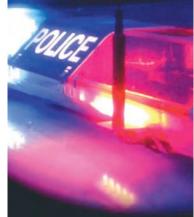

FAILURE TO ACT:

St. Armands Flooding **Crisis Threatens Regional Economy and Evacuation**

The city's system repeatedly fails, leaving St. Armands streets impassable even after storms pass.

The critical failure of aging stormwater infrastructure on St. Armands Key is posing a devastating, region-wide threat to emergency preparedness and the economic health of Sarasota County.

The immediate solution hinges on securing a \$24.5 million federal grant for the St. Armands Resiliency & Flood Mitigation initiative, which the Sarasota County Commission will consider on

December 16th.

In a touching display of community support, numerous Longboat Key residents who know Ms. François from the Tennis Gardens showed up dressed as literary characters, enjoying the gourmet food and celebrating one of Sarasota's most dedicated schools.

Specialized Intervention: An Educational Transformation

The funds raised directly support a remarkable educational mission. Dreamers Academy specializes in intensive literacy intervention, focusing on the approximately 600 students-many of whom enter the school below grade level in reading,

and the majority of whom speak English as a second language.

The school's innovative approach to language and education has been life-changing. Instead of students being labeled as special education candidates due to their reading difficulties, Dreamers Academy quickly moves the bar. In short order, the majority of these students not only reach grade level but, in many cases, gain skill levels that exceed the averages found in other elementary school programs across Florida.

Highlights and Community Investment

Head of Dreamers Academy, Dr. Cathy Rodriguez, and Founder Geri Chaffee addressed the attendees, underscoring the vital need for resources that support this successful model.

The gala's ambitious goal was to raise \$375,000 to support quality literacy interventions. These funds

Sound Ordinance: Sarasota Adopts New Standards Amid Downtown **Conflict**

The Sarasota City Commission unanimously approved a key revision to the city's Sound Ordinance on December 1st, but only after a lengthy debate that highlighted the growing conflict between downtown's vibrant restaurant and music scene and the quality of life for its

Speakers from both sides including downtown condo residents complaining of noise reaching 90-decibel levels and business owners stressing the need for a "lively downtown Sarasota"—underscored the difficulty of balancing urban vitality with residential living. Ultimately, the Commission focused on an easily enforceable legal solution to mediate this ongo-

The Longboat Loop: 81 and Back in the **Driver's Seat**

The familiar, guttural rumble of Detroitengineered RPMs vibrated through the cockpit as Suzette Jones pulled the 1965 Corvette Stingray south onto Gulf of Mexico Drive and floored the engine.

Though Jones is 81 now, the sensation was instantly transporting. Fifty years ago, she had regularly raced a '64 Stingray, a relentless pursuit that earned her a fifth-place ranking on Michigan's state racing

"The fun part was shifting down and feeling the engine," Jones remarked, her eyes bright with the memory of speed.

Jones grew up on a farm in Kalamazoo, Michigan. Perhaps it was the legendary "Michigan grit," or the tough independence com-

recurring failure impacts far more than just island residents, arguing the crisis is a county-wide concern:

Why This Investment is a Regional Necessity

SARA President Chris Goglia is urging an unprecedented show of public support, stating that community leaders and residents must "scream from the mountaintops" to dispel the myth that this is a localized project. Key arguments supporting the full funding request include:

- Federal, Not Local, Money: The project is not subsidized by taxpayers in Venice, North Port, or unincorporated Sarasota County. The funds are federal dollars (CDBG-DR) intended "to repair, replace and enhance public infrastructure to mitigate future disaster risks."
- County Responsibility: Sarasota County is bound by an interlocal agreement to maintain the city's stormwater system, yet SARA stresses the system "repeatedly fails to remove floodwater from our streets."
- The Evacuation Route Crisis: St. Armands is the only direct link (SR 789) between the mainland and Longboat Key, serving as the official hurricane evacuation route. Last year, flooded St. Armands streets rendered the route useless, forcing Longboat Key residents to evacuate via Manatee County—a critical failure of regional infrastructure.
- Economic Engine at Risk: The barrier islands are a major economic engine for the entire county. People from all over Sarasota County rely on the islands for work (service providers, contractors, delivery drivers) and recreation (Lido Beach, dining, arts, and tourism).
- Resiliency Over Recovery: SARA is not asking the county to stop hurricanes, but to invest in RESILIENCY so the community can "bounce back faster." They warn that until these issues are addressed, home buyers and businesses will be hesitant to invest across the entire barrier island chain.

