


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












EAR of the Ozarks By David Bell

I live in the midst of plenty, with an embarrassment of riches... riding-wise, that is. I'm surrounded by ribbons of pavement winding along the ridges and hills and valleys of the Ozarks. They pass through gorgeous scenery, often beside the creeks and streams that have carved the rugged landscape and terrain of northern Arkansas.

One of my favorite rides in the Heart of the Ozarks

here are numerous Ozarks highways that I can string together for a great ride. And my cure for a common weekend is a ride through the Ozarks — one that captures the essence of this wonderful area. Depending on whether I want to cruise leisurely or drag a knee on its sharp curves, a ride can eat up an entire day or it can be over in a few hours. Here's the lowdown on some of the fantastic stretches of road I consider the 'Heart of the Ozarks'.

I can motor 11 miles south out of Ber-

ryville on AR 21, to a dot on the map called Metalton, and catch County Road 719. This back road cutoff intersects with AR 103 and runs east to U.S. 412. I stay on AR 103 and ride east to Osage, home to a few houses and a pottery shop located a historic country store. The community, though, is mostly a way point on my ride. From Osage, AR 103 makes a wonderful serpentine run to AR 43, which weaves down into the Buffalo River/Boxley Valley area at Ponca.

The homesteaded community of Pon-

ca is a tiny place on the extreme north end of the beautiful Boxley Valley. However, it does have a thriving economy based on canoeing, hiking and other outdoor activities, including riding the fantastic roads of the area. It sits on the southern end of one of the best sport bike stretches in the Ozarks, the 14 miles of AR 74 from Ponca to Jasper, and it climbs more than 600 feet vertically via a series of switchbacks rivaling the Dragon. There are heavily timbered dropoffs on the west side and a steep hillside on

the east side.

Eleven miles from Ponca, keep an eye out for Wayne Clark's whimsical motorcycle tree. He started hanging mostly Japanese bikes on this tree "because I could get them so cheap," he says with a smile. It's true motorcycle art and a don't-miss photo opportunity.

In Arkansas there's a town called Diamond City. But there's only one true jewel in the crown of the Ozarks — the small mountain village of Jasper, on AR 7. Jasper and Newton County prospered in the 1960s and '70s after the designation of the Buffalo River as the nation's first National River. Coincidentally the area also benefited from the influx of back-to-the-earth hippies. Locals and the newly arrived counterculture types got along very well, and Jasper developed into this wonderful recreational destination. More recently, motorcyclists discovered Jasper and it has grown into a popular stop for riders.

Jasper has several restaurants, shops and lodging for riders. Plus, there are no better roads in the Ozarks than those in Newton County.

Continuing to ride south on AR 7, I catch AR 374 and cruise over to AR 123 and my next way-point, Mount Judea, another tiny Ozarks mountain community.

The 50-mile stretch of AR 123 from Mount Judea — locals call it "Mount Judy" — to Clarksville is one of the best single-highway rides in the Ozarks. AR 123 climbs south from Mount Judea with three-and-a-half miles of switchbacks and tight curves. The highway features both broad and tight sweepers that run across a line of beautiful ridges. There's a spot where AR 123, AR 7, and AR 16 all intersect — Pelsor, aka Sand Gap. I call it 'The Trifecta', the intersection of three great Ozarks highways

There's a '30s era country store there that's a convenient rally point, Hankins Country Store. It's a convenient place to grab a burger or sandwich, a snack, a bottle of water, or fuel up yopur ride. AR 123 dives southwest from Pelsor and crosses one of the Ozarks' premier float streams, Big Piney, via a beautiful 1930s-era one-lane steel-truss bridge. I stopped to photograph the bridge and a couple of sport bike riders pulled over to chat before continuing their attack on the highway

My ride continues south to U.S. 64, which takes me west to Clarksville. From this small college town I can get home by a couple of different great routes. On this ride I take AR 103 north, not physically connected to the previously traveled AR 103 through Osage. This section of AR 103 soon becomes very twisty ride, as it climbs back into the Heart of the Ozarks. It leads to AR 215 and yet another tiny mountain town called Oark, with no "z". It's a very popular stop with riders and is home to the oldest continuously operating general store in Arkansas — since 1890. It features a wonderful restaurant, serving great burgers, homemade pies and much more. And it has fuel.

