PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

I am privileged to be able to write this report as the Acting Principal while Dr Lavorato has taken some Professional Renewal Leave for the remainder of the year. During her leave, she will take some time to walk 'In the Footsteps of St Paul.' She is undertaking a pilgrimage in Greece and Turkey going to the historical sites where the Apostle, St Paul preached and wrote his letters that we listen to and read from the Bible. I trust this will be a time for her to relax, renew and reenergise herself for the coming year ahead.

At St Patrick's College, we continue to live out the mission of Blessed Edmund Rice, who believed in a 'liberating education', one that upholds human dignity and creates opportunity for all. While much has changed over the past 98 years, our core principle remains: to ensure that everyone has access to this liberating education. To fulfil our mission, we must leave no one behind. We aim to educate the whole person: academically, spiritually, socially and emotionally.

This commitment reflects the vision of both Edmund Rice and Pope Leo XIV, who in his *Apostolic Exhortation Dilexi te* emphasised the preferential care for the poor and the power of education as a form of justice and empowerment. Like Edmund, we are called to see the marginalised not as objects of pity, but as bearers of Christ's presence; a calling we live out through our Social Justice Program.

Over the July school holidays, students and staff embraced this mission through our Immersion experiences: the domestic program visiting our Flexi Partnership School, St Joseph's Alice Springs, and the overseas program travelling to Fiji. We extend our thanks to all participating students, and in particular to staff members Mr Biviano, Mr Wallace, and Mr Fox, for accompanying our students as they walked alongside our brothers and sisters on their journey.

As we approach the end of the year, we have much to celebrate. The Class of 2025 had a wonderful Graduation Assembly, Mass and Dinner. As the number of each cohort is getting bigger, the Mass this year was held in the College Gymnasium. It was a beautiful evening of celebration, and I must thank Ms Daley for transforming the space into a Chapel and ensuring the service was moving, meaningful and fit for the occasion. I would also like to thank Ms Fiscaro, Mr Simpson, Ms Viney and all the homeroom teachers for all the work that they did leading up to, and during the graduation events.

Whilst they have graduated, and we wait for the Class of 2025's academic results, we can already start to celebrate their practical results. We had four nominations for inclusion in SHAPE for Design and Technology; congratulations go to Daniel Bechara, Gideon Benedict, Anthony Boulattouf and Joseph Hanna. In Industrial Technology Timber, Joshua Barbera, Logan Barry, Luca Cavallaro, Adriano Di Bella, and Nicholas Macher were all nominated for their major works. In Music, we congratulate Nicholas Panagopoulos for his nomination. Another highlight for the College was our nominations for Drama and OnStage with both our group performances receiving nominations. Congratulations to Michael Bridge, Dylan Celegon, Gus Keneally, Thomas Doherty, Marco Geronimo, Xavier Kenniff, Elijah Mannah, Mateusz Milewski, Stefan Preocanin and Jordan Wehbe. A special mention to Xavier Kenniff who was also nominated for his individual performance.

We continue to broaden the range of pathways available to our students by expanding our Vocational Education and Training (VET) offerings. This year, students have had the opportunity to study Construction, Hospitality (Food and Beverage) and Information and Digital Technology, gaining practical skills and nationally recognised qualifications. Building on this success, next year we will introduce Hospitality (Kitchen Operations), Sports Coaching and Real Estate, further enhancing the choices available and ensuring every student can pursue a pathway that aligns with their interests and future aspirations.

At the end of last term, we acknowledged the student leaders for 2026. We will be ably led by our College Captain Francesco Mazza and our Vice Captains, Ryan Scullion and Marco Lo Russo. As well as acknowledging our new Student Leadership Team, our Year 11 students officially turned into the leaders of the College as we undertook our Black Tie Liturgy. This special occasion reminded the graduating Class of 2026 of their responsibility to lead with purpose, for others as well as themselves. It was also a moment to reflect on their journey so far and to look ahead with inspiration for the year to come.

I have very much enjoyed my time leading this community and look forward to supporting Dr Lavorato upon her return next year as we launch our new Strategic Plan.