Critical Funding Hangs in the Balance

The \$24.5 million project—designed to provide 100 years of flood protection and safeguard the 140 businesses in St. Armands Circle—is considered all-or-nothing. Goglia warns that "partial funding is unlikely to solve our resiliency problem."

The Sarasota County Commission is scheduled to consider the grant applications at its meeting on December 16th at 9 a.m. All regional stakeholders are being urged to attend to ensure this vital project, which impacts county-wide safety and commerce, is fully funded.

ing tension.

The Commission's Main Decisions

After multiple failed attempts to reconcile competing interests (such as whether to keep the 11 p.m. or midnight cutoff for louder weekend noise), the Commission passed a motion centered on legal enforceability:

- 1. Adoption of "Plainly Audible" Standard: The basis for enforcing nighttime sound will now be a "plainly audible standard." This means sound can be cited if a law enforcement officer can clearly hear it at a specified distance (100 feet from the source was discussed).
- 2. Legal Justification: This standard mirrors a City of Miami Beach ordinance previously upheld by a federal appellate court, making Sarasota's new regulation more likely to withstand the legal challenges that have plagued past ordinances.
- 3. Nighttime Hours: Nighttime enforcement hours will begin at 11 p.m. on weekdays and midnight on Friday and Saturday nights.
- 4. Hiring a Sound Consultant: The Commission also voted unanimously to hire an acoustical engineer/sound consultant to study the maximum decibel levels and potential solutions, including creating different noise zones across the city.

What Happens Next?

The revised ordinance passed on first reading and now requires a second reading, which is expected to take place in 2026. This next step will finalize the rules, while the consultant's future work will provide the data needed to potentially adjust the rules down the line to better balance the needs of downtown residents and businesses.

The "Plainly Audible Standard" Explained

The "plainly audible standard" is a criterion used in sound ordinances that shifts the focus of enforcement away from complex, precise decibel readings and toward a simple, subjective determination: can the noise be clearly heard by a law enforcement officer from a specified distance?

Instead of relying solely on technical measurement equipment, this standard uses the officer's own sense of hearing as the primary evidence. An officer stands at a defined distance from the noise source (in Sarasota's discussion, this was often cited as 100 feet) and determines if the sound—including low-frequency bass sounds—is "plainly audible" or clearly discernible.

Heroes on Court: Longboat Key Club Employees Honored for Saving a Life

A dramatic life-saving effort at the Longboat Key Club Tennis Gardens was celebrated last week at Town Hall, transforming what could have been a tragedy into a success story for the entire community.

Fire Chief Paul Dezzi formally honored four quick-acting employees—Alli Cruz, Kaci Melton, Katelinn Wurm, and Prakash Maraj—for their exemplary response to a severe cardiac event suffered by a Longboat Key resident while playing pickleball on May 15th.

The incident showcased not only the importance of accessible life-saving technology but also the swift judgment and preparedness of the resort staff.

The Critical Minutes

When the resident collapsed, the Tennis Gardens employees mobilized immediately. Their fast action centered on the prompt



deployment of an Automated External Defibrillator (AED). An AED is a portable device that can analyze the heart's rhythm and deliver an electrical shock to reestablish an

effective rhythm during cardiac arrest.

The staff's decisive action, initiating the AED sequence, was the critical first step. This was coupled with the extraordinary speed of

the Longboat Key Fire Department, which was able to arrive on the scene in under four minutes. The combination of immediate AED use and rapid professional medical intervention was crucial in preserving the individual's life.

During the ceremony, Fire Chief Paul Dezzi presented the commendations, praising the employees for their calm under pressure.

Dezzi's commendation states:

"In recognition of your exemplary actions and life-saving response. On May 15th, you immediately initiated an activated the tennis center's automated external defibrillator when a guest experienced a medical emergency. Your swift judgment, calm professionalism, and commitment to the safety and well-being of others played a critical role in preserving life. Your actions exemplify outstanding preparedness, courage, and dedication to service. On behalf of Longboat Key Fire Rescue, we extend our deepest appreciation for your heroic efforts and commend you for your exceptional performance. You have brought great credit to yourself, your coworkers, and the resort at Longboat Key."

mon among that generation of farm families, but Suzette is, as her daughter Dawn Willoughby puts it, "extremely competitive."

Dawn recounts a moment from her childhood when she and her brother were belted into the back seat, only to find their race car driver mom being challenged to an impromptu drag race on a two-lane highway.

