

With fantastic opportunities for work and play — without high costs and hassles — Buffalo Niagara is your place for a great life.

Downtown Buffalo features destination venues like Canalside, Harborcenter, and RiverWorks for year-round entertainment, from sailing and paddle-boarding to ice skating and hockey. There's also phenomenal architecture, craft breweries and distilleries, fantastic restaurants, diverse food trucks, live music venues, Broadway shows, college centers, and professional sports arenas.

Popular neighborhoods like Elmwood Village, Allentown, and North Buffalo's Hertel Avenue are easy to explore on foot or by bike. Attractions and destinations include cozy coffee shops, renowned museums, diners and bistros, farmers' markets, an internationally celebrated orchestra, intimate galleries, antiques, and other locally owned shops.

Buffalo's Frederick Law Olmsted-designed park system and community green spaces offer swimming pools, soccer fields, splash pads, tennis, golf, and more.

The sparkling waters of the Niagara River, two Great Lakes — Erie and Ontario — and one of the world's natural wonders, Niagara Falls, along with its emerging downtown center and area wineries, surround the region to the west and north. To the east and south are rolling hills, family-owned dairy and produce farms, historic cider mills and maple-sugar shacks, ski resorts, and miles of hiking, biking and snowmobile trails. In between, welcoming suburbs offer nationally recognized school districts and an abundance of family-friendly amenities.

One Spectacular Region

When you explore Western New York, you'll soon discover how special it is and how much there is to do. This section is an overview of the eight counties that make up the region: Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chautauqua, Erie, Genesee, Niagara, Orleans, and Wyoming. Geographically speaking, several of the world's largest bodies of fresh water create the region's western and northern borders: Lake Erie, the Niagara River, Niagara Falls, and Lake Ontario interconnect for a natural boundary that's spectacular to see and enjoy (the waterways are also the reason for our temperate climate). Everything to the east of the water is lush, green, and beautiful.

We've spotlighted the largest cities — Buffalo and Niagara Falls — and their respective counties — Erie and Niagara — followed by highlights of the other counties and the villages, towns, activities, and amenities that make up this spectacular region.





City of Buffalo Neighborhoods

INSIDE THE DOWNTOWN CORE



Canalside

Back in the 1800s, the Erie Canal was a thriving waterway connecting the Great Lakes to New York City. The canal's western terminus in Buffalo made the city a hub of commercial activity. Today, this same area — now known as Canalside — has been rediscovered (literally, as the terminus was buried for decades) and revitalized. Canalside has quickly become a year-round waterfront destination, with daily free and low-cost events, from craft beer tastings to waterside yoga classes. Explore & More (the Ralph C. Wilson Children's Museum), the Buffalo Heritage Carousel, the Longshed, and casual restaurants make this a familyfriendly stop. In summer, you'll find people kayaking, paddle-boarding, and sailing in the surrounding waterways; and enjoying

evening concerts, fireworks, and cultural events. And if you think things slow down in winter, think again; the canal becomes an urban outdoor ice skating (and ice biking) rink filled with people day and night.



Central Business District

Just steps from Canalside is the Central Business District, which is home to several of Buffalo's largest private- and publicsector employers. You'll find beautiful architecture throughout, such as Buffalo's Art Deco-era City Hall, the Ellicott Square Building, and the Guaranty Building, designed by Louis Sullivan, known as the father of modern American architecture. Many of the district's historic buildings are now residential and mixed-use properties, including the Hotel at The Lafayette (designed by Louise Bethune, the nation's


first female architect), and Seneca One, Buffalo's tallest building that is now a bustling technology hub and anchors the Main Street Innovation Corridor.



Cobblestone District

Small in size but packed with activity, this enclave next to the Central Business District has recently undergone major redevelopment, with loft apartments in renovated factories, restaurants, and exhibition spaces for visual and performing arts. Here's where you'll find KeyBank Center, a venue for top-name concerts, as well as home to the National Hockey League's Buffalo Sabres and our professional lacrosse team, the Buffalo Bandits. Nearby is Harborcenter — a mixeduse sports and entertainment venue.

Allentown

Eclectic and energetic, Allentown is known for its art, music, popular LGBTQIA+ bars, and top-notch restaurants, as well as its charming historic homes. One of Buffalo's best-loved events, the Allentown Art Festival, is held each June, while Allentown's art gallery walk, known as "First Fridays," has grown into a popular monthly event. In addition, Allentown is home to the Theatre of Youth in the historic Allendale Theater and the Theodore Roosevelt Inaugural Site. At the foot of Allen Street stands the brand-new University at Buffalo Jacobs School of Medicine and Biomedical Sciences — an anchor to the sprawling and innovative Buffalo Niagara Medical Campus.



