

HEADMASTER'S REVIEW



1994 has proved to be a year of profound significance for South Africa - a phenomenon extensively covered in the media and general discussion. 'Change' is the acolytes 'stake-holders', with its keynote, 'transparency', 'consulation', and the like, clustering around in a close-knit retinue. Exciting times for millions fired by the promises of a better life and opportunities; disquietening times for a minority with vested interests in the security and accustomed standards of past favoured race status. The new society looms over one or beckons one invitingly towards a more equitable future. While realism of the problems of transition has dampened the euphoria of the miracle of 27 April, the fact is that we are in a transitional period and it is incumbent on us to adjust and assist in the forging of the new society.

What should our perspective at Bryanston High be in these uncertain times?

Schools and their communities do not respond well to drastic, sudden change. Our awareness of the need for soundness in educating our children inclines us to avoid experimentation in favour of carefully considered adjustments to new situations, approaches and developments. Education must be dynamic in moving forward with progress in order to be relevant, but an awareness that high standards are the product of a

long process of diligent effort and that a deterioration in standards can be swift and not easily reversed is an essential consideration in our planning and actions.

Bryanston High is acknowledged as a centre of excellence in educational circles. It is my belief and my determination that it will remain so. commitment is one I share with the staff, Governing Body and the community. Since 1984 the community has endorsed my advocacy of the premise that the standard of education a school provides is commensurate with the level of involvement and finance the community is prepared to provide. The extensive facilities and low pupil/teacher ratio our pupils enjoy are some of the benefits accrued from As a state-aided school community support. Bryanston is well ahead of most schools in its ability to absorb changes to the educational system without significant effects on our accustomed standards. On a comparative basis we can have confidence in our proven ability to remain a centre of excellence. Fortunately we had the foresight in our strategic planning to anticipate and provide for the changes in education currently contemplated. While Bryanston High will play its part in meeting the educational needs of the new South Africa, the school will be able to do so without sacrificing the hard earned standards it holds so dear.

GOVERNING BODY REPORT

As we stand on the threshold of a new era in South African education, parents and pupils of Bryanston High can look back with pride and satisfaction on the achievements of 1994. Furthermore, I believe they have reason to anticipate 1995 with a sense of optimism and confidence, since there seems to be little material threat at this stage to the commendable ethos and standards which our school has not only successfully cultivated, but has also become widely respected for in the past decade. However, it is reasonably clear that parent communities are going to be called upon to demonstrate greater involvement in the school and probably make more tangible sacrifices than has been the case in the past.

The future of Bryanston High will be marked by a progressive transition of financial responsibility from the State to the parent community. It is gratifying to record, therefore, that from a position some four years ago when only 54% of families met any financial obligations to the school, 1994 saw 86% of potential school fees collected by November. Of 673 families, represented by 814 pupils, 62% of families had paid in full, 34% had partly paid and only 4% had made no contribution at all. In keeping with policy, legal action was instituted against 35 families.

School fees for 1995 have been set at R 3050 for one child, R2350 for a second child and R 1650 for a third or subsequent children. This equates with an increase of 10% over the fees of 1994. A scale of payments has been devised which implies a degree of incentive for prompt payment.

Another factor vital to the future of our school is its pupil enrolment, not only in quantity, but in quality. Consequently I am pleased to be able to report that new enrolments from premier schools in the Witwatersrand have increased the pupil complement from 814 in 1994 to a projected figure of 913 for 1995. Of these, 39% are boys and 61% are girls. 61% of the new enrolment is from our feeder area while 39% have applied for admission from outside our area, indicating the extent of Bryanston High's fine reputation for a balanced educational programme managed by a first-rate staff.

International tours undertaken by Rugby, Hockey and Tennis teams to Australia, Namibia and Germany respectively, have further extended the reputation of our school and proved that both our pupils and staff are worthy ambassadors of our country. Ventures of this nature are not conceived and brought to fruition without considerable initiative and effort being exercised by the organisers, to whom I extend the sincere gratitude of the Governing Body.


