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I. Fun Facts

In 1802, the West India Docks were the world's busiest shipping port and the heart of the British Empire.

Canary Wharf is located on the Isle of Dogs. The Isle of Dogs is a strangely named place, first mentioned in Henry III's papers.

It is thought that Edward III kept greyhounds here.

Canary Wharf itself takes its name from the sea trade with the Canary Islands, whose name originates from the Latin 'canis' which means dogs.

One Canada Square was the first building to be built during redevelopment, and stands at 235m tall.



Over 1,000 ships still pass through the docks each month.

The North docks have been a hub of activity lately, thanks to the regular cleaning that has made the water more attractive to various species of fish. Flounder, plaice, bream and Rudd have all been spotted in the waters, and the docks are also regularly used by aquatic birds. Seals have even been spotted on several occasions, much to the delight of onlookers. The increased activity is a welcome sight for those who use the docks for recreation, and it serves as a reminder of the importance of keeping our waterways clean.

Canary Wharf has its own international airport, London City Airport, which serves over 30 destinations.

Canary Wharf recently debuted the UK's first solar powered bus stop and it's pretty neat!

BBQ on the water anyone?

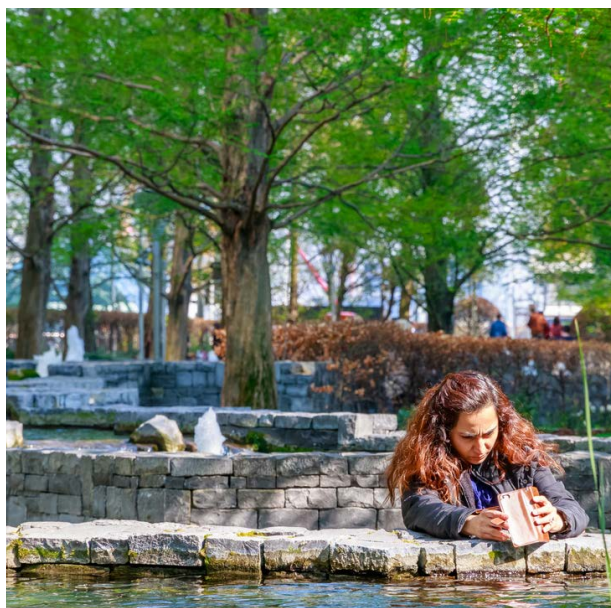

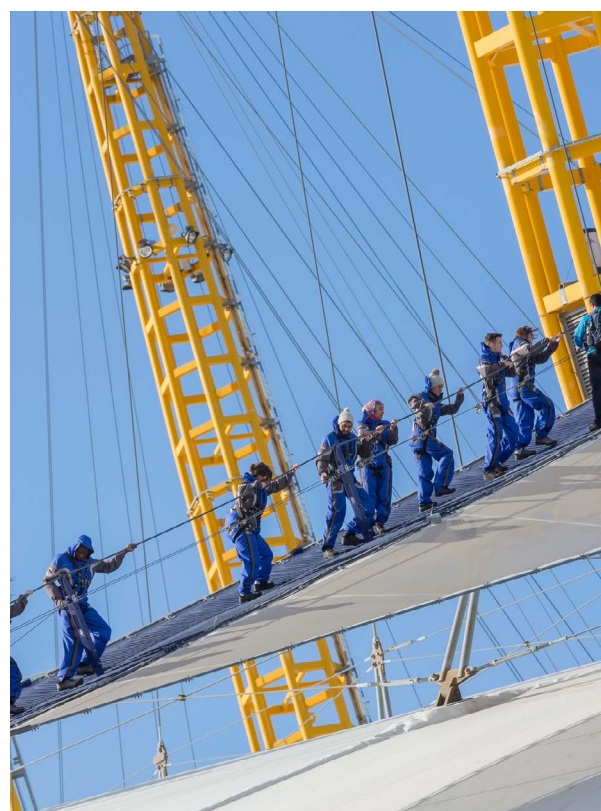
Climb with a stunning view Up the O2

Take the trail

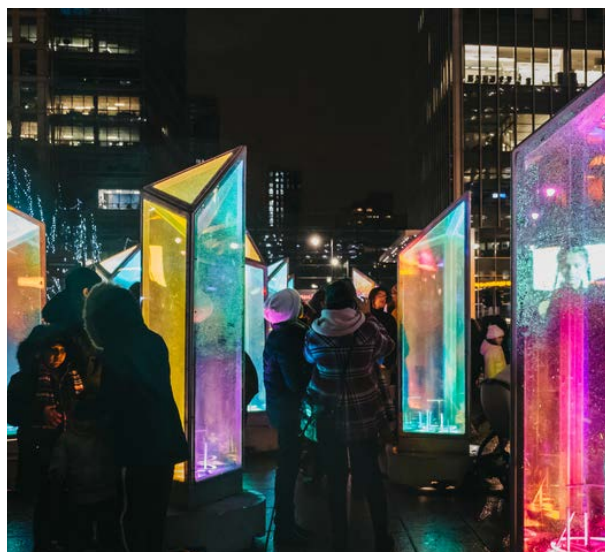

II. Things To Do Near Canary Wharf

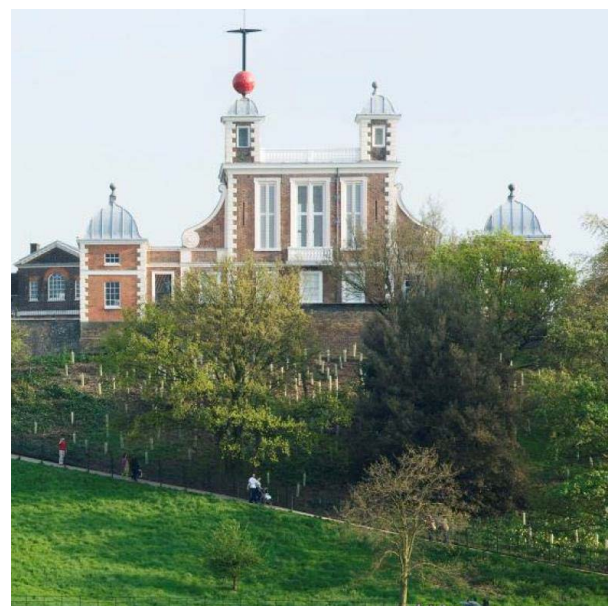
The Thames Barrier

