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

FAMOUS FIRSTS FOR TV

- 1922: The first electronic image transferred by wire occurs, accomplished by the Navy in Washington, D.C. It is a still image.
- 1923: The first moving image is transferred by wire, also by the Navy in Washington, D.C.
- 1925: An office boy in a laboratory becomes the first human face depicted on TV during a test demonstration of the technology.
- 1932: The BBC issues its first broadcast in the U.K. as a test. The program, featuring dancing girls, runs for four minutes and is the oldest surviving recording of broadcast television.
- 1936: The Summer Olympics in Berlin become the first sporting event on TV.
- 1938: The first commercially available television sets go on sale to the public for \$433, equal to about \$9,600 today.
- 1941: In the world's first commercial, Bulova airs a ten-second ad for its watches during a baseball game between the Brooklyn Dodgers and the Philadelphia Phillies. It features a Bulova watch over a map of the U.S., and the announcer states, "America runs on Bulova time!" Bulova paid \$9 for the ad. (cont)





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








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
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


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FAMOUS FIRSTS FOR TV (cont)

- 1942: Production of TV sets is suspended until 1945 due to World War II.
- 1945: The National Broadcasting Company (NBC) demonstrates the first color TV. NBC becomes the first network service in the U.S. with regularly scheduled programming.
- 1947: The first sitcom in the U.S. airs with "Mary Kay and Johnny" starring real-life couple Mary Kay and Johnny Stearns. The first kid's show is "Kukla, Fran and Ollie" quickly followed by "Howdy Doody." "Meet the Press" hits the airwaves and becomes the longest-running TV show in history.
- 1950: Nielsen Media Research begins providing television ratings data.
- 1951: The first transcontinental TV broadcast across the U.S. takes place, originating in San Francisco during the Japanese Peace Treaty Conference. "Dragnet." "Hallmark Hall of Fame," "Search for Tomorrow," and "The Roy Rogers Show" begin broadcasting. The "I Love Lucy" show is the first to be filmed in front of a live studio audience.
- 1950: Six million TV sets are now in use in the U.S. Zenith releases the first TV remote control, called "Lazy Bones." It connects to the TV via cable. "The Hank McCune Show" is the first to use a pre-recorded laugh track.
- 1952: "The Today Show" begins its run as the nation's longest-running early morning show.
- 1953: Lucille Ball gives "birth" to her son "Little Ricky" in an episode of "I Love Lucy," paralleling her real-life pregnancy with her son Desi Arnez, Jr. The word "pregnant" is never mentioned; she is always "expecting." 74% of all Americans who had a TV tuned in, a record not broken until 1956, when Elvis appeared on the "Ed Sullivan Show," with 83% of viewership. - To fix a hole in drywall that requires a healthy helping of joint compound, you can cut a piece of screen slightly bigger than the hole and tack it to the inside of the drywall. You also can wad up a piece of aluminum foil and shove it in the hole, pressing it in a bit to create a recess for the compound. The foil will keep the compound at the site of the hole, allowing it to set up instead of fall down.

- Add a softener sheet to your vacuum bag or canister when you change it. While you clean, you will distribute the good smell throughout your home. You also can use a cotton ball scented with your favorite essential oil or even perfume.
- If you have trouble threading needles, try spritzing some hairspray on your finger, and twist the end of the thread. It will keep the fibers together and stiffen it enough to be easily threaded.
- It is possible to save a bit of money on car maintenance if you can't change your own oil. Learn common add-ons you will be offered at oil and lube places. Air filters are surprisingly easy to replace on your own, and so are windshield wipers. Very often, the staff of auto-supply chains will lend you tools or even assist you right in the parking lot.

