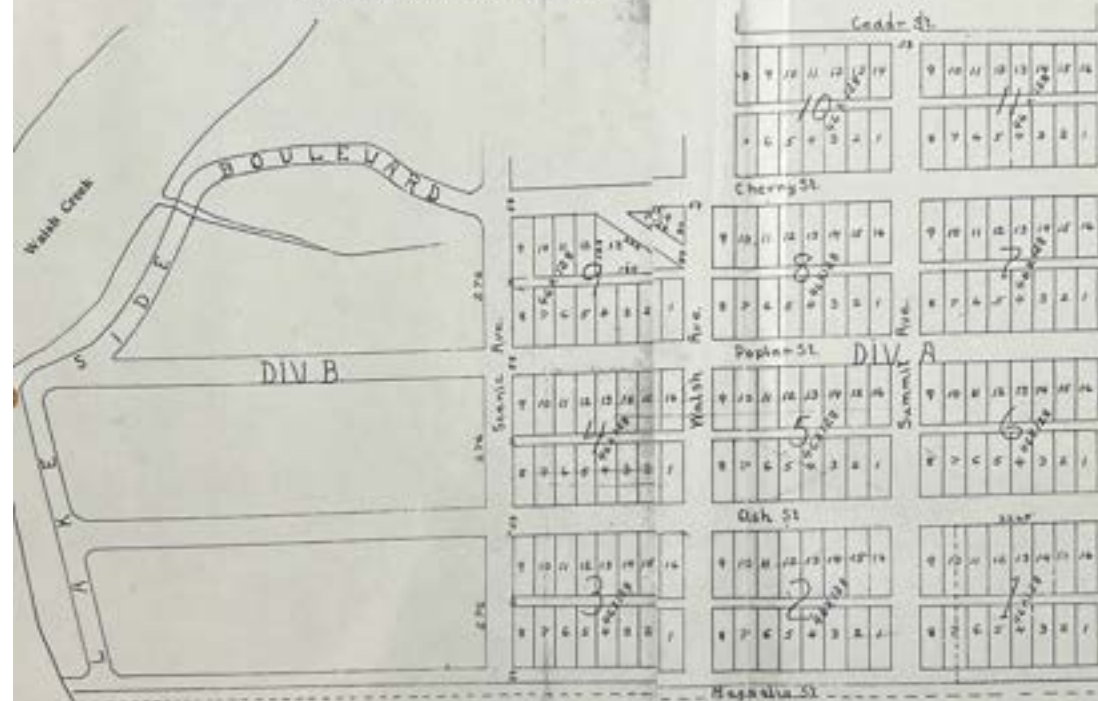

Maid Injured In Explosion of Gas

W. C. Schulle Home Is Partially Wrecked

Blanche Stevens, maid at the W. C. Schulle residence which was partially wrecked Thursday by an explosion of gas, is resting "fairly well" at Seton infirmary where she is being treated for painful burns suffered in the blast.

Members of the Schulle family were absent although two sons of Mr. and Mrs. Schulle, Billy and Walter, were in the house located on Schulle lane near Lake Austin, at the time. Billy Schulle was thrown from his bed by the blast.

City Officers Sam Piper and Leslie Fox, who investigated the explosion, said they believed that gas had accumulated in the basement of the residence from a leak from a private supply of fuel gas. Firemen confined the smoldering flames to the basement. A furnace and air-conditioning system in the basement were wrecked and the first floor was buckled. Front door glasses were broken and glassware in the dining room cracked when the explosion occurred, officers said.

The maid was walking up the basement stairs when the blast caught her and sent her tumbling down into the basement. Mrs. Schulle was out in the yard at the time.

Mr. Schulle, an owner of the Swann-Schulle furniture store, said he could not estimate the damage to his two-story rock home but he expressed the opinion that "half the house and furniture" were damaged extensively.

Gas believed to have caused the explosion is of a type used in many residences in that neighborhood and others where natural gas mains are not laid. It is contained in a tank.

