#### About the T-Shirt Design Contest

The "A Canvas Called Home" T-Shirt Design Contest invited artists from various backgrounds aged 13-21 to turn everyday apparel into an expression of identity and imagination. The goal was simple: to transform a blank T-shirt into a canvas that speaks to the idea of 'home'; whether that's a physical place, a memory, a feeling, or a dream for the future.

Participants explored themes of community, cultural roots, belonging, resilience, and the diverse ways people define "home" in an ever-changing world.

The contest received 22 submissions from Saskatoon/Canada, showcasing the remarkable talent and unique perspectives of our creative community.

Winning designs were selected based on originality, visual impact, relevance to theme, and potential to inspire conversation through wearable art.

Additionally, small doves adorn the top of the design, evoking memories of my local church in Nigeria, The Redeemed Christian Church of God. In the clouds, words that resonate with my experience of Nigeria - Memories, Home, Peace, and Love-are carefully included.

### The World is a Home to Us All by Seim Gebresilassie




I made the shirt about a world with people to show that the world is for everyone and to treat everyone the same even if we have our differences.

I chose this design to relate to the topic "A Canvas Called Home" because if our journey of our life can be compared to a drawing on a canvas board, then the homes can be compared to the canvas, which is a place where we live out or paint out our drawings of life.

Since the design is for the Saskatoon Open Door Society, which involves in helping new comers getting settled in Saskatoon, I also correlated the idea of setting up a new life to starting fresh a new sheet of paper on the canvas, which can be seen in my design with an old paper crumpled away underneath to further emphasize the idea of "starting fresh".

The painting on the new paper is also not finished, to further emphasize that finding a new home, such as coming to Canada, was only the first step to painting a new art of life, and that there are so much more and so much room left to explore for things that will fulfill your art of life. The colours in the design also held significant meanings.
