



Here is one of the first impactful memories I have of Fr George:

When I first moved into the area and found OLSH, I attempted my first Mass, yet ran late. I was upset with myself for not making it on time, yet was on time for other events in my life that were less important. However, as I was rushing up the stairs 5 or so minutes, Fr. George was standing at the outside doors of the church and he spread out his arms and hugged me and said, "Welcome." Immediately all the bad thoughts I had left, I felt lighter and I knew I found the parish for me. -Diana

"All is grace. "-St Philip Neri

No one in my family would have believed that I could become a priest. And since I became a priest outside of my native country, Slovakia, after having escaped imprisonments and concentration camps in Communist Czechoslovakia, my family was without any news about me until I came to the United States in 1968.

I cannot say that I received at any time a priestly call. There have never been calls, revelations, special graces, or events that are sometimes connected with a call to the priesthood. I like to think that before my mother conceived me in her womb I was set aside by the grace of God to be a priest. As far as I can go back in my memory, I always sensed that I would be a priest and that I could be nothing else but a priest.

I grew up under Communist oppression and always desired to live in a country with democratic freedoms. My dramatic escape from Slovakia in 1950, under Stalin, truly represented an Exodus from slavery to freedom, and I was willing to pay the price in perils and suffering in exchange for freedom.

I became a priest in Italy and since I had expertise in film production, I was allowed to pledge my life to working in media. The Lord allowed me to travel extensively around the world, producing film and television documentaries depicting the conditions of the poor, exiles, marginalized and underprivileged. Since I settled in the United States I reported on the workings of the Vatican II Ecumenical Council. I was privileged to be part of that most important event in the recent history of the Church.

Because I was separated for more than 50 years from my own bishop in Slovakia, I always desired to belong to a family of priests approved and blessed by the Church. In 1998 I began the formation of the Oratory of St. Philip Neri in New York. This undertaking received a special blessing from Edward Cardinal Egan and from the Holy Father Benedict XVI. In 2007 we were established as a Pontifical Community of St. Philip Neri in New York.

Before I made the choice of the Oratory of St. Philip Neri, I carefully examined the alternatives offered to priests by the church and realized that the Oratory was the most joyful, liberating, and family-oriented institution that I could find in the Church.

In a few years the Lord has blessed our Oratory. Today it has eleven priests, with activities in parishes, media, hospital, healing ministries and hopefully more to come. Please pray that the Lord may send workers into His vineyard, into our Oratory, for the glory of God and salvation of many.

"O Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, I would like to be filled with love for You; keep me closely united with You, may my heart be near to Yours. I want to be to You like the apostle John. O Mary of the Rosary, keep me recollected when I say these prayers of yours; bind me forever, with your rosary, to Jesus of the Blessed Sacrament. Blessed be Jesus, my love."

Fr Vladimir Chripko, C.O.-Provost

"The Priesthood of Jesus Christ is the joy of my life!"

I was born in Slovakia, the oldest of four children. I have two younger sisters and one brother. I first experienced my vocation to the priesthood in high school ... my pastor asked me if I was thinking of becoming a priest. At that time, enrollments in the seminary were very limited due to the Communist regime's persecution of the Church in our country.

From the age of three, I served as an altar server and was at church almost every day to serve at 6 am and evening Masses. We practiced our faith to witness our faith in a hostile Communist environment. We were an underground church. Catholics met in people's homes for prayers and mutual support. We could not leave the meeting together at the same time. We had to leave one-by-one to avoid notice. When I was in high school, I was repeatedly called to the police station after Sunday Mass for questioning about my being an altar server. After high school, I was unable to apply for higher education due to my service as an altar server; the Communist party controlled education. I served the mandatory two years military service.

