



hen the Southern Heritage Classic was searching for a new participant after last year's deporture of the last year year's deporture of the last year's deporture participant after last year's departure of Jackson State, the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff became an obvious candidate. With the UAPB campus being only 150 miles from Memphis and having a strong local alumni base, Classic founder Fred Jones Jr. saw the potential to create a new fierce territorial battlefield between the Golden Lions and the Tennessee State Tigers. The two teams have a familiarity with each other, having faced off three times since 2012 – all in Nashville. Now, the catfight renews its rivalry on neutral

Laurence B. **ALEXANDER**

CHANCELLOR

r. Laurence B. Alexander is in his 11th year as of Chancellor University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff, a public 1890 land-



grant HBCU in an urban setting. The second oldest public university in the state of Arkansas, UAPB is an institution of the University of Arkansas System.

Alexander has promoted excellence across UAPB through innovation and entrepreneurship, leading to several initiatives that brought historic increases in retention and graduation rates, new academic programs, higher research grant funding, new construction and renovation projects, and success in major-gift fundraising and development, which included several of the largest donations in the university's history.

In 2022, Alexander was appointed by President Joe Biden to serve as Chair of the Board for International Food and Agricultural Development (BIFAD), an advisory committee to

the U.S. Agency for International Development.

Prior to joining UAPB, Alexander served 22 years as a professor and academic administrator at the University of Florida, the state's land-grant flagship research institution, which is a member of the prestigious Association of American Universities.

He served as a Provost Administrative Fellow in the UF Office of Academic Affairs, a Director of the Office of Graduate Minority Programs, an Associate Dean of the Graduate School, a Chair of the Department of Journalism, and a tenured Professor in the College of Journalism and Communications.

In addition, he served as the 12th UF Distinguished Alumni Professor, a Research Foundation Professor, and a member of


the Academy of Distinguished Teaching Scholars.
A native of New Orleans, Alexander earned a Ph.D. in Higher Education from Florida State University, a Juris Doctor from Tulane University, a master's degree in journalism and communications from the University of Florida, and a bachelor's degree in Drama and Communications from the University of New Orleans.

Earlier in Alexander's career, he served on the faculty of Temple University and the University of New Orleans. He also worked in the journalism profession at The Houma (La.) Courier. The New Orleans Times-Picayune and The Philadelphia Inquirer. He is a member of several professional organizations, and he currently serves on numerous professional and community boards and committees.

ROBINSON

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

ne of the all-time greats in Golden Lion football history, Chris Robinson was named UAPB's Vice Chancellor for Intercollegiate

Multiple stints at UAPB is a common theme for Robinson, who came to Pine Bluff after a standout career at Mattie T. Blount High in Pritchard, Ala. After playing for the legendary Archie "The Gunslinger" Cooley at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff, Robinson transferred to Southern University, playing quarterback for one season under College Football Hall of Fame Coach Marino Casem.

As the Golden Lion football program returned to play in 1993, Robinson returned and led the revival of the program under UAPB alum and the coach with the most wins in school history, Coach Lee Hardman. UAPB went 6-5 before forfeiting a game in '93 before Robinson led the Golden Lions to the 1994 NAIA National Championship Game, highlighted by a seventouchdown (six passing, one rushing) performance in a comefrom-behind overtime semifinal win.

After one year away from working in management, Robinson returned to the sidelines at Mid-American Nazarene University. He coached quarterbacks and running backs while also serving as assistant softball coach, and as the school's Director of Minority Affairs.

Robinson then returned to UAPB, teaching marketing while also coaching the offensive skill players and special teams, football operations and was the program's NFL liaison. He then returned to the corporate sector for a decade before returning to The Pride in 2012.

A 2014 UAPB Sports Hall of Fame inductee, Robinson earned his bachelor's degree in management from UAPB, and a Master's degree in business administration from Mid-America Nazarene University.

In Robinson's first year as Vice Chancellor and Director of Athletics, the Golden Lions football program captured their first Western Division title since 2012 and advanced to the spring 2021 SWAC Championship.

In July of 2022, Robinson was named to the FCS ADA Executive Committee. He currently serves on the Executive Board for the Jefferson County Habitat for Humanity and the Arkansas Sports Hall of Fame.



Hampton injects much energy into restoring the Lions' pride

The University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff Golden Lions football squad has recently launched the Coach Alonzo Hampton Era for his second stint with the football program, but first as a head coach. Around the field house, there is understandable excitement surrounding the new season, the new coaching staff, and new energy.

During his first stint as an assistant coach from 2006–09, Hampton help lead UAPB to a SWAC Western Conference championship in 2006, but now he's back to "Restore and Reclaim the Pride," in his first opportunity to lead a program as the head man.

"We had a great training camp, new coaching staff, a lot of new players coming, so everybody is excited to get a good feel of where we want to take our program, and our motto is Restore The Pride," said coach Hampton.

"We're excited about the opportunity to play in the Southern Heritage Classic on a national stage. We are setting a foundation around the program to get them on track to make everybody better. Players have been battling all summer against each other and they are ready to compete against someone else, it's time to go."

UAPB's **offense** will have several options to spread the ball around with several talented

receivers led by Christen Cochran, speedster Maurice Lloyd, Memphis native Kenji Lewis, who can stretch the field, and Grambling State transfer Claude Coleman.

Cochran is the top returning pass catcher after posting 28 receptions despite missing a game. Lloyd, Lewis, Daemon Dawkins and Javaughn Williams all return to the receiver corps.

