Dear friends,

How wonderful it is to enjoy brighter, longer, warmer days - not one, but two bank holiday weekends - and the effulgence and vitality of spring! I hope this finds you in good heart for any or all of those reasons.- in good heart, for in this season of the church year we remember Jesus' resurrection – His victory over death.

We also remember His ascension, which was (initially at least) an unsettling time for His first followers. They had only just adjusted to the shock of His miraculous resurrection when they had to say goodbye to Him again on the Mount of Olives as He ascended to heaven.

But why? In John's Gospel we are reminded by Jesus, speaking to His disciples, that "it is for your good that I am going away. Unless I go away, the Advocate will not come to you; but if I go, I will send Him to you" (John 16:7).

Jesus ascends back to the right hand of the Father so that He might send His Holy Spirit on His Church. That's what we celebrate at Pentecost - but that's next Month! Psalm 121 has always been one of my favourite Psalms:

both now and forevermore

A few years ago my wife, Deirdre and I went to the Lake District in the late Spring. A heavy snowfall took us by surprise but the roads soon cleared and we were able to take a drive up along the shore of Wast Water, the deepest lake in England.

It is a dramatic route as the hillside on the far side of the lake drops down almost sheer into the lake and it was made more impressive by the blanket of snow.

We walked up to Wasdale Head but it was too snowy and stormy to walk on further up towards Scafell Pike. We went into the isolated little Church of St Olaf that stands below the mountains. It is the smallest Parish Church in England but was a welcome oasis of calm against the tumultuous weather outside.



There is a little window there with the first verse of Psalm 121 engraved on it and a depiction of Napes Needle on Great Gable. It was placed in memory of those from the local climbing club who fell in the two World Wars.

What an uplifting find but for the snow we might never have stumbled upon. Mountains have always been a source of awe and wonder. They are beautiful, and they can be dangerous places. They are a place of peace but also of storms.

Many cultures have placed their Deities' home in the mountains and when God appears in the Old Testament, it is usually on a mountain. When Jesus was transfigured, it was on a mountain and it is where he went to pray and talk to God His Father and, of course he gave his Sermon "on the Mount".

For me Psalm 121 is a prayer of Faith and Spiritual Comfort. In difficult times it is easy to wonder who is going to help one? This Psalm poses that question and answers it in no uncertain terms with an affirmation of our Faith that God has been and will always be there to look after us and that we can call with confidence to God for his help and protection at any time. How comforting that is.

JONATHAN SCOTT

Described as "The leading British organist" (BBC RADIO 3), Jonathan Scott enjoys a hugely varied international performing career on a diverse spectrum of keyboard instruments, and is known throughout the world for his virtuoso arrangements and performances of major orchestral music for the pipe organ.

As Associate Artist of The Bridgewater Hall, Manchester, Jonathan gives a series of organ recitals which attract huge audiences, and with his brother; Tom, his performance videos on the Scott Brother Duo YouTube channel have achieved more than 90 million views. Recent and forthcoming performances include solo and concerto appearances across the UK as well as performances at the major festivals, venues and Concert Halls in Germany, France, Hungary, Norway, Italy, Estonia, Finland, Poland, Switzerland, Belgium, Latvia, Sweden, Netherlands, Spain, Taiwan, South Korea and Singapore.

Other recent concert highlights include a series of Concerto performances with the National Chinese Orchestra of Taiwan and the Hong Kong Chinese Orchestra, the reopening concerts at the organs of Rochdale Town Hall, UK, St Mary's Basilica, Kevelaer, Germany and All Saints Church, Warsaw, Poland, as well as the only solo organ concert for the 2024 BBC Proms, broadcast live from the organ of the Royal Albert Hall, London.

Jonathan gave the world premiere of the new organ concerto '6000 Pipes!' by Sir Karl Jenkins for Hull, UK City of Culture and has toured this work, including a special gala performance at the Royal Albert Hall, London, with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by the composer.

Jonathan also has a busy international concert schedule with his pianist brother, Tom Scott, performing as Scott Brothers Duo; they are the winners of the ECHO (European Cities of Historical Organs) competition to create a performance which introduces the pipe organ to a young audience. Their project combines animation and organ music and will be performed at major festivals across Europe.

Born in Manchester, Jonathan studied piano and organ at Chetham's School of Music and continued his studies in the UK, USA and Netherlands. He won the Worshipful Company of Musicians WT Best Scholarship and gold medal, and is a Freeman of The City of London.