Communism fell in 1989. In 1990, I entered the theological seminary and was ordained a priest on June 17, 1995. I never thought of going to America. My mother came to work in America in 1994 to earn some extra money that was used for the family and also to pay for the expenses of my first Mass celebration. After ordination, I worked as a dean of studies and discipline at St. Charles Borromeo Seminary in the Archdiocese of Kosice. My sister moved to America, and I loved to visit her. I came to America several times and enjoyed getting to know this country better.

I had the opportunity to visit the Slovak communities in America and learned that they desperately needed Slovak priests ... I believed in my heart that God was calling me to serve them. I spoke with my bishop, and he allowed me to stay in America and to study English, which I did at BOCES from November 1999 to February 2000. On one of my visits I heard about Fr. George Torok, who at that time was serving the Slovak community in Clifton, NJ. I went there to attend Mass and to have the opportunity to meet Fr. George. It was a providential meeting, prepared, I believe, by the Holy Spirit. In 2002, I began working with Fr. George and served as a priest to many communities, including the Slovak parish of St. Michael in Trenton, St. Cyril and Methodius in Clifton, the Dominican Sisters' communities in Sparkill and Blauvelt, Holy Cross in Sleepy Hollow, and also, as a Catholic chaplain, at Rockland Psychiatric Hospital. I won a green card through the lottery and obtained citizenship five years later.

I realized after meeting with Fr. George that I had discovered, through the Oratory of St. Philip Neri, how I could fulfill my own way to be a priest. The Oratory of St. Philip Neri is not a religious order but a community of apostolic life. It adopts a more democratic governance. The Oratory is to be first of all a community of mutual support and love. The spirit of joy of St. Philip Neri animates our every action and prayer. Every Wednesday night we gather for a community dinner, each taking our turn to cook for the others (It's fun!). On Thursday nights we celebrate our Christian Seder, a beautiful tradition instituted by Fr. George. Continued...

Fr Vladimir Chripko, C.O. continued:

Fr. George began the process of establishing an Oratory in 1995. I was among the four priests who co-founded the New York Congregation Oratory. On the Feast of the Holy Apostles Peter and Paul, Pope Benedict XVI issued the decree of our foundation. On August 15, 2007, the feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, we officially received the papal documents authorizing us to be the Oratory of St. Philip Neri in New York.

My hobbies? I love to grill. I love to cook, and every Oratorian takes turns cooking for our community. I used to play hockey. Now I love to walk around Rockland or Congers Lake; sometimes it is difficult to find the time for such pleasure, but I try.

What is my hope for the parishes cared for by the Oratory? My hope is that we can do something beautiful for God together and also for all of us to enjoy one day the eternal life in heaven. What is most important is that we be united in love and joy, work together as friends and family. Nothing is more important than a family that works and prays together and where love reigns. We work for the glory of God, and that will bring us together. The people of God in St. Paul and St. Ann's church are my joy!

Inspiring quotes? All is Grace – St. Philip Neri – Be good if you can. There are people in your life whom you unknowingly inspire simply by being you. If being a Christian were illegal, would there be enough evidence to put you in jail? Enjoy Life, It has an expiration date. Be patient. God isn't finished with me yet.





Fr Roman Palecko, C.O.

"My great joy as a priest is to see the Sacredness of Sundays observed at Mass."

I grew up in a large city in Slovakia in a family of 13 children; I have six brothers and six sisters. Nine of my siblings still live in that city and so does my mom. My dad passed away seven years ago. In the second grade, I began my very happy experience as an altar server at the Cathedral in my city, where I served until I entered the seminary two years after the fall of Communism. Five boys in my family served in the Cathedral as altar servers. There was a rectory connected to the Cathedral, and we had a constant rotation of young priests who were a very good influence on all the altar servers. Over 12 years I met so many young, wonderful priests! We played football with them and worked side-by-side with them, helping in the rectory, the garden, even washing the cars. We listened to many homilies, and some of their preaching had a strong influence on me personally. Sometimes it was their work with families that was an inspiration.