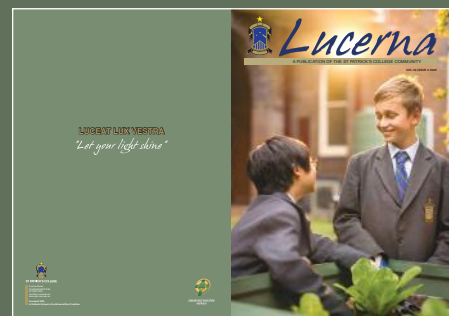

LIGHTS, CAMERA, ADVOCACY!

Last term, several Year 10 classes at St Patrick's College were invited to take part in *Doco in a Day*, a new initiative by the Edmund Rice Foundation Australia (ERFA). Students formed five small teams and were tasked with creating a three-minute documentary showcasing the impact of ERFA's life-changing work in Africa. ERFA is the charitable arm of Edmund Rice Ministries, supporting programs run by the Christian Brothers across the globe, particularly in Kenya and South Africa. The prize for the winning documentary? A trip to East Africa in 2026.

Each team had just six hours to produce their film using footage and resources provided by ERFA. The challenge encouraged students to share a powerful story while deepening their understanding of the importance of education and social justice; a reminder of how often we take these opportunities for granted.

Out of 86 entries from 23 schools, one of our College teams took home the top prize. Congratulations to Antony Di Gori, Luca Serratore and Noah Young, whose documentary told the uplifting story of Faith, a young woman who dared to dream. Judges Sal Balharrie and Archie Chew praised the team's work, describing it as "a personal story of joy and hope in the face of adversity... crafted with great dignity and a lightness of touch."

This outstanding achievement is a testament to the students' creativity and compassion, and a reminder of the impact we can have when we support organisations like ERFA.

We thank Mrs Lombardo for guiding the teams throughout the process and ensuring all entries were successfully submitted.

AWAKENING EMPATHY

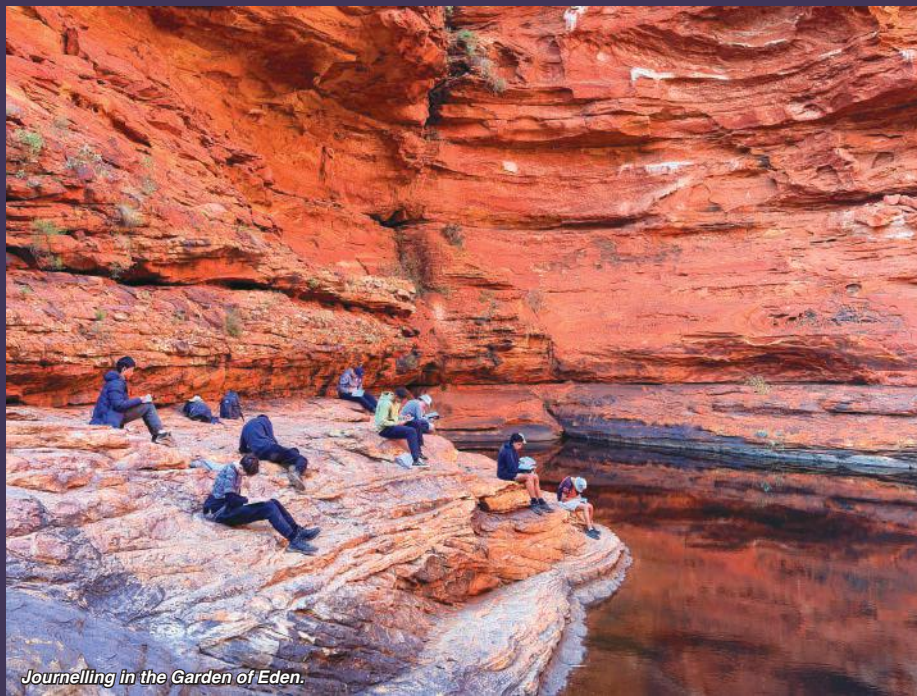
SPEAKING 4 THE PLANET

It was an amazing opportunity to engage with other schools and share our thoughts and hope we stay close with this community in the years to come so we can really make a difference.

