This summer term, academies across Cornwall Education Learning Trust have embraced new learning experiences. With a focus on exciting classroom projects, creative arts and outdoor adventures, our children have been busy exploring, discovering and approaching new experiences with enthusiasm.



Beech Class at **Luxulyan School** have worked together to create guidebooks on 'How To Care For a Cloud' based on their focus text 'Lizzy and The Cloud.' They each worked on publishing a section of their guide to create group booklets and are very proud of them. They now take pride of place in the school library for others to enjoy.



Penrice Academy have been learning about knife crime from St Austell police and Safer Cornwall. Students learnt about the risks and consequences of carrying or being involved with knives, empowering them to make safe and informed choices. 

As part of their science curriculum, Sycamore Class at **Luxulyan School** rolled up their sleeves for a hands-on investigation into the fascinating world of friction. Pupils explored how different surfaces affect the way objects move, testing their hypotheses through a series of lively experiments.

Using toy cars and ramps, the young scientists carefully observed how the texture of each surface influenced speed and distance. The practical activity not only reinforced key scientific concepts but also encouraged pupils to think critically, make predictions, and evaluate results.

By combining curiosity with experimentation, the session brought science to life and highlighted the power of learning through doing—a brilliant example of Luxulyan's commitment to engaging, hands-on education.

Setting sail from Fowey and navigating to Saint-Malo, Guernsey, Salcombe and back, a group of students from **Brannel School** had the incredible opportunity to immerse themselves in French culture while learning the ropes - quite literally!

From speaking French in real-life contexts, sampling authentic cuisine, and exploring beautiful coastal towns, to becoming active members of the crew, this voyage was full of hands-on learning, teamwork and personal growth.

Matt Barraud, Director of Morvargh Sailing Project said: "From navigating foreign harbours to managing life on board in unfamiliar and demanding conditions, each student grew in confidence, resilience, and empathy. They found their voice, both in French and English, and carried themselves with maturity and pride as ambassadors for their school."




Brannel cadets shine at Okehampton Camp














A CUPPA WITH... LEANNE RANDALL, HR LEAD

Each term, we sit down with a member of staff to uncover the stories, quirks, and passions that make them who they are - beyond their job role.

What's the most unusual job you've ever had, and what did you learn from it?

When I was younger I was a holiday rep in Portugal. It gave me the foundation of people skills that led me to this career.

Imagine you're an inventor. What is one product you'd create that would make everyone's life easier?
