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### **HEADMASTERS REPORT**



The School has had a good year during which the achievements of our students and their teachers has been fantastic. We can proudly claim to be one of the better schools in the province, if not the country. The management of the school is well aware that there are weaknesses and shortcomings and we constantly have to meet the challenges and solve these issues. Constant improvement is a priority and essential to the future well-being of our school.

Bryanston High currently consists of 1040 students, 31 teachers paid by the GDE, 25 teachers paid by the SGB, 8 administrative and 10 grounds staff. Also included in the workforce are 3 Tuckshop convenors and the mothers who assist on the Gardening Committee and in the Second Hand Shop. The School is therefore a large organization that requires considerable management expertise and leadership to keep it pointed in the right direction, while at the same time, giving attention and recognition to all its many different departments and individuals.

Managing the school within the framework of Government policy is challenging. Recent amendments to the South African Schools' Act has meant that School Governing Bodies have to apply to the Education department for permission to make additional payments to teachers who hold managerial positions, who teach specialist subjects and who contribute to the

extra-mural programme of the school. These laws have created a nervousness amongst the teaching profession and could possibly encourage teachers to leave the profession, or go to private schools. Growing teacher shortages could result in huge problems in the future for all schools. The level of teachers' frustration is best illustrated by the commitment of teachers from all spheres of the community to the strikes in September. When one adds the mountain of paper- work that teachers have to complete as part of OBE, conditions in the profession are not conducive to retaining staff, let alone recruiting new teachers. Teachers are not being allowed to get on with the key function of teaching and the excessive demands of administrative work have made it extremely difficult for the teachers to focus on the needs of the students and to use their intuitive professional judgement to nurture the growth of all the individuals under their care.

The teaching staff has remained reasonably constant this year. Some Maths classes were disrupted because of Mrs Atmore taking accouchement leave, but it did result in us retaining the services of Mrs Nel. Miss Keth has been welcomed into the History Department, and Miss MacKenzie has become a welcome addition to our Accounting Department. Mrs Peters has also had accouchement leave and we were fortunate to have Miss Kemp return to the school. We were fortunate to have Mrs Mashele join the Zulu department. It is exciting for the future that we could attract Miss Marais. She is a past head girl and we look forward to her input into the school. I would like to thank Ms Vermaak for her contribution to the History Department and Ms Madzonga into the Zulu Department. Both left Bryanston High to further their careers in the private sector. It was also exciting to have one of our teachers, Mrs Marescia, go to the Olympics as an assistant manager of the women's hockey team. The School is retaining good staff and attracting exciting new teachers, but our continued ability to do so depends on the students behaving appropriately so that teachers will enjoy coming to our school. I am afraid that bad behaviour will frighten off teachers. So if we want GOOD TEACHERS, ALL STUDENTS NEED TO CO-OPERATE. Fair and just discipline is the foundation on which our school is built and I appeal to all parents to support the teachers as they try to educate your children in very challenging times.

The rugby tour to Russia was an outstanding success. Not only were the 27 students exposed to unique situations, the marketing exposure of the school was incredible. I also believe that it is wonderful that we have teachers who have the enthusiasm and commitment to the school to organise such a massive undertaking. I would like to thank Mr de Ras and his wonderful committee for all the events that were organized. Events such as the Barnyard Theatre evening were special for all people connected to Bryanston High School. I look forward to the hockey fund-raisers as they further enhance the marketing

and participation of parents, teachers and students in the various social events that are organized in preparation for the girls and boys hockey trip to Australia next year.

A constant focus of the Governing Body has been the improvement of the school facilities. The pool has been painted and each year sees the paving of more areas. The fields have been fertilized, the irrigation system improved and the gym quad is about to undergo a facelift. Keeping the toilets clean is an ongoing challenge. We are planning to change many of the basins and toilet bowls and, possibly, tile the floors. I would like to emphasise that the behaviour of our students leaves a lot to be desired in the toilets. It concerns me that the toilets are cleaned three times a day and yet students will continue to leave them dirty. The renovations of the foyer were done with the funds raised by the GMS and I would like to thank them and Mr Brown for their efforts. The change rooms in the swimming pool were altered into a flat for a teacher. All swimmers will use the gym toilets in future. Some of the vacant ground at the back of the school was rented by Investment Cars and has been upgraded into a car park. The gardens are looking beautiful – thanks to the tireless efforts of Mrs Moskowitz, Mrs Catto, and their team.