"Plenty of dat lime was sold in dem days. Sometimes .. wagon loads was sold f'om each kiln in a day. Dere was times when I drove a wagon out of town, and I wouldn't git dere till midnight. To come back, all I had to do was give 'em four mules dere way and dey would know how to come back.

"One day another one of our bosses, Mr. Walsh, bought four barrels of wine. Dat wine was shipped all de way f'om California, and some of it was nine years old. When yo' drank it it sure made you feel lak fightin'.

"One time dat old Irishman Walsh was so drunk dat he fell into a cistern.

""Hey,' he hollered, 'throw me a rope, I wanta put it around my horns'.

"Dat Irishman never had no horns, but he sure seemed to lak dat cool water in de cistern durin' de summer. He was des' enjoyin' hissef, dat's all.

"Other times he would yell at us, 'Hey did yo' go down wid Scotty?'

"Dere was somebody in de Civil War dat must of beat him up; and when we'd say yes, we sure had a fight on our hands.

"Dat's been over forty years ago now dat dem kilns had closed down. Dere is a laghe cave on de old Walsh place and dey say dat it runs all de way to Congress Avenue, in Austin. Walsh's formen used to store his powder in dere. Dat cave was opened at one time, so people sould go into it, but den decided to close it 'cause it was too dangerous.

