Letter From the Executive Director

One of the many things I love about CCS is our amazing ability to put together puzzles. When a cat comes along that may need extra support, we find each piece of the puzzle to create a bigger picture for interested adopters. Some puzzles are more complex than others!

Look at Trelawney, our CCQ cover model for instance. There were a number of pieces to this puzzle, and fitting them together wasn't always easy. Though, like a jigsaw puzzle, some of the bits come together quicker than others. She came to us unfixed, for example, and had a URI. Those are easy enough.

The overgrooming is another thing altogether. This can be caused by a number of factors, including stress. So uncovering the real reason behind it can be a trial and error process. Allergies were the culprit, so we adjusted her food and put her on some medication to get her back to a better baseline.

Then there's the behavioral part. Trelawny is independent but shy. It takes the right home to foster that independence and help her grow into a cat who loves to play and gets the kind of enrichment she needs to live her best life. Getting to indulge that inquisitive nature is a big part of her coming out of her shell.

This is what it means when cats come to us. We figure out how the pieces fit together, because seeing the big picture is key to finding a loving home best suited to all their needs, and their prospective humans' needs. We're setting both cat and human up for success as best we can. Trelawney's well on her way, and we're eagerly anticipating her human's arrival.

In this issue we look at our intake team, and the philosophy behind the way we think about new arrivals. These are the first people to examine a new cat during their stay with us, and assess how we move forward. Minimizing stress by understanding their particular needs is how we make a cat comfortable enough to show us who they really are. It's the first piece of that puzzle.

Lastly, in this issue we look at one of the puzzles that cat owners deal with from time to time: introducing a new cat. A UK-based survey indicated that 62% of multi-cat owners reported seeing regular signs of inter-cat aggression. That's a lot of cats going through stress that might have been avoided with a little preparation. So many factors come into play when introducing a new cat that we've put an article in this issue that might help you next time you're looking to partake in the Cat Distribution System. And if someone you know is looking to get another cat soon, this issue can be found on our website, so please pass it along.

The diagnosis? Severe skin disease, namely miliary dermatitis, which is generally caused by allergies. We pulled out all the stops. Multiple medications, new diet. Whatever it took to improve her quality of life.

It took a few months, and a couple of course corrections. Treatment's can be like that sometimes with a special cat like Bitter. Was she a trooper? You know it. She came through the other side of treatment much improved, and we came through it with a better understanding of not just how to treat her condition, but how to find the right home for her.

From INTAKE to IMPACT

A Look Inside a Shelter Cat's Journey (and the People Behind It)



From the moment a cat begins his or her journey at Cat Care Society, it is the helping hands of the intake team that guide their first few moments through the shelter. Most cats come in either as an owner surrender or transfer from another shelter. Regardless of how they came to our shelter, Alex and Masih are ready to make that process a welcoming one.

It often begins as a call from a cat owner who so often feels like they have no other option. Other times, it's a message from a busy shelter across the metro that thinks a cat has a better chance at a facility like ours.

This team must be multi-talented with so many moving parts to the intake process. They're organized, juggling phone calls, emails, filling out forms, updating databases, scheduling appointments, and ensuring proper "crowd control." They're skilled at basic medical care, performing physical examinations of cats and assessing his or her needs and conditions, triaging where they need to go next, administering vaccines, doing blood draws and deworming. They're people focused, constantly coordinating with shelters across the state and other Cat Care Society team members. These two are even out in the community doing supply runs or helping rescue cats in dire circumstances.

While we say yes to as many cats as we can, we always wish we could help more. "Our size and capacity make it daunting to try to help everyone in need," Masih says, but adds that often instead of saying "no," we are able to say "not yet."

Alex — CCS' second longest employee, feels fulfilled knowing that he plays a role in helping put cats into better situations than they had before, and doesn't take the job lightly. His favorite quote is, "To us, they are a part of our lives, but to them, we are their whole lives."

