Remebrance Journey Abroad

uring the 2024 April Break, students traveled abroad to Germany, Poland, and the Czech Republic. Approximately 50 students attended the trip, with five teacher chaperones. The students explored sites in Berlin, Prague, and Krakow, including the concentration camp of Auschwitz-Birkenau. During this nine-day excursion, there were opportunities throughout the tour for small-group facilitated discussions with faculty, private reflection, and prayer. In Berlin, the group visited the Soviet War Memorial, the Sacred Heart of Jesus Church, and Checkpoint Charlie. Checkpoint Charlie was a bustling spot in Berlin during the Cold War. It was the line between East and West Berlin, and it was right where the American and Soviet sectors met. There was a significant moment in 1961 when tanks from the U.S. and the Soviet Union faced off there, making it even more famous.

After the Berlin Wall came down in 1989, Checkpoint Charlie wasn't necessary. Now there's a replica, and

a museum, all about its history. The travelers also explored Museum Island, Berlin's Jewish district, and sites related to World War II and the Holocaust. Berlin's Jewish district is an extremely important part of the city's history. It's home to the New Synagogue, which was important for the Jewish community in the 1800s. There's also the Old Jewish Cemetery, which has lots of stories to tell. During the Holocaust, this area was where many Jewish people were taken from Berlin. Visiting these places helped students understand how the Holocaust affected the Jewish community here. It was a truly somber and meaningful experience that helped students reflect on what happened to so many people during that time.

In Prague, the students visited the Olympic Stadium and the House of the Wannsee Conference. The House of the Wannsee Conference is where top Nazi leaders met in 1942 to plan the "Final Solution," which was the genocide of millions of Jews during the Holocaust. Led by Reinhard Heydrich, they decided how to carry out the mass murder. Students also toured the Royal Quarter and St. Vitus Cathedral. Overall, this trip was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity and experience for the students who went.





SAVI Recap

uring the 2024 April Break, seven students had the opportunity to embark on an Augustinian journey of tradition, prayer, and reflection. Schools rotate who hosts the retreat, and this year was Malvern Prep's turn, who is located in Malvern, Pennsylvania. Austin Prep is one of ten select Augustinian Schools in North America to be a part of this retreat. The retreat is rooted in the desire for schools in North America to provide opportunities for students to deepen their knowledge and spiritual practices. As Fr. The last activity the class participated in was making dumplings. Students were all brought down to the dining hall where the Mandarin teachers had all the ingredients laid out. Students added the beef filling in the dough, which could be colored with different fruits. It made for a lot of fun, and after students were finished, they had enough to pass out to people walking through the dining hall.

Another tradition is for little boys and girls to receive Red Envelopes from their parents or grandparents. These envelopes are full of money, usually ending in "8" because it is considered a lucky number in the culture. Students played a game of bingo, and the prizes were the Red Envelopes with varying amounts of "Yuan", (¥) which is the name for Chinese currency. Lunar New Year was a great chance for our community to learn and celebrate Chinese culture. culture.


Steven always puts in the energy and effort needed to take his talents to the next level, and is excited to see what the future holds.




JV Boys Hockey
