Blessings of the Way - Australian Loreto Principals' Retreat

In recognition of 150 years of Loreto education in Australia, during the September school holidays, I had the privilege of joining my Australian Loreto Principal colleagues on a pilgrimage and retreat entitled *Blessings of the Way*. This retreat traced the spiritual and historical journey of our foundresses, from the homeland of Teresa Ball and Gonzaga Barry in Ireland to the birthplace of Mary Ward in York, England. The experience offered an opportunity to reconnect with the origins of the Loreto mission and to reflect upon the enduring legacy entrusted to all of us who lead within Loreto education today.

Our journey commenced in Glendalough, a place of serenity and natural beauty and the location of the ruins of the ancient monastery of Saint Kevin. Our reflections in Glendalough centred upon the notion of liminality, the sacred threshold between what has been and what is yet to come. In these spaces of transition, transformation occurs, and it is here that we encounter the quiet invitation of God to embrace new beginnings with courage and commitment. The reflections shared during this time called us to listen deeply for the presence of the divine in the ordinariness of life, and to recognise that, as the Celtic tradition affirms, all is grace. These moments of stillness reminded us that true leadership in the Loreto tradition begins with discernment and trust in God's guiding presence.

A visit to Loreto Gorey followed, where the vocation of our Australian foundress, Mother Gonzaga Barry, was first nurtured. Standing in the very place where a young Gonzaga Barry discerned her call to religious life was both moving and inspiring. Her courage to leave Ireland in 1875 to establish Loreto education in Australia continues to resonate deeply. Her reflection, "I felt I had to do it, or be unfaithful to grace," speaks powerfully to the essence of our shared mission, one that calls each of us to trust in divine providence, particularly when the path ahead is uncertain.

Our time in Rathfarnham afforded us the opportunity to honour Mother Teresa Ball, whose vision and steadfast faith gave rise to the first Loreto foundation in Ireland in 1822. To stand in this first Loreto school, the same school from which Mother Gonzaga Barry later left to come to Australia, was an inspiring experience. We later held a prayer service with the Irish Loreto Sisters at the final resting place of Teresa Ball and reflected upon the countless generations of Loreto women who followed her example of courage and conviction. These sacred sites remind us that the work of Loreto education is not merely institutional; it is spiritual, relational, and enduring across time and place.

The pilgrimage concluded in York, the birthplace of Mary Ward and the spiritual home of the Institute of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Her belief that "women, in time to come, will do much" continues to serve as both inspiration and challenge for all engaged in Loreto education.

At the Bar Convent, the oldest surviving convent in England, we were immersed in the history of the Institute, a history marked by perseverance, faith, and unwavering commitment to justice and truth. Standing at Mary Ward's burial place in Osbaldwick, we were reminded that every Loreto school across the world continues her mission: to educate in freedom, to form women of integrity, and to act always in the spirit of faith and justice.

The Loreto Principals' Retreat was not only a journey across place but also a journey inward, a renewal of the call to lead with authenticity, humility, and grace. As we commemorate 150 years of Loreto education in Australia, this retreat reaffirmed our collective responsibility to continue the work begun by courageous women who were, in their time, truly faithful to grace.

At Loreto Kirribilli, this same spirit is alive in our classrooms, assemblies, and daily interactions. As educators, parents, and students, we are all called to ensure that Mary Ward's vision continues to shine for the generations who follow.

VALE SR MARGARET NOONE IBVM AM

It is with great sadness that the Loreto Sisters of Australia and Southeast Asia announce the death of Sr Margaret Noone ibvm AM. Margaret was a member of the



Victorian Community; she died peacefully on Friday 3 January 2025 with many of our Sisters by her side.

Sr Margaret Noone was a student at Loreto Kirribilli from 1946 to 1950, along with her sister Bette Noone ('45).

Sr Margaret devoted her life to serving others, dedicating thirty years to various teaching, educational leadership and pastoral care roles across Australia. After a period of study in the United States, Sr Margaret introduced hospice care to Australia in 1996 through Very Special Kids, which remains Victoria's sole children's hospice, delivering comprehensive palliative care to children and young people with life-limiting conditions, and offering personalised support to their families.

For over 40 years, Margaret was the heart and soul of Very Special Kids and after retiring in 2002, she remained very active in her role as patron. In 2000, Margaret received an Order of Australia award recognising her outstanding contribution to paediatric palliative care.