Black Rock/Riverside

Black Rock is located along the Black Rock Canal and was an independent and bustling waterfront town before incorporation with Buffalo in 1853. Riverside is just past Black Rock, where the canal meets the Niagara River. These abutting neighborhoods include both families who have called them home for generations, and newcomers — many immigrants and refugees, whom Buffalo welcomes. They all enjoy this affordable

area's proximity to waterfront bike paths and greenways, including Riverside Park, designed by renowned landscape architect Frederick Law Olmsted's firm. Niagara Street is experiencing a renaissance of its own with new mixed-use building renovations, loft apartments, breweries, and restaurants.

Buffalo Niagara Medical Campus (BNMC)

The Buffalo Niagara Medical Campus, located on the North end of the Main Street Innovation Corridor, is a dynamic place. Home to world-class hospitals, research institutions, and educational facilities such as the Oshei Children's Hospital and Roswell Park Comprehensive Cancer Center, the BNMC has benefited from Buffalo's entrepreneurial spirit, with more than 120 private sector companies located within its boundaries as well as brand new housing options. BNMC is also home to several University at Buffalo buildings, including the Incubator@CBLS, a business incubator designed to spur innovation and entrepreneurism.

7 Delaware District

The Delaware District centers on Delaware Avenue, with stately mansions dating back to the late-nineteenth and early-twentieth centuries. At its core is Delaware Park, the centerpiece of landscape architect Frederick Law Olmsted's Buffalo Parks System. This area encompasses the city's Museum District, with the Burchfield Penney Art Center, the Buffalo History Museum, and Buffalo AKG Art Museum. Other attractions such as Hoyt Lake, historic and serene Forest Lawn Cemetery, and the Buffalo Zoo make this a popular area.

8 Elmwood Village

Nearly 200 shopping, arts, dining, and leisure destinations fill the storefronts and make this area a residential and entertainment favorite. Highlighted as one of America's "most livable neighborhoods" by the American Planning Association, the EV offers diverse living options, including many Victorian and Queen Anne—style single-family homes. A seasonal farmers' market, pocket parks, parkways, and miles of bike lanes make it easy and fun to live and play here. Within or



near this neighborhood — which also borders

Delaware Park and the Museum District —
are several colleges, including Buffalo State
University.

Fruit Belt

One of Buffalo's most historic neighborhoods, the Fruit Belt takes its name from the orchards planted by its first settlers. Home to both families and professionals, many of whom have lived there for generations, the neighborhood is bordered by the Michigan Street African American Heritage Corridor. Its proximity to the Medical Campus, the Central Business District, and Jefferson Avenue, the commercial heartbeat of the near East Side, make the Fruit Belt a convenient option to live, work, and play.

10 Hamlin Park

Hamlin Park, on Buffalo's East Side, is home to Canisius University. This neighborhood and the surrounding blocks include many historically significant homes and houses of worship, another Olmsted-designed park (Martin Luther King, Jr. Park, known locally as MLK Park, a popular destination for its splash pad in the summer and ice skating in the winter), and the Buffalo Museum of Science. With significant investments in surrounding

neighborhoods and its easy commute to downtown, this family-forward neighborhood is reemerging with affordable and exciting residential redevelopment and business opportunities.

11 Larkin District

The vibrant neighborhood known as Larkinville is favored by people of all ages who live here and attend its many restaurants, breweries, bars, concerts, and events. It centers on the historic and redeveloped Larkin Terminal Warehouse, now called Larkin at Exchange, and several other large-scale industrial buildings are under renovation as mixed-use and residential properties.

12 Masten Park/Cold Springs

With historic and beautiful architectural character, this residential neighborhood adjacent to the Jefferson Avenue corridor is undergoing a planning rebirth. This neighborhood features the Merriweather Library, Freedom Wall, African American Cultural Center and the Michigan Street African American Heritage Corridor. Here you can also find The Foundry, an active, community-based makerspace providing hands-on classes and entrepreneurial support.

Allen Street was named after Lewis
Falley Allen, who arrived in Buffalo in
1827 with his wife, Margaret Cleveland.
(The future Mrs. Allen was Grover
Cleveland's aunt — her nephew's
career trajectory went from sheriff of
Erie County, to mayor of Buffalo and
governor of New York and, ultimately,
president of the U.S.) After selling
parcels of land on Main Street, the
Allen's herd of cows could no longer
graze, but the path that had been
used to move the cows became "Allen
Street" in 1888.

13 North Buffalo

With Hertel Avenue at its heart and Delaware Park and the Buffalo Zoo within an easy walk or bike ride, North Buffalo is a perennial favorite. It boasts a mix of Buffalo restaurant and bar mainstays, as well as an active retail hub. The eclectic mix of antiques, clothing and furniture stores, art galleries, spas, coffee shops and ethnic markets keep it ever-appealing. This neighborhood is also home to the historic North Park Theater, a much-loved and gorgeously restored 1920s movie theater.