"The kids yelled out 'do it, Mom!' and she did," Dawn recalled. Jones's own recollection is crisp: "I smoked them, and he turned early, and we never saw him again."

The competitive spirit didn't stop with four wheels. Jones also spent countless hours on her 350 Yamaha dirt bike and became the top women's racquetball player in Grand Haven, Michigan, regularly besting the men in the region.

The Happenstance of Speed

Jones's intoxicating drive down the sunny Florida highway was the result of a happy accident. Longboat Key resident Paul Karon, the owner of the '65 Stingray—a near-perfect match for Jones's old '64, save for the added louvers—was watching a tennis tournament at the Cedars club last weekend. He was there to see his friend, Steve Willoughby (Suzette's son-in-law and one of the island's top players).

While chatting with Steve's wife, Dawn, and her visiting mother, Paul realized he was talking to a genuine racing legend. When Suzette gazed longingly at the sleek vehicle, Karon didn't hesitate. "Hey, take it for a spin," he offered.

Off she went, from Cedars to Publix and back, shedding decades with every push of the accelerator.

The Roar of Memory

The drive was exhilarating. As Jones opened up the engine, all of time and life seemed to evaporate. She was instantly back in the driver's seat of her youth, revving the engine, ignoring the speed limit, and aggressively shifting up and then down just to hear that magnificent roar. Ironically, Dawn and Steve have since retired to this sunshine paradise. When asked if she considers joining them, Jones laughed, recognizing the obvious temptation.

"If I retired here," she mused, the thought lingering like exhaust fumes, "it would open up the opportunity to roar up and down Gulf of Mexico Drive. I might just have to get my own

'64 or '65 Corvette."

It seems that for Suzette Jones, the fastest way to travel is not forward, but 50 years into the past—and it only takes a legendary car and an open stretch of Longboat Key pavement to get there

Her daughter Dawn added that you have to understand her mother. "Her advice in life is if someone asks if you want to drive her Corvette or park a shark you say 'yes."

And that advice has stuck with Dawn. Dawn retired as COO of Clorox company, no small accomplishment and certainly must have taken a different kind of drive to get there.

Suzette heads back to the freezing cold and nightmarish ice of Michigan this week but her deja vu drive in Paul Karon's Corvette has planted both a seed and brought back memories.

Now, when she comes down to visit her daughter, it may not just be passively watching tennis and eating out, it likely will include lead-footed mayhem in a very controlled and precise and professional way on Gulf of Corvette Drive.

To: Longboat Key Commissioner BJ Bishop, Public Works Director Charlie Mopps

I think we can work through these disconnects. I'd like to correct one statement though: the Perimeter Channel and the Private Waterways are the domain of Bay Isles Master Association with the exception of the Key Club owned sections as denoted on the Property Appraisers map. This is clearly documented in the governing documents of Bayou and Bay Isles but had been ignored until five years ago. Since that time, Bay Isles has been trimming the mangroves on both sides of the waterways. Bay Isles is also responsible for the shoreline up to the property line of the Bayou homeowner. One exception: Bayou owners who construct docks in the channel must maintain the areas of their docks.

To correct the fallen tree issue in the waterway, I will ask Scott Seabaugh of Bay Isles to have the tree removed. This is allowed under the Florida Tree Law. Compensation for removing the tree is another issue and I trust whoever caused the tree to fall will provide reimbursement.

To: Longboat Key Commission, Sarasota City Commission Today I'm reaching out with recent tourism data to share. Below you'll find October information along with data for FY25.

October tourism metrics in Sarasota County reflect lingering distortions from Hurricanes Helene and Milton in 2024 where recovery workers and displaced residents created unusual patterns in occupancy and spend. We are seeing and hearing optimism from our industry for the season ahead.

October numbers comparing 2025 to 2024:

Visitors were 93,600 compared to 86,600 in 2024

Visitor direct expenditures were \$93,760,000 compared to \$81,713,200 in 2024

Lodging occupancy was 46.6% compared to 49.2% in 2024

Lodging average room rate was \$245.15 compared to \$182.65 in 2024

There were 191,200 room nights sold compared to 197,100 in 2024

And hot off the presses – FY25 annual numbers.

A few notes about the FY:

Visitation metrics for FY 2025 were influenced by hurricanes and hurricane recovery. October-December visitors included recovery workers, displaced residents, and those who came to check on properties. These visitors may stay longer and have different spending behaviors than a more typical mix of leisure and business travelers.