Taking the winding AR 21back west out of Oark leads to a ride north on half of the Pig Trail, on AR 23. The 24-mile long Pig Trail earns its unique moniker mostly because it's a fantastic scenic and twisty ride. At the intersect AR 16 I'm officially off the Pig Trail and AR 23 and AR 16 run together for a few miles. I can either stay on AR 23 north to Eureka Springs, or take AR 16 to AR 21. AR 21 breaks off south down into the lower Boxley Valley, headwa-

ters of the Buffalo River. The valley is often described as one of the most gorgeous areas in the entire Ozarks and AR 21 takes me back home to Berryville.

With the conclusion of this ride I have completed one of the most iconic rides in the Heart of the Ozarks.

Hidden amongst the mountains and lush foliage of the Ozarks are fantastic geological features, like Hawksbill Crag, beautiful scenery, and serpentine roads. Here are six of the most challenging of those winding roads for your consideration.

The Pig Trail/AR 23 – Ozark to Brashears – c. 24 mi.

The Pig Trail/AR 23 – Ozark to Brashears – c. 24 mi. Without equivocation, it can say that AR 23 has more of what most every rider wants, all rolled into one bold and often brash stretch of asphalt. Over the years, various driving and car magazines have named AR 23 in general, and The Pig Trail specifically, as one of the best driving roads in America. Ditto for riding. Ozark, Ark., on the Arkansas River, was named for the mountains to the north. And that's where the renowned 'Pig Trail' begins. Practically, though, it runs from I-40 north to Brashears on AR 16. The Pig Trail was a popular route to football games of the Arkansas Razorbacks.

AR 9 – Allison to Melbourne – c. 20mi.

This ride is in the eastern Ozarks is one of the very best stretches of highway in the Ozarks... AR 9. It runs south of Melbourne, Ark., down to AR 5 at Allison. Not as many riders have discovered this highway – on my list of the Top Ten Roads – as say "The Pig Trail". This fantastic sportbike ride is as twisty as The Pig Trail , and equally as exciting. If you just looked at the Arkansas State Highway map you might definitely overlook this ride. But a quick glance at DeLorme's fine Arkansas Atlas and Gazettier will give a better feel for what this road has to offer. This is a genuine "money" highway.

AR 9, from Allison to Melbourne, is a Butler Maps gold rated road for good reason.

AR 74 – from Ponca to Jasper – c. 14 mi.

Ponca sits in the north end of Boxley Valley and is home to the upper Buffalo National River. But, it's also on the western end of one of the best stretches of roads in the Ozarks... AR 74. After crossing the Buffalo, AR 74 climbs over 600 feet in elevation on very winding pavement. It's a twisty ride on to Jasper. The road is fantastic, as is the destination, Jasper, a wonderful mountain village.

The mile-and-a-half romp out of Ponca on AR~74 is as much fun as the Dragon and other popular roads.





AR 27 - Tilly to Hector - c. 27 mi.

Amid all the great roads in the Heart of the Ozarks, others are often overlooked as they spread across the Boston Mountains. And one of those roads you really should give a try is Arkansas 27. It begins at Harriet at AR 14 and runs almost the entire length of the state to the Coastal Timber area of extreme southwest on US 71. Besides running over and along numerous ridges and through deep valleys, the road runs down the steep mountains into the Arkansas River Valley at Russellville. Switchbacks and hair pin curves climb into the Ozarks.

Push Mountain – AR 341 – c. 25 mi.

Push Mountain is a long and lonely road running from AR 14 to AR 201 at Norfork and AR 5. It runs up and over Push Mountain. The National Forest is dense but mostly back from the road right-away. A long stretch of tight, curvy pavement greets you on the southern four-fifths of the road. Riders from central Arkansas love coming up to spend the day riding this highway. The tiny town of Norfork is a great rendezvous spot for anyone beginning or ending a Push Mountain Road ride.

AR 123 – from Mt. Judea to Clarksville – c. 48 mi.

There's a little burg on AR 123 called Mt. Judea (locally pronounced Mt. Judy.) It's situated at the "headwaters" –if you will allow me a canoe analogy – of one of the top roads in the Ozarks. The 48-mile length of the highway from Mt. Judea to AR 164 near Clarksville is fantastic, but the stretch from Mt. Judea to Pelsor, on AR 7, that fills the bill for this topic. Don't miss any of the great ride.

What is is it about being in the middle of nowhere that's so much fun on a ride? Whether it's in the backwoods on an ADV bike or just out on lesser traveled pavement on a street bike, you will certainly come across little places with tons of personality and scenic beauty. Or perhaps it's the excitement of discovering interesting places with lots of history or charm.