Old First Ward

One of Buffalo's oldest neighborhoods has become one of its hippest. The Old First Ward – which historically drew Irish, Polish and Italian immigrants to work the thriving industrial scene – has been reinvigorated. In recent years, in addition to the reimagining of the huge grain elevators, things like kayak launch sites, new breweries, cool coffee shops, a rowing club, bike paths, and a climbing gym have popped up.

15 Outer Harbor

The Outer Harbor features more than 200 acres of green space, including the Independent Health Wellness Trail, Wilkeson Pointe, the Lakeside Bike Park, and the Lakeside Event Lawn. The Outer Harbor hosts events and festivals as well as free summer fitness classes, and kayak and bicycle rentals. Check out RiverWorks, a redeveloped industrial grain-elevator compound featuring a concert venue, outdoor adventure park, restaurant, and brewery that hosts amateur

hockey, curling, roller derby, and other special events.



On the eastern border of Delaware Park, this tree-lined neighborhood was planned as a residential area by landscape architect Frederick Law Olmsted in 1883. Parkside encompasses the Buffalo Zoo, the Darwin D. Martin House — one of Frank Lloyd Wright's best examples of Prairie-style architecture — and Nichols School, one of Buffalo's most prestigious private schools.

17 South Buffalo

While South Buffalo's Irish-American roots are proudly reflected in the street signs and pubs here, it's a diverse and bustling neighborhood with two Olmsted parks: Cazenovia Park and South Park. South Buffalo is also home to Trocaire College, the renowned Buffalo and Erie County Botanical Gardens, and Tifft Nature Preserve, a popular urban woodlands and wetlands refuge.

18 Theatre District

The Theatre District, located along Buffalo's Innovation Corridor between the Central Business District and the Medical Campus, is a vibrant cultural hub with a rich history of performing arts. Shea's Performing Arts Center which hosts Broadway shows, concerts, and special events is known for its stunning architecture and iconic marquee. This district is also home to multiple other theaters, and a variety of restaurants, bars, cafes, and live music venues - plus a strong creative community.

19 University Heights

This unique, eclectic neighborhood is within walking distance of the University at Buffalo's South Campus with great access to public transit. This neighborhood is home to students, faculty, and families, surrounded by restaurants, small shops, and bars that cater to the campus community.

Waterfront Village

This largely residential waterfront enclave next to Canalside is also home to the Erie Basin Marina's bikeways, walkways and gardens, and the Naval Military Park. The neighborhood is adjacent to Buffalo's largest waterfront park, Ralph Wilson Park, which is currently being transformed into a signature park through a community-led design process.

21 West Side

Buffalo's West Side is one of the largest and most diverse neighborhoods in Buffalo. Waterways flank its western border, with the Peace Bridge connecting Buffalo to Fort Erie, Ontario in Canada. It was once one of the final stops of the Underground Railroad, with escaped slaves seeking refuge in Canada. Because of relatively affordable real estate and resources to support small businesses, as well as efforts by community-based organizations, this neighborhood is a hub for Buffalo's growing immigrant and refugee populations. Today, new Americans are opening vibrant businesses, like restaurants and retail shops on the West Side.

Erie County Cities & Towns

Amherst

The Town of Amherst includes East Amherst, Williamsville, Eggertsville, Getzville, and Snyder and is the largest suburb of Buffalo. Known as one of the safest towns in America, Amherst neighborhoods are dotted with "main street" shops and restaurants, farmers' markets, parks, and highly rated school districts, as well as several colleges including Daemen College, Erie Community College, and the University at Buffalo North Campus.

Cheek-tah-wah-guh

Cheektowaga

Cheektowaga lies just to the east of the City of Buffalo and is one of the larger suburbs. Two of the region's busiest destinations — the Buffalo Niagara International Airport and the Walden Galleria — are in Cheektowaga, as is Villa Maria College.

Clarence

Clarence, a suburb about 20 minutes from downtown, has an award-winning school system and lots of green space with parks, bikeways, and farms (horseback riding is particularly popular here). It's also home to Antique World, a huge indoor/outdoor antique and flea market and to the Great Pumpkin Farm — hosting a month-long celebration of harvest season and Halloween.

Colden/Glenwood/Boston

Nestled in the hills 30 minutes south of Buffalo, these villages are reminiscent of small Vermont towns and form the heart of Erie County ski country. Buffalo Ski Club and Kissing Bridge resorts are located here.

East Aurora

East Aurora is filled with tree-lined streets, enchanting brick and clapboard houses, and a charming village center. It's also home to Fisher-Price Toys, Vidler's 5 & 10, and Elbert Hubbard's Roycroft Campus, where artisans continue the tradition of crafting handmade home goods and useful objects from wood, metal, and glass in the Arts & Crafts style.

Grand Island

Situated in the Niagara River between Buffalo and Niagara Falls, Grand Island is one of the world's largest freshwater islands. Its 33 square miles are largely residential and recreational; some significant corporate headquarters are here as well. Attractions include Beaver Island State Park — a waterfront park with golf, bike trails and beaches — as well as Buckhorn Island State Park, a huge nature preserve.

