OUR COVER ARTIST

Timothy Cummings, represented by Catharine Clark Gallery in San Francisco and Nancy Hoffman Gallery in New York, journeyed to a French Quarter pied-à-terre overlooking Armstrong Park in the Fall of 2017 as part of a My Good Judy Residency. The My Good Judy Foundation provides residencies for artists seeking to produce a body of work or performance in New Orleans that address culture making from an LGBTQ+ perspective. The residency was established to also honor the work of author and activist Judy Grahn. The subjects of Cummings' work are often children and adolescents struggling with issues of sexuality and sexual orientation in an adult world. In 2013, he was an artist-in-residence and subject of a solo exhibition at Transarte in Sao Paulo, Brazil. His paintings are also part of the collections of singer, songwriter, and composer, Rufus Wainwright, Whoopi Goldberg in Los Angeles, CA and Tomaso Bracco and Sara Davis in Milan, Italy.

This leisurely stroll through the French Quarter focuses on New Orleans' enchanting past with an emphasis on the neighborhood's queer history and its rich literary heritage. See where writers lived and wrote and learn about the incredible contributions lesbians and gay men have made to the city over its 300-year-old history. The tour is guided by long-time French Quarter resident **Frank Perez**, a local historian and professional tour guide who has written six books about French Quarter history. Perez also serves as the executive director of the LGBTQ+ Archives Project of Louisiana.

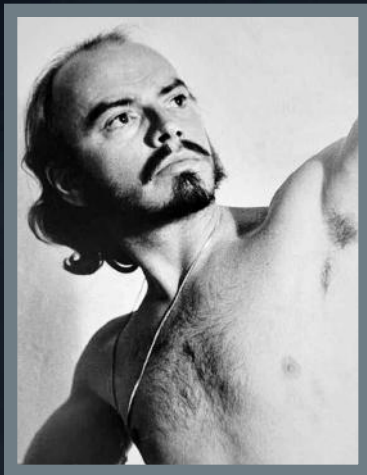
QUEER UNDERGROUND

John Burton Harter

(1940-2002) documented the richness of gay experience through his prolific artwork. Harter is most known for exquisite figure studies, especially fine compositions of the male body. These works range from classical studio drawings to completed paintings and self-portraits. He created over 3,000 works of art during his life largely based in New Orleans. His paintings have received acclaim at showings in New York, Baton Rouge, and San Francisco.

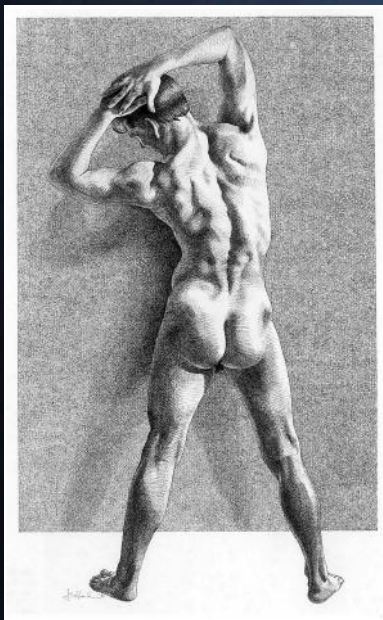


Plate 22, *Standing Figure*, Pen and Ink, 1993

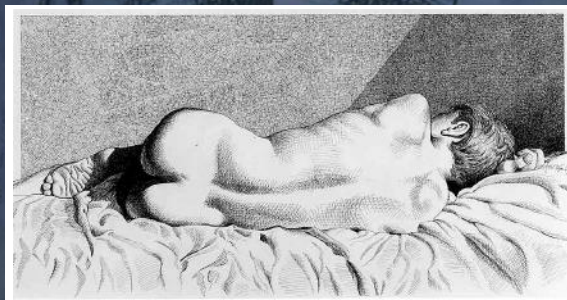
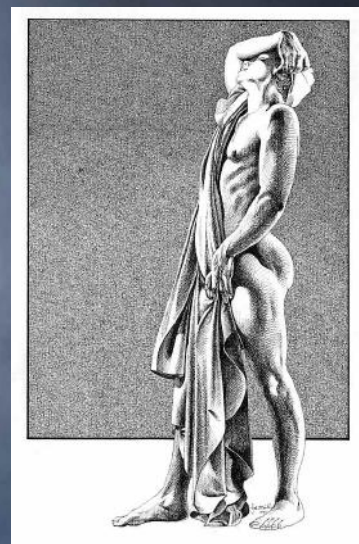