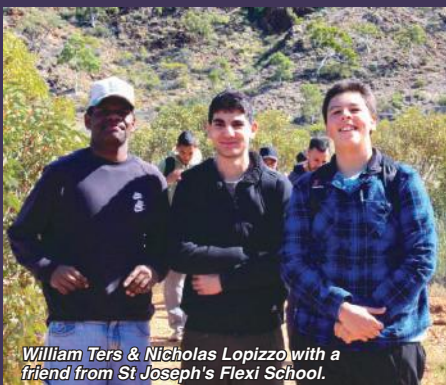

CONNECTING THROUGH COUNTRY

During the Term 2 break, nine students from the Year 11 cohort of 2025 embarked on a life-changing journey filled with fun, learning, and, above all, connection. The Alice Springs Immersion has long been a cornerstone of SPC immersions, with each group helping to strengthen the bond between St Patrick's College and St Joseph's Flexi School in Alice Springs.

After arriving in Alice Springs, we spent the night in cabins before waking at 4:30 AM to venture out into the red desert and begin the three-day camping program. During this time, we slept on Country beneath the beautiful night sky and learnt about Aboriginal practices and traditions in places such as Kings Canyon, Kata Tjuta, and the iconic landmark Uluru. Learning about how these sacred sites were used before colonisation was a privilege for all involved. From sleeping in swags to preparing meals together, the camping experience helped the boys connect deeply with the land and with one another.

Upon returning to town, the group eagerly anticipated our visit to St Joseph's Flexi School. Beforehand, we discussed appropriate conversation topics and areas to avoid, such as cultural initiations and aspects of personal background. However, once we arrived, we were pleasantly surprised at how easily the conversations flowed. Connections were made effortlessly as we discussed music genres, favourite hobbies, and shared experiences. Learning about the lives of other young people across Australia was both educational and eye-opening.

The immersion proved to be a truly transformative experience. Each of the Year 11 boys expressed that this journey would always hold a special place in their hearts. The connection formed with St Joseph's Flexi School extends beyond the individuals on this trip; it represents a lasting bond between two schools united by the Edmund Rice tradition. Throughout our time there, we felt nothing but welcome, thanks to the kindness and generosity of the staff, volunteers and students.

On our first day exploring Alice Springs, we were greeted by three locals who cheerfully called out, "Hello, tourists!" This moment, rather than feeling uncomfortable, reflected the warm and welcoming spirit of the local community, who embraced the group with open arms.

Overall, the Alice Springs Immersion provided all of us with invaluable knowledge about the continuing traditions and practices of First Nations peoples in Central Australia. It offered a unique opportunity for cultural understanding, personal growth and genuine connection; an experience that will stay with us for years to come.

THE ISLAND CLASSROOM

In the September/October school holidays, I was blessed with the incredible opportunity to travel on the 2025 Fiji Immersion, a week that completely changed how I see the world and our planet's future. The Immersion took us to Taveuni, a small island of Fiji, where we witnessed first-hand how climate change is affecting communities and ecosystems.

From the moment we arrived, the warmth, friendliness and generosity of the Fijian people immediately stood out, and we made an effort to learn as many Fijian words as we could. Over the week, we learned how Fijian communities live sustainably - growing their own food, fishing responsibly, and using every resource carefully to ensure nothing goes to waste. It was eye-opening to see how their lifestyle naturally aligns with environmental protection, something many modern societies are still striving to achieve.

But among the natural beauty of tropical forests, waterfalls and colourful coral reefs, we also saw signs of distress and the reality of rising sea levels. Some coastal villages have already been overtaken by the sea, forcing the people to relocate inland as the shoreline continues to erode. The local Fijians spoke about how unpredictable weather patterns and stronger storms have affected crops, coral reefs, and traditional livelihoods. While we were there, a huge drought was taking place, limiting the amount of fresh water available in certain areas. Listening to these stories was emotional. Hearing and witnessing these alterations made climate change feel real, not just a scientific concept, but a daily challenge impacting people's lives.

The biggest lesson I took away from this experience was that sustainability is not just about technology or government policy, it's about mindset. The Fijian way of life shows how caring for the environment is about community, respect, and gratitude. If every person adopted even a fraction of that attitude, we could make a meaningful difference in combating climate change.

Our immersion to Fiji was a prompt to live out our shared responsibility. It is a continuous reminder that connection to the environment is not something separate from us, it is part of who we are. Seeing the resilience of the Fijian people inspired me to make changes in my own life, to reduce waste, be mindful of energy and water use, support more environmentally friendly choices and most importantly, raise awareness of how urgent the climate crisis truly is.