Hamburg

Hamburg is located on Lake Erie south of Buffalo and has a bustling village center, Hilbert College and Woodlawn Beach State Park — one of Western New York's most popular beaches. In Hamburg, you'll also find the Penn Dixie site, where curious diggers can find Devonian-era fossils and other archaeological wonders in its shale outcroppings.

Kenmore and Tonawanda

Kenmore is a first-ring suburb of Buffalo and a village in the Town of Tonawanda. It's home to a vibrant village center, large parks and libraries, and other amenities that give it a great mix of urban and suburban benefits. Tonawanda, with its strong school system and safe neighborhoods, developed around Kenmore and its more recent history is reflected in its post-World War II housing, including some lovely mid-century gems.

Lackawanna

The City of Lackawanna lies south of downtown Buffalo, just over the Skyway. Once home to bustling steel mills, it's now the site of the country's first urban wind-turbine farm. Here you'll also find the Small Boat Harbor and Gallagher Beach — a destination for windsurfers and kayakers — as well as urban beaches, parks, marinas, and biking and hiking trails. In winter, it becomes an ice-fishing spot, with hundreds of colorful fishermen's tents dotting the harbor.

Lancaster

Lancaster's mix of village life, suburban amenities, and pastoral charm comfortably comingle. Like many of our suburbs, Lancaster has been designated as one of the safest communities in the country. While it's one of Erie County's easternmost suburbs, Lancaster is still an easy commute to Buffalo.

Orchard Park

Originally settled by the Quakers, today's Orchard Park residents enjoy great schools, beautiful parks, and lively events all year long. In addition, it's here that you'll find one of the region's most popular venues -Highmark Stadium, home of the National Football League's Buffalo Bills.

West Seneca

West Seneca, which is actually east of Buffalo, is a large, post-World War II suburban community with a strong school system, safe neighborhoods, and quick proximity to just about anywhere in Western New York.

East Aurora, a suburb located southeast of Buffalo.

North Tonawanda, a suburb between Buffalo and Niagara Falls.

Orchard Park, a suburb located southeast of Buffalo.





Niagara County is home to one of the world's most popular tourist destinations and a wonder of the natural world: Niagara Falls. You'll also find thriving farms, vineyards, orchards, cider mills, and wineries along the Niagara Wine Trail. Beautiful towns and villages, miles of biking and hiking trails, outstanding schools, and dozens of arts and cultural destinations are here, too. Niagara County Community College and Niagara University reside here, and are essential partners in arts, culture, and athletics in Niagara County. Historic cities like Lockport grew around the Erie Canal, and this waterway still runs through Lockport's downtown center. Lewiston is a charming and historic village on the Niagara Escarpment, where the Niagara River empties into Lake Ontario. One of the longestrunning hydroelectric power plants in the country is also here in Niagara County.



Downtown

One of the most popular tourist areas in the world, downtown Niagara Falls attracts millions of visitors every year and features both the iconic series of waterfalls and also Niagara Falls State Park. Designed by the incomparable landscape artist Frederick Law Olmsted, Niagara Falls State Park — America's oldest state park - is packed with popular attractions for those who want to experience a full Falls experience, including the Cave of the Winds, Maid of the Mist boat tour, Prospect Point observation tower, and Goat Island. After exploring the majestic waters, visitors can enjoy entertainment, shopping, and dining both in and outside the park in the Pine Ave. and Main St. business district as well as the growing areas around Third St. and Buffalo Ave. Take a stroll down the pedestrian-friendly walkway lined with public murals know as Art Alley at 425 Third Street. Other major attractions include the Aquarium of Niagara Falls, and the Seneca Niagara Resort & Casino, with plenty of games, shows and dining options.



Deveaux

Tucked in the northwest corner of the city, the Deveaux neighborhood is a quaint and picturesque area that is home to 10 acres of an old-growth forest park known as DeVeaux Woods, and features a dog park, as well as some of the city's oldest and grandest homes. The area is located on the escarpment immediately adjacent to Niagara University. The neighborhood is named after Samuel Deveaux, a large landholder, local judge, and businessman who was heavily involved in the construction of the Whirlpool Suspension Bridge in 1847.



Hyde Park

Located along Hyde Park Boulevard in the city, Hyde Park refers to both the municipal park and the surrounding residential areas to the east and west. Dubbed the "Jewel of Niagara Falls," the park provides recreational opportunities in golf, tennis, swimming, ice hockey, bocce, lawn bowling and, perhaps most prominently, baseball. Sal Magile Stadium, named after the major league pitcher in the '40s and '50s nicknamed "The Barber," is located within the park boundaries.