Jesus' Miracles

In the last of this series of articles on the stained glass windows of St Mary's Church, Dedham we are going to look at a depiction of one of Jesus' Miracles: "The Raising of Lazarus from the Dead" (John 11: 1-44). This three panel window is in the North Aisle of the Church. It was installed around 1886 and from the style would appear to be by the prestigious stained glass window makers Clayton and Bell.



The Raising of Lazarus from the Dead

The window shows Lazarus on the right side emerging from his tomb still in the linen shroud from his burial and really looking as if he has just risen from the dead. In the middle section Jesus is standing and a speech ribbon above His head reads "Jesus cried 'Lazarus come forth'."

Jesus stands with His right hand raised in blessing and He looks sad as He gazes down at the plight of His friend Lazarus who had been through death but had been resurrected.

Perhaps Jesus is contemplating that He too would go through this same ordeal.

In the left hand panel are Lazarus' two sisters, Mary, who would later anoint Jesus' feet with

perfume (John 12: 1-3), and Martha, who are looking on in amazement and relief.

The first miracle performed by Jesus had been turning water into wine at the wedding feast at Cana (John 2: 1-12). This miracle showed Jesus' power over things physical and revealed Him to be more than just a religious teacher or Rabbi. There is a fine stained glass window depicting this in St Peter and St Paul's Church in Lavenham.

Raising Lazarus days after his death showed Jesus' power over things spiritual and was so dramatic and changed the perception of Him to such a degree that the chief priests, and Pharisees fearful of Roman reprisals against a new Jewish leader, started plotting to kill Jesus. Caiaphas the high priest prophesied that Jesus would die to save not only the Jewish nation but all of the children of God (John 11: 45-57).

We have now looked at all the narrative stained glass windows in St Mary's Church, Dedham. There are also "Clear" glass windows with the odd panel of stained glass which are also beautifully designed and there are a few remaining panels of 15th and 16th century glass at the top of some plain windows which were not destroyed by the iconoclasts of the reformation.

We have looked at the main stories depicted, but there is much more to these stained glass windows.

Jesus' Miracles



If you are interested you could examine the more than 120 Angels depicted in the glass and study the wide variety of musical instruments that they are playing. One might ask, do, the angels in the Kempe windows of the chancel represent the 150th Psalm with its exhortation to praise the Lord upon a variety of instruments?

Or, in this age where facial hair on men seems to be becoming more and more in fashion, one could look in envy at the wide and wonderful range of most elaborate and luxuriant beards so carefully rendered on many of the

figures, Saints and Prophets.

Jesus' Miracles

In addition to their religious and artistic importance the windows provide a historical perspective on the eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries in Dedham. These windows were both donated by and dedicated to local parishioners and clergy, whom we have not had space to discuss in our brief journey around St Mary's Church, Dedham. I hope you have enjoyed the journey and reading the articles as much as I have enjoyed writing them.

Unfortunately many of the windows in the body of the church are falling into disrepair from the ravages of time and weather. The glass with its lead mounts, the supporting frames and the masonry around the windows will need extensive renovation if we are to save these valuable works of art. (The chancel windows have in the not too distant past been beautifully restored for which we are most grateful.)

These sort of repairs are, as you might expect, extremely expensive. We shall need to raise a sum well in excess of $\pounds 160,000$. The Parochial Church Council is working to raise funds.

We are grateful for a promise of support from the Friends of Dedham Church and hope to be able to secure some funding from grants but we shall still need to raise a substantial sum of money in addition. To this end we are reaching out to our Parishioners and visitors to the Church to ask for donations to this important cause. We hope that you will wish to donate.

A REFUGEE'S SPIRITUAL JOURNEY: FROM LOSS TO FAITH

In a small corner of London, surrounded by ancient buildings, I sat by my window, gazing at the grey sky. I never imagined that my long journey - fleeing my homeland after losing my family, my home, and everything I possessed would lead me to a deeper search for God.

Despite my intimate knowledge of Islam and Christianity, my belief in a divine being had always remained superficial at best. I thought that human beings had control over their own fate. But as I struggled with the hardships of life as a refugee, I began to see that my destiny wasn't entirely in my hands. My quest for freedom, which I once saw as a mere physical journey, became a spiritual one.

A Gradual Transformation

Life in Britain was far from easy. The burden of my past, the challenges of the present, the uncertainty of the future all pressed heavily on my shoulders. But through it all, there was one voice that never stopped guiding me - my mother's. A devout Catholic, she kept whispering to me, "Return to God; only He can give you peace."

My father, a Muslim, had left me a legacy of wisdom, but I struggled to grasp its depth. I found myself caught in the middle - between two faiths, two identities, between belief and doubt. I saw Christianity as a religion of peace and Islam as a path to divine wisdom.