Our thoughts and prayers are with the countless people whose lives Margaret touched across her rich and colourful life.

May Margaret rest in peace surrounded by her Very Special angels.

Established in 2009, the Mary Ward Connect program is an annual student exchange event that develops connections between Loreto schools across Australia. The program involves Year 10 students from six participating schools (Loreto Ballarat, Loreto Coorparoo, Loreto Kirribilli, Loreto Marryatville, Loreto Normanhurst and Loreto Toorak). Each school hosts a total of 12 students and two staff for a three-day school exchange. At its heart, the program is a celebration of over 400 years of Mary Ward education, aiming to promote student leadership and build and strengthen connections between students, staff, and communities in Loreto schools nationwide.




St Joseph's Building Upgrade

October saw the commencement of the upgrade of Levels 1 and 2 of St Joseph's Building ('J Block') in the Senior School, with completion due for the start of Term 1, 2026. The new design by BVN, Northrop and JHA will see all classrooms fully refurbished and a new home created for Senior School Student Reception, our Health Care Centre, and key staff, including the Head of Senior School and Coordinator of Students.

This is a wonderful step forward for our campus, and I am grateful to our community whose support makes such projects possible. The project is aligned with our 2025-2028 Strategic Vision and ensures that Loreto Kirribilli continues to provide the very best facilities for the education and wellbeing of our girls.

METRO MINDS CHAMPIONS

Congratulations to our Year 8 Technology students Mary-Lou Doolan, Sienna Livermore, Juliet Khoury, Alicia Fleming and Ruby Little, who won the finals of the 2025 Metro Minds STEAM Challenge, a prestigious competition that brings together schools across Sydney to tackle real-world transport and sustainability challenges.

The girls worked collaboratively to design and prototype 'Luminex', an innovative kinetic floor tile that generates electricity. The team had to present their ideas under pressure, and showcase their thinking to industry judges, with tough competition from the five teams in the finals.

METRO MINDS JUDGING PANEL

The Luminex Idea

The winning team's idea, called 'Luminex', is to introduce kinetic energy floor tiles in Sydney Metro stations.

Strategically placed in high-traffic areas - near Opal gates, outside restrooms, and by platform screen doors - these tiles could harness commuter footfall to generate clean energy, allowing station amenities to be powered sustainably. The tiles could also be programmable, enabling dynamic visual displays that can celebrate key moments throughout the year, such as Pride, breast cancer awareness and New Year's Eve, as well as local Indigenous art, showcased respectfully and with permission.

GLOBAL FUTURES CHALLENGE


Congratulations Caroline Brown and Juliet Khoury who both took part in the 2025 Global Futures Challenge and were successful in their respective age groups.

Juliet Khoury (Year 8) came Runner Up and was awarded a partial scholarship of £1,500 (AUD \$2,720). Her project focused on the development of biopolymer plastics as a sustainable alternative to conventional plastics.



Juliet explained the results of research. "While the initial cost of producing gelatin-based biopolymer films is significantly higher than traditional synthetic plastics - ranging from approximately \$8,000 to \$14,000 AUD per tonne compared to around \$1,500-\$2,000 AUD for conventional plastics - the long-term benefits present a compelling case for investment. These biopolymers are derived from renewable resources, are fully biodegradable, and break down in natural environments without releasing microplastics or harmful greenhouse gases. As demand rises and technology advances, gelatin-based bioplastics could become a cost-effective, sustainable alternative that aligns with both economic and environmental goals."

Innovation and Creativity

It was wonderful to hear the excited chatter as our Year 6 Changemakers presented their digital projects to an impressed audience of parents, families and staff. This was the finale of a semester-long transdisciplinary project, where the girls worked in teams to create an app to support a United Nations Sustainable Development Goal. Thank you to our industry mentors working in business, marketing, product development and IT who provided real-world insights and assisted the girls in the development of their apps.







FUTURE ANYTHING GRAND FINAL WINNERS

Congratulations to Year 10 students Mimey Yard-Smith and Eliza De Lorenzo, who won the Grand Final of the 2025 Future Anything National competition.

Future Anything is a national program that challenges young people to create innovative solutions to real-world problems. In 2025, more than 8,200 students across 85 schools participated, and the Grand Final brings together the top eight student teams from across Australia as they pitch their ideas live to a panel of expert judges.