LaSalle

Located along the Niagara River in the southeast portion of the city, LaSalle is a popular residential area with a village feel. In fact, the area was once the Village of LaSalle before it became part of the city of Niagara Falls in 1927. The area is named after Robert de La Salle, a French explorer who completed expeditions on the Great Lakes, Mississippi River and Gulf of Mexico. La Salle's famed ship, Le Griffon, was built in the area in 1679.



Little Italy

Historically home to a large population of Italian-Americans, the neighborhood of Little Italy is centrally located along Pine Avenue between Hyde Park Boulevard and Portage Road. One of the major commercial areas in the city, Little Italy features plenty of retailers and boasts some of regions best-known eateries, including the original DiCamillo Bakery, Michael's, and the Como Restaurant.


Niagara County Cities & Towns

Lewiston

This gem on the Niagara Gorge sits above the Niagara River at the mouth of Lake Ontario. It's known for its breathtaking beauty, charming village center with a variety of eating and shopping establishments, historic homes, and proximity to Niagara Falls. The Lewiston-Queenston Bridge is one of several international crossings in the Buffalo Niagara area, and makes Canada minutes away as well. It's also a favorite spot for popular venues and events including Artpark, the Lewiston Peach Festival, the Lewiston Jazz Festival, and the Christmas Walk and Home Tour.

Lockport

Lockport (both the city and town) formed along the Erie Canal, and its historic downtown still reflects its 18th and early 19th century roots. Lockport has an active arts scene highlighting both contemporary and historically significant art. It includes several galleries, museums and shops, as well as the Kenan Center, a refurbished historic home with a range of programming. The town enjoys 20 different park locations featuring two nature parks with great walking trails. The city is home to a public marina where residents can enjoy some of the beauty of the canalside city. It's also the county seat. As with the rest of Niagara County, Lockport is being rediscovered as a great place to live and play.





Newfane

With over 22 wineries, breweries and cideries to choose from, Newfane is nestled on the picturesque shores of Lake Ontario, located in the heart of the Niagara Wine Trail. The town is known for charming cottages, quaint shops, and excellent freshwater fishing. Kids love Olcott Beach for its vintage amusement park, while adults find it a shopper's dream. The beach hosts outdoor concerts and classic car shows. The Van Horn Mansion, a cultural and historic highlight, and said to be haunted, offers candlelit tours.

North Tonawanda

North Tonawanda is a suburb bordered by the Erie Canal and the Niagara River. As the region's waterways are revitalized for recreational use, "NT" (as locals refer to it) is drawing people from around the region for its easy proximity to the water. The area is an affordable and accessible haven for boaters. Don't miss Canal Fest, an eight-day festival in Gateway Park featuring free concerts, carnival rides, a variety of ethnic and specialty foods and a parade.

Wilson and Porter

These two Niagara County towns, about 15 minutes apart on the shores of Lake Ontario, are less than an hour from Buffalo. An easy drive from Niagara Falls, Lockport, and North Tonawanda, they provide some of the loveliest waterfront and sunset views around. They are destinations for water sports, including sailing, power boating, and fishing. Popular for both yearround residents, and summer dwellers, Wilson Harbor offers restaurants, shops and marinas. And Porter is adjacent to Youngstown, where historic Old Fort Niagara still stands from the War of 1812. On clear days, you can see Toronto across the lake.



Allegany County

Allegany County is home to Alfred University, Alfred State College, and Houghton College's main campus, providing exciting cultural venues and educational opportunities for residents and visitors of all ages and interests. With its hilly terrain and abundant farmland, it's a perennially popular destination for cross-country skiing, hiking, mountain-biking, and golfing, and the dozens of freshwater lakes, rivers, and streams that meander here make it a haven for boating and fishing. www.WNYWilds.com

Alfred

CLOSING PROCESS



Once you've found your dream home or built a new one on the perfect property, what are the next steps in New York State? The closing process in New York State typically takes 60 to 90 days, if everything proceeds smoothly. Here are a few key steps in the closing process:

- 1. INSPECTIONS: In New York State, home inspectors are licensed and trained to check for very specific things. The results of the home inspection can change the home sale price, the buyer's willingness to purchase the home, or identify issues that may need to be fixed before the closing date.
- 2. THE BINDER: After the inspection is finished and the buyer has decided to purchase the home, the buyer will be asked to sign a binder. A binder includes details about the sale such as the purchase price, down payment amounts, anticipated mortgage amount, realtor information, attorney information, and expected closing date.
- **3. CONTRACT OF SALE:** Once the binder is finalized, the seller's attorney will draft the contract of sale. After the contract has been signed, the buyer will deliver the down payment to the seller's attorney to be held in escrow.
- 4. TITLE REPORT: The title report discloses any liens or judgements on the property, how the current seller obtained title to the property, potential property line issues, outstanding property violations, permits, outstanding property tax, and any bankruptcy filings by the buyer. Title insurance is commonly purchased and protects the buyer against possible claims relating to the title of the property.
- 5. CLOSING: At the closing, title to the property is transferred to the new owners by deed and the buyer pays the seller the balance due. If the buyer is taking out a mortgage, the mortgage documents will also typically be signed at the closing.

