Winchelsea Community Action Plan Released

The working group for the Winchelsea Community Action Plan (CAP), under the guiding hand of the project coordinator, has put together the results of the last few months of community input, discussion and consultation. This means the CAP moves to the next stage - where interested individuals and groups with a passion for a particular project or item can start to unpack what's actually entailed in making it happen.

The CAP will be presented to Surf Coast Shire Council (officers and Councillors) at a Briefing on August 8th, however, that is certainly not the objective of this whole project. Winchelsea now has a list of issues, projects and ambitions that reflect what residents are calling for, and it is up to the community to get involved as appropriate to get the ball rolling. There has been a fascinating mix of suggestions and ideas - from the quick &easy through to long-term major infrastructure.

Some items in the list are in fact already underway - for example, directly as a result of people's wish for the Winchelsea Carols to be resuscitated this year, it looks like that is indeed going to happen. Is that something you'd like to be involved with? Volunteers are needed to assist with the organising of a significant event, from market stalls, through a PA system, to setting the program. Someone will even need to get in touch with the elves to make sure Santa turns up with a stash of lollies to give out.

Other items have been bubbling away in the background for guite some time. The Growing Winchelsea volunteer organisation has a particularly strong interest in ensuring that the town's various developments aren't left to head off in their own directions but rather follow guidelines that retain the 'feel' of Winchelsea that we enjoy now as a place to live, work and play. An example is the Growing Winchelsea subcommittee that was formed to follow through on the replacement mud-hut building after the non-consultative debacle of the initial design. Another example is the Growing Winchelsea subcommittee pushing along the Winchelsea Arboretum Trail project to beautify and link walking paths across the town - with significant wins under their belt already, more is actively planned over the coming months. The Winchelsea Community Action Plan includes an umbrella Community Vision and 6 key themes that fall under it. Each key theme has its own goals and its own list of priority projects plus additional project ideas - all received through the Winchelsea community. WINCHELSEA PROJECTS UPDATE



CONCEPT DESIGN

Pool redevelopment proceeding

Redevelopment of Winchelsea Pool is ready to start following awarding of the design and construction contract.

Council resolved at its June meeting to award the contract to Bowden Corporation, providing a green light for the provision of renewed aquatic facilities for the town and region into the future.

Detailed design will proceed across several months, with construction planned for completion during the 2024-25 summer.

The much-loved existing pool has reached the end of its serviceable life after having provided summer fun for families and visitors since 1963.

The redevelopment will include:

- Demolition and removal of the existing pools, pump house, amenity and shade structures and concrete concourses.
- Replacement of 25-metre and leisure pools.

- Replacement of concourses, pool surrounds and drainage systems.
- Construction of a zero-depth splash park, with elements to be confirmed.
- Construction of a new plant room and amenities building incorporating kiosk, first aid, and office.

The redevelopment will occupy the same space on Barwon Terrace, but include the new splash park, and the amenities building will be relocated to the south-east of the site to create a more central entry point and better connection with the adjoining Adventure Park.

Input from earlier community engagement and a Community Reference Group will inform detailed design, and updates will be shared as the design process progresses.

THOUSANDS TO 'BAND TOGETHER' FOR ROAD SAFETY ROUND

Victoria's football and netball communities will rally behind road safety this week, donning blue armbands to honour people killed on Victorian roads and affirm a shared goal to reduce road trauma.

The fourth annual initiative running across the state from July 21-23 will see thousands of Victorians from country and suburban football and netball leagues 'Band Together', wearing blue armbands to honour those lives that have been touched by road trauma and to promote road safety in their communities.

Players, coaches, volunteers and supporters from more than 1000 AFL Victoria-affiliated clubs will wear the bespoke armband, which features a QR code linking people to an online hub of stories from people affected by road trauma.

This year, 165 people have been tragically killed on Victorian roads with road deaths in regional areas a continued concern with 94 fatalities this year compared to 73 at the same time in 2022.