The exceptional successes of 1994, which include a broad spectrum of signal achievements like the opening of the sports pavilion, impressive academic standards and an unbeaten First Fifteen, call for a vote of thanks to the Parents' Association, the Headmaster and the Staff. On behalf of the Governing Body I extend this to all those who have given so generously of their time and dedication, often well beyond the call of duty. Personally, I would like to record my sincere gratitude to our bursar John Alkema and all my colleagues on the Governing Body for their sterling support and for their total dedication to the management responsibilities of the school.

In terms of an undertaking given last year, the Headmaster and I have continued to monitor developments in education at both the national and the regional level. At this stage we do not anticipate changes at such speed or of such magnitude as to threaten the educational ecology of our school. However, it would be astute to expect that in the years ahead sacrifices will have to be made in the interests of a more equitable distribution of educational resources. Consequently, we should prepare to invest more in the education of our children and unceasingly explore the emerging technologies that could be harnessed to optimise the transfer of knowledge, skills and values in an environment where the ratios of pupils to state financed resources, both human and material, will be rather different from those to which we have been accustomed in the past.



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
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MOTHERS' COMMITTEE REPORT

THE ENGLISH OLYMPIAD

Entrants: Forty eight Bryanston pupils from Standard Eight to Standard Ten wrote the three hour open book examination on 1 March 1994.

The Olympiad offers a challenge to pupils who wish to broaden their intellectual horizons in a creative and imaginative way. This entails an analysis of the issues suggested by the text in an individual manner, taking into account the world situations and the pupils' individual ideas at that particular time in their lives.

The theme for 1994 was "War" using The Oxford Book of War Poetry, edited by Jon Stallworthy, with texts chosen, from exhortations to warriors to fight and the pathos of suffering in Homer's Iliad, to the fears of a world-wide atomic attack prior to the crumbling of the East-West strategic arms race.

Pupils were encouraged to attend lectures and discussions in addition to their own self-study. In many instances, the pupils' thoughts lead to lively discussions, and the truth of the saying: "by your pupils you'll be taught" was experienced by the staff!

The hard work and effort paid dividends as seventeen pupils achieved Honours, and Highest Honours were awarded to Lynne Gordon, Marcus Oshry and Sarah Hearn, while Jennie Loffell was placed amongst the top 100 in the country.


COMPUTER OLYMPIAD

(Note: Amounts depend on size of glass or Ingredients: dish. No exact ingredients are needed)

- Whip the instant caramel. Add a bit of vanilla essence and cream to thin it, if necessary.
- Pour into base of glass and top with strawberries. 2.
- 3. Sprinkle with nuts and chocolate.
- Cover with piped whipped cream. 4.
- Decorate with grated mint chocolate, chopped almonds and strawberries.

If your glass or dish is large, a repeat of the process may be needed.

Mrs Sonia Liddiard ably took control of the Media Centre, guided by our new "Media Chief", Mrs Webb, during the First Term, while I was on accouchement leave. Having experienced some problem with our computer system, we purchased a new computer program, with the approval of the T.E.D., in the Second Term. We have since accessioned over 450 new books and we have to thank Lindi Stalker, Jackie Aldersley and Janet Wilmot for their hard work in the administration of the stock cards. Our Media Prefects, Shaun, Ceri, Emerys and Audrey took care of the computerization. We now begin the task of computerizing some 8500 books already on the shelves.

Future plans include bar-code labels for the books, linked to a scanner for the computer, and metal tags, linked to an alarm system to prevent loss of books.

The Staff Reference Library has been updated by the addition of new resource books in most of the subjects. Annie Bennett and Kay Gregory have been looking after this section of our library for us.

