Pastoral Letter - Rev^d Brian Streeter

SACRIFICE

There is a question that often arises from the Parable of the Prodigal Son – who do you feel most sorry for in the story? The younger son who squanders his inheritance and doubts his father's love for him? Or the elder son who resents the return of his brother and refuses to take part in the celebration? The answer that is sometimes given is.....the fatted calf who will be sacrificed for the celebration!

The word sacrifice does not have a very good press. In March last year I wrote about the sacrifices that Ukrainians were having to make on a day-to-day basis, the sacrifices that parents likewise make for their children, and how both emulate the decision of Jesus to be sacrificed for each of us. Nevertheless, the word sacrifice is unpopular and as I said, does not get a very good press. When we hear the word "sacrifice" we often conjure up images like that of the fatted calf – sacrifice means cost, and possibly even the cost of life itself.

However, there is a better way to look at the word "sacrifice" and therefore, the meaning and value of the sacrifices that are made in our everyday lives. The word "sacrifice" derives from the word "sacred" and literally means "to make sacred". In turn, the word "sacred" means "to set apart" or "to make holy", normally for someone special like God. And I think this is a much better way of picturing the sacrifices that we sometimes have to make in our lives.

The farmer who works hard to make a living from the land, making sacrifices that are not always financially rewarding, can be encouraged that their work is honourable and set apart in the eyes of God. A mother or father who makes daily sacrifices to provide for the physical and emotional well-being of their child can likewise be encouraged that their sacrifices do not go unnoticed. That is to say, that farmers do not simply make sacrifices for the farm, the landscape, and their livestock; nor do parents simply make sacrifices for their children's well-being. Instead, farmers, parents, and anyone else who makes a willing sacrifice for others is also making a sacred gift, a holy offering, a sacrifice to the LORD God.

The Apostle Paul writing to Christians in Rome, wrote,

I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship.

Christians are encouraged not to think of sacrifices in their lives as the loss of something, as death is the association of the loss of life – the common picture of the word sacrifice. Instead, as Paul suggests above, our lives like our bodies are to be "a living sacrifice". We live to serve, we live to give, we live to make sacrifices for others – all of which are holy and sacred offerings in the eyes of the LORD God.

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH by Rev. David Gregg OCTOBER: FREEDOM OF SPEECH

In its Communist era the so-called "Democratic Republic" of East Germany provided the tale of the member of the "Volkskammer" (= People's Chamber) who stood up and said. "My name is Herr Schmidt. I have *three* questions to ask. When are we going to have freedom of the press? When are we going to have freedom of speech? And when are we going to have freedom of travel?" A week later another member stood up and said, "My name is Herr Braun. I have *three* questions to ask. When are we going to get freedom of the press? When are we going to get freedom of speech? And – does anyone know what has happened to Herr Schmidt?"!

Freedom of Speech is a very hot topic this October, with debates and decisions due about curbing the excesses of the social media, and saddling media entrepreneurs like Elon Musk with some personal responsibility for not curbing excessive material in the areas of pornography, racism, sexism, anti-Semitism, misogyny, gender issues etc. under the pretext of preserving "freedom of speech." Also the need for restricting access by young people and children to inappropriate material, by Act of Parliament. But the issues of unrestricted and uncontrolled utterances, spoken *and* written, reach much more widely into everyday life. Misleading advertising, political "spin" (particularly around elections), Islamophobia (involving "Fatwas" and issues of Blasphemy) and the whole vast industry of parliamentary and other forms of lobbyists

invade every aspect of life.

There is an abundance of material in the scriptures on the subject, to which a story about Winston Churchill provides a way in. He was reproved by the Speaker for calling a fellow member a "fool". He replied, "I'm sorry Mr. Speaker. What I should have said was that the honourable member has perpetrated a terminological inexactitude!" It brings to mind the teaching of the Lord Jesus Christ near the beginning of the Sermon of the Mount, where He uses the example of "Fool" (Raca) to say that insulting people as a means of expressing anger is as sinful and destructive to the soul as murder itself (Matthew 5:22). In the Hebrew Scriptures it begins with Satan's lies to Eve, repeated to Adam, which initiates the Fall of humankind. "You shall not take the Name of the LORD your God in vain" (= Blasphemy) is the third Commandment and "You shall not bear false witness against your neighbour" (= Slander) is the ninth Commandment given by Moses.

Despite the condemnation of harsh words spoken in anger, the New Testament affirms that words of *warning* may sometimes be right and necessary. John the Baptist calls the Pharisees and Sadducees "a brood of vipers" (Matt. 3:7) and Jesus himself drove out the traders in the Temple, claiming they were making it a "den of thieves". He also pronounced seven "woes" against the Scribes and the Pharisees, designating them as hypocrites. But His main teaching urges the simplest use of language, forbidding the use of Oaths, and saying "Let your word be, 'Yes, yes' or No, no': anything more than this comes from the evil one". (Matthew 5:37). For Himself, courteous *dialogue* was a preferred option, as His conversations with the Canaanite woman and Pontius Pilate show, an example closely followed by the apostles (in Acts) and inferred repeatedly in Paul's letters. ("Speaking the truth in love"). The apostle James has a separate take, with a detailed treatment under the text, "The tongue is a small member – no one can tame it, full of deadly poison" (James ch. 3: vv 5 & 8).

Those of us wanting to please Almighty God will be seeking to apply these Biblical Principles as we engage in this vital debate.