Plate 28, *Sleeping Figure*, Pen and Ink, 1995



Draped Figure, Pen and Ink, date unknown

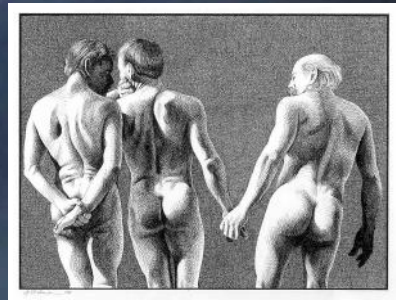


Plate 51, *Secrets*, Pen and Ink, 1999

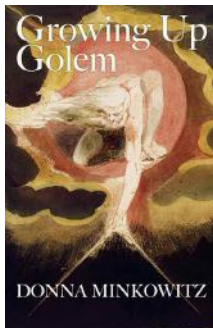

Yet prose writers often forget that the word, the sentence, and even the syllable are the basic units of their art. In this workshop, Donna Minkowitz, Lambda Literary Award-winning author of two memoirs and a novel, will show how prose writers can infuse their work with sound, rhythm, imagery, metaphor, and lyricism.

It's said that those who do not learn from history are doomed to repeat its mistakes. Historical fiction is a key genre to understanding our past and ultimately shaping our futures. How does one make it credible and vivid? This session hopes to provide lively discussion about the techniques and pitfalls of setting fiction in past eras, the ethics of incorporating actual events and individuals into a story, and the ways in which historical fiction can inspire readers to reflect on their own present-day circumstances.

Gothic literature has several key identifiable elements: an atmosphere of dread; fear of supernatural occurrences; the intrusion of the past on the present; terrifying events that often are emblematic of psychological or social conflicts; lost lovers; and anticipation of torture. Early stories featured bloody dismemberments (or the fear of them); think about Poe's "The Pit and the Pendulum!" Also common were hauntings by ghostly dead lovers, mythical beasts, possession, and somnambulistic adventures.

This workshop will focus on elements in our society today that nurture the terrors abound in Gothic stories. What would we write using either a contemporary or historic setting that would tell us a moody, claustrophobic story filled with shadows and anxiety? We'll explore story ideas, each participant creating one or two-line descriptions. Then we'll talk in the session about how specifically such a story would develop. The hope is to leave each participant with the bones (pun intended) on which to build a complete story.

Technology offers new and different ways to approach writing across three axes: our generative process, the actual narratives of our stories, and the distribution of our final work. Perhaps you use novel writing apps or software to organize characters, plot, and structure; or you might go further and turn to generative AI (such as ChatGPT) to help you work out kinks in a story or provide feedback akin to that of a developmental editor. Tech offers an ever-evolving palette of options for setting (e.g., virtual spaces like "dating" apps), character (e.g., the jilted AI lover), plot and conflict (e.g.



surveillance, a rogue AI therapist). In terms of getting our writing out there, we'll look at ePublishing, blogging, Substack, and hosting or creating a podcast, which can elevate less-represented voices and even create exposure that leads to publication. We'll look at how we can make use of and integrate these aspects of technology into our work, focusing primarily on the fun part: the story itself. We may want to write about how the "dating" apps have changed LGBTQ+ life, offering opportunities for story that didn't exist before, normalizing the blind date and the element of surprise – tragic, comedic or even downright dangerous. App dialog itself can be a literary form - often poetic - and can even include photos! If we want to tell a story via podcast, what stories work best in this format? We'll talk about all of this and do a writing exercise incorporating AI, podcasts and apps.

THE LAB: EXPERIMENTS IN QUEERING FORM, VOICE, AND GENRE—MATTHEW CLARK DAVISON

This session will invite queer writers of all levels to experiment with crossing genres—fiction, nonfiction, poetry, and hybrid forms—as a way of opening new artistic possibilities and deepening voice. Here's a passage from the book that captures the spirit of the session:

"We somehow have to balance three things when we write: 1. We should write about something we're personally interested in, preferably even obsessed by. 2. We should write about something that may eventually matter to the world outside our own head (but we don't worry about that when creating). 3. We should write about something that will surprise our readers by its beauty—and, in the best circumstances, move them through the power of its aesthetic force."

With examples from Jeanette Winterson, Justin Torres, and others, we'll look at how writers find something like beauty in its opposite. What's beautiful and what's ugly is completely up to you. In fact, if you see beauty where others don't, or ugliness where others don't, you may have an advantage. Through guided prompts and short bursts of writing, participants will explore how obsession, aesthetic force, and nonconforming oddities can help queer their work—creating art that is personally urgent, aesthetically bold, and resonant within and beyond LGBTQ+ communities.