We have also been extremely busy in the afternoons, where the Media Centre has been the venue for our English Enrichment Programme on Tuesdays and Thursdays and some extra Zulu lessons on Wednesday and Thursday afternoons. Apart from this, pupils have been able to watch their Film Study setworks, Shakespeare setworks, and film versions of their set novels in English and Afrikaans, if they have missed class viewing due to absenteeism or if they wished to revise their work. Miss Buist, Mrs Frost and Mrs Snyman have helped man the afternoon sessions, and we thank Mrs Schumann, Mrs Hall, Mrs van der Colf and Miss Stephens for assisting, as their seasons' extramural activities allowed.

Perhaps the most heartening aspect of running the Media Centre this year has been the discovery that so many of our pupils are reading so much! Looking through the "reading records" of our Standard Six and Seven pupils in Information Skills lessons, it is easy to find at least three pupils per class who have, in this year alone, read more than thirty good books! Television and computer games have not quite made our youth illiterate. This is a credit to those parents who encourage their children to visit the public library, join book clubs and make use of our Media Centre.



We stayed with host families and were able to visit Victoria Market, the Melbourne Cricket Grounds and the Science Works Exhibition. We were also invited by the Brighton Grammar School to a dinner at the Royal Brighton Yacht Club. On Friday 15th, we played our last game, against Brighton Grammar, which proved to be our easiest match of the tour, giving us a win of 64-7. Saturday we were at the MCG, watching an "Aussie Rules" game between Essendon and Melbourne. After this we were taken to Melbourne Airport for our return to South Africa.

Our trip "down under" still lingers in our minds and I am sure that many of us will return there in the not too distant future. We have had the opportunity to play against Rugby teams from a different country, but, more important, we were able to be ambassadors for South Africa and share experiences and enlighten the Australian people we made contact with, regarding our own lovely country.




MIDMAR MILE TOUR

STANDARD EIGHT HISTORY TOUR TO THE STAR



I, THE WITNESS, BECOME THE VICTIM

Gasping for breath, it feels as if my chest is about to explode. Mommy stop them, stop them from killing me! I'm dizzy, I can't breathe, I can't get enough air. Don't kill me! Save me, save my Life!

I can feel myself falling, falling down into the dark. What are they doing to me? Why are they leaving me here in this room to die? It's cold and dark Mommy, help me! Don't let them do this. I don't want to die - not yet.

Mommy, why don't you want me? Why don't you love me? Why are you killing me? Mommy, I'm dying. Mommy, I love you. Mommy? Where are you Mommy? Where are you? I, the witness.

Mommy was told four months ago that she is going to have a baby and that baby is me. I remember so clearly when Dr Lewis told her. She was so happy then.

Now she's always sad and she always cries because Dr Lewis told her that I have Down Syndrome, whatever that is. I think it's some sort of disease but I'm not sick, at least, I don't feel sick. I wish I could tell Mommy to stop crying and feeling so sad because there's nothing wrong with me. Whatever this Down Syndrome is it can't be that bad to make Mommy cry all the time. But if there is something wrong with me, why don't I know it?

Mommy got really angry with me today. She was shouting at me and said that I've ruined her life. She asked how a single woman with a salary as small as a peanut, could raise a retard?

I guess I know what Down Syndrome is now. It's not something that makes your body sick; it's something that makes your brain sick. I don't think you can blame anyone for what's wrong with me. I think it's just the way it's supposed to be and there's nothing anyone can do to change that.

I was wrong. There is a way to change what has happened. One very horrible, very terrible way to change everything. I'm going to be aborted. It's strange thinking that I'm going to die before I'm even born and it scares me, it scares me so much because all I will ever know is Mommy and I don't even know whether she loves me or not.

I'm never going to know what it will be like for me to sit on Mommy's lap, holding her close and tight while she sings me to sleep. I'm never going to know what it will be like for Mommy to tuck me into bed and read me a bed-time story. I'm never going to know what it will be like for me to be loved by Mommy.