A Precious Gift and a New Beginning

As Ramadan approached, my mother encouraged me to try fasting—not just as an act of worship, but as a means of

reflection and spiritual closeness to God. It was a new experience for me, one that opened doors I had never considered before. During this time, I received a precious gift: a bible from a close friend and mentor - someone I considered an older brother and a father figure.

Reading the Bible gave me new insights, and I also revisited the Quran with fresh eyes. I realised that just as the body needs nourishment, so does the soul. I understood that God was not distant but ever-present, waiting for His servants to call upon Him.

Finding Inner Peace

I became more certain that the path to God was not limited to rigid rituals but was instead a personal journey - an ongoing search for truth and peace. I wrote in my journal:

"No matter what your religion or background is, the path to God is the only salvation. If a person sincerely searches, they will find peace within their heart."

I no longer saw myself as just a refugee seeking a home but as a soul searching for meaning. Within the pages of the Quran and the Bible, I found my answer: God had always been there, all around me, simply waiting for me to lift my hands in prayer.

APRIL PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Notes from the meeting held on the $7^{\rm th}$ April 2025.

Issues Raised by Residents

A resident gave feedback from Ardleigh Surgery who are still offering support to patients on the new Anima booking system. The local Digital Support team was also very helpful

Concern was expressed about the water coming down Castle Hill and this will be investigated.

Munnings Museum

Further meetings have taken place between Cllr. Bourn and the trustees of the Munnings Museum. During these discussions, the trustees were advised that if they wish to proceed with the proposed dog exercise area, they should first consult with village residents, ideally by including a questionnaire in the parish magazine—a step they now plan to take.

Additionally, Cllr Bourn reported ongoing conversations with the trustees about other fundraising ideas and ways to strengthen connections between the museum and the local community.

One such proposal includes a joint intergenerational project in collaboration with the village primary school.

Tennis Club application for lighting on the courts

The application for flood lights had been refused by Colchester City Council planning department.

High Street Parking

A discussion was held with NEPP regarding the car park, during which a report was presented.

One of the proposals considered was to modify the current two-hour parking limit on the High Street. It was agreed that this issue requires further discussion and public consultation, and it may be included in the development of a Parish Plan.

Financial report

The financial report was approved.

Planning

The council are still waiting for further details on the plans for new houses (likely to be bungalows) on the Long Road West area of the village

Concern was expressed about Shakespeare House in the High Street Dedham and the plans to change the property from commercial to residential.

Community areas

It was agreed to rename the Dedham Notes Facebook page to Dedham Parish Council.

Litter Pick Up: It was agreed to seek views on the idea of a regular litter pick Which could possibly include the youth club and school.

Business Breakfast: It was agreed to consider this within discussions on Parish Plan

Anti-Social Issues

It was agreed to seek advice from police and other bodies about how best to monitor potential issues by the river and on the playing field in the summer.

Infrastructure

The group was now meeting regularly. It was noted that the Drinking fountain in the playing fields will be removed.

There are planned discussions with NEPP on car parking issues.

On Litter Bins, proposals to change the locations of some of the bins and provide new ones were agreed.

The Council agreed to keep in contact with other local councils on the impact of housing developments regarding surface water and Black Brook.

Traffic Survey Updates

The report on the survey on car usage and speeding in Crown Street was received. The report identified that 8% had exceeded the speed limit. There was also concern about increased frequency of HGVs through the village. This to be investigated further.

Website Development

The report on website development was agreed and council members will develop proposals with preferred bidder.

Annual Parish Meeting

It was agreed that the Annual meeting of residents will be held prior to the next Council meeting. If issues emerged that need wider discussion, they this could be brought into the consultations around the parish plan. *Cllr Douglas Bourn, Chairman*

Gardening Notes

WE PUT ON A SHOW!

Thank you to everyone who exhibited at or came along to our annual Spring Show. More than two dozen people entered classes for plants and flower arranging, cookery and photography this year.

Walking into the Assembly Rooms, visitors were hit with a riot of colour and the scent of spring.

Spring is our daffodil show with 15 separate classes to exhibit the best of your blooms. It's a great section to enter as nearly everyone has a daffodil or two in the garden or a planter.

However, the classification of daffodils can be confusing, so – if you are thinking about planting a few bulbs this autumn – here's more of an explanation.

Daffodil is the common name for the botanical classification of Narcissus (plural Narcissi). This bulbous perennial (it comes back and will slowly spread over the years) is typically shades of yellow but also white/cream and orange/ peach. But what are we talking about when we say trumpet, corona and perianth?

