Now in its 21st edition, the festival continues to be a vibrant celebration of global traditions, music, food, and community.

This visit held extra meaning for us — many of the festival organizers had attended our own Echoes of a Proud Nation Pow Wow in July, where they experienced firsthand the values and care we embed in our events. The elders' seating area made a strong impression on them. This time, it was our turn to learn and draw inspiration.

We arrived on site at 10:00 AM and began exploring the beautifully arranged festival grounds. From the layout to logistics, every detail reflected thoughtful planning and hard work. We had the chance to discuss key topics such as: Pricing strategies, accessibility, visitor experience, on-site logistics and flow. This hands-on experience was incredibly valuable, providing fresh perspectives on how large multicultural events can operate smoothly and inclusively.

CHUCK YA! CORN FEST WAS AN A-MAIZE-ING DAY! August 24th, 2025

On August 24th, the Golden Age Club was buzzing with energy as over 400 people gathered for our Annual Corn Fest, hosted in collaboration with KSCS's Strong Man/Strong Woman Day and Maison Lepailleur from Châteauguay.

With more than 20 vendors, the day offered something for everyone—from tasty eats to hands-on workshops and family fun.

Delicious Highlights

The scent of fresh corn filled the air as guests enjoyed: Corn soup by **Screaming Chef**, Corn bread from **Simple Pleasures**, Tamales from **A La Mexicana**, and of course, buttery corn on the cob, a festival favorite!

Visitors got the chance to take part in culturally rich and interactive workshops: Skanaiea Deer led a corn husk doll-making session, Brooke Rice shared insight on Tkà:nios Seed Rematriation and Corn Silk Medicine, and Maison Lepailleur presented their Habitant du Fort experience with a butter-making demonstration and pottery clay workshop.



Contests, Prizes, and Entertainment

Excitement built throughout the day with fun contests and generous prizes: Our half-and-half draw winner, Line Pharand, took home \$229! Corn basket giveaways went to lucky winners Ruth Loft and Leandra. We hosted our first-ever Corn Shucking Contest, the Adult winner, Quincy Jones, who won a \$50 Shop Kahnawà:ke gift certificate and the kids' winner was Bentley Lahache!

Kids also enjoyed bouncy castles and face painting by Hayley Cross, while families wrapped up the day dancing to the tunes of local country band Midnight Renegade, whose performance brought the community together on the dance floor. It was a day full of laughter, learning, and togetherness, and we thank everyone who came out support and celebrate importance of corn in our culture and community life.



FORT CHAMBLY VISIT - ACTS OF RECONCILIATION IN ACTION Honoring Our Voices, Sharing Our Stories

On August 27, 2025, members of the community took part in a special work-session and site visit at Fort Chambly, located on the banks of the Richelieu River. This collaboration marks an important step toward reconciliation — one that centers truth-telling, respectful dialogue, and the inclusion of Kanien'kehá:ka voices in spaces where our presence has long been underrepresented. The work with representatives from the Fort Chambly team is focused on ensuring that our stories, language, and cultural perspectives are meaningfully reflected in their new exhibition and the rest of the museum spaces.

Fort Chambly is known historically as a gathering point, especially for portaging around the river's rapids. As part of this collaboration, we are exploring whether Kanien'kehá:ka traveled or accessed this area, the possibility that our ancestors may have docked further south and hiked through traditional trails, and how our relationship with water, paddling, and land can inform the narrative presented in the space.

This work matters. It moves beyond symbolic gestures and into the realm of collaborative truth-sharing, where institutions begin to acknowledge and make space for Indigenous knowledge systems and lived histories. Reconciliation is not just about apologies or acknowledgements - it's about action. It's about:

Inclusion of Indigenous narratives in public history spaces


Respectful collaboration, where we are equal partners

Reconnecting with our stories and asserting our ongoing relationship with the land and waterways

IONKHINÈN:RINE' YOUTH CULTURAL LEADERSHIP PROGRAM RECAP

This summer, Kahnawà:ke Tourism proudly launched the Ionkhinèn:rine' inaugural Youth Cultural Leadership Program, an inspiring and experience immersive youth aged 12-17. Rooted in Kanien'kehá:ka values, the program nurtured leadership, communication, and skills. while storytelling deepening cultural connection and pride.





Each day began with the Ohèn:ton Karihwatéhkwen (Words Before All Else), setting a collective tone of gratitude, respect, and community. Participants cocreated classroom agreements and connected through team icebreakers, building a foundation of trust and collaboration.



Leadership & Skill Development Workshops

Youth took part in engaging, hands-on workshops led by inspiring facilitators: **Kevin Paquette** – Explored team building, self-reflection through self-portraits, and personal leadership styles.

Kimberly Cross – Built confidence in public speaking through constructive critique and culture-based ideologies. Lastly, **Justin Kingsley** – Strengthened storytelling and communication skills through dynamic, creative games.