The number of young Victorians aged between 21 and 39 who have died on the roads has risen by more than 20.

The TAC and AFL Victoria's Road Safety Round provides the perfect platform to speak directly to the thousands of Victorians traveling hundreds of kilometres on the state's roads for games and training every year.

Road Safety Round is just one aspect of the TAC's longstanding partnership with AFL Victoria, with the TAC Club Rewards Program offering clubs up to \$10,000 for their efforts in promoting safe driving behaviours throughout the season.

"Which way to the beach?": Council seeks community input on new wayfinding signage

Surf Coast Shire Council is seeking community feedback on a Torquay Wayfinding Signage Strategy and Design Guidelines, which aims to help the community and visitors better navigate the township and identify key places of interest.

A recent audit of Torquay's township identified opportunities to improve wayfinding signage, with a focus on readability and interpretation, as well as to ensure cohesion across signage in terms of colour, design and typography.

Council officers have liaised with Wadawurrung Traditional Owners and will continue to work on the potential to incorporate dual language placenames and Welcome to Country wording and artwork on gateways and identification signs.

The community have the opportunity to have their say on the draft strategy and design guidelines, which include two colour options for the signage: charcoal or aqua.

Once finalised and endorsed, Council will commence the manufacture and installation stage of the project within Torquay, with a view to applying the strategy and guidelines to other townships across the Shire in the future.

Council endorses further climate emergency response and action

Surf Coast Shire Council has updated its Climate Emergency Response Plan 2021-2031, with enhanced focus on adapting to the impacts of climate change, and addition of an emissions reduction roadmap.

Council resolved at its June meeting to approve changes to the plan and also endorsed a separate draft 2023-2025 Climate Emergency Action Plan for public exhibition.

"Council is pleased to be making further decisive steps forward on our climate emergency response with these actions," Cr Kate Gazzard said. "The 2021-2031 Climate Emergency Response Plan provides strategic long-term vision, goals and actions for managing Council's response to the climate emergency, while action plans are developed every two years setting ambitious but practical shorter-term goals.

"We are proud to have reached some important and meaningful climate response milestones since Council's declaration of a climate emergency in 2019 but aspire to more under the guidance of these plans.

"And in striving to demonstrate climate emergency leadership we hope to inspire and empower climate action across our community."

The updated Climate Emergency



Response Plan now includes an **Emissions Reduction Target and** Roadmap adopted in April 2022, and a **Climate Adaptation Planning** Framework.

Key goals within the response plan include reducing emissions within Council's operational control to zero by 2030, excluding Anglesea Landfill and building resilience to ensure we thrive within a changing climate. Building resilience recognises the impact of climate change and the frequency of increasingly severe weather events which can have significant impact on Council infrastructure including road and stormwater networks.

Council's corporate operational achievements since 2019 include transition to 100 per cent renewable electricity, reduction in non-landfill greenhouse gas emissions by more than 40 per cent, installation of extensive solar systems and battery storage on Council buildings, and

achieving Climate Active Carbon Neutral Standard certification.

The 2023-25 Action Plan sets out actions under six goals including that Council:

- Is carbon neutral
- Generates, stores and uses renewable energy
- Is working with local Registered **Aboriginal Parties and First Nations** on Climate Change, and
- Facilitates and empowers community responses to the Climate Emergency.

The Action Plan is on display for public comment until 31 July via www. surfcoast.vic.gov.au/CEAP.

COVID - 19

A total of 39 COVID-related deaths were reported to the department in the past week.

In the past week, 543 positive PCR tests were reported to the Department. The recommendation to report positive RATs was removed on 30 June.

The total number of reported COVIDrelated deaths in Victoria since the pandemic began is 8,189.

Of Victorians aged 18 and over, 19 per cent have recorded a vaccination or COVID diagnosis in the past six months. This means 4.2 million Victorians are eligible for a 2023 booster dose.