I need to emphasise the commitment that the staff and I have to the extra-mural programme of the school. We believe that all extra-murals are vital to the educational process. Students who are actively involved in some extra-curricular activity enhance their ability to become productive and successful members of society. Healthy bodies lead to agile and productive minds. I am totally against parents preventing their sons and daughters from taking part in school activities so that they can do their school work, or punishing them by not allowing them to participate. Evidence is overwhelming that students who actively participate in sport are also successful in the classroom and are better able to manage their time successfully. I appeal to parents to support all activities in the school

I would like to thank the Governing Body for their management of the school and all their support. It is difficult for the parent members as they have to manage their own business careers, keep their commitments to their families and, at the same time, attend to all the important issues in running a school as large as Bryanston High School. You are very special people and we are very grateful for everything you have done. I would like to extend a huge 'thank you' to Françoise Harrison, who is leaving the Governing Body at the end of the year. She has managed the portfolio of exemptions. This is a stressful and demanding job which she has done incredibly well. She has always been supportive of the management of the school and very positive in all her contributions to the school.



## **CHAIRMAN'S REPORT**



As I have repeatedly stated "Education is not free"! In fact, the government places a burden on the Governing Body to run efficient, effective educational institutions. Just one example of this is that many schools, in excess of thirty years old, have had no maintenance or repairs done by the government in the last ten years. I need not tell you the effect of this - pipes rotting under the ground, electrical installations eroding and general decay which happens even in the best kept homes. This problem has emerged as one of our most important priorities which we have been, and are still addressing. This is just one of the additional burdens that we have to carry at present.

2004 has been a relatively quiet year with no major problems considering current times. We have concentrated on our core-values - a very strong academic focus requiring a well above average teaching staff, a school Governing Body supporting the school Principal and the management team, all backed up by good administration.

The rugby calendar proved more than successful. Hockey has been consistent and we are looking forward to a very exciting 2005 tour. Swimming and Athletics both held their own in very competitive leagues. The other sports at the school also excelled. Our equestrian team continue to be strong competitors and our newly-developed cheerleading team has done exceptionally well this year. Of course there are also many cultural and other extra-mural activities. "Grease"

was noted in the Sandton area for excellence. We must not forget First Aid, Catering, Debating, Chess and many more. These all cater to the holistic education Bryanston High School offers.

The need for very good, and sufficient staff, is essential to the education of our children. Our staff need the support of parents because they deserve it for their skills, dedication and workload. Our continued success, not only in the matric exams but in all other spheres is indicative of our good staff.

This year saw new legislation (Section 38A of the Education Amendment Act) being introduced regarding schools supplementation of teachers' salaries. Schools had to apply for permission and we are awaiting further progress on this. As required by this law, we have budgeted for this teacher assistance.

You will all have seen/read about the teachers/public service strike. The necessity for this strike tells us that the future of the teaching profession is looking very poor:

- Because they are poorly paid, existing teachers are leaving the profession
- Future supply of new young teachers has dramatically fallen
- Very few men enter the profession because they cannot support a family on a teacher's salary
- AIDS is killing approximately 400 teachers per year in Gauteng alone
- Gauteng experiences currently an annual shortage of 1 500 teachers

It is therefore essential that we are able to keep our good teachers in order to maintain our excellence, both in the classroom and on the sportsfields.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the parents for their support, enabling the school to operate efficiently under the guidance of the Principal, Dave Robinson, ably supported by his academic and administrative staff.

I must say a special 'thank you' to the mothers and fathers who have rendered services, such as, tuckshop, supporters' club, second hand shop and gardening to mention a few areas of parental assistance. Without these people our school would not be the place it is.