The number of visitors decreased from FY 2024, resulting in a decrease in direct spending and a decrease in economic impact.

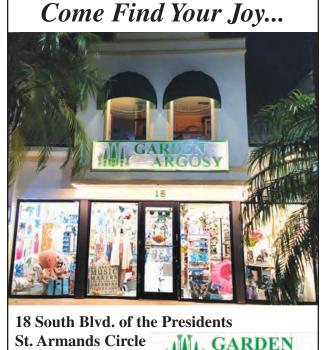
Room rates increased from FY 2024, but occupancy decreased resulting in a tempered increase in RevPAR. Though RevPAR increased, TDT collections decreased from FY 2024 due to a decrease in the average number of available units.

Though total visitation was down compared to FY 2024, the number of visitors from the Central Europe and Other

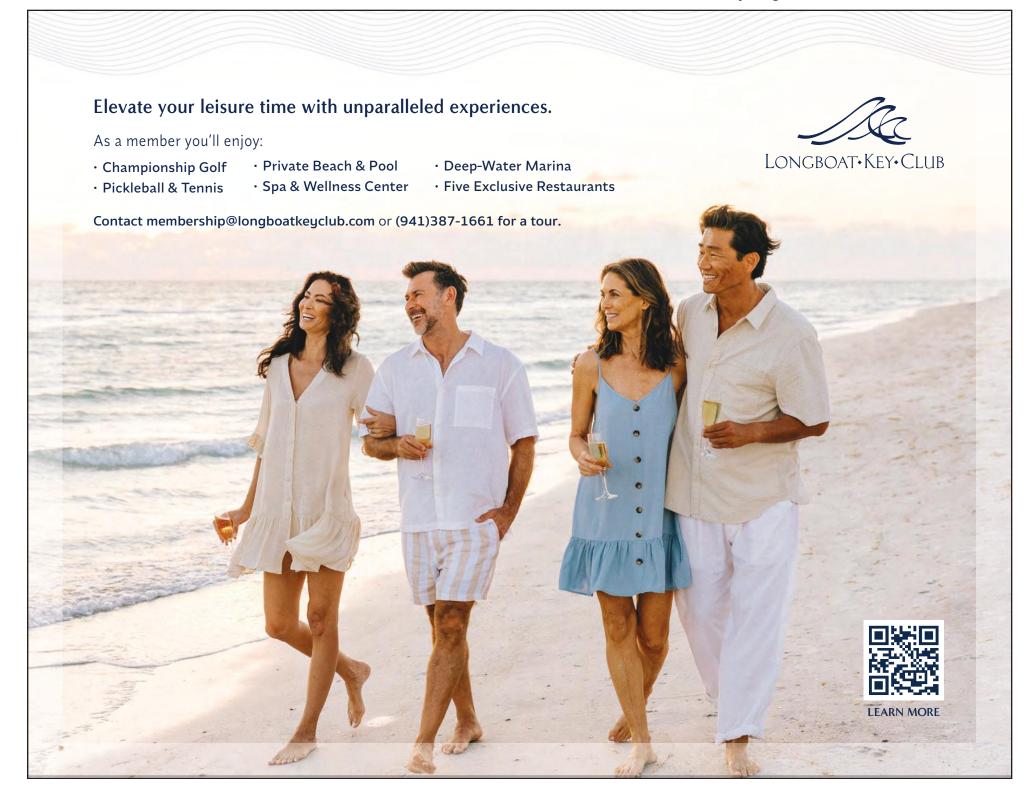

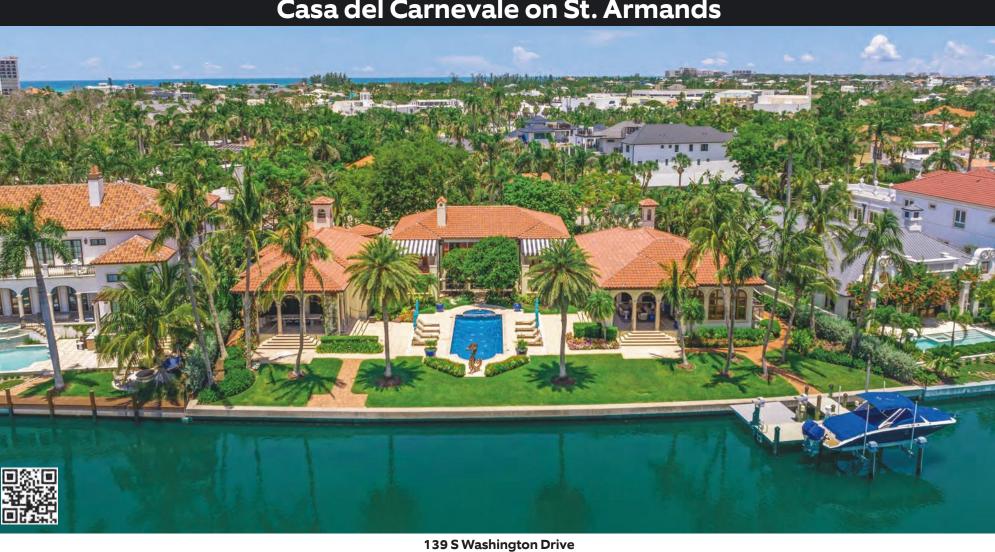

Property tax reform information

Property tax reform information

To: Longboat Key Commissioner Sarah Karon

It was nice speaking with you this afternoon and we appreciate all your efforts.

I updated a few slides from the November Workshop (PowerPoint presentation attached). Slides 7 and 8 show the revenue losses for both a \$500,000 super exemption and a \$100,000 exemption.

There are also the slides that show the impact if we had to cut budgets 20%,40%, 60% and even 80%.

I also checked these numbers for you:

The FY26 Police/Fire and Emergency Expenditure Budgets are \$14.1 million total. This divided by \$24.1 million adopted budget = 58% Public Safety

75.46% of the General Fund Budget is funded by Property Tax.

The second attachment is an analysis of a \$500,000 super exemption (Blue columns) while keeping public safety intact. So when we keep public safety whole, all other budgets must be reduced \$2.2 million which is approximately a 21% cut to each department. For a \$100,000 exemption (beige columns), also keeping public safety intact, we have to cut \$272,834 and that is about 2% cuts to each department, the latter being much more tolerable.