- 5. Parent/legal guardian photo identification
- **6.** Legal guardianship or custody papers (if the child does not reside with the biological parent)
- Proof of physical examination within the last year (due to school within 30 days)

The Office of State Assessment (OSA), within the New York State Education Department is responsible for the coordination, development, and implementation of the Grade 3–8 tests, Regents Examinations, Regents Competency Tests, Second Language Proficiency Examinations, Alternate Assessments, and English Language Proficiency assessments that comprise the New York State Testing Program (NYSTP). Voter registration is handled through county boards of elections. You must be at least 18 years old, a U.S. citizen, and a resident of the state and the county, city, or village for at least 30 days prior to election (please visit the website, www.elections.ny.gov for more information). You may be able to register through the Department of Motor Vehicles when you update your driver's license and registration in New York State.


BANKS

Western New York has many financial institutions, ranging from local credit unions to large, international banks for commercial and personal accounts. Important considerations when choosing include availability of ATMs, online banking options, fees and interest rates, availability of account bundles (checking and savings, for example), and loans.

LIBRARIES

You'll find a library in nearly every town center in WNY. The largest system, the Buffalo & Erie County Public Library system (BECPL), includes the Central Library in downtown Buffalo and more than 35 branch libraries throughout Erie County. There's much more than books, magazines, and electronic media at our libraries — they're community centers for education, entertainment, and public forums. There's no cost to get a library card (identification is required to obtain one, so bring valid ID with you) and one card is good at all libraries in the BECPL system.

Other Western New York counties also have library systems (in some cases, they may share resources, as with the Chautauqua-Cattaraugus Library System). In addition, nearly all of our college and university libraries are open for your use as research resources (lending privileges may be limited, however, so please check). With New York State identification and the OverDrive app, you also have access to the New York Public Library.



It also has an Art Truck experience. Don't miss the Burchfield Penney Art Center, the Castellani Art Museum at Niagara University, or Hallwalls Contemporary Arts Center in Babeville, a Gothic Revival church renovated by singer-songwriter Ani DiFranco for other impressive collections.

Looking for something fun to do with the kids? Try Buffalo Museum of Science, Explore & More Children's Museum at Canalside, the Buffalo Zoo, Aquarium of Niagara, or Niagara Power Vista's interactive experience.

If history is your thing, start at the Buffalo History Museum — the building was actually part of the 1901 Pan Am Exposition. In fact, you can also visit the building where Teddy Roosevelt was inaugurated in 1901 as the 26th president. Additional stops should include Old Fort Niagara, Buffalo & Erie County Naval and Military Park, Michigan Street Baptist Church, Underground Railroad Heritage Center, National Comedy Center, and the Buffalo Transportation Pierce-Arrow Museum.


MUSIC

Hear the Grammy Award-winning Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra or catch global touring acts in concert at Artpark, Asbury Hall at Babeville, Town Ballroom and other regional venues. Buffalo is home to a thriving local music scene, with many genres represented. Try Nietzsche's on Allen Street or Sportsmen's Tavern in the Black Rock neighborhood. The Colored Musicians Club is a jazz hotspot — historically, all the touring musicians of their day stopped in, including Duke Ellington, Dizzy Gillespie, and Miles Davis. It now offers weekly jam sessions and an interactive museum experience.

THEATRE

National touring companies of many Broadway shows are booked at the famous Shea's Performing Arts Center, which anchors Buffalo's vibrant downtown theatre district. Buffalo Niagara features 36 performance theatres in total to take in a show at. And Buffalo's Shakespeare in the Park is one of the oldest and largest free outdoor Shakespeare companies in the country.

TASTY LOCAL TREATS

WINGS Chicken wings, originally served at Frank and Teressa's Anchor Bar in 1964. Often served with carrots, celery sticks, and blue cheese dip. Say it like a local: just "wings"— and NEVER "Buffalo wings."

BEEF ON WECK A thinly sliced roast

beef sandwich on kimmelweck rolls – caraway seed-and-kosher salt-topped hard rolls – with horseradish, considered a local delicacy.

CHIAVETTA'S

Barbecued chicken,
popular at just about any outdoor gathering,
named for the company that provides the signature
vinegar-based marinade.

FISH FRY A breaded or beer-battered fish, traditionally served in WNY restaurants on Friday, as an alternative to meats and a reflection of the area's strong Catholic heritage.

PIEROGI A Polish dumpling, fried or boiled, traditionally filled with sauerkraut, potato, cheese, onions, or meat.

SPONGE CANDY

A chocolate candy with an airy, crunchy, sugar center.

TEXAS HOTS A style of hot dog known for its hot, spicy sauce. Texas hots originated in the kitchens of Buffalo's many Greek restaurants, not in Texas. Make sure it's a Sahlen's.