In those years it was very difficult to practice our Catholic faith due to Communism. My father was called in for questioning many times about our family being in Church. It made him angry. He never joined the Communist party.

Was it difficult to leave your family and home country to live in America? Personally, it was exciting to think of coming to America to serve as a priest ... I had curiosity and wonder about what it would be like. I had been to America before entering the Oratory when I came for five summers on vacation, though being on vacation somewhere is very different from living and working in that place. In preparation to work here, I studied English every day at BOCES in Nyack, never knowing I would serve at St. Ann's parish one day. I used to come to St. Ann's to pray but did not know anyone. I believe it was God's providence! I've learned in life that no matter how many plans you make...none will ever be as perfect as God's plan for you.

What gives you joy about your vocation as a priest? In my priestly ministry, what I really love and enjoy so much is to see young families with children sitting together at Mass. It pleases my soul and it's what my own family did every Sunday. It reveals that parents understand Mass is good for their kids. Sunday is set aside for God and family ...it is "the Sacredness of Sundays in families." I also love when someone makes a really good confession ...this is a great moment. Confession is a sacrament of God's mercy.

Fr Roman Palecko, C.O continued:

How did I come to the Oratorian community? I started to come for vacations in 2006 to visit Fr .Vladimir and Fr. Martin, friends who were three years ahead of me in the seminary. This is how I met Fr. George. At that time, they were preparing to open the Oratory. I was here in August 2007 and was present when our bishop from Slovakia and Cardinal Egan came to Tappan for the establishment of the New York Oratory of St. Philip Neri. The Oratory is a community of brother priests who live and work together. They support each other spiritually, pray together, and provide understanding and good advice. It is healthy for priests to live in community with brothers who support them in their work as priests. The Oratorians live as a community in friendship.

Fr Peter Budjos

"The Lord is My Shepherd"

I was born in the regional newborn hospital in the city of Svidnik, Slovakia, but grew up in another city, Stropkov. I have three brothers and one sister (the youngest) and I am in the middle. My family was a very nice, good, Catholic family who went to Mass every Sunday due to the faith of my parents, especially, my mother. Our family prayed every night together (my mother never missed!). During Communism, it was not easy to practice Catholicism. The Communist Party told parents if they gave their children religious education, they would not allow them to go on to higher education, and their children would just be workers. My parents were committed to teaching us the faith so we expected to be workers, but all of us finished Universities in Slovakia. As a child I never served as an altar server. Many priests heard the inner calling to the priesthood when they were altar servers, but this was a later calling for me. I was in the military service for one year at a time when there was no conflict. We lived in the barracks and helped if there was a flood, etc.

This was the time I changed my meaning for my life. For the first time I was alone, without my parents and siblings. In the military you have to sign up to go to Mass. I remember the first time going to Mass without my family. I started thinking about my own spiritual life. In this year, in my heart, I began to feel maybe I should give my life as a sacrifice for God. After the military I worked for one year before going into seminary at age 21 (a bit old for formation at that time.) In the last year in seminary (pastoral year) and for the next three years as a priest, I enjoyed living and working with the homeless. There were one or two priests and three to five lay people living with 60 to 80 homeless people, including men, women, families, and the sick in an old, dilapidated, large rectory. We helped build the housing.

How did I come to the Oratorian Community? I knew Fr. Vladimir since I was student in seminary; he was Director of Discipline. He invited me to visit in 2002, my first time in America. I visited Fr. Vladimir three or four times in Tappan. On my visits I observed the community life of the Oratorians. This community attracted me to come to this country. As a diocesan priest, we rotated in different directions. In the Oratorian community, we are all diocesan priests who are friends; we work, pray, and have dinner together. We are ten priests who support each other, a very healthy family, like brothers.