VET Hospitality Food and Beverage has been thriving since its introduction in 2023, with outstanding enthusiasm and success from students. Building on this momentum, the College is excited to announce the expansion of our VET offerings to include Hospitality Kitchen Operations, commencing in 2026. This marks an exciting new chapter for our Hospitality department, opening even more opportunities for students passionate about pursuing careers in this dynamic and rewarding industry.

With both Food and Beverage and Kitchen Operations on offer, students will gain a comprehensive understanding of the hospitality sector, covering both front-of-house and back-of-house operations. From customer service and food presentation to kitchen management and menu planning, the courses equip students with a broad range of practical and theoretical skills. Students in Food and Beverage also have the opportunity to complete their Responsible Service of Alcohol (RSA) qualification, giving them a competitive edge for part-time work in cafés, restaurants, and event venues.

Over the past two years, our VET Hospitality students have made a significant contribution to the College community, assisting at numerous school events including the Old Boys' Business Dinners, Father's Day Breakfast, Major Works Exhibition Night, Graduation functions, and staff morning teas. With the addition of Kitchen Operations, the department looks forward to further expanding student involvement and strengthening the connection between our students, the College, and the wider community.

Throughout Term 2, Year 7 Visual Arts' students explored the serious issue of plastic pollution in our oceans. Each year, 8 to 10 million metric tons of waste enters the sea, harming marine life and even breaking down into microplastics that affect humans.

After researching these environmental concerns, students worked in groups to create Drain Art installations around the College. By transforming rain run-off drains into eye-catching artworks, they aimed to inspire the school community to think twice about where their rubbish ends up.

From drains painted as hungry sea creatures and deep-sea divers to vibrant waterfall scenes, each piece carried a powerful message. Clever slogans like "Sometimes the most dangerous sea creature is

not a shark" and "Keep the water clean like Breen" reinforced the call to action.

As a method of collaboration across year groups, Year 10 Visual Arts then took the most successful of these designs to transform into permanently painted artworks in the Junior School Yard. It has been incredible to see how Year 10 have refined and resolved the ideas of their younger peers into vibrant works that relay the importance of the correct disposal of plastic waste.

SPREADING A MESSAGE OF HOPE

During R U OK? Week, we had the pleasure of welcoming to the College Old Boy Mr John Brogden ('86) who made a special address at the College Assembly. Mr Brogden shared a heartfelt and deeply personal message about mental health, speaking with honesty and compassion. He reminded students that "there is no shame in experiencing mental illness," drawing a powerful comparison to physical ailments. "Would you be ashamed to have a broken leg? Would you be ashamed to have cancer? No, you wouldn't," he said, encouraging everyone to see conditions such as anxiety or depression as illnesses that can be treated, supported and overcome.

Mr Brogden's message was one of hope and resilience, acknowledging that recovery is not always straightforward, that "sometimes it's one step back and two steps forward," but assuring students that they are never alone. He reinforced that within the College community, support is always available from friends, teachers and peers who genuinely care and want to help others through difficult times.

His words set the tone for the week's broader activities, which focused on strengthening connection and empathy. In Pastoral Care Lessons (PCL), students explored how to initiate meaningful conversations about wellbeing, while homeroom activities encouraged practical ways to check in on friends. The following week, the 2026 Student Leadership Team led a lunchtime activity, inviting students to contribute to large canvases by paraphrasing the R U OK? question in their own words. Phrases such as "How's it going?" were added to the artwork, which are now displayed throughout the College. This activity will serve as a lasting visual reminder to continually foster connection and support across the College community.

Mr Brogden's address left a lasting impression on the College, inspiring students to recognise that mental health challenges do not define them, and that seeking help is an act of strength. His words continue to echo as a call to look out for one another and to ensure that every member of the community feels valued, supported and never alone. Ultimately, R U OK? Week reminded everyone that genuine care, conversation and compassion can make a lasting difference in the lives of others.

Our own Year 10 student, Harvey Truscott, joined the dancers for the first time: an incredibly proud moment for the College community. Year 7 student, Marcus Donovan, also shared part of his personal story with courage and authenticity, leaving a lasting impression on all who gathered.