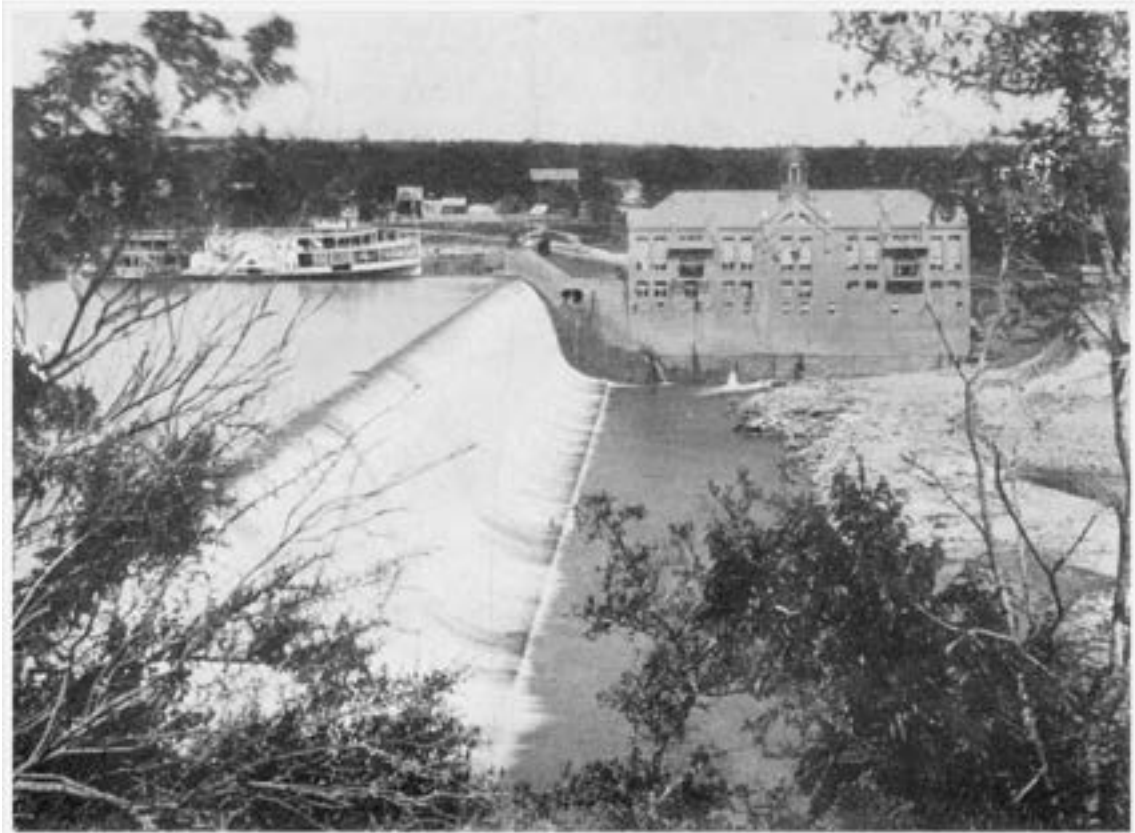

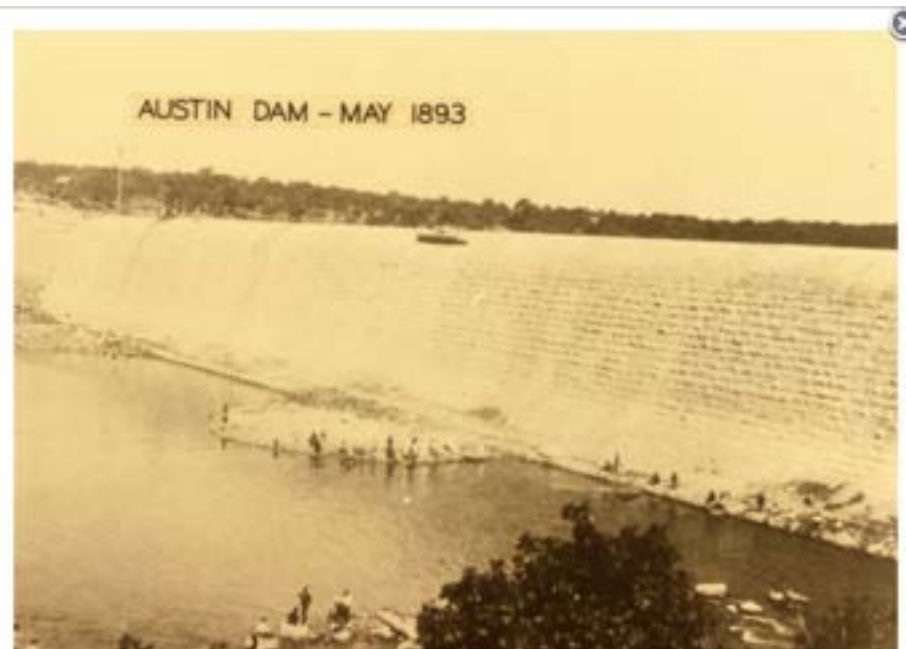
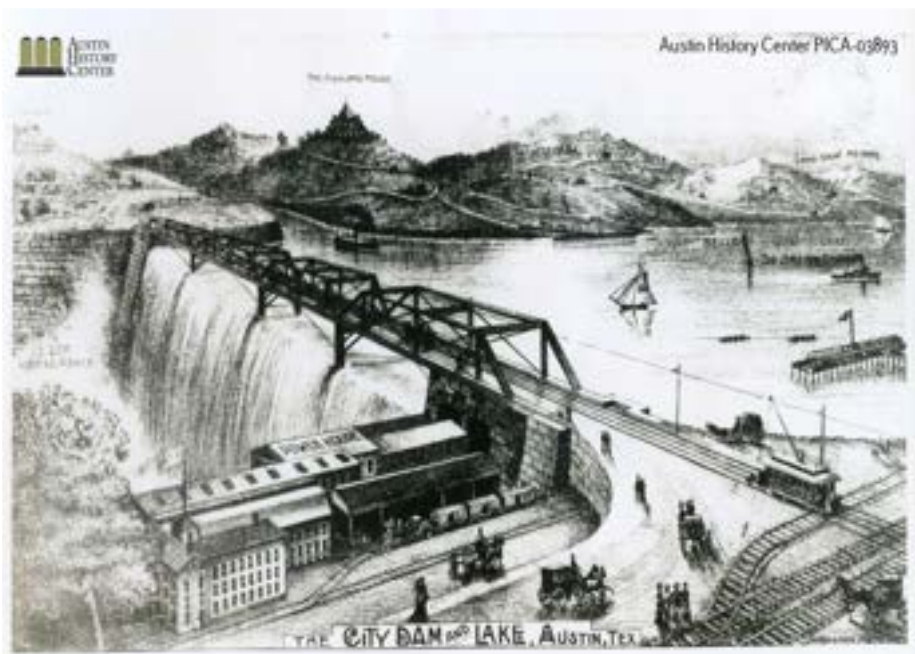