The stem and leaves sprout from the bulb planted in autumn and flower from February to May depending on variety and climate. The flower itself has two key parts: the corona in the centre, which is surrounded by the perianth.

If you think of the daffodil lying on the ground, sometimes it suggests a teacup resting on its saucer, and this gives a clue to one of the alternate names for the corona, the cup. Sometimes the corona is longer, so it's called a trumpet (imagine the cone-like shape of the musical instrument).

Still thinking of the flower lying on the ground, the perianth is the 'saucer' of six petals (they're actually tepals, but you don't need to care about that!). Now that you know all that (you'll thank me later), it will help you work out what to exhibit in which class.

Our classes are guided by the Royal Horticultural Society's classification of daffodils into thirteen descriptive divisions.

Classes 1-6 are for trumpet daffodils, identified by gently folding one of the petals forward. If they are the same length or shorter than the corona, then you have a trumpet.



Identify your large-cupped daffodils by folding the petals forward again. If they are longer than the corona (cup), then you have a cupped daffodil – some of the cups are small and will reach less than a third of the length of the petal, others are much wider/longer and dominate the flower. The latter are the ones to exhibit here.



Gardening Notes

Double daffodils can be confusing. The flower itself should be doubled with a mass of petals. A daffodil with two or more flowers on the stem is NOT classified as a double daffodil unless each of those flowers has that mass of petals.



Two or more flowers on a stem is classified as triandrus and you can enter these in classes 13 and 14). These two



classes are essentially for 'any other' type of daffodil. These include miniatures (flowers usually less than 50mm in diameter), weird-looking (I think) bulbocodium, and the pretty split-cupped.





Then there's the pheasant's eye (classes 11 and 12) – also called poeticus – which has pure white petals and an almost flat corona with a red rim.

If you can't be bothered remembering all that (though if you're not sure, just enter everything on your entry form and we can help you out on the day), just find 12 daffs, make them look nice in a vase and enter class 15! So now you know a bit more about how to exhibit daffodils in our next spring show and have a year to prepare!

We hope you'll also have a go in our Autumn Show, when it's all about the dahlia. There's no fee to enter as many classes as you like in either show.

Don't forget to support the Horticultural Society on Saturday 10th May at our annual plant sale in front of Dedham's church on the High Street from around 9-11.30am. If you have any plants that you've divided and don't need or any leftover cuttings and seedlings, we'd love to take them off your hands. Just bring them along or let us know in advance

Essex Newsman - Tuesday 09 January 1945

CANON RENDALL DIES AT THE AGE OF 93. Canon Gerald Henry Rendall. 8.D., LL.D., who has died at the age of 93, had lived in retirement at Dedham House. Dedham for nearly 34 years. He had been Canon of Chelmsford Cathedral since 1918. and Examining Chaplain to the Bishop since the foundation of the Diocese. Educated at Harrow (his birthplace) and Trinity College, Cambridge. Dr. Rendall distinguished himself early in his career in mathematics, history, and Shakespearean studies. To the end his interest Shakespeare was enthusiastic, for he was convinced that Edward de V'ete, Earl of Oxford, was Shakespeare, a theory he expounded various books and articles. From 1880 to 1897 Dr. Rendall was Principal University College, Liverpool, and then, for thirteen years headmaster Charterhouse from which post he retired 1911, making his home at Dedham. Two of his books were "Dedham its History" and "Dedham Described and Deciphered." His wife, whom he married 1887, died in 1938.

Essex Newsman - Friday 16 March 1945

PAINTERS SILVER WEDDING Sir Alfred Munnings, president of the Royal Academy, and Lady Munnings, whose home is at Castle House, Dedham, celebrated their silver wedding on Tuesday. Sir Alfred, who is 66, famous for his paintings of horses.

Daily Mirror - Saturday 14 April 1945

WHISKY FOR £261. Major Atfield Brooks, Essex Regiment, of Dedham, Essex, a prisoner of War in Germany. wrote home to his wife telling her to give a bottle of whisky which had been saved for his homecoming to be put up for auction at a Red Cross sale at Colchester. It fetched £261. (equivalent to £14,395 today)

The original photograph of the VE Party in the Hewitt Hall is held in the Muniment Room collection in the Church. A few years ago a CD of Photographs of Dedham was published and this photograph was appeared there, along with many other photographs of Dedham. The photograph had a scratch across the middle, so for the purpose of this magazine it was cleaned up using AI techniques, also a procedure called Upscaling was applied to it, to improve the resolution.

If anyone reading this magazine has any memories of this party or VE Day in 1945, we would like to hear from you.