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




FAMOUS FIRSTS FOR TV (cont)

- 1953: The first issue of "TV Guide" hits the stands, featuring baby Desi Arnez, Jr. About 53% of American households have a TV.
- 1954: The first color TVs go on sale. The first color broadcast aired nationwide is the Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena, California, on New Year's Day. NBC's sitcom "The Marriage," starring real-life couple Hume Cronyn and Jessica Tandy, becomes the first prime-time series produced in color.
- 1954: "The Tonight Show" airs, becoming the second longest-running show on TV.
- 1955: The first game show is "The \$64,000 Question."
- 1956: Zenith introduces the "Space Command" remote control which uses ultrasound to control channel and volume.
- 1960: The presidential debate between Nixon and Kennedy is the first ever shown on TV.
- 1961: Walt Disney's "Wonderful World of Color" spurs sales of color TVs. Kennedy gives the first live televised press conference.
- 1962: The launch of the communications satellite "Telstar I" makes global transmissions possible.
- 1964: A controversial ad called "Daisy" aired by the Johnson campaign depicts a young girl obliterated by a nuke in TV's first political ad.
- 1964: The first made-for-TV movie, "See How They Run," starring Leslie Nielsen, Jane Wyatt, and John Forsythe, airs on NBC.
- 1965: Half of all programming is in color.
- 1966: 100% of prime-time shows are in color.
- 1970: RCA introduces the first electronic remote control that uses digital signals.
- 1972: Home Box Office (HBO) becomes the first paid television channel. (cont)





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

- 1975: The first navel on TV belongs to Cher, during "The Sonny and Cher Comedy Hour."
- 1977: The first VCRs and VHS tapes go on

- 1980: CNN becomes the first 24-hour news channel. The first remotes using infrared technology go on sale.
- 1981: MTV debuts.

- 1996: DVD players and DVD movies are introduced. The first movie ever commercially released on DVD is "Twister."
- 1997: Netflix is founded. The first plasma TVs are introduced.
- 2006: The Hollywood movie "The History of Violence" starring Viggo Mortensen, Ed Harris, and William Hurt becomes the final movie ever released on VHS.
- 2016: The last company to manufacture VCRs Actor Bela Lugosi was buried in full Dracula goes out of business.



Italian furniture

With its carved giltwood trim and rich velvet upholstery, this sofa would look right at home among the opulent Baroque and extravagant Rococo styles of the 18th century. It was made much more recently, in fact, by Jumbo Collection, a contemporary Italian furniture company that was founded in 1985. It sold for \$1,188 at a Hindman auction.

Italian furniture may be Contemporary associated with postmodern, avant-garde trends like Radical Design, Studio Alchimia and Memphis, but older styles are always coming back. Rococo style was revived, like many other past design styles, in the 19th century, and came back into fashion once more in the early 20th century. Today's design may tend towards minimalism; the simple, functional mid-century modern look is popular, but the pendulum always swings back; decorations like elaborate carving, gilded trim and lush fabrics may come back again before we know it!

Q: I was given this medicine cabinet by a dentist many years ago. Any idea on what it would be worth?

A: Medical and dental equipment, including cabinets, are popular with collectors. Value depends on their size, condition, material and

unusual features like rotating cases or other movable parts. Your cabinet is by Clark & Roberts, a company that made dental cabinets, exam tables and other medical furniture in the early 20th century. A cabinet by Clark & Roberts sold at auction a few years ago for about \$500. More recently, similar cabinets by other or unknown manufacturers have sold for about \$200 to \$700. Having the label with the maker's name increases the value. Asking prices online can go from about \$400 to over \$1,000. An auction house or dealer who specializes in medical or dental collectibles may be able to give you a more precise estimate.

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Fight back against fleas

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: My apartment has been infested with fleas all summer! I'm so frustrated. My two cats are suffering from hot spots and patchy fur because of the flea bites, and I've constantly got bites all over my legs. I don't want to give my cats flea medicine because I heard it is dangerous to their health. What can I do to get rid of these fleas? -- Cara J. in Macon, Georgia

DEAR CARA: You're going to have to plan an all-out assault on the flea infestation, and do it as soon as possible.

Talk to your veterinarian about the health risks and benefits of various flea and tick treatments. Ticks can give your cats heartworm and tapeworm. Your cats' health is at greater risk right now from not doing anything than they would be from an effective treatment.