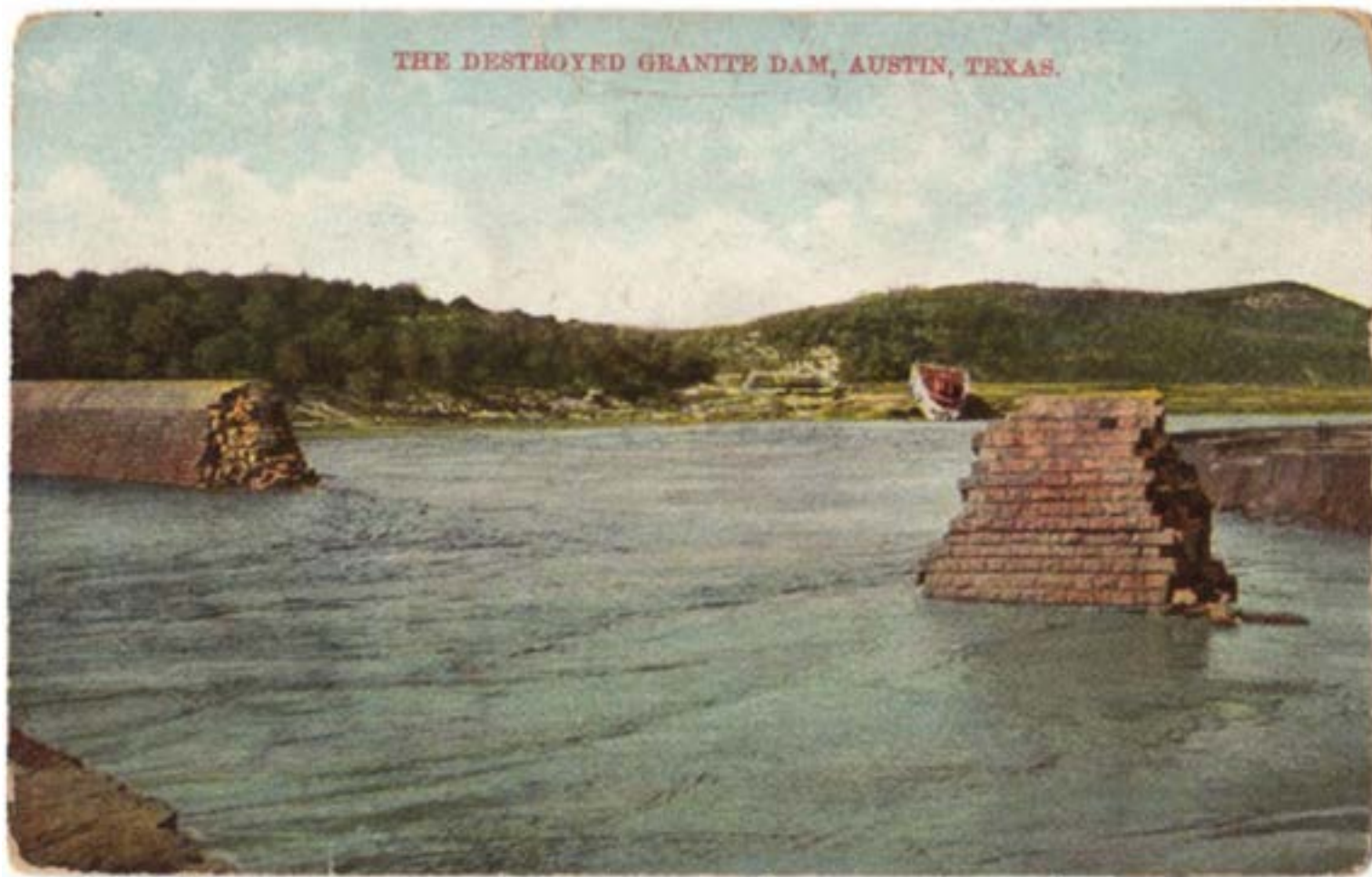

tary. It is entrenched behind privileges and buttressed by an irremovable senate, which selects the presidents. In later years it has become largely a government of financiers. It has abrogated the right of trial by jury and denied to the people the right of plebiscital suffrage. The French republic is ruled from the top down. The prefect of police is the agent of this oligarchy, as he was in the time of Louis XVI. The secret police is its obedient servant. Presidents come and go; liberal ministers are succeeded by radical ministers, and socialists follow the radicals, but always the secret police remains, and always the oligarchy governs. The very man who is chief of state may be ranked among the enemies—at least the adversaries—of this occult ruling power.—The October Success.

