BOSTON SCI-FILM FESTIVAL

The "festival"—as we currently number them—began with SF1 in 1976.

It is the longest, continuously running genre film festival in the United States and the second longest running film festival worldwide.

The Boston Science Fiction Film Festival is renowned not only for its longevity, but also for its consistent high quality, tradition, strong sense of community, and, more recently, for its educational components and robust engagement of filmmakers. Reflecting this status, Boston SciFi has several times been named one of the top film festivals worldwide. For the first 40 years, the festival was primarily the 24-hour Boston Science Fiction Film Marathon, although some years featured add-on "festival days" with feature films, shorts, and events. The multi-day Boston Science Fiction Film Festival, as its now configured, began in 2016 with SF41. The traditional 24-hour Marathon lives on as the Festival's concluding, signature event.

With one exception, all of the film festival Marathons have been held in February on the Sunday and Monday of the President's Day holiday (formerly Washington's Birthday weekend). SF30 in 2005 was held on Saturday and Sunday of the holiday weekend.

The Boston SciFi Marathon is a continuous 24-hour event—with the tag line "Old enough to know better. Young enough to stay awake". The official times are Sunday noon to Monday noon. SF10 was 36 hours, which began at midnight Sunday rather than noon. SF25 was 25 hours as was SF30. SF1 took place just a few days after the historic "Blizzard of 1978." Due to another historic blizzard (the second of two February 2015 blizzards just a week apart), that closed all public transportation, the SF40 24-hour Marathon—the "Blizzard Edition"—began at 4 pm Sunday to give attendees more time to arrive.

SF1 through SF11 were held at the Orson Welles Cinemas in Cambridge, Massachusetts, which also included a "Night Flight" in its smallest cinema from Sunday midnight to noon Monday. (The Orson Welles was destroyed by a fire prior to SF12.) SF12 through SF14 were held at the Somerville Theatre in Somerville, Massachusetts. SF15 through SF28 were held at the Coolidge Corner Theatre in Brookline, Massachusetts. SF/29 was held at the Dedham Community Theater in nearby Dedham, Massachusetts. SF30 was held at the Somerville Theatre. SF31 was held at the West Newton Cinema in Newton, Massachusetts. SF32 returned to the Somerville Theatre where all of the Boston SciFi festivals have been held through 2020 (SF45). Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, SF46 (2021) will be a virtual film festival event with live-streamed components and a real-time 24-hour Marathon.

Today's festival routinely includes between 80–100 films (features and shorts), panel discussions, workshops, and special events spanning an 11–day period. (Note: due to the pandemic, 2021's SF46 has a truncated timeframe.) Over the years, the Marathon and Festival have featured a plethora of guest speakers, filmmakers, actors, writers, and industry artists. [The Boston SciFi team may be able to provide highlights and additional background information regarding this impressive list of people.]

A tremendous tradition has grown up around both the 11-day film Festival and its concluding 24-hour Marathon. Individuals have met at this event, married, and have had children who themselves have grown-up with the Boston SciFi Film Festival and Marathon. Many of the traditions, including games, trivia contests, cosplay, audience participation, the Marathon's "In Memoriam", community-formed groups (e.g., the Martian Liberation Organization or MLO), cartoons, hilarious trailer reels, and more have endured and enriched the Boston SciFi community for decades.


