Located in the Mid-West of WA, there's a country town called Geraldton that sits along the sea.

The first people of this land were the Yamatji People, they lived on this land where the desert meets the ocean.

And today, in Geraldton, many aboriginal languages are spoken.



In Geraldton, you'll find windsurfers riding the waves so grand, fishermen casting lines and kids building castles in the sand.

Whilst there are many parks, playgrounds and schools, a favourite place to go is Aquarena, the public swimming pool.





There are many primary schools in Geraldton, 17 to be exact, so we haven't named them all. Some have lots of children and others are very small.

There's another little school but you won't find children there because this school is called the Meekathara School of the Air.

The oldest school of all is Geraldton Primary School. It was opened in 1878 and is still open today.

This makes it one of the oldest operating primary schools in all of WA.

Let's not forget Bluff Point or Webberton. Put these all together and you have the city of Geraldton.






In Mullewa's heart where the sun shines bright, is a meeting place for families from morning till night.



This iconic gathering place is called Doc Docherty Pool and for sixty years it's where Mullewa kids have gone to stay cool.



But wherever they live, it's important to know that all kids in Geraldton still need adults to help them grow.



Geraldton kids are special, they are all one of a kind. They may look different and have their own individual design.

Some kids are in wheelchairs or have extraordinary minds but, most importantly,

All kids in Greraldton have the right to feel safe all of the time!

Some kids feel unsafe depending on who they are with or what they are doing, whose house they are at or what pictures they are viewing.

It might be a secret they have been made to keep or something at night when they are trying to sleep?

Someone might ask to see someone's private parts under their clothes but if it's not their job to do this, then that's not how it goes.





When Geraldton kids feel unsafe, they might feel it in their belly or maybe they sweat or their legs turn to jelly.

These feelings have names. It's not just in their minds. These reactions are called

Early Warning Signs.

Their heart might beat fast, or their brain might race away. If this ever happens, HELP they must say and, if it is possible, try and get away.

If this ever happens, it's important to know that all kids in Geraldton can let their feelings show.

Some worries kids hide may be big and some worries may be small but it's important for kids to talk to a trusted grown-up about them all!

Ignoring unsafe feelings won't make them go away. If you don't tell a grown-up, the worry will stay.



Remember

Nothing is so awful you can't talk with someone about it.

Kids need to know that this is true. So always tell a grown-up if there is something worrying you.

When feeling unsafe, kids should try not to fear, there are plenty of adults who are just waiting to hear.





It simply doesn't matter what you've done or what you do. There are lots of grown-ups in Geraldton who care about you.

Maybe someone in your mob is there when things get rough to help you see things through.

Can you think of someone you know that you could talk to?



If at first you don't feel safe, keep telling till you do.

Keep telling the grown-ups who you trust, they are there to help you.