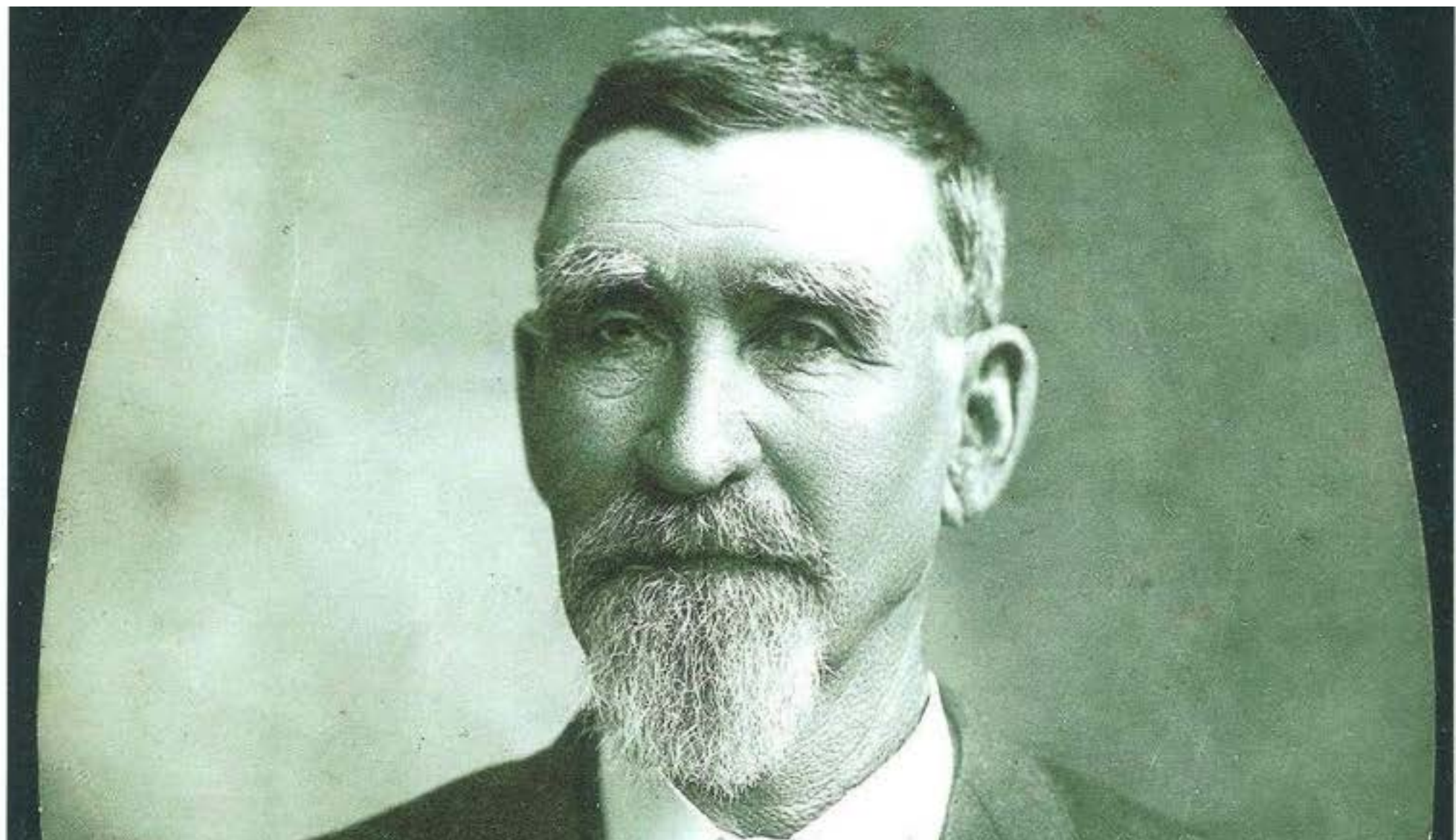

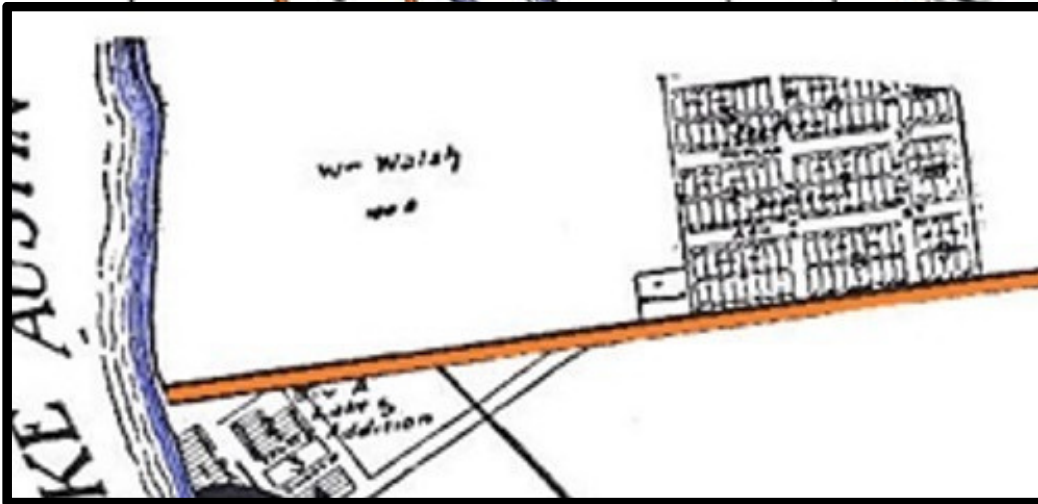