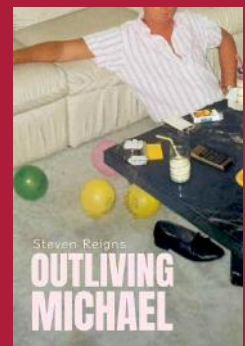

Sven Davisson is a writer, editor, and longtime advocate for queer literature whose work has helped sustain and expand LGBTQIA+ publishing. He is the founder of Rebel Satori Press and its imprints, where he has spent more than two decades championing emerging and marginalized voices. His own writing—appearing in journals, zines, and collaborative projects—explores identity, memory, and the intersections of queer spirituality with art and activism. Based in New Orleans, he continues to edit, write, and support independent literary communities, remaining a committed steward of queer storytelling and small-press culture. His most recent works include *Breeding Devils In Chaos*, *Puck You!*, and *The United Rite*.

St Sukie de la Croix is an award-winning, internationally published reporter, columnist, photographer, historian, novelist, humorist, and playwright. His latest books are *Twilight Manors in Palm Springs: The Great New Orleans Powder Puff Caper* and *St Sukie's Lunatic Asylum for Demented Toys* (Illustrated by Roy Alton Wald). He is currently writing another novel in the *Twilight Manors* series.

Alfred P. Doblin has spent most of his professional career working as a journalist. He has been recognized by numerous state and national journalism associations, including the American Society of News Editors, the Society of the Silurians, NLGJA: The Association of LGBTQ+ Journalists, and was nominated four times for the GLAAD Media Award for Outstanding Newspaper Columnist. He was a finalist in the Saints and Sinners 2025 and 2024 Short Fiction contests. His first book, *Tales of the Lavender Twilight*, was released last spring, and his second book, *Sailing Beyond the Sunset*, a collection of ten short stories, will be released this spring by Rattling Good Yarns Press.



Margot Douaihy's debut mystery, *Scorched Grace*, won the Pinckley Prize for First Crime Novel and was named one of the Best Crime Novels of the Year by *The New York Times*, *The Guardian*, *CrimeReads*, and others. Her second mystery, *Blessed Water*, was also named a *New York Times* Best Crime Novel of the Year (2024) and won the Publishing Triangle Award for LGBTQ Fiction. The third mystery in her series, *Divine Ruin*—"fearlessly inspired" (Gillian Flynn)—published in January 2026. Margot is an assistant professor with the Popular Fiction MFA at Emerson College.



Reine Dugas is an English professor at Southeastern Louisiana University. When not writing, she's assistant editor of *Louisiana Literature*, publicist for the Tennessee Williams and New Orleans Literary Festival and editor of the magazines, *Louisiana Life* and *Acadiana Profile*. On the weekends, she interviews authors for a boozy literary podcast called *Booktails*. Her short stories have appeared in publications including *South 85 Journal*, *Deep South Magazine*, *The Arkansas Review*, and *Acentos Review* to name a few. Of those, "Ellie, an Epilogue," was nominated for a Pushcart Prize. She's edited two anthologies—an academic collection focusing on Eudora Welty's *Delta Wedding* and a creative collection of feminist writing called *Audacious Women*. Her short story collection, *When Books are Your Life*, will be published next spring.



Samuel Ernest is a theologian and writer in New Haven, Connecticut. He is the founding publisher and editor in chief of Homodoxy, a new press for gay/queer theology and literature. His essays in erotic spiritual autobiography have been featured in *Cephalophore*, *Longreads*, and Roxane Gay's Emerging Writer Series at *The Audacity*. He is graduating in May with a PhD in Religious Studies from Yale University, after which he will begin working on the press full time.



Andrew Faye is a recovering-attorney-turned author. His current fiction project involves exploring the overlapping 19th and 20th Century histories of queer fiction, vampiric fiction, phlebotomy, and hematology, as told through a story of love, sacrifice, and innocence lost predominantly set in the Allied trenches cut into the French countryside during The Great War and the blood banks of San Francisco in 1985, where a different kind of battle is playing out.



Robert W. Fieseler is a journalist investigating marginalized groups and a scholar excavating forgotten histories. A NLGJA Journalist of the Year and recipient of the Pulitzer Traveling Fellowship, his debut book *Tinderbox* won seven awards, including the Edgar Award, and his reporting has appeared in *Slate*, *Salon*, and *River Teeth*, among others. Fieseler's second queer history book, *American Scare*, was named a *Kirkus* Best Book of 2025. He is pursuing a PhD at Tulane University as a Mellon Fellow and lives with his husband on the gayest street in New Orleans.



Bradley Firchow is a Kentucky-based writer and medical student whose work examines the human and ecological complexities of Appalachian life. His essays and stories draw from his clinical experiences in rural medicine and his long-standing commitment to narrative as a tool for understanding place. His work has appeared in *Academic Medicine*, *Testament: A Rural Anthology*, *Salvation South*, and elsewhere. He is at work on a collection of fiction exploring care, identity, and the ties that bind people to the mountains.