But we also need to keep in mind, that in next year's budget, Fire and Police have contractual wage increases, state dictated FRS adjustments (usually increases), and defined benefit pension contributions that must be met. So that can only mean that the other budgets will suffer by larger cuts. There are other fixed costs that must be met like property and liability insurances which are on the rise.

While somewhat unrelated, I want to mention another potential big liability that must be funded due to recent legislative changes.

The Heart and Lung Act is going to cost government, amounts we can't even conceive, under the workers compensation laws. It basically presumes that certain health conditions are work related. Any hypertension claim is deemed as a result of a workplace injury and must be covered under workers compensation for the life of the employee. We must pay all their medical bills and expenses incurred due to the injury, which will further increase the overall cost of workers compensation. If there are any related illness (such as diabetes) that have a correlation to the injury we could be paying for that employees healthcare for life under workers compinstead of a normal Medicare claim. And people are living a lot longer. We will also need experienced attorneys who specialize in workers' compensation law.

Property tax reform is not a one size fits all. We are very fiscally responsible as shown in the comparison mill rate slide. And we even put a taxation limit on ourselves with a Charter requirement of 5 mill limitation vs the State's 10 mill limit. There is a lot here. Let me know if you need anything else.

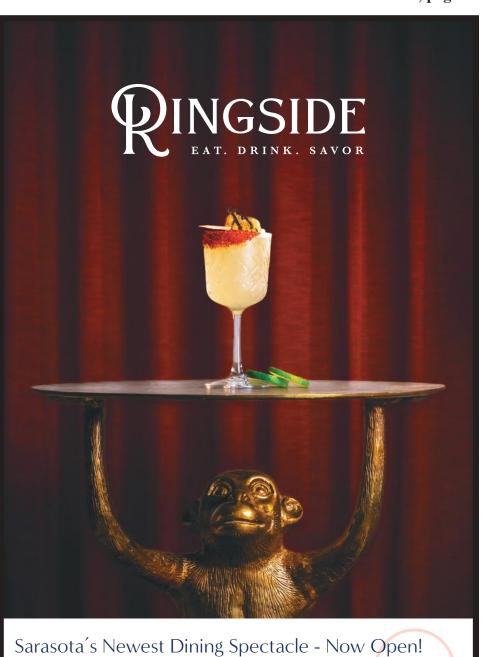

This money would come from federal funds received by Sarasota County following last year's hurricane damage, to be spent on resiliency projects

The upcoming December 16 meeting will be held at the County's Robert L. Anderson Administration Center at 4000 S Tamiami Trail, Venice, FL 34293. All public input is taken at the very beginning of the meeting (at 9am).