Here are five off-the-beaten-path places you should check out. PONCA If there's a 'home base' for floating as well as the other wonderful activites available on the Buffalo it would have to be

the community of Ponca, found in the gorgeous Boxley Valley at the intersection of AR 43 and AR 74. The Buffalo was named for the animals that once pop[ulated the valley... elk, too. Elk have been reintroduced and now thrive in the area. All roads into Ponca are fantastic riding & driving roads, along with great scenery.

WINSLOW There are several disjointed roads that carry the AR 74 designation... all are wonderful roads. But, the one that crosses I-49 is exceptionally nice. It's twisty, runs through drop-dead

gorgeous scenery and leads not only through an interesting little berg but also to a dynamite Arkansas state park – Devil's Den. It was constructed during the WPA era by CCC workers of the '30s. AR 74 there is real treat for riders and drivers. It has vintage cabins, and camping picnic areas, along with a rock dam forming a wonderful lake. Winslow used to be known for its logging, carried to markets on the north/south railroad, which is still commercially active today.

Rush This former zinc mining town at one time was home to as many as 5,000. They were expecting the ore they discovered was



silver, but turned out to be zinc. It was mined there until the bottom fell out of the zinc market right after WW-I, Today it's a genuine, real-deal 1880s ghost town, located just a few miles off AR 14 on Newton Co. Road 6035, and sits on the Buffalo River. A visit to Rush is a visit to life in the Ozarks of the 19th Century. And like those Western and Southwestern mining towns that became home to 'ghosts', you may feel like you're being watched.

Natural Dam Natural Dam, Ark. is a rural rural bedroom community for Ft. Smith and Van Buren. The small, natural lake on Lee Creek, was created by a rock ledge across the river, forming a natural dam. It's on AR 59, 15 miles north of Van Buren, just off the Wild Hog Ride. The best approach, highway-wise, is AR 220 from Devil's Den south to AR 59, then north. Slip your swim suit on under your jeans and take a dip in this old-fashioned swimming hole.

Gilbert The founding force for Gilbert, Ark. was the abundant timber reserves of this area of the Buffalo River valley. A railroad ran to Gilbert, but went away when the timber was used up. The old store survives, along with several residences. It thrives on the recre-

ational opportunities provided by the Buffalo River. You can't get more "off the beaten path" than Gilbert. AR 333 runs three miles from U.S. 65 at Ferguson's Country Store and it's a real trip to the past. Rent a canoe, get something to eat, or take a picture.

Harrison...

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An important part of planning an excursion to a fantastic region like the Ozarks is where to base your trip. Ideally, it should be a location that allows the best riding and touring opportunities within easy reach. Also, those roads should take you to interesting places with great spots to to explore and allow you to enjoy the area's ambiance.

Besides the convenient cruising, your base has certain requirements that most riders expect. That would be a wide variety of places to eat, with variety of comfortable accommodations to pick from, and places to unwind after a long day on the road. And over the years, Harrison has grown into just that type of city, a place

that motorcycle riders and sports car drivers appreciate. And the town has willingly embraced that role.

Harrison sits in an expanse of Ozarks prairie smack in the middle of the great roads you want and has all those other amenities you expect. Plus, the fantastic riding you are looking for is within easy



know about are near Harrison, within easy reach. Presented here is four-day plan to experience some of the best riding in the heart of the Ozarks presented to me by a reader who planned the ride out and emailed it to me. They, too, are based in Harrison. I think it's a wonderful riding experience so I present it to you for your consideration. It includes what most folks consider the most desirable roads in the Ozarks, like scenic AR 7. But there's also AR 43, 123, 103, 74, 14, 27, 341 (aka Push Mountain) and several up across the state line in Missouri. Many of the iconic locations you want to visit are on or near those roads.

On these iconic Ozarks byways are the places you want to, or need to be sure to, visit: the Boxley Valley; Ponca (with its reintroduced elk herd); the Pig Trail; the entire Buffalo River; the quad-lakes on the White River; Mountain View; Branson/Silver Dollar City; the Peel Ferry; the four historic Missouri Water Mills in Ozark County; and many others.

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


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
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

Until Bull Shoals Lake was built, AR 7 ran from Missouri to Louisiana. Today it begins at Diamond City. After Scenic 7 crosses the Arkansas River Valley at Russellville it runs into the Ouachita Mountains, then the timberland in southern Arkansas.

And I only have to do what I enjoy anyway... that's just to Cruise the Ozarks.


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
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