What gives me joy about my vocation as a priest? I love my priesthood and give praise to God for everything I receive in my priesthood. Being a priest is a public ministry ... but with love always comes sacrifice. After the initial enthusiasm of becoming a priest, there is a sober realization that there is much to learn. As a priest for 16 years, I am always learning; every day I'm learning something new. I am really thankful to God for everything. I have joy ... and awareness of God's love. "The Lord is my shepherd" was the motto for my first Mass. The parable of the workers in the vineyard is my favorite. There is the worker who works all day and a worker who works for one hour. It is not easy to work in the vineyard, but the work is worthy. Working in God's vineyard gives me joy. It doesn't matter how long one is working in the vineyard — only that all people are in the vineyard — it is the Kingdom of Heaven.

Fr Peter Budjos, continued:

Was there anyone in particular who influenced me to become a priest? There were three seminarians in the military with me; at the time, studies were interrupted for military service. One of the seminarians was older and very special; a good man, passionate about his faith, and brave. We all attended Mass together and talked about spiritual things.

What is my hope for the parishes cared for by the New York Oratory? My hope is for the parish to grow in faith, be strong in cooperation, respect, identity, and love.

What are my hobbies? I like every kind of sport. I was a serious soccer player. I love running, cycling, hiking, swimming, skiing, traveling, and reading. I do not follow baseball or football but some parishioners asked me to pray for the Yankees!

Fr Tom Kunnel, C.O.

"That your joy may be complete."

I was born in Kerala, the cradle of Christianity in India. St Thomas the Apostle came to this part of India and established the Church, which to this day is a vibrant community. I have 5 sisters and an elder brother who has settled in Germany. I lost my younger brother when he was 22 years of age. As I write this my mother has just turned 100!

Our family home was next to a large convent and the nuns were my teachers at the primary school. Though I was extremely mischievous as a kid, they took a special liking to me and trained me to be an altar server and attend daily Mass in the convent, where no outsider was allowed to enter. This was an early, positive influence in my life.

In India, various congregations run *Apostolic Schools*, which are modelled on the regular state curriculum of Education with a great emphasis on Scripture and Catholic Doctrine. The vocation promoters go from school-to-school inviting students to join the Apostolic Schools. I joined the Apostolic School run by the Salesians of Don Bosco at the age of 10, for a course of studies for 7 years which ended with the graduation at Pre-University level equivalent to the 12th Grade in the US. At that point, I decided to enter the Novitiate of the Salesians thus beginning a 10-year course of formation towards priest hood.

I lived and worked as a missionary priest in North East India among the tribal population for 15 years. When a call came asking for help in the field of youth ministry and communication, I volunteered for African Missions. I came to the US for training in Film Production at Hallel School of Communication in 2001. After that, I spent 8 years establishing Media Production Centers in Africa. After the death of my father, the responsibility for the care of my mother fell on me. So, I left the Salesian Order and joined the Oratory knowing that my experience in Media Ministry would be strengthened and the charism of St. Philip Neri was familiar to me as Don Bosco took inspiration from St. Philip.

My vocation to the priesthood gives me great joy. I like to remind myself daily that I am a 'broken-healer' in the hands of God and he can use me as He wills. This is a privilege that I need to be grateful for constantly.

In our Oratory we all hope to create the atmosphere of belonging to a family and to be close to the parish community by being available, approachable, and friendly.

In my personal time I enjoy designing Film studios and working on music and media production.







Fr Frantisek Conka, C.O.

I was born in 1974 in Vranov and Toplou, Communist Czechoslovakia at the time. I spent most of my childhood in the small village of Zalobin, near Domasa Reservoir, which is in eastern Slovakia, an independent country and member of the European Union now. My father, Frantisek, who recently passed away, was a plumber and my mom, Maria, worked as a teacher. We were not allowed by the regime to go to church nor to receive the sacraments. I have two siblings, Kristina and Peter, both of them happily married and living in Slovakia.