Next, get rid of the fleas and their eggs in your house with a complete cleaning and treatment. Take down the curtains and wash and dry them. Wash all your bedding and clothes. Dust from ceiling to floor. Vacuum the carpets thoroughly. Wash all mats and put out in the sun to dry. Clean every corner of the apartment. Clean fabric furniture with a steam cleaner. Flip the sofa and vacuum up all the dust bunnies and dirt. Finally, with the cats sequestered in a safe room, treat the carpet to kill remaining fleas and their eggs. You can use a direct spray or an insecticide that is sprinkled into the carpet and vacuumed up.

This all-out assault will nearly wipe out the fleas in your home. But they can (and will) come back. To keep them on the retreat, vacuum twice a week, wash your cats' bedding weekly, and make sure the cats get their flea/tick/heartworm medication on schedule.





K2 presumptives: Too late for too many

Sixteen thousand veterans who served at K2 are now eligible for expanded Department of Veterans Affairs benefits. This will be welcome (and overdue) news for many.

K2, also known as Karshi-Khanabad and Camp Stronghold Freedom, was an Uzbekistan airbase used from 2001 to 2005 during Operation Enduring Freedom after the Sept. 11 attacks.

The VA is now making Gulf War illnesses a presumptive in those who served at K2, recognizing that those who served there were exposed to "several contaminants of concern" and ensuring that exposures to those toxins are taken into account for K2 veteran claims -- all good steps forward.

But it wasn't always so. A 2015 study detailed all the multiple types of cancer among those who'd served at K2. The VA rejected the information and claimed there was no high rate of cancer even though there had been many documented cases.

A 2020 congressional study, however, opened up some previously classified documents that showed the toxins and hazards were very real and so were the health consequences:

Kerosene, jet fuel, contaminated soils that could "cause adverse health effects," particulate uranium, elevated levels matter, tetrachloroethylene, burn pits, jet fuel plumes, radiation exposure, asbestos in the soil and more.

One of the veterans who testified before the committee said that they'd constantly been told there was no risk from the toxic exposures. Further, any high environmental readings were blamed on faulty test equipment.


A Deployment Health Clinical Center (now the Psychological Health Center of Excellence) advice sheet instructed medical staff to "listen actively" when returning service members expressed concerns about exposure to toxins at K2. "It often helps rapport if you thank them" for their service, it says. But meanwhile, yeah, they tried to abate radiation in the soil with more soil dumped on top, and you walked around in glowing green water and breathed in jet fuel fumes. But hey, the protective measures were effective, and would you like a mental health consultation?

Moments in time THE HISTORY CHANNEL

- On Sept. 16, 1951, 19 people enjoying an air show in Colorado were tragically killed when a monoplane performing stunt maneuvers crashed into the crowd at a Colorado air show. The pilot was performing a snap roll when a wing caught on the ground and propelled the craft into spectators.
- On Sept. 17, 2006, an E. coli outbreak, blamed on spinach, occurred in the United States. The vegetable was recalled from stores and three deaths were attributed to the outbreak.
- On Sept. 18, 1973, future president Jimmy Carter filed a report with the National Investigations Committee on Aerial Phenomena, claiming he had seen a UFO several years previously in Leary, Georgia, which he described as a silent ball of light that changed size, brightness and color over a period of 10-12 minutes.
- On Sept. 19, 1995, The New York Times and The Washington Post published the Unabomber's 35,000-word manifesto, as in June he had said he would kill again if they did not do so by a specific deadline. The FBI hoped the publication might help reveal his identity.
- On Sept. 20, 1881, following the assassination of James Garfield, Vice President Chester Arthur was inaugurated on Sept. 20, 1881, becoming the third person to serve as president in that year. Interestingly, Garfield's assassin wrote to Arthur from jail, taking credit for his promotion into the White House.
- * On Sept. 21, 1955, eight women launched America's first lesbian-rights group, the Daughters of Bilitis, initially as a social alternative to the frequently raided bar scene. The group eventually grew into a national advocacy organization.
- On Sept. 22, 1828, Shaka, founder of the Zulu Kingdom of southern Africa, was murdered by his two half-brothers after his mental illness threatened to destroy the Zulu tribe. Although at first a brilliant military organizer, his grief at losing his mother in 1827 led him to enact strange laws, including a prohibition against planting crops and using milk, and to order the execution of all pregnant women and their husbands. The crisis came when he sent his army on an extensive military operation, and upon their returning exhausted, immediately commanded them out again.