Masih has worked in animal welfare for over 10 years and calls his job "the most fulfilling work I have been able to do." The best part of his job is getting cats in with a history of being extremely fearful, "but once they get to CCS, we see that the cats are very social and were likely just scared in their previous shelter."

Case in point: His favorite CCS cat's previous owner was told the cat may not be successful in a home. "Ever since she has arrived here, she has been nothing short of perfect, not showing any of the behaviors that were described to us," he said. "It was a great example of how a change in environment and people can be so beneficial."

This is a philosophy you'll hear often at CCS. Each team knows their role in supporting each cat's journey and works tirelessly to ensure every cat has the best outcome — a home they can call their own, where they are safe, supported and so very loved.

- Utilize your Donor-Advised Fund by making a tax-deductible donation to your DAF and then recommending a grant donation to CCS.

BRINGING HOME A NEW CAT



Thinking of adding a new feline friend to your family? Follow this step-by-step introduction process to ensure a smooth transition for both your resident cat and the newcomer. Discover how to create a harmonious multi-cat household and set the stage for lifelong feline friendships with these tips.



A multi-cat household can be fun and rewarding, but before bringing a new cat home, it's important to assess your readiness and prepare for a gradual introduction process to ensure a smooth transition for both your existing cat and the newcomer. This will ensure both cats feel comfortable and your resident cat feels welcoming toward their new housemate.

By planning ahead and taking things slowly, your chances of success when introducing cats are much greater. If you rush into things, you might inadvertently sabotage a relationship that could have otherwise worked out. Here are steps that can help you ensure a successful introduction.



Part One: Prepare Your Home

Before you adopt a new cat, some pre-adoption prep is essential. This will create a smooth transition for both your resident cat (and/or other household pets) and the newcomer.

Create a private, comfortable but separate space for the new cat away from the resident cat. Equip it with a cozy bed, litter box, stimulating toys, a covered hiding spot, and a scratching post or climbing structure.

Make sure your resident cat also has blankets and towels for laying on to impart its scent. Eventually, you'll be swapping the cats' bedding so they can get used to each other's smell.

Consider incorporating Feliway diffusers or spray as they can help alleviate stress symptoms and support a smoother transition for your pets.

Part Two: Introduce the Cats...Slowly

As soon as you bring your new cat home, take them directly to the room you prepared to help them feel safe and secure. Don't let the two cats see each other yet.

At mealtimes (or treat times if you free feed), place the food for both cats right in front of the door for both cats (with the door closed!). If one of the cats refuses to eat, feed her elsewhere, but still place dishes on either side of the door. By having both cats experience something positive while they are nearby, they can learn to form positive associations with each other.


Scent swap! After a few meals, swap the bedding from each cat's room and place it by or below the food bowls outside the doors. You can also rub a sock on the cheeks of the cat and then give the sock with the scent of one cat to the other cat. Once both cats are calm and eating well, it's time to trade places. Let the new cat roam the house with the resident cat in the safe room for a short period of time. Swap the cats back again into their original spaces. You can repeat this step a few times if necessary.

If everything is going well and everyone is acting, eating and using the litter box normally, the next step is to allow the cats to have visual access to each other. You can use a screen door or pet gate to allow the cats to see each other without being able to physically touch yet. During this time, continue to feed each cat on both sides of the door and continue switching them back and forth.

Once visual contact has gone well, remove the barrier. Have toys or treats ready so the cats can focus on that instead of each other at first. There may be some hissing or swatting at first, which is normal. If they tolerate, ignore, enjoy or interact with each other, claim it a success! End the meeting on a good note, separating them again before any bad feelings arise. Continue this a few more times.

Conduct another meet and greet each day using the same process, slowly extending the time the cats are together until it appears that everyone, including yourself, feels comfortable with both cats free-roaming the house unsupervised.

If a cat becomes stressed during any of these steps, pause and revisit a previous step until both are comfortable again. Recognizing and respecting each cat's comfort level will help ensure the process is successful.