I don't blame Mommy for the choice that she's made. No-one should blame Mommy for her decision. It's like she said, she's a single woman who doesn't make much money, so she wouldn't be able to afford the special schools and treatments I might need, so we would both end up being unhappy.

I wish I knew what "normal" people were like. Maybe then it would be easier for me to understand why Mommy is doing what she is doing. Maybe she's even doing this because she loves me. I find it very hard to believe that Mommy is going to have me aborted just because she doesn't want to raise me because I have Down Syndrome. When she found out about me she was happy and she wanted to have me. I think the only thing that has changed is that she doesn't want to have me in a world that ridicules Down Syndrome sufferers.

I've come to terms with the fact that I'm going to die. Before, it seemed like it was going to happen to someone else. I was watching all these things happening through someone else's eyes. But reality has forced me to realise that it is happening to me



The story of KISMET, with music and lyrics by Robert Wright and George Forrest, was adapted from a 1911 play by Edward Knoblock that was closely identified with Otis Skinner. The

music for KISMET was adapted from themes Alexander Borodin composed for such works as the "Polovtsian Dances" ("Stranger in Paradise") and the D. Major String Quartet ("And This is My Beloved", "Baubles, Bangles and Beads").

In this "Musical Arabian Nights", the action occurred within a twenty-four hour period from dawn to dawn in ancient Baghdad, where a roguish



public poet (Karlo Glorioso) assumed the identity of Hajj the beggar and experienced a series of unlikely adventures. By the time they have ended, he has drowned the wicked Wazir (Neville Stephen), has seen his daughter Marsinah (Claire Rogers) wedded to the handsome Caliph (Stefano Marani), has been appointed Emir of Baghdad, and has gone off into the desert with the Wazir's luscious wife Lalume (Candice Thornhill).

A group of motivated teachers pulled us through this tough task, when even on the opening night, Mrs Swart became a male slave unintentionally and Mr Bibb got so involved with the props that he was stuck between them for a whole scene!



Not only was it the acting and singing that made the play a success but exciting dancing, fantastic props and excellent costumes added to the production quality.

We, as a cast, have never put so much effort into a play.

Special mention needs to be made of Jennifer Acutt who provided a never-ending source of creative ideas for the dancers to cope with their unusual dance sequences; Patrick Rolland and Robert van Zyl for their excellent comic movement and organisation in "He's In Love"; Sarah Hearn for excellent basic programme design.

DRAMA COURSEWORK

In order to produce fully rounded theatrical performers, Miss Bennett and Miss Buist ran the Drama coursework in the First Term. A wide spectrum of skills was explored and great fun was had by all.

Although most of the pupils who took part were in Standard Six, quite a few aspirant actors and actresses from the higher

standards also joined in.

Movement was the first component and consisted of games and mime. The pupils were divided into groups, and had to pretend to be a machine. Using the body effectively is vital in drama, and the pupils learned how to manipulate their limbs to gain maximum effect.

The second component of the coursework involved learning about stage make-up. The pupils were shown various techniques, specifically regarding the use of colour, to show emotion. Pupils then chose their own emotion and illustrated it on paper. A number of pupils who took part in this workshop showed their expertise in the musical.

In the stage design component, the pupils were able to exercise their creative talents with the help of shoeboxes, materials, cardboard and glue. The sets produced were original and exciting.

Another major part of the coursework was jewellery design. Pupils were given the basic theory behind design, and various materials were suggested for use in making their own pieces of jewellery. Many innovative and creative designs were produced by the pupils, and a vast number of them were utilised by the cast of Kismet. The Arabian flavour of the production was clearly evident in both the style and colours of the jewellery. This workshop allowed pupils to express their creativity, and all the pupils are to be commended for their superb efforts.

Voice production, last but certainly not least, marked the end of the course. The pupils learned the importance of voice projection and proper breathing techniques. They worked on characterisations using tone, accent and pace.