IONKHINÈN:RINE' YOUTH CULTURAL LEADERSHIP PROGRAM RECAP

Cultural Arts & Traditional Knowledge

Participants deepened their cultural knowledge through traditional crafts such as: Wampum bracelet making, Beadwork, Moccasin making, and Pottery! These activities encouraged appreciation for ancestral skills and artistic expression.

Exploration & Field Learning

Enriching field trips offered real-world insight into Indigenous resilience and history:

Droulers Tsiionhiakwatha Archaeological Site, Kahnawà:ke's Historical Village, Montreal Botanical Gardens, and the McCord Museum. Youth explored both the ancient roots and contemporary stories of our people, fostering intercommunity understanding and identity.

Reflection & Connection

Each day concluded with a "Rose, Bud, Thorn" debrief, encouraging personal reflection on successes, challenges, and hopes. Daily cultural challenges invited youth to engage with their families and elders-sharing traditional recipes, family stories, and cherished memories-strengthening intergenerational bonds.

Celebrating Achievements

Participants were recognized with graduation certificates and a cash award for their commitment. Parental feedback highlighted the program's impact: "It opened her eyes to our culture and made her want to explore more." "She was happier and more confident each day." A special congratulations to Mia Iakona'tónhahse Lucero-Armstrong (15), who demonstrated outstanding leadership throughout the program and is now proudly serving as Kahnawà:ke Tourism's youngest tour guide!


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MEET OUR NEWEST TOUR GUIDE: MIA LUCERO-ARMSTRONG!





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
WELCOME OUR SPECIAL PROJECTS COORDINATOR: KORTANIE RAYE!

SÉPAQ PARK COLLABORATION - SEPTEMBER 3 VISIT TO ÎLES-DE-BOUCHERVILLE

On September 3, we had the opportunity to visit Parc national des Îles-de-Boucherville, managed by Sépaq. Tourism Autochtone Québec was invited by Sépaq to collaborate on updating the interpretive section titled "Huttes des Premières Nations"—an important archaeological site connected to our Nation's history.

The purpose of this collaboration is to provide accurate, respectful, and culturally grounded information about the site. We are deeply grateful for this opportunity to help ensure our stories are shared properly, and that meaningful education is offered to everyone who visits these unceded Indigenous territories.

The site is located in a peaceful, natural setting that is accessible only by foot or by river shuttle operated by Navark. Surrounded by the river and forest, it offers a quiet yet powerful glimpse into the vastness and depth of our history and presence on these lands.

We look forward to continuing this important partnership with Sépaq to enhance cultural interpretation and contribute to reconciliation through education and collaboration.





September 23rd launched the final phase of the historic capital campaign to build our new Kanatahkwèn:ke Cultural Arts Center, a project years in the making. Spearheaded by the Kanien'kehá:ka Onkwawén:na Raotitióhkwa Language and Cultural Center (KORLCC) in partnership with Kahnawà:ke Tourism, Turtle Island Theatre, and the Mohawk Council of Kahnawà:ke, the center will house a language revitalization hub, a community museum, and a 178-seat performing arts theatre. It is envisioned as a vibrant space for education, creativity, and cultural preservation—honoring Kanien'kehá:ka identity and serving as a gathering place for both the local community and visitors.

With over \$51 million of its \$55.5 million goal already secured through generous public and private contributions, the campaign now invites wider community support to bring the project to

completion. Slated to open in spring 2026, the center represents a powerful statement of pride, resilience, and cultural renewal.

In the spirit of community, we asked everyone to help us raise the remaining funds through our Radiothon fundraiser. The event took place October 18–19 K103.7fm Radio. With a fundraising goal of \$200,000, we called on residents, local businesses. and loyal K103.7fm listeners to come together and help bring this vital cultural vision to life. 

On September 30th, in honour of the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, we stood in solidarity with our sister community of Six Nations of the Grand River for an incredibly significant moment in history—the unveiling of the former Mohawk Institute Residential School as an official International Site of Conscience and Commemoration.

This powerful recognition would not be possible without the bravery, resilience, and determination of the Survivors who have long fought to have their voices heard and their stories acknowledged. Their strength continues to inspire and lead the path forward.

Members of the Kahnawà:ke Tourism team travelled to the Woodland Cultural Centre to be part of this historic day and to support the ongoing #SaveTheEvidence campaign. We were

deeply moved by the overwhelming turnout from neighbouring Nations and communities, all coming together to honour Survivors and commit to a shared journey of healing and education.

The day began with powerful stories from Survivors, followed by an opening address from Grand Chief Hill. Throughout the day, visitors took part in guided tours of the former residential school, educational activities, and a social gathering that filled the grounds with the sound of songs, drums, and community.

This exhibit serves as a reminder that the past must not be forgotten. Despite efforts to erase our presence, we persist in rising, speaking, and teaching to protect future generations. Let us pursue reconciliation together with honesty, love, and determination for a better future for our children.