Mr Byrne addressed the Assembly with warmth and insight, reminding us of the importance of reconciliation through understanding and compassion. Mr Wallace shared his Nan's harrowing story as part of truth-telling; a powerful reminder of the strength and endurance of First Nations peoples and the importance of listening to these stories as we walk together toward healing.

Celebrating another culture does not diminish our own, just like lighting another candle does not put out our own. Reconciliation calls us to celebrate the endurance, beauty and wisdom of our First Nations peoples, whose stories and strength are woven into the land we all call home.

At St Patrick's College, we take our sporting program seriously, not only for the competition it brings, but for the lessons in teamwork, discipline and pride it instils in our young men.

Led by a dedicated Co-Curricular leadership team and supported by specialist staff in sports and athletic development, our programs provide every student with opportunities to grow, perform and thrive in his chosen discipline.

As is always the case, this winter sport season brought with it the highs and lows and overall excitement one would expect. There's something special about pulling on the SPC jersey on a cold winter morning, the sound of the whistle, the roar from the sidelines and the pride of playing for your College and your mates. These are the moments that live long after the final siren, the memories that our students will carry with them for years to come.

It was a strong season for SPC Tennis, with Divisions 4 and 7 finishing as Runners-Up, and Divisions 1, 2 and 10 securing third

Division 7 shone brightest, capturing the ISA Premiership title after a thrilling season marked by teamwork, determination and composure under pressure. Across all divisions, players showed remarkable improvement, achieving personal bests and showcasing the emerging talent within the College. After a season of strong performances and consistent results from our A teams in the ISA Rugby competition, SPC earned a place in Division 1 of the inaugural combined ISA and CAS competition. Our strong results throughout the ISA season saw our teams travel to Bathurst for the Semi Final Play-Offs. Congratulations to the 14 As, who capped off their impressive season by claiming the ISA Championship and our First XV who restored pride in the College Rugby Program with some magnificent wins and outstanding

performances, setting a strong platform for the next generation of SPC Rugby players.

It was an exceptional season for Football, with over 780 students representing the College across 56 teams. The First XI led the charge, claiming the ISA Premiership with a 6-1 victory over St Pius, finishing as Minor Premiers, and reaching the Top 4 in the State CIS Cup. Nine teams progressed to Grand Finals, with four crowned champions and three completing undefeated seasons. SPC also proudly regained the All-Schools Championship Shield, a fitting reflection of the program's strength and success.

As we close the chapter on another season of sport and move into the summer term, we look forward to more opportunities for our boys to get involved and represent the College, including the continued growth of Touch Football, introduced last year as an exciting addition to our program.

Jack's brothers have also proudly continued the tradition: Owen ('23) served as Swimming Captain and played in the First XV Rugby team, Lewis ('21) was Swimming Vice Captain and a member of the Second XV Rugby side, and William ('19) also represented the College in Swimming, Athletics and Rugby, returning to his alma mater as a swimming coach after graduation.

Together, they exemplify a family deeply committed to College life and proud to represent their community.

PICCIN PERFECT PERFORMANCE

In recognition of his exceptional sporting achievements and leadership, upon graduation, Alessandro was also awarded The Read Trophy for Excellence in Sport.

Like Jack Taylor, Alessandro follows proudly in his father's footsteps. Guy Piccin ('84), former College Vice-Captain, was also a talented footballer who represented the College in the 1993 and 1994 First XI Football Team.

MR CUTRUPI HANGS UP HIS LAB COAT

As Term 3 drew to a close, we bid farewell to Mr Michael Cutrupi, whose 25 years at the College have left an indelible mark on generations of students and colleagues alike. Before heading off to his next adventure, Michael sat down with me to share his thoughts from his time at SPC.

When Mr Cutrupi joined St Patrick's College in 2001 as Curriculum Coordinator, he didn't expect to stay for a quarter of a century.

"I certainly didn't have any intention of staying as long as I have," he says. "But the culture and tradition of the College really grew on me. The professionalism, dedication and camaraderie of the staff made coming to work each day worthwhile. And finally, the boys themselves. Hard to put a finger on it, but there is something special about a St Patrick's boy."

