CITY LEARNING OUARTER

Construction of the college's brand new, purpose-built, four-storey campus in the centre of Wolverhampton is continuing apace.

With the roof completed in December - as reported in the last newsletter - all levels, waterproof boarding and insulation have been installed and the contractor McLaughlin & Harvey is currently working on the next stage of the build which includes external cladding, further glazing and the internal fit-out.

The state-of-the-art campus - which is phase two of City of Wolverhampton Council's transformational City Learning Quarter (CLQ) - remains on course to open in the autumn of the 2025/26 academic year.

THIRD TRANSPORT AND RAIL INFRASTRUCTURE TRAINING ACADEMY **OPENS IN BIRMINGHAM**

In partnership with training provider NIS Group, the college opened its third Transport and Rail Infrastructure Training Academy (TRIA) training site in Aston, Birmingham, in February.

The site, at the Urban Express Park, features a 15-metre high-speed slab track, 30 metres of conventional track, a high-speed set of points and a level crossing barrier.



Peter Merry, deputy principal and chief executive at the college, said: "Alongside the existing TRIA sites in Wolverhampton and Dudley, the opening of the third site in Aston is fantastic news as it will enable even more people from across the region to access high-quality, specialist industry-specific training to enable them to work in this priority sector."

JANUARY OPEN DAY

The first open day of 2025 took place on Saturday 11 January with 409 people attending the event.

On arrival, visitors attended a welcome presentation giving an overview of college life and details of the new CLQ campus, before going on to speak to tutors in their chosen curriculum area about courses and qualifications available.



Around 90 prospective students submitted applications for courses while at the event and, of the visitors who completed a post-event survey, 100% said they received all the information they required and that they would recommend the college to friends and family after their experience.

The event was also an opportunity for attendees to engage with each other and establish links to work together to tackle the challenges facing the city.



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




SUPPORTING EMPLOYERS

During National Apprenticeship Week, employers from around 20 local, regional and national organisations promoted apprenticeship opportunities during a careers fair at the Wellington Road campus.

Employers - including the Army, Budweiser Brewing Group UK&I, Britvic, Jaguar Land Rover, Midwest Mechanical and Electrical Services, The Royal Wolverhampton NHS Trust and West Midlands Police - spoke to over

500 student about apprenticeships available, the qualities they require their workforce to have and career opportunities within their companies.

Participants in a free Into Employment course for those who want to work in health and social care roles had cause for celebration when they not only successfully completed the programme, but were all offered jobs with a local company too.

The course - which gives an overview of working in the sector and the skills and knowledge needed - includes a guaranteed interview with an employer with vacancies and everyone in the group was offered a role as a home care support worker.







CURRICULUM ROUND UP A LEVELS

Students doing an A Level in English literature have launched their own newspaper, with the first edition featuring articles on film adaptations of the novel Little Women, the complexities of motherhood in fiction and history, non-verbal communication, and a review of The Importance of Being Earnest.

AUTOMOTIVE

Students on automotive courses gained a first-hand view of working in the industry during a visit from Andy Wells from Auto Works, a Birminghambased service centre.

He shared his personal career journey, discussed the challenges of running his own business and offered insights into what it takes to be a successful repair technician.



ESOL

Speakers of other languages who enrolled on courses to improve their English skills put their new skills into practice during a week of enrichment activities.





They took part in a scavenger hunt around the city centre, visited the art gallery, central library and

The students also benefited from a visit by Maya Patel, from Reinvntd CIC, who shared her insights on sustainable fashion, offered marketing advice, and talked about how she set up her own business.

Following the talk, the students took part in a hands-on workshop, where they transformed old items into new products to sell.



FUTURES FOUNDATION LEARNING

Students from the Futures Foundation Learning programme took part in a 'Design a Railway Station for 2030' challenge which was an opportunity for them to show their creativity, learn new skills and link their classroom lessons to a real project.

As part of the project, they benefited from a visit by Jade Masuh, Project Engineer at SLC Rail, who

gave advice on improving their 3D models and also told them about what her job entails.







Students also spent a day volunteering at Wildside Activity Centre and worked as a team as they walked along the canal collecting litter on the way.

HAIR AND BEAUTY

Students doing hairdressing qualifications helped a local man's fundraising efforts when they cut hist waist-length hair in aid of the Little Princess Trust which provides real-hair wigs free of charge to children and young people who have lost their hair due to cancer treatment or conditions such as alopecia.



HEALTH AND SOCIAL CARE

Students enrolled on the new health and social care T Level programme got an insight into one of the many roles in the NHS during a visit from Sheelagh Bickerton from The Royal Wolverhampton NHS Trust. Sheelagh, who is the lead clinical nurse specialist for acute kidney injury (AKI), spoke about the structure and function of the renal system and the importance of understanding and recognising AKI.








MATHS