Although I used to be an altar server as a kid, I never imagined I would become a priest one day, much less stationed in the United States of America. It all began around the time when I was graduating from the high school as an engineer in the beautiful city of Presov, along with working as a bartender, part-time, during summers. Under unusual circumstances, I felt the need to change my life and become a better man. I had two options; either to continue my studies at the University of engineering or attending the University of theology to become a priest. In other words, either build bridges between

two river banks or to between people and God .

I heard about the Oratorians and Saint Philip Neri when I arrived in the United States in 2006 to study English language and met Fr. George Torok. He explained to me what it meant to live out one's priestly life in the community of the Oratory. It reminded me of old times in Slovakia where I shared moments of joy or sorrow with my four best friends and 'colleagues;' priests, Fr. Roman, Fr. Dusan and Fr. Marko. Once a week, when we had a day off, we would get together to pray, say a Mass or just relax, being out there for each other as brothers. 

Fr Ravi Dasari

I was born in India. I'm the oldest in the family and have a brother and a sister. Both of my parents came from large families; my Mom was one of 9 children and my Dad was one of 7. My paternal grandparents stayed with us in our early lives. My grandmother, a convert to Catholicism, strongly influenced my journey of faith because of her encouragement to go to daily Mass and say a daily rosary. We come from a farming family, my Mom was a housewife. Both of my parents completed high school and could read and write; this was a very good achievement in our village. Our parish did not have a Catholic school and there were no Catholic schools within a 120-mile radius. Education was very important to my parents. They decided to send me to a Jesuit boarding school when I was in the 4th grade and sent my sister to study with nuns when she was in 2nd grade. Our other brother stayed home because my parents needed someone to love! Most of my schooling was with the Jesuits. The order was very generous to farming families in my country who could not pay tuition. I admired the kindness of the Jesuits. During that time, I learned about St Francis Xavier, who had traveled to India. The story of his life was very instrumental in my faith. As students, we went to a Jesuit camp one year and it was there I saw the movie, *Mission* (with Jeremy Irons and Robert Deniro.) The film opened my heart to vocation to the priesthood. Another strong influence was the life of St Francis of Assisi. While in seminary, a biography of the life of St Francis was our dinner reading one year. I was with the Jesuits for 5 years but then left.

I had my challenges in responding to the call to the priesthood. At times, I felt God was putting blocks in my path and maybe didn't want me. Then, God would open a door or window again! After a few challenges, I was ordained a priest. My first assignment was as principal of a high school. This paved my path of growth in compassion and kindness. When I became principal, it brought back to me the financial struggles I went through. I was able to be compassionate toward the students who also had financial difficulty and whose parents did not have money for their education.

Eventually, this led me to pursue pastoral ministry abroad and I came to the United States in 2009. I served for about 5 years in the southwest and then came to New York in 2015 to serve at St Aedan's in Pearl River. While at St Aedan's, I became attracted to the spirituality of St Philip Neri. It was the spirit of *joyfulness* that drew me to the Oratory of St Philip Neri in Tappan.

My journey with the Oratorians is about spreading that joy through various ministries. In my own experience as a priest, I recognize the humanity in people. For me, this humanness is a constant reminder of the challenges, temptations and sinfulness in life, as well as the holiness and deep sense of spirituality. When I was young, members of the clergy, religious and nuns were elevated to a pedestal. I am no great saint. We all have our demons in life. There are great moments, great days, but also difficulties. I like the humanness of my priesthood, though there are challenges of being a priest due to structures of the lifestyle. Continued-

Fr Ravi Dasari continued:

My education has greatly helped me in my ministry. I have 3 bachelor's degrees, philosophy, education and sociology and I also pursued theological studies. I have a Master's degree in Public Administration and completed a post-master's degree in Personal Public Management. Currently, I am working on a master's degree in marriage and family therapy through Seton Hall. I am very interested in Bereavement therapy, as well with the focus on healing, celebration and gratitude.