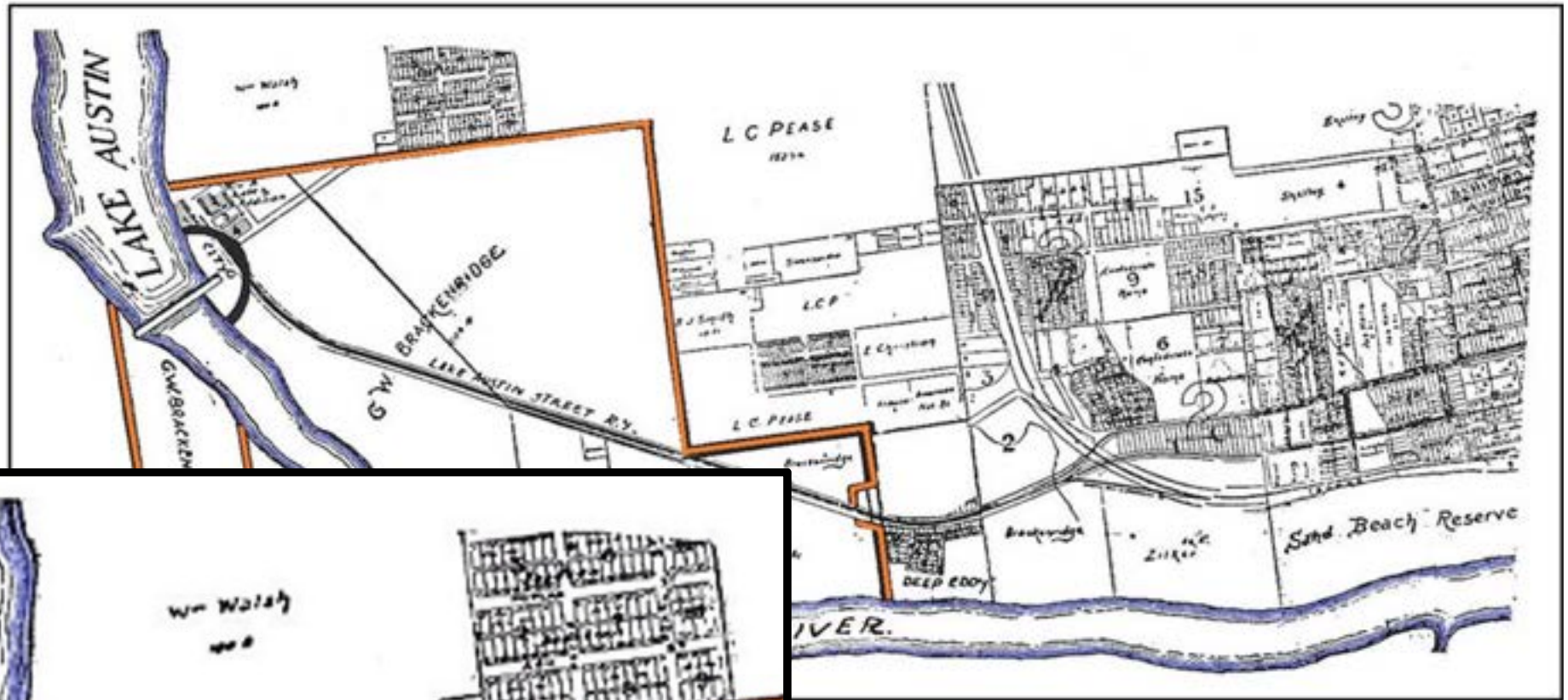
HANKS: And McGinnis would have been their family name?

