From the Superintendent's Desk PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

Research shows the physical environment of schoolfacilitieshasanimpact on how our students learn in the classroom and their experiences in extracurricular activities. In an effort to ensure that our facilities meet the needs of our students now and into the future, the District partnered with The Collaborative, a local architecture firm to complete a facilities assessment and master plan.

So what are the next steps? The Collaborative will present their AW facilities assessment to the Board of Education at their February meeting. This presentation will share a snapshot of the current conditions of the school buildings. The facilities assessment will help the District develop a Facilities Master Plan, a document outlining the District's goals for maintaining and improving our buildings and grounds based on current and future needs.

The District wants to hear your thoughts about how the District can improve its facilities in order to achieve its mission of empowering students to be future-ready.

All District stakeholders are invited to complete a survey about potential renovations and/or new construction within the District.


POG: CRITICAL THINKING & LEARNER'S MINDSET BOOK STUDY OFFERS FOOD FOR THOUGHT

An industry-recognized credential means a student has demonstrated a specific set of competencies related to an industry or occupation. CTE programs are one way for students to earn IRC, but there are other options, including, but not limited to traditional coursework, CCP or third-party training.