Through my homilies I feel I am able to pursue the path to holiness. My message is always of joy and hope. I love to lead small pilgrimages and trips and visit churches and cathedrals, where I get to know people personally and listen to their stories and faith. This enriches my priesthood. I am currently involved with a monthly ministry called, "The Daughters of St Ann." The group has about 80 women, widowed or single and never married. Originally, the group was for widows and was called, "The Voice of Ruth." In my ministry as hospital chaplain, I have found so much comfort in being with the sick and dying. It has humbled me in many ways to be present at that time in their lives and I try to share with them the spirituality of dying with dignity. In my role, I also have an opportunity to work with United Hospice of Rockland and offer spiritual and sacramental support.

One other thing for me...in my heart I feel every believer has the opportunity in life to become a reflection of God. In the sacramental celebration of a wedding or funeral, I try to bring meaning and dignity to the faith of people and the community. As Oratorians, we communicate a sense of 'personal touch' through all the ministries that we do.

In my free time I like to play golf, go for a walk, bike ride or swim. I do these things in my personal life to relax. It is important to practice self-care and avoid feeling drained in a busy life. I also enjoy watching some shows on Netflix. These things help to remind me I am human!

Fr Joseph Ravi Kumar

"You are precious to me, for I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." (Jeremiah 29:11.) Whatever God plans, is what I want for me.

I was born in Ravipadu, a village in South India, and attended Catholic School from nursery to 10th grade in our Church premises. In the 4th grade, I received my First Communion and in 8th grade the sacrament of Confirmation. After 10th grade from my school Catholic students who are pursuing to be ordained Priests went to 2 different vocation camps; diocesan camp (6 days) and religious camp (15 days,) during which vocation promoters (PRIESTS) from various congregations came to us to explain their charism and way of life. In 1995, I entered diocesan seminary and began 12 years of formation where I studied Spirituality, philosophy, Theology, in secular studies B.A. in political science, Specialty in English, and B.Ed. in teaching. As a part of my training, we were under Salesian formation for four years. Prior to this I was in seminary for three years. That time I was not completely sure in my heart that I was called to be PRIEST. But during formation period, I became serious about my vocation to the priesthood...I was 19 years old. In my journey with Salesians their charism spirituality motivated and molded me to be a complete servant of God. Salesian Spirituality is characterized by Gospel based virtues of humility, concern for downtrodden and liberty of spirit. Salesian's support and assist poor youth and their families. It is through both educational and vocational schools, social and work force development programmes. It helps youth to break the cycle of poverty and lead productive and happy life. It's the BASE for what I am today.

When, in the course of our philosophy and Theology, we were sent out for ministry in nearby parishes where I helped Mother Theresa's sisters caring for the poor, giving shaves, and trimming nails for the homeless men, teaching value and moral education classes in nearby Catholic school. I was ordained a priest on Feb 18, 2007 and served two years as in charge of a boys boarding, a teacher in boys' high school and as assistant priest in parishes and then as pastor 4years. In 2013, came to USA to serve in the diocese of Gallup, New Mexico. Where I am friends with Fr. Ravikiran. In 2015 August my brother Fr Raj came to work in the Oratorian community of St Philip Neri in Tappan, NY. I traveled to New York City in September 2015 to visit my brother Raj, Ravikiran and to see Pope Francis. Where I had an opportunity to see Holy Father in St Patrick's Cathedral prayed Vespers with him. I stayed with Oratorian community for about two months and had wonderful experience with all the Oratorian priests. This was a beautiful experience in my life. I fell in love with them. With the recommendation and encouragement of Fr. Ravi Dasari I showed my interest to come here. Fr George welcomed me, saying your brother is with us "You too can come here, we have a place for you." Fr Joseph Ravi Kumar continued:

My father was an example in my childhood; as parish council member he was always helpful to everyone in the Church and in our village too...and still is today. How did I come to know the Oratorian community?


I came to know the Oratorians through Fr Ravi and Fr Joseph, who is my brother. Originally, I was ordained a Salesian in India.