BLUE Labatt Blue: Buffalo is the beer company's U.S. headquarters.

LOGANBERRY A sweet, deep

purple and non-carbonated fruit drink made from loganberry juice.

TIMMY'S/TIMMY-HO

Shortened name for the regional coffee and donut chain, Tim Horton's. Possibly one of Canada's greatest gifts to America, along with hockey.

POP You may call it soda, but in Western New York, this is the word for any flavored carbonated beverage or soft drink.



Just north of the Central Business District is the perfect place to barhop, with dozens of bars playing an eclectic mix of music genres. Don't miss the late-night food spots.

Hertel Ave.

Check out this North Buffalo district for new bars, long-time neighborhood staples, and popular soccer-watching spot, Més Que.

W. Chippewa St.



Outdoors & Healthy Living

PARKIT

Buffalo has an entire park system designed by Frederick Law Olmsted — that's the same guy who designed New York City's Central Park. He thought the purpose of green space was "to refresh and delight the eye and through the eye, the mind and the spirit."

Upon touring the City of Buffalo in 1868, he convinced local leaders that not one park – as in New York City's Central Park – but multiple parks would better serve Buffalo's needs. In all, there are six major parks, seven parkways, and eight circles where residents make daily use of playgrounds, basketball courts, baseball diamonds, soccer fields, golf courses, running tracks, tennis courts, paths, trails, and a lot more.

Buffalo Niagara has many non-Olmsted designed parks across its region as well. Letchworth State Park is often referred to as "The Grand Canyon of the East." And the Ralph Wilson Park, located along Lake Erie on Buffalo's west side, is undergoing a \$110M transformation into a world-class waterfront destination with a resilient shoreline to mitigate the effects of climate change and rising lake levels.

DOG PARKS

In Buffalo, there's plenty of room for your fourlegged friend to enjoy the outdoors. Check out Knox Farm State Park, which has a six-acre dog park (with puppy- and small dog—designated areas) within its 633 acres.

"When I lived in Manhattan, we had 300 pounds of dog within a 600-square-foot apartment.
Buffalo is really dog-friendly. We're always hiking in the Southtowns or at the Knox Farm dog park."


BIKE SKI SKI CLIMB HIKE RUN



If you're looking to get active out-of-doors, try free yoga at Canalside or get a bit more daring while scaling one our monolithic grain silos reinvented as a rock wall. Not your bag? Try one of Lakeside Bike Park's three mountain bike tracks: 20 acres dedicated to the adventurous biker – complete with a bike wash. And when the temperature drops, head to the hills for skiing, snowboarding, or sledding. Or, lace up the skates for pond hockey.

POPULAR TRAILS

Enjoy beautiful and seemingly endless trails like: Eternal Flame at Chestnut Ridge Park, Knox Farm, Tift Nature Preserve, Reinstein Woods Nature Preserve, Niagara Gorge, Zoar Valley, The Town of Lockport Nature Trail, and Letchworth State Park.



Waterfronts & Waterways

ON THE WATER

Buffalo Niagara's waterways are more than just beautiful – they're a lot of fun, too. The region is surrounded to the west and north by Lake Erie, Lake Ontario, and the Niagara River. Take a walk on Bird Island Pier, picnic at developing Ralph C. Wilson Centennial Park, or bike along the Erie Canal.

From Memorial Day to Labor Day, take the Queen City Bike Ferry from Canalside to the Outer Harbor and back (you don't need a bike to ride the ferry; it's \$1).

Buffalo Harbor State Park is home to a 1,000 slip marina, boat launch, fish cleaning station, playground, and more. The park is adjacent to the popular Tifft Nature Preserve, boasting 264 acres of restored habitat.

The most popular public beaches are Woodlawn (Hamburg), Beaver Island State Park (Grand Island), Sunset Bay (Irving), and Evangola State Park (Evans/Angola). Yearround the region is a haven for fishing.



CITY OF BUFFALO WATERFRONT ATTRACTIONS

Bird Island Pier

Accessed from the foot of Broderick Park, which recently underwent an \$11 million makeover and is recognized as a terminus of the Underground Railroad between the United States and Canada.

Buffalo and Erie County Naval & Military Park

The largest inland Naval & Military Park in the country featuring four decommissioned Naval vessels.

Buffalo RiverWorks

A restaurant and brewery featuring a Ferris wheel, roller derby track, multiple ice hockey rinks, and a high ropes course, and is home to big-name concerts and events.

Canalside

At this playground for all ages take a free wellness or fitness class, play a free game (giant chess or checkers, anyone?), and rent a kayak or bike. There are family activities, restaurants, and concerts, just steps from the Central Business District.

Outer Harbor

On mighty Lake Erie's edge, access the trails, walking and biking paths, beaches, and parks that dot over 200 acres of green space and reclaimed shoreline. Wilkeson Pointe, Lakeside Complex and bike park, and the Bell Slip along the Health Wellness Trail are popular destinations.