I hope that enough residents, business interests, and other stakeholders will consider this to be worth their time and effort. If it's possible to secure this \$25 Million investment in St. Armands infrastructure from the county, that's what I think it will take.

We must become more resilient to future storms. Combined with our recent progress towards undergrounding power lines & utilities, this project will help make St. Armands a much more attractive and safe place to live, visit, work, travel to and through, and invest in. 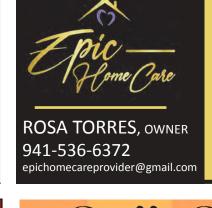

The Unreturnable Ace: Who Has the Best Serve in Professional Tennis and Why?

The serve is arguably the single most important shot in professional tennis. It's the only stroke a player has complete control over, acting as the ultimate weapon that dictates the flow of the point.

While many players rely on a rock-solid serve, a few have elevated it into an art form—or, more accurately, a physics problem for their opponent.

So, who owns the title for the best serve in professional tennis right now? The answer depends on whether you value pure speed, strategic placement, or consistent execution.

Speed Limit: Unofficial vs. Official Records

When we talk about raw power, we're talking about pure velocity. The fastest recorded serve of all time belongs to Sam Groth, who blasted a terrifying serve clocked at 263.4 km/h (163.7 mph) during a Challenger event in Busan, South Korea in 2012. However, because the technology used at lower-tier Challenger events is not standardized, the ATP Tour does not officially recognize this speed.

The official record, recorded at a top-level ATP or Davis Cup event, belongs to the towering American, John Isner, who hit 253.0 km/h (157.2 mph) during a 2016 Davis Cup tie.

The Pure Speed Kings: The Gentle Giants

Regardless of the official record, the giants of the game dominate the conversation. Isner, who leads the all-time Ace count with over 14,000, and his spiritual successor, Hubert Hurkacz, leverage their immense height (both 6'10" or taller) and power. Hurkacz blends massive speed with unexpected kick and slice angles, ensuring his consistent, high-ranking ace count. This height advantage means the ball clears the net at a shallower angle than shorter players, giving the opponent significantly less time to react and translating a physical gift into an unreturnable weapon.

The All-Time Master of Precision: The Swiss Maestro

While no longer competing, no discussion of the best serve is complete without mentioning Roger Federer. His serve wasn't the fastest, but it was arguably the most efficient, versatile, and deceptive serve in history. The gold standard of his serve was its perfect disguise: Federer's motion was so identical for slices, kicks, and flat serves that opponents could not predict the direction or spin until the ball was already in

flight. He rarely hit the exact same spot twice, constantly targeting the "T" and wide angles, making him unpredictable. Crucially, it was his ultimate safety valve, consistently showing up when he needed it most, allowing him to win easy points and conserve energy.

The Current Best Overall: The Strategic Edge

If the title goes to the player whose serve is the most balanced, consistently gets them out of trouble, and is virtually unbreakable on the biggest points, the crown belongs to Novak Djokovic or perhaps the next generation's standout, Jannik Sinner.

Novak Djokovic: The Unbreakable Foundation

Djokovic isn't known for blazing 140 mph serves, but his ability to hold serve is unmatched. His greatness lies in the mental and technical aspects: he almost always hits his targets, keeping his first serve percentage incredibly high. Crucially, his second serve is fast, placed aggressively, and protects him from break points better than almost anyone.

It's a rock-solid foundation for his defensive dominance.

Jannik Sinner: The Rising Power

Sinner represents the evolution of the modern serve: a blend of immense power with intelligent tactics. He uses his flat serve to generate exceptional pace, and his ability to hit both the "T" and the wide slice with authority makes him unpredictable. His serve is currently one of the most difficult to read and return effectively on tour.

The Verdict: Power Meets Precision

While players like Isner and Hurkacz own the fastest and most punishing serves, the title of the best serve must go to the player who can win free points while simultaneously setting up the next shot, minimizing errors, and excelling under pressure.

The most impactful and strategically superior serve in today's game belongs to Novak Djokovic (for sheer consistency and pressure-handling) and, rapidly climbing that list, Jannik Sinner (for balanced power and pin-point accuracy).

The serve is not just about power; it's about owning the rhythm of the match—and these champions demonstrate that week after week.