Of Victorians aged 65 and over, 50 per cent have recorded a vaccination or COVID diagnosis in the past six months. The remaining 50 per cent are recommended to receive a COVID vaccine whenever possible. Of Victorians aged 50 to 64, 21 per cent have recorded a vaccination or COVID diagnosis in the past six months.

Steps to protect yourself and others

Protecting yourself from getting infected is the best way to protect yourself and the community. If you don't get Covid, you can't spread Covid.

These six steps can help you stay ahead of Covid:

- Wear a mask: a high-quality and well-fitted mask can protect you and others from the virus.
- Get your 2023 booster: new bivalent vaccines targeting Omicron variants are available at your GP or local pharmacy. To find out if you're eligible for your next booster, visit

the Coronavirus website. Flu vaccines are also now available.

- Let fresh air in: open windows and doors when you can – it reduces the spread of the virus.
- **Get tested:** if you have symptoms, take a rapid antigen test.
- Stay at home: if you have Covid, you should stay at home for at least five days and until you have no symptoms.
- Talk to your doctor: if you are at risk of falling very sick, you may be eligible for Covid and influenza medicines – and early testing and diagnosis are important. With expanded criteria, more people are now eligible for Covid medicines.

RATs available through local councils

All Victorians are eligible to pick up two free packets of rapid antigen tests (RATs) through their local council.

Antivirals and other medicines

Oral antiviral medications remain highly effective against all currently circulating Covid subvariants to reduce severe disease and prevent death.

Information on eligibility to receive antivirals can be found at the Coronavirus website coronavirus.vic.gov.au/covid-19medicines

2023 boosters

Eligible Victorians who have not had a Covid vaccination or confirmed infection in the past six months can now receive their 2023 booster. This is irrespective of how many prior doses a person has received. Vaccination continues to provide the best protection against becoming severely unwell or dying from Covid.

For those not infected or vaccinated in the past six months, a 2023 booster is recommended for:

- All adults aged 65 years and over
- Adults 18-64 years who have medical comorbidities or disability with significant or complex health needs.

For those not infected or vaccinated in the past six months, a 2023 booster should be considered for:

- Adults 18-64 with no risk factors for severe Covid
- Children and adolescents aged 5-17 who have medical comorbidities or disability with significant or complex health needs.

Victorians are encouraged to book a free booster appointment through their local GP or pharmacy. You can find your nearest vaccination provider through the Health Direct Service Finder https:// covid-vaccine.healthdirect.gov. au/booking/

CONQUERING THE CORRUGATIONS WALK

27-28th May 2023

On reading the information for the walk in the Star it brought back many memories growing up at The Falls (McMillans property) in the late 40's early 50's, and as a four year old walking mobs of sheep from the Falls to the saleyards at Inverleigh.

Then starting school at Inverleigh in 1952 travelling the corrugations and sand drifts to and from school each day in an "A" model Ford, occasionally in Paddy Dixon's horse and cart.

The "A" model rattled to pieces on the corrugations and was finally replaced by a red Ford Prefect panel van which was number one rabbit transporter taking rabbits from the Falls and Englewood Park to the rabbit chiller in Inverleigh and kids to school (and mum had her licence then and could drive the little red beast)

The Prefect rode the corrugations till 1955 when we moved to Buckley. Then school was a one mile walk across Les Swaby's paddocks. Mud and frost in winter, grass seeds and snakes etc in summer.

When these memories triggered the brain I took part in the walk for old times sake and enjoyed every minute. Great company and plenty of chatter.

Growing old takes work but three things can help us prepare

Growing up, I was told it is a privilege to get older and reminded not everyone has the opportunity.

But rather than later life being celebrated and respected, over time many of us have come to believe it is problematic and therefore something to be feared.

That's partly because we're living longer, so collectively older age is somewhat uncharted territory. It requires a lot more preparation than in past generations.

Researchers know very little about how prepared we feel for ageing in Australia, what aspects of preparation are a priority and what factors impact our capacity to prepare.

National Seniors Australia's new research enriches our understanding of all these things, based on a survey of 3400 people aged 50 and older.