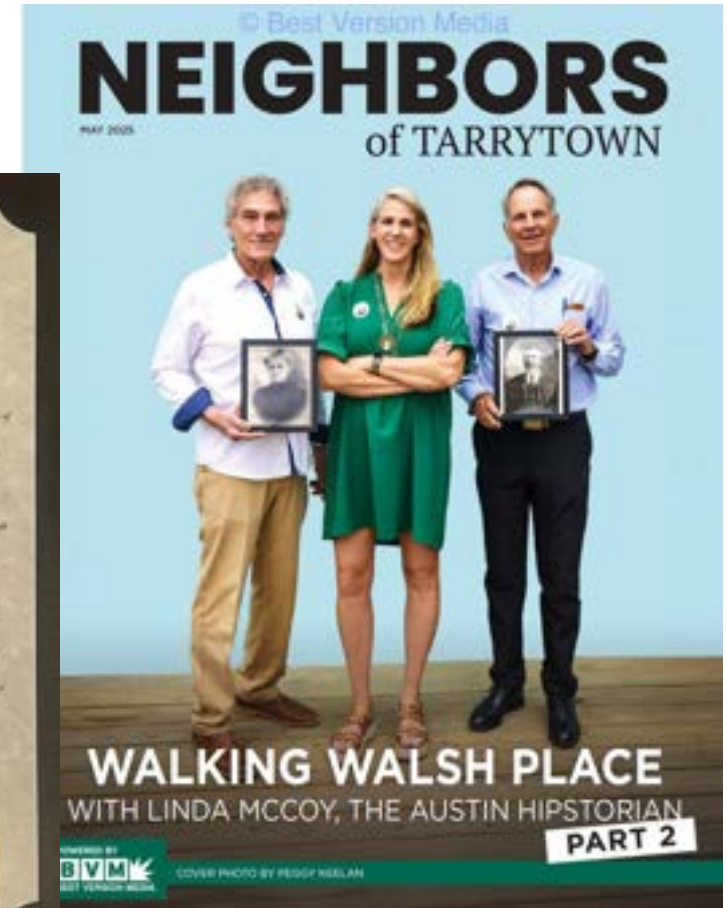