Massive data breach

The word going around is that hackers have stolen 2.9 billion Social Security numbers, which means everyone. And now it appears all that information, including other personal information, has been released on the internet. That batch of data can include not only Social Security numbers, but names, phone numbers, current and former addresses, lists of relatives and more.

It's time to get very, very serious about protecting our personal data, our identity, our banking information and everything else. Although the horse is out of the barn when it comes to that information being released, there are still steps we can take to try to protect ourselves.

Don't carry your Social Security card in your wallet. Leave it at home, perhaps in an envelope inside a cabinet where you can access it easily.

Change your passwords. Use not only letters but numbers and symbols in your new passwords.

When you get a Medicare statement about any medical treatment you've had, go over it carefully to be certain there's nothing listed that you didn't get.

Be more cautious than ever about answering the phone. It's possible for thieves to fake the number they're calling from, and they can appear to be from your bank or another company you know. Never answer any questions about your personal information.

Be suspicious about any email you receive that asks for personal information. Don't click any links and just delete the email.

Send for your credit reports (or get them online) to check all your information. Put a freeze on all three credit bureaus at the same time. Those are TransUnion, Equifax and Experian. With a freeze, no one will be able to open a new account in your name because no one can check your credit. If necessary, you can do a temporary freeze lift if you're applying for credit somewhere. All three credit bureaus have this option available by phone.

Of all the data breaches we've had, this is the worst.







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DVT Patient Switches to Aspirin With Good Results

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am an 81-year-old female who has been on Xarelto for years due to deep vein thrombosis (DVT). I also have an inferior vena cava (IVC) filter. I read that lowdose aspirin (325 mg) is just as effective in preventing clots in the legs as Xarelto, which is very expensive. My doctor advises against changing to aspirin, but won't give me an explanation as to why.

I switched anyway, and the redness in my foot disappeared. After one month of taking 325 mg of coated aspirin daily, I have no symptoms and actually feel better. What are your thoughts? --A.B.

ANSWER: Although aspirin is better than nothing, it has been proven to be less effective than Xarelto and similar medicines in people who are at risk for blood clots. In a yearlong trial comparing the two, recurrences of DVT (a blood clot in the deep veins of the leg) occurred in just over 1% of people taking Xarelto and in 4.4% of people taking aspirin. (This study used low-dose aspirin -- 100 mg -- rather than the full-dose of 325 mg that you are taking.) The risk of bleeding was about the same among the aspirin group and the Xarelto group.

Aspirin is an anti-inflammatory, which may be why the redness in your foot disappeared. I doubt it had anything to do with a blood clot.

For people at a high risk, I recommend against changing from a more-effective medicine like Xarelto to aspirin. In your case, you are protected against a blood clot in the lung by your filter, which is designed to catch any clot before it can get to the lung. Unfortunately, the IVC filter slightly increases the risk of a recurrence of a blood clot in the legs, so it's important to keep taking medication to reduce your risk.

Given the serious nature of a blood clot, I can't recommend disregarding your doctor's advice, although you deserve a thorough explanation from your doctor. If the main issue for your wanting to change medications is the expense, you might ask your doctor if there are lessexpensive alternatives that would still be as effective as Xarelto. The manufacturer also offers a program to help with expenses.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am a 67-year-old woman in good health. I have been taking omeprazole for at least 10 years, and it was originally prescribed to help chronic cough. With all the talk of an increased dementia risk from this medication, what is the safest way to wean off of it? -- C.H.

ANSWER: There is some evidence that protonpump inhibitors like omeprazole increase dementia risk. But the evidence isn't strong, and there are studies that haven't shown a risk. Still, omeprazole and similar drugs do have the potential for long-term side effects, and it is always worth a periodic trial off of the medicine to see whether it is still needed.

If you and your physician agree to stop the medication, my usual recommendation is to cut the dose in half for a week, then take it every other day for another week before stopping. People on a high dose may need to cut the dose in half twice.


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