Ben Fluet is a queer poet and filmmaker living in New Orleans. He is currently the Graduate Editor at University of New Orleans Press and a reader for *Bayou Magazine*. In 2022, he hand-bound and self-published his debut chapbook, *How We Forgot to Sing*. A collection of short stories, *Far from Home*, was published in October 2021. He lives with his husband in San Leandro, California and Puerto Vallarta, Mexico.



Dan Meltz was raised in the low-rent reaches of Jersey, sixteen minutes from Times Square, and has lived in Manhattan for fifty years. He's a retired technical writer and teacher of deaf young people, with a B.A. from Columbia (no honors). Donna Minkowitz is a writer of memoir, fantasy, and journalism. Joby Mire is a graduate student of creative writing in the genre of poetry at the University of New Orleans. Joby was born and raised in the Acadiana region of Louisiana and now resides in New Orleans, after having spent years living in Southern California. Additionally, he has studied English literature, with an emphasis in the early modern period, at California State University, Long Beach. His greatest poetic influences are John Milton, William Blake, W.B. Yeats, Robert Duncan, James Merrill, and Rebecca Tamás.



Mark Mones is an editor at the University of Virginia Press. A 2021 Out100 Honoree, her writing has been supported by MacDowell, Tin House, and the Kimbilio Center for African American Fiction, and appears in *McSweeney's*, *American Short Fiction*, and *ZORA*. She is co-host of the critically-acclaimed podcast *Food 4 Thot*, and her debut novel, *When The Harvest Comes*, was released by Random House in April 2025.



Martin Padgett is the author of *The Many Passions of Michael Hardwick* (2025), which tells the full story of the Supreme Court's disastrous 1986 sodomy decision, and *A Night at the Sweet Gum Head* (2021), which details the emergence of queer rights at a famed Atlanta drag club. Martin has written for *Bitter Southerner*, *Oxford American*, *The Paris Review*, *Gravy*, *Washington Post*, and *Time* on topics ranging from single mothers in pursuit of sole custody to the prison labor that

Frank Perez is a writer, teacher, tour guide, and public speaker who also serves as the executive director of the LGBT+ Archives Project of Louisiana. He is also the editor of *Ambush Magazine*. He has authored several books on New Orleans queer history and written hundreds of articles on the same topic. 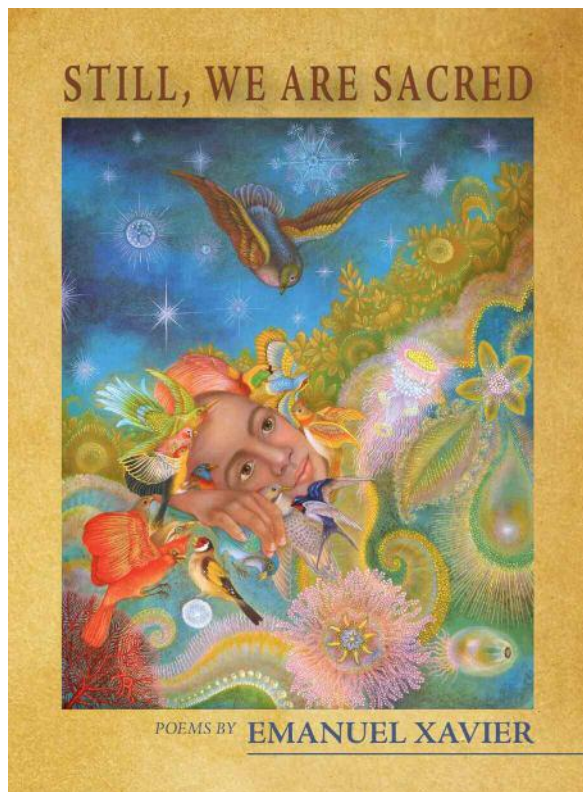

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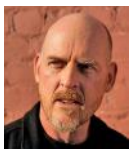

His published novels are *Army of Lovers*, recognized by the Independent Publisher Book Awards for the best LGBTQ Fiction Of 2022; *The World of Normal Boys*, winner of the Lambda Award for Gay Fiction; *You Can Say You Knew Me When*; and *Robin and Ruby*. He lives in San Francisco and teaches in the MFA program at University of San Francisco.



Rodney Rhoda Taylor is a playwright and author inspired by Carrie Bradshaw, who earned a Creative Writing degree from San Francisco State University. Their passion for storytelling led to writing, directing, and acting in numerous plays, as well as co-founding the LGBTQ-focused Left Coast Theatre Co. in San Francisco. Chicago Writers Conference, and the International Dublin Writers' Festival. She lives in the suburbs of Chicago with her husband, their rescue dog, and two cats.