The students have won an incredibly generous prize package of cash and mentorship, valued at \$42,000, to take their idea to the next stage of development. Their achievement stems from their participation in our SEED Program, where they developed 'Eco Drive', a system that detects wildlife activity to reduce vehicle-related accidents.

As Mimey and Eliza explained, "Our research indicated that Dubbo has the highest incidence of road collisions with wildlife in NSW, so we would hope to collaborate with local council, wildlife organisations, and Dubbo Western Plains Zoo to see our idea fully conceptualised." A great idea and an amazing achievement, well done girls!

Building Futures through STEM

DR JONATHON MASCORELLA | DIRECTOR OF TECHNOLOGY & INNOVATION

At Loreto Kirribilli, learning is more than what happens in the classroom - it's an exploration of ideas that connect curiosity with real-world purpose. Our approach to STEM blends Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (and often the Arts) to create a truly transdisciplinary experience. STEM is more than a collection of subjects. It's a mindset, a way of thinking about learning that encourages students to connect ideas across disciplines, to innovate, and to solve meaningful problems.



NEW STEM ELECTIVES

When we recently reviewed our STEM programs, one message from our students stood out loud and clear: they wanted more challenge, more creativity, and more connection to the industries shaping their future. They spoke of their fascination with rocketry, car racing, drones, aviation, and robotics, fields that capture the imagination and inspire ambition.

Our new iSTEM elective, for Years 9 and 10, based on the NESA-endorsed iSTEM curriculum, immerses students in large-scale, collaborative projects. From designing space settlements inspired by biomimicry with the Taronga Conservation Society, to competing in FIRST Robotics, to building and racing a 1/10th scale solar car, students will be constantly challenged to think critically and creatively.

Beyond the classroom, new programs such as the EV Racing Team, Flight Futures, Drone Certification Project, and of course, our established VEX IQ Robotics Teams, provide rich opportunities for students to apply their learning in authentic, industry-aligned contexts.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ISTEM TAKES OFF



In our new EV Racing Program students will design, build, and race their very own electric-powered car. For students in Years 5-11.



Now in its 8th year at Loreto Kirribilli, VEX Robotics teaches students in Years 4 to 11 how to design, build and code robots.



In the Aviation Program, students in Years 10 to 11 can begin their journey toward earning a Recreational Pilot Licence (RPL) while exploring the physics, engineering, and

aerodynamics of real-world flight. Drone Certification Project gives students the knowledge and skills required to become a certified drone pilot. For students in Years 9 and 10, exclusively as part of the iSTEM elective.

Learning Experiences

In the Loreto Kirribilli Strategic Vision for 2025-28, the 'Learning and Inquiry' section articulates 'practical experiences', 'real world problems', and the development of 'transdisciplinary intelligence'. As we look ahead to the coming year, we are planning a range of exceptional experiential learning opportunities for our students, aimed at achieving these outcomes through cultural immersion, environmental engagement, and outdoor adventure.



NEW ZEALAND NETBALL TOUR

Term 1 Holidays | 6 - 15 April | Years 8 & 9

A sporting and cultural event giving students the opportunity to compete in Netball games against local schools and clubs in New Zealand while exploring Maori traditions and New Zealand landscapes.



LADY ELLIOT ISLAND

Term 1 Holidays | 13 - 17 April | Year 10

Led by the Science and Geography departments, students will explore the southernmost point of the Great Barrier Reef through guided reef walks, snorkelling, field sampling and glass-bottom boat tours.



SKI CAMP

Term 2 Holidays | 28 June - 3 July | Years 10 & 11

A snow-filled adventure to Perisher Ski Resort where students to ski or snowboard under the instruction of qualified Perisher staff, engaging in daily group lessons tailored to their ability, gaining both technical skills and cherished memories.



EAST ARNHEM LAND

Term 2 Holidays | 29 June - 5 July | Years 11

In collaboration with Culture College, this program invites students into the heart of East Arnhem Land to engage directly with First Nations communities, deepening their understanding of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures.



ENGLAND

Term 2 Holidays | 5 - 17 July | Years 9, 10 & 11

With a blend of history, culture, and live performance, this trip will focus on exploring key literary and dramatic landmarks in London and Stratford-upon-Avon and will include a visit to the grave of Mary Ward.



