

he largest hospital in Haiti, State University of Haiti Hospital (HUEH) in Port-au-Prince, has been closed since Feb. 29. Armed gangs stormed government buildings, released some 4,000 prisoners and turned the capital into a war zone. In one month, access to health care for most of the city's 3 million residents vanished.

"I left the hospital in extreme danger as bullets flew past the buildings," said one of the hospital's doctors, who we'll call Dr. Luc to protect his identity. "I had one last patient to evacuate, but it took a little longer than expected because the patient's parents didn't have the financial means and were undecided about which roads to take to leave the hospital area, which was already under the control of bandits."

Haiti is in crisis. Gangs have looted other hospitals and vandalized and burned most of the pharmacies in the city center.

At least 18 hospitals are nonfunctional in the Port-au-Prince metropolitan area, according to local news reports.

But amid darkness, there's hope. As of Jan. 13, community health centers in La Gonâve, where World Hope International (WHI) supports the island's only hospital, had benefited from medical equipment and medicine. The hospital currently operates an oxygen production center that can meet the needs of the hospital and outlying hospital centers. The hospital recently sent oxygen to Port-au-Prince and safely transported patients and necessities to and from the island

WHI remains committed to expanding health care access to children and vulnerable people in crisis in Haiti and around the world. We thank our partners and supporters who bring hope and well-being to the world's most vulnerable communities.

UPDATE: La Gonâve Hospital Blood Bank

he blood bank at La Gonâve
Hospital can now provide lifesaving
blood to hospitals on mainland
Haiti, in addition to serving residents and
a growing number of displaced Haitians
on the island.

Gifts from Butterfield Memorial Foundation, the blood bank's principal funder, along with gifts from New Life La Plata and other donors, enable the bank to reach more patients who need blood. This comes at a critical time, as La Gonâve Hospital blood bank still needs your support. University of Georgia Partnership Makes Gains Against Human Trafficking

ighty-six child survivors are protected, 401 more children know ways to prevent human trafficking and over 1,000 more community members recognize the need for Sierra Leone's new anti-trafficking law: the Anti-Human Trafficking and Migrant Smuggling Act, 2022.

FAST FACTS

- 86 Child survivors cared for
- 401 Children trained on "I Am Special" trafficking prevention

All of this happened because of a three-year partnership between World Hope International and the Center on Human Trafficking Research & Outreach (CenHTRO) at the University of Georgia.

Funded by the U.S. Department of State's Office to Monitor and Combat Trafficking in Persons (J/TIP), the partnership addressed child trafficking in four of Sierra Leone's 14 districts: Kailahun, Kambia, Kenema and Kono. There, a type of informal fostering called "menpikin" often masks child trafficking. The traditional arrangement — often for education

opportunities — allows extended family members, trusted acquaintances and family friends to take in children. But menpikin contributes to child labor in agriculture, mining, domestic work, street hawking and, in some cases, early marriage or sex trafficking within and outside Sierra Leone. World Hope's program implementation included many participants, from survivors to village chiefs, city councils and schoolchildren. Lessons learned will be applied to expand similar programs.

"It's a huge step toward sustainability," said Yusifu Koroma, trafficking prevention program manager with World Hope.

SCHOOL EXPANSION IN LIBERIA PROMISES BETTER FUTURES

orld Hope International (WHI) plans to expand three schools in Liberia. Expected benefits of the school expansions include reduced dropout and child labor rates, along with increased graduation and post-school employment rates.

Phase 1 includes the \$260,000 expansion of a primary school with 221 children who are supported through World Hope's Child Sponsorship program. Previous renovations at the school — a new roof, doors, cement flooring, furniture, solar panels and computers — remain operational, but they didn't solve another problem: The building is too small and overcrowded.

Without you, the school does not have the resources to add a secondary grade level. But with you, the school can build a second story to provide 16 classrooms, three offices, eight restrooms, plus computer and science rooms.

RADIO FRY FRY TO REACH 5 MORE CITIES

Radio Fry Fry, the first nondenominational Christian audio-visual radio station in Sierra Leone, recently purchased five radio transmitters that will expand its broadcast reach to 5.2 million people across 10 districts in Sierra Leone, or 60% of the population!

With headquarters in Freetown and broadcasting in Bo, Kenema, Makeni and Kono — Radio Fry Fry will begin broadcasting in five more cities in 2024: Moyamba, Tonkolili, Pujehun, Koinadugu and Kailahun.

Viewers and listeners can catch programming on analog radio, mobile radio, Facebook, TikTok, businesses, web/app and group chats.

To complete the transmitter installations, Radio Fry Fry needs \$50,000.

ach year, members of Hoboken
Grace church in Hoboken, N.J., head
halfway around the world to a public
beach in Freetown, Sierra Leone. The reason is a short-term mission trip for Enable
the Children (ETC) Beach Day, a World
Hope International (WHI) annual event
that began in 2008.

As a partner, Hoboken Grace helps organize the party that honors roughly 600 to 900 children with disabilities and their caregivers, who often are ostracized in Sierra Leone. The Hoboken Grace team shares World Hope's goal to change longheld beliefs and perceptions that have been passed down over generations in Sierra Leone. Beach Day is a fun break for children with disabilities and their

caretakers, and it's a way to educate the public about people with disabilities, what causes disabilities and how with resources, children can overcome challenges.

Children and their caregivers play together at the beach, share stories of what they're going through and hear inspiring words from prominent stakeholders and dignitaries who attend. What's more, the team from Hoboken Grace hosts an annual two-day retreat for Enable the Children staff. The team understands that caregivers of children with disabilities need care and support, too. Caregivers bear heavy burdens that can lead to depression and feelings of isolation, and children with disabilities need caregivers who are supported.

In 2024, Hoboken Grace hosted its eighth retreat for Enable the Children staff at a beach resort. The team has been hosting annual retreats for Enable the Children staff since 2017. Thank you, Hoboken Grace!