Waterfronts & Waterways

Niagara Falls State Park is home to over 400 acres of lush landscape and wildlife, the beautiful Falls themselves, and many famous attractions. Designed by Frederick Law Olmsted, Niagara Falls State Park offers a breathtaking view of one of nature's marvels as it was intended to be seen.

First discovered in 1678, by French explorer Father Louis Hennepin, Niagara Falls was one of America's first icons, luring explorers, daredevils, and visitors.

World-class attractions such as the Maid of the Mist and Cave of the Winds, offer the nine million+ visitors each year an opportunity to feel, see, and experience the rush of Niagara's waters. Niagara Falls State Park is the oldest state park in the United States and is open 365 days a year, 24 hours a day.

NIAGARA FALLS, U.S.A. ATTRACTIONS

Cave of the Winds

Go face-to-face with the pounding waters of Niagara Falls and get soaked on the Hurricane Deck just feet from the waters.

Goat Island

Enjoy nature while gaining access to Cave of the Winds, Top of the Falls Restaurant, Three Sisters Islands, Terrapin Point, Luna Island, and the Niagara Rapids.

Maid of the Mist Boat Tour

Experience the world famous scenic boat tour of the American and Canadian Falls.

Niagara Falls State Park Visitors Center

Information Center, ticketing, gift shop, food, and home to the Niagara Adventure Theater. Footpaths lead from the center to every area of the Park and the Niagara Scenic Trolley departs from near the center.

Niagara Falls Illumination

Hundreds of LED lights create a breathtaking view of Niagara Falls every night of the year, with custom colors celebrating holidays and significant occasions.

Niagara Scenic Trolley

Take a three-mile trolley ride through the park that stops at several locations. A history of the park is provided.


Observation Tower

SPRING

DYNGUS DAY

ART FESTIVALS

AIRPORTS

Niagara Falls International Airport (IAG)

Niagara Falls International Airport specializes in destination vacations with specialized carriers, as well as some private business travel. THRUWAY TRAVEL

The New York State Thruway system includes electronic tolls that are billed to you or, more conveniently, with E-ZPass, an electronic transponder that's accepted throughout New York State, the surrounding Great Lakes states, and most areas in the New York City metro/tristate area. It's also accepted at U.S./Canada bridge crossings.

CROSSING THE BORDER WITH EASE

Remember, you're traveling across an international border and proof of citizenship is required. Every person in your vehicle must have appropriate identification. Lack of proper identification can cause travel delays, and denial of crossing or reentry. Acceptable forms of identification include U.S.-issued passports, an enhanced driver's license, enhanced nondriver identification card, or a NEXUS card (issued by the Canadian government for U.S. and Canadian citizens). Basic driver's licenses or birth certificates are not considered proper identification for adults at international crossings. This is also the case if you're traveling by bus, airplane, or train to or from Canada. For detailed information on acceptable forms of ID, please visit the U.S. Customs and Border Patrol website at www.cbp.gov.

Other important considerations include purchasing items to bring home (including shopping at the Duty Free shops at the international crossings), as some items may require you to pay duty or may be banned at international crossings (such as some food and plant materials). It is important to declare any purchases made while visiting. If bringing pets, please note that they must be properly licensed including proof of vaccinations.


THE QEW

THE YOUNGMANN

(AKA – The 290) The Youngmann Memorial Highway, a six-lane expressway through the suburbs of Amherst and Tonawanda, connecting I-90 with I-190. Biking is big in Buffalo Niagara, both as transportation and for recreation. We're adding miles of bike lanes every year — more than 80 miles of trails and dedicated bike paths have been created in the last few years, from waterfront connections between Buffalo and Niagara Falls, to the outlying hills with breathtaking trails and scenery. Newly created trails connecting Buffalo and North Tonawanda create easy access between the popular work and residential areas.

Buffalo is also the western terminus of the newly created Empire State Trail, a 750-mile connecting Buffalo to New York City, including the 8-mile Erie Canalway Trail section, which runs through the city from the Buffalo Harbor to the banks of the Niagara River. www.empiretrail.ny.gov



BIKE PATHS

Community-based organizations like GObike Buffalo and Buffalo Niagara Waterkeeper, public officials, and private corporations are committed to making Buffalo Niagara a forwardthinking and bike-friendly region. Bike infrastructure investments have been plentiful throughout the region, including more and more places dedicated to biking. These paths follow along much of the area's most beautiful scenic areas, like the waterfront, and enable easy access between destinations. The most comprehensive is the popular Niagara River Greenway Trail, featuring miles of urban, waterfront, naturalized, and suburban paved pathways and trails (www.niagararivergreenway.com). In addition, many major city roads have dedicated bike lanes to enable easier commutes by bike.

Advanced Business Services

A tech-savvy workforce and more than 80,000 miles of fiber optics cable are significant assets for companies in insurance, back office, and technology.
