

How did the apostles and other followers grow the church and what were the obstacles they had in that growth. How does that growth and obstacles apply to our daily life today? BOOK CLUB

On October 17th, our church book club discussed The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks. The book told the true story of Henrietta Lacks, a poor Southern tobacco farmer whose cells were taken without her knowledge during medical treatment for cervical cancer. Henrietta died, but her cells, named HeLa by scientists, became the first "immortal" human cells grown in culture. HeLa cells were vital to the development of the polio vaccine and were used to uncover secrets of cancer, viruses, and atom bomb effects. They helped lead to important advances like in vitro fertilization, cloning, and gene mapping.

Despite the medical breakthroughs attributed to the cells as well as the monetization of them into a multimillion-dollar industry, Henrietta's family, struggling with basic needs, were kept in the dark for decades. Members of the book club used this novel as a springboard for discussion on issues such as informed consent, racism and healthcare, income and education disparity, and whether individuals should be compensated for scientific use of their own biomatter. The next meeting is November 21st at 7:00 p.m. in the den. The club will discuss Inheritance by Dani Shapiro.




MISSION

During our September meeting, the Mission team went through their disbursements for the year, with an increase of funds (compared to last year) serving local organizations, especially ones we have a strong relationship with.

Of all the disbursements distributed, 81% went towards local organizations (Anderson House, Camp Johnsonborg, CASA, City Relief, Clinton Fire Department, Clinton Rescue Squad, Family Promise, Flemington Food Pantry, Friendship Center for New Beginnings, Grow-A-Row, Habitat for Humanity ReStore (Clinton ReStore), Market Street Mission, Meals on Wheels, and Safe in Hunterdon) and 19% went towards national / international organizations (All Hands, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, and Samaritan's Purse).





THE GIVING TREE

We have from November 10 until December 1 to shop for friends and neighbors in need, many of whom we support during the year with our mission outreach. CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE



The handicap ramp was demolished thanks to the hard work of Zack Mo, Jake Treese, Paul Morrissette and his brother who was visiting NJ. A huge thank you to these gentlemen. Their efforts have saved us the demo cost. Excavation for the footings is scheduled for the last week of October and then construction of the ramp and stairs will begin. After the ramp is completed, templates for the railings will be made. Fabrication and installation of the railings could take up to 5 weeks.
