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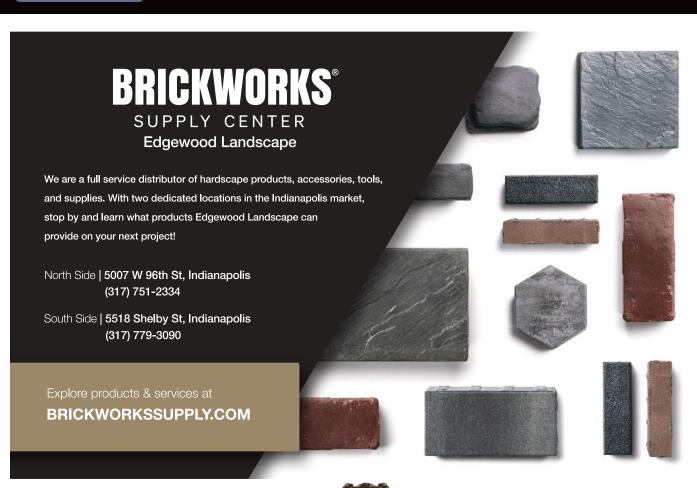
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ILA BUS TRIP - CINCINNATI, OHIO

Historic Willow Tree

Leroy Fitch, half-brother of Dr. G. N. Fitch, was in the United States navy for many years.

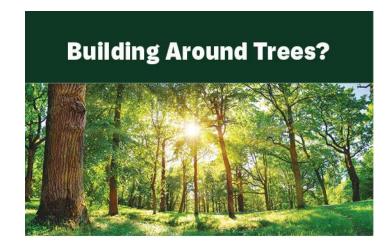
In 1840 he was an officer aboard the United States war ship that was appointed to escort the remains of Napoleon Bonaparte from the Island of St. Helena back to Paris for permanent sepulture. When at St. Helena he secured a sprout of a willow tree that stood at the head of Napoleon's grave on that island and brought it home with him and planted it on the Fitch lot, corner of Seventh and Market streets, Logansport, Indiana, where it grew into a large tree and may now be seen (in 1913) in front of George W. Seybold's residence, No. 709 Market street, who purchased the property.

The tree in 1913 was nearly two feet in diameter and stood in front of the house on the lot line and in building the present iron fence they were considerate enough to make a curve in the fence around this historic tree in order to preserve it.

Note from Jud: This tree no longer exists as it was toppled in a storm, years ago but the Indiana connection to Napoleon and trees is of note!

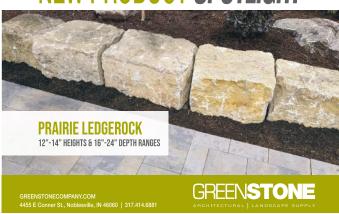
- **Regular cleaning and inspections:** Removing debris, checking fluid levels, and inspecting for wear and tear after each use can prevent small issues from escalating.

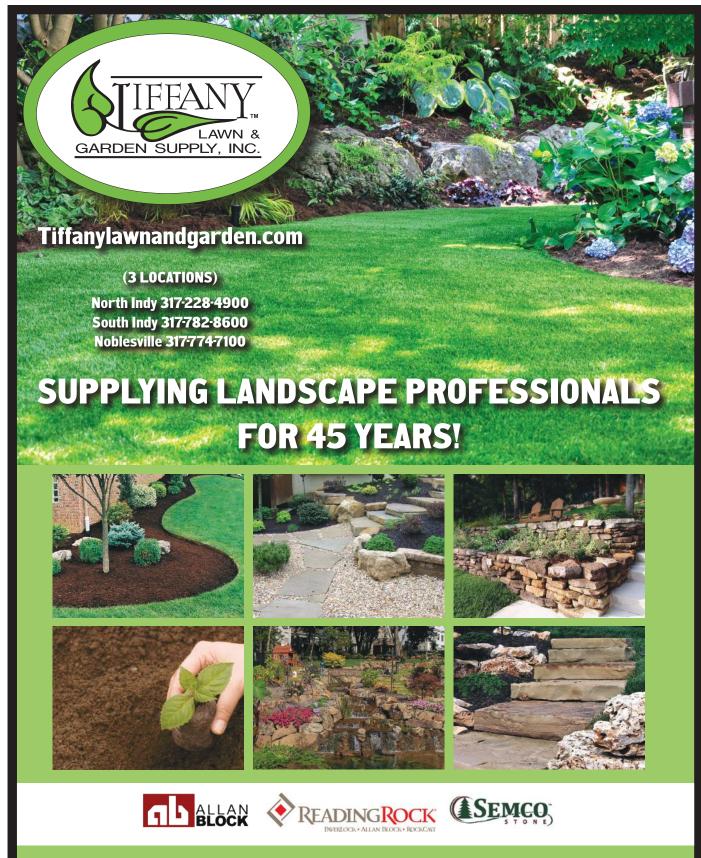

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Top 5 trending perennials for 2025

The world of gardening is constantly evolving, with new and exciting plant introductions each year. If you're looking to refresh your garden with some of the hottest and most desirable perennials for 2025, here are five to consider:

1. Mountain Mint (Pycnanthemum muticum):



Named the 2025 Perennial Plant of the Year by the Perennial Plant Association, Mountain Mint is a must-have for pollinator gardens. 3. Salvia (Sage):



Known for its long blooming season and ability to attract hummingbirds and bees, Salvia remains a popular choice for gardens. Living Large 'Big Sky' from Proven Winners is a standout new introduction for 2025, featuring large violet-blue flowers on a large plant that creates a significant impact in the garden. 4. Hosta (Hosta):

5. Dianthus (Pinks):



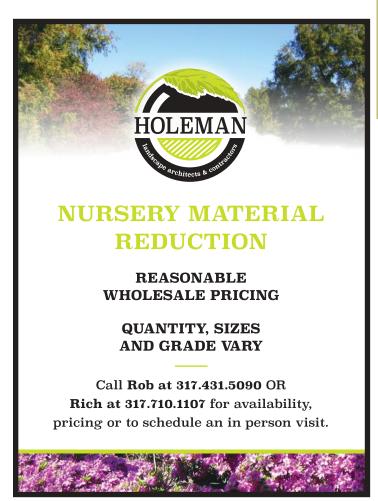

• Bold foliage and multi-season interest: Choosing perennials that provide visual interest beyond their bloom time, through their foliage or seed pods, is also a growing trend.

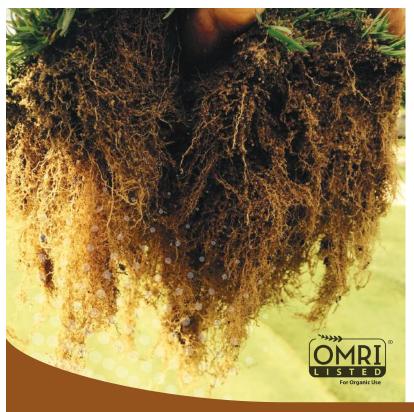