It turns out that a glass half full or empty attitude can make a difference to our preparedness.

Our research has confirmed this intuitive link between older people's attitudes towards ageing and their readiness for it.

Just over two-thirds of our survey respondents felt somewhat or very prepared for ageing, but those who had ageing concerns were significantly less likely to feel prepared.

Conversely, respondents who agreed there are positive aspects to ageing were 340% more likely to feel prepared for it.

That's a significant difference, associated with a sunnier outlook on getting older.

Age, health and wealth all affect our readiness for later life too.

The research showed older and wealthier people were significantly more likely to feel prepared, while those in poor health were nearly 30% less likely to feel prepared.

So, what does preparation for ageing mean to these older Australians?

The survey invited respondents to comment on their ageing preparation experiences and sentiments.

The comments highlighted several life areas in which preparations are required, the primary domains being health, accommodation and finances.

The survey revealed that across all life areas, feeling prepared is associated with taking action, gaining knowledge and having a positive mind set.

As one 68-year-old respondent explained, "Our finances and living arrangements have been planned for many years and make ageing somewhat easier."

On the other hand, comments about being unprepared highlighted worry and the barriers to preparation.

As a 70-year-old respondent shared, "The biggest concern is my lack of understanding of the aged care sector, options and how to pay for it."

Overall, the comments suggest older people need three kinds of support to prepare for ageing.

Structural change such as housing and income security are essential enablers because without access to these material supports any preparations will be inadequate.

Good information about how to prepare is also valuable. People need to know what to expect from their ageing bodies, what changes to make in their lives, and how to navigate our social support systems in later life.

Emotional resilience is the third factor, to help people challenge negative expectations and fears that prevent them from making preparations. We could all benefit from cultivating that magical positive attitude to ageing.

While ageing can present changing circumstances, taking action to prepare for it helps maintain quality of life – it buffers against health-related challenges and increases opportunities for fulfillment and satisfaction.

When it comes to maintaining quality of life, preparation is key.

National Seniors will use this information to help inform its policy and advocacy work supporting quality of later life for older people.

Wadawurrung Traditional Owners secure funding for work at Murrk Ngubitj Yarram Yaluk

The Victorian Government has granted Wadawurrung Traditional Owners Aboriginal Corporation nearly \$450,000 for works at Murrk Ngubitj Yarram Yaluk, the site of Barwon Water's former Bellarine Basin, which is being transformed into 30 hectares of public open space.

Wadawurrung Traditional Owners Aboriginal Corporation Interim CEO Liam Murphy said the organisation was thrilled to receive the funding for the important project, that would go toward improving the local environment in line with Wadawurrung values. The site is unique on the Bellarine Peninsula, and currently there is a thriving wetland, remnant grassy woodlands, wedge tailed eagle and collared sparrowhawk nests and a variety of areas with revegetation opportunities.

Stage 1 works comprised removal of 30 per cent of the pine plantations, removal of the basin walls, the recreation of the Yarram Creek natural alignment and the creation of a master plan for a nature reserve and public space.

SW vic dairy farmers learn about virtual fencing during NZ tour

Six south-west Victorian dairy farmers have learnt about the potential benefits of virtual fencing to manage herd grazing and movement during a New Zealand study tour.

One of the highlights was visiting a large farm of 1800 cows using Halter collars on three herds, prompting a suggestion to lobby the State Government to allow their use in Victoria.

"The farmer took us to a 59ha paddock of Kale and Fodder Beet and simultaneously moved two large groups of animals, at either end of the paddock, up to the eating face from either side of the paddock," said tour leader Angus Drummond . "All cows moved quietly, none broke out and crossed the virtual fence and then after a while the herds were moved back again, with no fuss."

Mr Drummond said farmers might want the virtual fencing but the price was currently prohibitive.

"They are a very powerful tool and the demonstration showed there was no evidence of cruelty," he said. "The two herds were very relaxed and happy to take and obey the sound cues given to them.