I would also like to express my gratitude to our Governing Body for their dedication and long hours of commitment. A particular thank you to Francoise Harrison, who is leaving us at the end of the year, for her years of commitment to the Governing Body and to Bryanston High School.



















































































































































































































































































































































































































































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### **GRADE 8 2004**







# **ARGUS TOUR**

### **ARGUS CYCLE TOUR**

I had always hoped and aimed to ride the Argus one day, so last August a group of teachers and I developed a plan to invite students, parents and teachers to enter the race in one mad, crowded and busy weekend.

Ms van Veyeren (Mrs Hall) completed all the entries of those who wanted to ride. There was a window period of approximately three days where 36 000 cyclists could enter on the Internet, so time was crucial. Mrs Hall spent three days coming to school at 5.00 am to complete the entries, with me risking my credit card to her control. She managed to enter 12 students and 6 teachers.

The next challenge was to arrange transport and accommodation. An Arrows Bus with a TV/Video was arranged as we would complete the trip to Cape Town, non-stop, through the night.

Accommodation arrangements were more difficult as Cape Town was fully booked during the Argus weekend. In the end, I phoned the Principal of Camps Bay High and asked if we could stay at the school. He kindly agreed so we had the cheapest accommodation in Cape Town with the best view and close to the start and finish of the race.

We were fortunate enough to have Mr Simon Nash, a parent and regular rider of The Argus, arrange sponsorship for us. We received superb BHS cycling outfits and organised training at Omega Spinning Classes.

Training then began. All of us completed the 100km of the 94.7 race in November and our keener cyclists entered a number of other races. The new year started with the Argus two months away. Training began in earnest with trips to Omega becoming very hard work. The advice and the support we received from Malcolm and Graham of Discovery Omega Cycling Club were fantastic.

The one problem, however, was that the organiser had slipped off the roof of his house and had to spend a week in hospital, with the result that, for him, six weeks of training was lost. A good doctor, a brilliant physio and a very supportive wife kept the dream alive and I did manage to fit in ten days training, prior to the race.

We left for Cape Town on Thursday afternoon with two bus drivers, a trailer filled with bicycles and very excited cyclists. Frequent stops on the way and countless movies helped us get through fifteen hours on the bus.

Cape Town on Friday morning was hot with the dreaded South Easter blowing -a cyclist=s nightmare! We went straight to the Cycle Expo where we confirmed our entries, spent a fortune on Argus clothing and wandered around looking at the latest in bicycle technology. Then we went on to Camps Bay High, unpacked the bus and assembled our bikes. We spent Friday night at Canal Walk, one of the more impressive shopping centres in South Africa.

Saturday was a beautiful day - with the South Easter pumping!
Some of our group went to the Waterfront, others rode to Hout
Bay but most relaxed on Camps Bay beach. Rest and suitable
nutrition were crucial ingredients to cope with the long ride on
Sunday. That night Mrs Mollema, with the help of Dino Lupini and

Jef Jacobs, cooked excellent pasta in the Home Economics Centre of the school.

Five-thirty on Sunday. We were up and ready to ride. Race day proved to be very hot and, thankfully, the wind stayed away. We all had a 10 km ride to the centre of Cape Town for the start. To have 36 000 cyclists in Cape Town with the music and commentators sounding forth, made the start very exciting. As we all started at different times, it was difficult to follow the progress of our fellow cyclists. I met Miss Coetzer whilst I was fixing a puncture at Smitswinkel, otherwise we were alone with 36 000 other riders.

I found the scenery, the camaraderie and the atmosphere to be incredible. Thanks to all the players and coaches for making this such a memorable week.



"Has anyone seen Doody's guitar?"


"Ouch! Watch it, that's my leg!!! Get off!!!"



One afternoon was taken up by the Obstacle Course, which was laid out in such a way that we ran the maximum distance between obstacles.






# **CHESS, GARDENING & TALENT SHOW**
