William Bartram, *Travels*

William Bartram accompanied his father, John Bartram, a botanist, to Florida in 1766 for King George III. In 1774, he returned to the Florida he had fallen in love with. His assignment was to research the land for Dr. Fothergill of England. Bartram's resulting book, *Travels*, became recognized as one of the pivotal scientific books of his time, also heralded for its poetic language and vivid illustrations.

Bartram was a renaissance man who melded art and science into an indelible record of his passionate encounters with the world.


Now you can follow in Bartram's footsteps and boat trails here in Florida, and experience much of the same wildlife and scenic beauty he encountered in the 1760s.



Gaines' Mill

Visiting Richmond National Battlefield Park

The concentration of Civil War resources found in the Richmond area is unparalleled. The National Park Service manages 11 sites, giving visitors an opportunity to examine the battlefield landscapes, to hear the stories of the combatants and civilian residents, and to understand the complex reasons why Richmond came to symbolize the heart and soul of the Confederacy.



- ### Regulations
- There is a limited list of park regulations. Use open spaces to observe. When appropriate, please use the parking area and use the trail, in compliance with FWS.
 - Smoking, beverages are prohibited.
 - Alcohol and other substances are prohibited by law.
 - Wild feeding is prohibited. Feeding of a wild animal is illegal.
 - Feeding, whipping, holding, or otherwise mistreating animals is prohibited.

1862 Seven Days' Battles

No military campaign had more influence on the course of the Civil War than these Seven Days' battles. George B. McClellan's army of more than 100,000 Union soldiers landed at Fort Monroe in spring of 1862, and fought its way up the peninsula. By mid-May the Army of the Potomac lay on the shores of the Chesapeake and perhaps end the war. If that strategy succeeded the nation might be reunified, but without abolition of slavery. Confederate General

Robert E. Lee chose not to wait for the Federal army's next move. Instead he seized the initiative, and on June 26 advanced across the Chickahominy River with nearly 90,000 soldiers. That action opened a week-long series of battles that resulted in the Union army retreating to the banks of the James River. With Richmond secure, Lee's army moved north, defeated Union forces at Cedar Mountain and Second Manassas (Bull Run), and then marched toward Maryland and the first invasion of the North.

Lee moved south to the Chickahominy River and crossed the river to the east in a combined operation with the "Seven Days' Battles".	McClellan's army of 100,000 men landed at Fort Monroe on the James River, but he retreated to Gaines' Mill early in the morning, where Lee's Confederates launched a small-scale attack, beginning the second and largest battle of the Seven Days.	McClellan organized his retreat and ordered a head east to what would become a trap in the James River. Meanwhile, Lee shifted from pursuing Richmond to pursuing and defeating the Union army. A Confederate general at Lee's farm, west of the Chickahominy River, ordered a small victory.	Lee pushed his army forward against the Union army's rear at Savage's Station, the Richmond and York River Railroad. The two armies had a fierce, pitched-upon battle and were separated by the presence of McClellan's forces.	Confederate forces pursued the Union army to a Union battle at Glendale. The Federal army was defeated. Lee had the opportunity of the campaign, but the determined resistance of McClellan's soldiers kept the line of retreat open.	McClellan's army took up a strong defensive position along Malvern Hill. Finally, a Confederate attack resulted in a decisive Union victory.

Gaines' Mill Breakthrough Trail

The park protects only a small fraction of the Gaines' Mill battlefield, but the preserved ground includes some of the most significant landmarks of the engagement.

This trail will lead you to where the climactic moment of the battle occurred—where General John B. Hood's Confederate forces first broke the Union line. From there you can loop back to the parking area, or continue on a longer trail that takes you to the extreme left of the Union position and to the location of the Wilcox's Brigade monument.

Fight for the Heart of Dinosaur

"Echo Park Dam would back water so far that ... Echo Park and its magnificent rock formations would be submerged. Dinosaur National Monument as a scenic spectacle would cease to exist."

Shall We Let Them Build Our National Parks
Bernard DeFoto, Author and Historian, 1950

In 1950, a plan to build a 550-foot high (168 m) dam on the Green River near Echo Park threatened to forever change the character of Dinosaur National Monument. Another dam was planned downstream in Split Mountain Canyon. The dams would have inundated much of the monument's dramatic canyon scenery, Fremont cultural sites, historic homesteads, spawning beds for native fish, along with habitat for bighorn sheep, elk, and other wildlife and plant life would have been submerged.

Some people advocated in favor of the dams for water storage and recreation. Others were concerned about the sanctity of national parks and stepped forward to explain and defend the special values that define Dinosaur National Monument as one of America's treasured, wild places.