Brother Steven Neier

I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit, because without me you can do nothing. (John 15:5)

I was born in what was once, Mary Immaculate Hospital in Jamaica, Queens. I am the oldest of four children with two younger brothers and a younger sister. My mother and father worked hard, and still do, to support our family. I grew up in a two-bedroom house in a middle-class neighborhood in Queens with grandparents a few miles away, cousins in the next town over on a street where neighbors took the time to get to know each other. My education through sixth grade was in public school and from seventh grade onward, I was a Catholic school student. I graduated from St. Gregory the Great School (now Academy) in Bellerose and Archbishop Molloy High School. My family relocated to Rockland County when I was in college, shortly after the birth of my sister, and I stayed behind for the better part of two decades. I think the seedlings of my call to the priesthood sprouted in the seventh grade and I first became aware of the call when I was in high school. However, the seeds were actually planted long before that, as I can remember how meaningful my First Holy Communion was to me. On a Boy Scout camping trip/retreat for Catholic scouts in high school, the Holy Spirit placed me in the presence of the Vocations Director.

As a first-year college student, I attended college seminary but chose to leave. I continued my education, began my career and worked in a number of positions. Over several years, I visited my family in Rockland County right around the time the NY Oratory arrived at St. Paul and St. Ann. I came to St. Ann Church in Nyack during the Octave of Christmas for daily Mass around the noon hour. Advent and Christmas are *my favorite* liturgical seasons. It was important to me to fully celebrate the Christmas season of the Church, something that so easily gets lost. I can see in hindsight, that this had become like an annual mini-retreat, of sorts. It was not Christmas for me if I didn't make this retreat. The priesthood had been in the back of my mind and somewhere on my heart for many years. I think God used those mini-retreats at St Ann to expose me to the Oratorians and to call me back to the vocation of the priesthood. In those still, peace-filled, joyful days of the Church calendar, surrounded by the beauty of St. Ann Church and among the faithful people, God was still calling to me. It was as if God wanted to surprise me with a model of priesthood that I never could have imagined, and truly that is what God created through St. Philip Neri- a priesthood that is neither diocesan, nor religious order. Finally, after about four years of this (and right before the pandemic struck us,) I contacted Fr. George to learn more about Oratorians and, in particular, the New York Oratory of St. Philip Neri.

I chose the New York Oratory of St. Philip Neri because in it I find a community of joyful priests who love their priesthood, love our community and love the people whom they serve. We are a Clerical Society of Apostolic Life of Pontifical Right (how's that for a tongue-twister?) quite young as an Oratory (our Oratory just turned 14 years old.). Oratories are families and the particular gifts of each family member are celebrated and nurtured. When I was on those informal Christmas mini-retreats, I was inspired by the way the Oratorians celebrated the liturgy and preached as well as the gentle example of holiness that I saw in them. What I had once searched for was finally made known to me in a subtle and unexpected way. "C.O....What's that?" I asked myself as I walked out time and again with a St. Ann's bulletin. Some basic Google research provided me with early answers but meeting with Fr. George and having a period to discern within the community that has helped me to understand the significance of those letters after each of our Oratorians' names. Congregation of the Oratory of St. Philip Neri: a community of prayer, of love and of joy.

Br Steven Neier continued:

The things that give me joy in my vocation, are the people I encounter, those alongside whom I have the opportunity to serve and minister, and the faith that is shared by the witness of people both young and old.

Remo DiSalvatore, O.F.M. who was my pastor at another St. Ann's in Hoboken, NJ. Others were early classmates...now, Fr. Jean Delva, and others who came after me like Fr. Patrick Dorelus. My maternal grandmother was also a large influence on my life and her faith doubtless had a powerful impact on my vocation. Each parishioner whom I meet, speak with and spend time with-is influencing my vocation and I am grateful for this.








"Wadi" Ts a dry gully or riverbed. It fills up only during the