CULTURAL TOUR OF ITALY

Term 3 Holidays | 26 September - 10 October | Years 9, 10 & 11 Italian Elective students only This cultural journey includes stops in Milan, Lake Garda, Verona, Venice, Florence, Pisa, and Rome. Students will enjoy language lessons, hands-on cooking classes, museum visits, and historical explorations led by expert local guides.



NEPAL IMMERSION

Term 4 Holidays | 5 December - 20 December | Year 11



36 Years of Mock Trial

PHILLIP BAIN | MOCK TRIAL CONVENOR

For 36 years now, Loreto Kirribilli has competed in the Law Society of New South Wales' interschool Mock Trial Competition.

Mock Trial is a fun, intellectually challenging activity, where teamwork is essential. To succeed, you need to think on your feet, display public speaking and acting skills, be thoroughly prepared, and learn how a law court operates.

The Law Society of New South Wales coordinates the Mock Trial Competition, with 100 schools participating. A team of six students take on the roles of barristers, solicitor, witnesses, and a court official. Across a courtroom-style contest, student lawyers examine witnesses, interpret legislation, justify the admissibility of evidence, and argue persuasively for their client. A distinctive feature of the competition is the opportunity for students to raise objections during questioning, requiring the Magistrate to make an immediate ruling before proceedings continue. Teams may act as either Prosecution or Defence in cases that explore a wide range of civil and criminal matters.

Loreto Kirribilli's Mock Trial teams are always well prepared. With guidance from me, and the support of ex-student Supreme Court judge, the Hon. Justice Julia Lonergan ('78) and retired barrister Mr John Berry, students spend three weeks



preparing for each trial, which typically runs for up to three hours. The competition comprises three preliminary rounds before progressing to a knockout series for the top 32 teams.

Mock Trial builds confidence, resilience, and critical thinking, encouraging students to step beyond their comfort zone. Loreto Kirribilli has a proud history of success in the competition, including Grand Final victories in 2019, 2021, and 2023, with several students recognised for outstanding advocacy across the years.

SIMONE CHUA ('04) LIGHTING DESIGNER

When, in early September, our Year 12 Design & Technology students showcased their creativity and technological capabilities at the 2025 Major Design Project Expo, they were lucky enough to hear from ex-student Simone Chua ('04), who, since leaving school, has become one of Australia's foremost artistic lighting designers.

Simone founded her company, Amigo & Amigo, in 2012 and is now in demand internationally for the artistic, interactive sculptural light installations that "bring joy to public spaces".

After completing an Industrial Design degree at UTS, Simone's first commission was to create a sculptural piece for TEDx Macquarie University. She was using origami techniques to build a paper sculpture, and while working on it, placed a light inside the form. "I was immediately surprised and in love with how the light elevated the sculpture - it cast beautiful shadows and added an entirely new dimension. From that moment, I knew I wanted to keep exploring how light and sculpture could work together, and that's where my journey into lighting design really began."

Simone's advice to students graduating these days? "I think finishing school is such an exciting time - it's a moment full of new possibilities. My advice is to stay open-minded and non-judgemental, meet people who are different from you, and learn from everyone around you. And most importantly, have fun!"

Edith Clark ('97) is an architect and founder and Director at Archebiosis, a Sydney-based architectural practice specialising in design and project management of residential, commercial and hospitality projects. She has visited the school in recent years to talk to Year 9 students at Entrepreneurs' Day.

Edith believes her family and her education gave her the courage to start her own business. "My parents always supported me to do what I loved. A guest speaker for several years running at the Year 9 Entrepreneurs' Day, Jess Woodward ('12) had some very entrepreneurial news to share with the students: she has set up her own sparring gym! Previously Jess has worked in People and Culture roles within Dyson, Daydream Island Resorts, and Couriers Please, and has advised Year 9 students on job applications and interviews.

Jess's experience in recruiting employees and people management has stood her in good stead in her new role as Director of her own company, a boxing gym in Leichhardt called Flow Sparring.

She spoke to the students about her experience as an entrepreneur. "Nothing is easy when you start a business! If it was, more people would do it. I spoke to the girls about the 'cheat sheet for life' - looking at those who have already done what you are trying to achieve, taking their lived experiences and applying their learnings, so you don't need to make the same mistakes."
