### Eggs Galore!




# Holy Week Recap

### Easter Sunday at CPC

There wasn't an empty pew in the sanctuary as we gathered to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. From the first note to the final "Amen," the room was filled with life, hope, and the good news that He is risen indeed! Our praise team and choir led us in beautiful, Spirit-filled worship, joined by the bright, triumphant sound of the trumpet ringing out "Jesus Christ Is Risen Today."

And the children—what a joy to see them discovering "little Jesus" figures tucked in unexpected places around the sanctuary. With each tiny find, they were reminded (and reminded us!) that Jesus still shows up where we least expect Him.









Outside, the flowering of the cross became a powerful visual of new life. One by one, people of all ages came forward to add fresh blooms, turning a symbol of death into something vibrant and alive.

Through music, the message, and the communion we experienced with one another, we were reminded that this is no idle tale. The tomb is empty. Jesus is alive. And we are a resurrection people!

May has arrived in all its sneezy, sun-dappled glory! The CPC grounds are blooming, the birds are singing, and so are weliterally. Before I launch into what's ahead, let's take a quick look back at the musical whirlwind we've been riding through Early March, Lent, and into Eastertide.

March began with a Children's service. **The Children's Chorus** sang "Thank You, Lord" complete with choreography. **Tom Fuller and Davis Henry** performed "All God's Critters", with Davis on ukulele, and **Emmett Dougherty** wowed us with "Didn't It Rain".

On March 5th, we observed Ash Wednesday with a quiet, contemplative service. **Ted Brancato** opened with a bluesy version of "When I Survey The Wondrous Cross" and the congregation sang beautiful chants composed by the Taizé Community of France. **The Chancel Choir** offered "Bless the Lord, O My Soul", featuring solos by **Pete Peterson**, **Tom Fuller**, **Amy Barnes**, **Kevin Thompson**, and **Georgia Goodman**. A veritable who's-who of CPC vocal talent!

The First Sunday of Lent (March 9) featured **Kevin Thompson** singing "How Can I Keep From Singing"
for the prelude. **The Praise Team** followed with
Paul Zach's "Fill Your Cup With Joy", led by **Tom Fuller**, whose cup—and vocal cords—runneth over.







On March 16, our unofficial St. Patrick's Day celebration opened with **Amey Barnes** playing "Hewlett" on the flute, **the Chancel Choir sang** "Thy Holy Wings". **Amey** returned with "Carolan's Memories" for a lovely Irishtinged postlude.

March 23 brought us a beautiful prelude by a quartet of bell ringers — Cathie Sayre, Janet Boyd, Tom Fuller, and bell choir leader Jared Miner—playing "Be Thou My Vision". The offertory was a touching rendition of an old hymn – "Stand By Me", sung by Tom Fuller and accompanied by Bill Anthony, Jr. on acoustic guitar, and new church member and member of the Praise Team, Jeff Moskovciak on electric guitar.

March 30 offered a double blessing: a prelude that was an original composition by **Amey Barnes** (lyrics and music!) sung by **Amey and Kevin Thompson**. **The Chancel Choir** brought back "Bless the Lord, My Soul" from Ash Wednesday for a well-deserved encore.

April 6—the 5th Sunday of Lent—opened with the **Bell Choir** playing "Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence", which they did beautifully. **Emmett Dougherty, Molly Keefe, June Perry, and Marin Dougherty** sang "Even When" for the offertory, with harmony by **Julie Baldassare**. And speaking of **Julie**, she returned for Communion with a soulful version of "Your Love Is My Song". I'm certain we'll be hearing more of that song - it's a toe tapper!

Palm Sunday (April 13)—Pastor Tracey's favorite service of the year—started in classic "Ted" fashion: with a couple of false starts on the piano. Once the kids heard the correct song they processed in, palm fronds waving, as they sang "Ho Ho Ho Hosanna" and "This Is The Day".

The Chancel Choir followed with the triumphant new anthem "Let The Rocks Cry Out", echoing the energy of Pastor Tracey's sermon.

Maundy Thursday (April 17) featured a simple yet moving soup-and-bread supper. During the washing of feet and hands, **Ted** played "Amazing Grace" on piano, and the service closed with the group singing "God Is So Good".

Then came Good Friday (April 18). The service opened with a somber jazz rendition of "Old Rugged Cross" by Ted Brancato. The Chancel Choir sang "Make Me a Channel of Your Peace", Julie Baldassare offered "O the Deep, Deep Love of Jesus", and Abby Dougherty played "What Wondrous Love Is This" on flute. A vocal quartet—Amey Barnes, Sharon Rosenberg, Pete Peterson, and Kevin Thompson—sang "Saw Ye My Savior", accompanied by Abby and Ted (on the newly-repaired pipe organ—kudos to Glenn Gray for his emergency electrical work!). The service ended with "Were You There", with the final verse movingly sung solo by Kevin Thompson.





And then... Easter (April 20)! We kicked it off with Dave De Rienzo on trumpet and Mari Green singing "Little David" (a little taste of what she'll be singing in her CPC sponsored concert on May 18th) as the gathering music. The Chancel Choir opened with the introit "Hear The Glad Sound", followed by a enthusiastic version of "Jesus Christ Is Risen Today"—complete with rhythm section, trumpet, and the mighty voice of Mari Green leading the way. We brought back "Glory To God" for the response to confession and also brought back our Praise Team member, Rick Hyman, from a long hiatus due to knee surgery, to sing it, along with Julie Baldassare. For the offertory, the Chancel Choir sang "Alleluia, Praise The Risen King" with percussion provided by Maddie Morman on synthesizer. Communion was a full-on family affair: the Chancel Choir along with Emmett and Marin Dougherty on vocals, Adam and August Dougherty on percussion, and Mari Green with more of that soulful singing. #### Dear Pedal People, November, 2024

I am very happy to announce that your support has allowed us to establish a new program in Sierra Leone with the Kola Nut Producer's Association in conjunction with Slow Food Sierra Leone. This fall they successfully unloaded their first shipment of bicycles and sewing machines after months at sea.

This new program has struck a chord with our donors and sponsors, people that I have had the pleasure of connecting with at our collections and speaking engagements this summer and fall. How these bikes will be helping the community of Kenema, Sierra Leonne is quite amazing, when fully considering that many of these bikes will be going directly to rural farmers.

Farms are the sole reason we have modern civilization. World history has existed largely around the most fertile places in the world for a reason. Where there is food there are people. Where there are people there are communities. By aiding farmers with our bicycles, we are helping the community prosper at its core. This new program will be empowering farmers to improve their lives and contribute to the well-being of their communities and the planet.

Alieu Sesay, pictured below, is one of the first farmers of our new program that has received an adult sized tricycle. This tricycle will greatly improve his productivity and health. Before this, Alieu had to carry 60kg (132lbs) of Kola Nuts on his head from his farm in Dalu Village to the Market in Kenema, a grueling 12-mile journey that has caused significant strain on his neck and back. Thanks to his new tricycle to help transport his crop, he will live a less strenuous, more prosperous life.

A community with productive farmers means a full and thriving population of people ready to seize the day on their own bicycles. These bicycles help people get where they need to be, and because of that, we are building thriving communities for years to come. Your support helps us continue to provide transportation that is putting food on the plates of people in Sierra Leone and everywhere we send our bicycles. Please consider making a donation today to help us put used bikes and sewing machines to good use.