Over his 25 years, Mr Cutrupi has witnessed the College evolve in countless ways, from new buildings to the growth of technology in classrooms and the increasing number of female teachers. "When I started, there were no female Science teachers," he recalls. "Now the Science Department is mainly women. This is not meant to be a criticism, it's just reflective of schooling today, as not many young men are entering the vocation of teaching."

As Director of Curriculum, Mr Cutrupi is proud of a number of achievements. One that stands out is the College's academic reporting system. "Particularly how the 'back end' generates the student reports from student data linked to the learning areas of assessment," he explains.

He also remembers students who inspired him through extraordinary resilience. "One student I taught Physics to had a debilitating health condition and came close to death twice in his HSC year," he says. "He never complained, never made excuses, and if you weren't in the know, you wouldn't know there was anything wrong. It was a real honour to shake his hand and congratulate him on his outstanding HSC results."

Balancing leadership, teaching and coaching was demanding. "For many years on minimal sleep," he laughs. "But it was worth it."

COVID-19 brought some of his greatest professional challenges. "We had to quickly adapt the College's curriculum, assessment and reporting during COVID," he recalls. "What we put in place was nothing short of exemplary. The College fared much better than most other schools during that difficult period."

At the heart of it all, Mr Cutrupi is a teacher. A Physics teacher, to be precise, one who loves the beauty and story of the subject. "I teach Physics explicitly with the historical narrative that goes with it," he explains. "My philosophy is to model thinking on the thinking of great thinkers. The story of Physics is the most captivating part. To understand that Einstein's Theory of Relativity came from a thought; that's pure genius."

His favourite classroom moments often came from the simplest experiments. "The dynamics of a bouncing ball," he says. "It's a basic experiment, but it's amazing how something so simple can reveal so much about forces, momentum and energy."

Technology has transformed his teaching practice, but not completely. "The shift to digital learning shaped how I delivered content, but I still 'old-school chalk and talk', particularly with my Physics students," he says.

Outside the classroom, Mr Cutrupi has coached countless basketball teams, guiding students on and off the court. "The importance of individual self-sacrifice and cooperation for the greater good applies to life beyond the court," he says. "A championship trophy is emblematic of the hard work and sacrifice made to attain it."

He vividly recalls two seasons: the 13 As' 2006–07 grand final win against undefeated Oakhill College after changing defensive structures, and the 15 As' gritty 2014–15 victory over Pius X College. "Both were particularly joyous wins," he says. "But what I enjoyed most was seeing the boys' growth and development and becoming good people."

As Speech Night Coordinator, Mr Cutrupi has overseen 25 productions; a legacy in itself. "Speech Night has changed a lot in orientation, format and style," he says. "It's become like a professional production compared to when I started."

The introduction of a theme in 2010, alongside a Speech Night Committee, helped shape the event's modern style. "A theme gave direction on what aspects of College life to highlight through music, performances and video," he explains. His favourite? "Without doubt, the 2013 Speech Night, the theme was 'Old Boys of St Patrick's'. I'm still amazed by how we managed to pull that one together."

After 25 years, Mr Cutrupi reflects on the essence of St Patrick's. "There is an 'x factor' here," he says. "But if I told you, it wouldn't be an 'x factor'. Suffice to say SPC has to be lived to feel it."

He offers simple advice to new teachers and students: "Willingly immerse yourself in the life of the College, participate and contribute, and if you stay long enough you'll understand the 'x factor'. If you come here just for a job: don't come."

As he steps away from the College, he's ready for the next chapter. "It's a work in progress," he says. "More time for family and travel come to mind. My time is done. I won't miss the job, but I will miss the people."

And how would he sum up his 25 years? "Has it been 25 years already? Well, I can't say I was bored!"

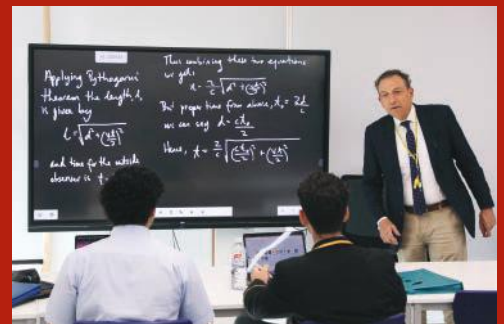