After more than five years of heated debate, President Eisenhower signed legislation for the Colorado River Storage Project on April 11, 1956—without the proposed Echo Park and Split Mountain dams. Citizens from all walks of life succeeded in preserving Dinosaur's wild canyons for present and future generations.

Canyon Warriors

The confrontation over dams in Dinosaur National Monument rallied a diverse coalition of people and organizations including the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the American Nature Association, the Conservation Foundation, the National Parks Association, the book *Walters and the Wilderness Society: The Sierra Club joined the cause after David Brower became the executive director in 1952.*

Using his background in publishing, Brower swiftly rushed to press. *This is Dinosaur: Echo Park and Its Magic Rivers*, featuring photographs by Martin Litton and Philip Hyde, and edited by Wallace Stegner. Every member of the U.S. Congress received a copy of the book along with a brochure titled *What is Your Stake in Dinosaur?*

Meanwhile, Howard Zahniser from the Wilderness Society negotiated with members of Congress behind the scenes. The success of these organizations in defeating proposed dams in Dinosaur National Monument demonstrated their ability to confront perceived threats to conservation on a national scale.



Blacksmith

Most logging camps employed a full-time blacksmith who made and repaired tools and other objects. The average wage of a camp blacksmith in the early 20th century was about \$2.50 a day. The blacksmith shop was typically located somewhat apart from the rest of the camp due to the increase risk of fire. A supply of iron bars (called "pigs") was kept on hand to manufacture hardware such as nails, chains, hinges and peavey points. The blacksmith made, sharpened, and repaired grabs and couplers used in skidding logs. He also helped take care of the horses by trimming their hooves, replacing their horseshoes, and maintaining their harness and tack.

Sawmill & Log Pond

Water-powered sawmills were common in Pennsylvania from colonial times, and were used in the lumber industry until the mid-nineteenth century. The industrial revolution brought steam power to sawmills, and the circular saw provided continuous cutting action that greatly increased levels of production. The museum's working circular sawmill is typical of a medium-sized facility following the Civil War, when Pennsylvania was the leading lumber-producer in the nation. A steam-powered mill of this size would have historically produced 12,000 to 15,000 board feet of lumber daily. The log loading pond helps to wash dirt and stones from the logs and softens the wood to make it easier to cut. The drying ramp attached to the building would have provided elevated access to the mill's lumber yard, where finished boards were stacked up to 30 feet high for curing before sale and transport.



Boiler exhaust is piped through the log pond to prevent it from freezing during the winter.



Sawmills in post-Civil War Pennsylvania, nearly 2,000 saw mills manufactured over 500 million in lumber products annually to meet growing market demand by the nation's industrial.



CDC HEADQUARTERS

Directly ahead is the site of Building 1, which was CDC's headquarters from 1949 to 1976. A granite marker pinpoints the original site of the former CDC director's office. During this time, CDC became a national and international leader in protecting the public's health. CDC worked on a key priority in the global eradication of smallpox and worked to identify and research new infectious diseases, including Legionnaires' disease and HIV/AIDS.

During the 1970s and 1980s, the agency expanded to apply epidemiology to diverse challenges such as air pollution, birth defects, lead poisoning, contaminated drinking water, violence, and foodborne outbreaks. In 1978, CDC completed construction of a new "hot lab" facility to provide a safe work environment for scientists handling dangerous infectious agents, such as Ebola and Marburg.

CDC teams help respond to natural and man-made disasters around the globe. The agency's focus also includes health education, nutrition, injury, the effects of smoking, environmental health, and occupational safety and health.

Reflecting its broadening mission, CDC's name was modified over the years from the National Communicable Disease Center, Center for Disease Control, Centers for Disease Control and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Throughout the years, CDC has remained the same.

In 1959 a devoted group of volunteers founded the Buckeye Trail Association (BTA) and laid out the first miles of the BT. The BT has evolved into a large loop trail around the entire state of Ohio. More than 1,800 miles now connect wooded footpaths, abandoned railroad and canal right-of-ways, back roads, rivers and lake shores within both rural and community settings, connecting many of Ohio's most beloved public lands and trail towns. The BT provides an intimate way to experience Ohio's wonderful scenic and historic diversity.



The BT is marked along its length by 2" x 6" painted blue blazes. The trail is open to all hikers, made possible by BTA volunteers and the partnership of many federal, state, and local agencies, and private land-owners. The BT is enjoyed as a popular local hiking destination by millions of Ohioans as well as a long distance thru-hike by the more adventurous.