The Thames Barrier is a massive engineering project designed to protect London from flooding. The barrier consists of 10 gates that can be opened or closed as needed, depending on the tide. When the tide is high, the gates are closed to prevent water from flowing into the city. When the tide is low, the gates are opened to allow water to flow out of the city.

Walk the Greenwich Foot Tunnel

She was designed to transport cargo between Britain and Australia. At the time, she was the fastest ship in the world. Today, she is the only surviving tea clipper. The Cutty Sark is now a museum ship. She is moored in Greenwich, London.

Take a selfie with a Beefeater

The Tower of London is one of the most iconic landmarks in the world. It has served as a royal palace, a prison, and a place of execution, and it is now one of the most popular tourist attractions in London. The Tower was built by William the Conqueror in 1066, and it has been expanded and remodelled many times over the centuries. It is home to the Crown Jewels, and it also houses the famous ravens. Canary Wharf is located in east London in the borough of Tower Hamlets.

Canary Wharf is located in Zone 2 and can be accessed via the London Underground on the Jubilee Line to the Canary Wharf tube station, the Docklands Light Railway and the newly opened Queen Elizabeth line. You can also travel by Uber Boats by Thames Clippers.

If you're driving, exit the M25 at junction 30 and follow signs for the A13 east. After passing through Dagenham and Barking, take the left exit onto the A406 north. Follow signs for Canning Town and then take the right fork onto East India Dock Road. This will bring you right into Canary Wharf. Parking is available at Fraser Place Canary Wharf at an additional cost.

If you're taking the bus, routes 135, 277 and D3 all stop near Canary Wharf station. Buses run frequently, so you won't have to wait long for one.