With the bulk of the receivers possessing experience, they will be running routes alongside a new quarterback with the departure of senior Skyler Perry, who threw for 1,381 yards and six touchdowns in nine games last year.

Of the three top quarterbacks on the depth chart (Mekhi Hagens, Jalen Macon, and Chancellor Edwards), offensive coordinator Bobby Acosta feels good about his scheme as the season approaches.

Hagens and Macon battled things out in camp for the starting nod. Macon is a returnee after passing for 303 yards in four contests last season. Hagens is a transfer from Cisco Community College in Texas, where he passed for 1,136 yards and 11 touchdowns in 2021.

"We have three quarterbacks capable of playing this game. Unfortunately, only one can play," said Acosta. "We have prepared our entire room for the game plan. Now, we need to go out and perform to the best of our abilities. Our quarterbacks had a good preseason camp, and they have improved as we went on, but I'm excited about where we are right now. Our focus on offense is to dominate our craft and take it one play at a time."

The running attack is re-tooled after the transfer of Kayvon Britten, who racked up 1,046 rushing yards and 16 touchdowns a year ago, while also leading the squad with 35 receptions.

Sophomore Michael Jamerson and freshman Johness Davis will both see plenty of duty in the backfield this fall.

Jamerson is a transfer from Campbell. He didn't play last year but led the Camels

in rushing the year before.

The Golden Lions return six starters on offense, including three on the offensive line led by preseason second-team All-SWAC lineman Ryan Atkins. The Golden Lions line played a significant part in UAPB's running game, as they led the conference in rushing. Atkins is the third consecutive UAPB offensive lineman to be named to the All-SWAC preseason squad.

One guy who won't be back is All-SWAC left tackle Mark Evans, who signed a freeagent deal with the NFL's New Orleans

Saints this spring.

Atkins, a senior, will slide over to left tackle and be joined by four juniors – Tre Lester, Rolando Jones, Thomas Prater and Christon Love.

"I'm going to come out there and do well," said Atkins on SWAC Media Day. "I learned a lot from Mark. I talk to him on a regular basis, so I'm ready for my opportunity."

Graduate Tristan Ballard will perform most of the tight-end duties. He played in three games in 2022 after transferring from Wheeling University.

On the **defensive** side of the ball, defensive coordinator David Calloway returns five starters, led by two preseason second-team All-SWAC linebacker Rico

Dozier and defensive tackle Kendarius Clark.

Dozier played in all 11 games last year for the Golden Lions. The junior registered 87 total tackles, with 41 being solo to lead the team last season. His tackle total placed him sixth in the SWAC overall.

Clark, known as a run-stopper on the defensive front, started in nine games and played 11 games for the Golden Lions. He finished the season with 46 tackles, six TFLs, two sacks, and one QB hurries. Clark finished the season ranked in the top 15 in the SWAC Conference in sacks with five.

Juniors Isaiah Ward and JaVonn Gray and sophomore Anas Luqman join Clark as returnees along an experienced front four. The group combined for 23 TFLs in 2022.

Dozier and fellow junior Timon Akins headline the linebacking group after the transfer of Monroe Beard. Akins got into

only four games last year.

"I'm very excited to see the results of the work our guys are having as we prepare for the season," said Calloway. "The players are buying in, showing up consistently watching the video and doing things correctly with a certain type of attitude and attention to detail – Clark, Ward, Dozier, and Grant Ewell) – to mention a few. I look forward to our defense playing together and having fun while playing tough, clean football."

Ewell, a senior safety who made quite an impact last year after transferring from Butte Community College, ranked second on the team with 68 tackles.

More experience in the deep secondary include senior Kyre Williams and junior Shawn Wilson. Williams' 49 stops placed

him fourth on the defense, while Wilson is a transfer from LA Valley Community College.

Senior Laprel Boyd and sophomore Kyle Knox will man the corner positions. Each played in 10 games last year and recorded an interception.

Special teams play a big part in the Golden Lions success on the field, returning Maurice Lloyd, who finished second overall in the conference in kickoff returns, averaging 25.4 yards and one touchdown. UAPB finished Top 5 in both kickoff (5th) and punt (2nd) returns last season in the SWAC.

This season, senior Dean Sarris will take over the kicking. Sarris in 2022 kicked for Division III Baldwin Wallace in Ohio, where he was 4-of-6 on field goals.

ALONZO ALONZO Arkansan returns home to

The University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff announced that Alonzo Hampton was named the Golden Lions' 22nd head football coach, bringing him back to his home state. The Warren, Ark., native returns to one of his previous coaching stops, having been with the Golden Lions five

seasons from 2006-10.

A name highly recognized throughout Arkansas and around the nation in college football, Hampton comes to UAPB after serving as the assistant head coach/special teams coordinator under Terry Bowden at the University of Louisiana Monroe.

build Lions into powerhouse

Hampton, a four-year letterman as a defensive back at ULM 1993-96, returned to his alma mater to serve as assistant head coach on Bowden's staff. After working with the safeties in 2021, Hampton took over the responsibilities as special teams coordinator, heading into his second season.

Under Hampton's guidance in 2022, ULM special team (punting) was ranked 29th in the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision and second in the Sun Belt Conference averaging 43.9 yards per punt (Devyn McCormick).

In 2021, three of his safeties ranked among ULM's Top 10 in tackles, including Jabari Johnson, who recorded a career-high 58 tackles while making seven starts.

"I'm excited to be named 22nd head football coach at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff. This institution gave me my first opportunity to coach college football in 2006," said Hampton. "This is a special day for my family and we are grateful as we look forward to pushing this program to new heights. Also, it means more

to come back to your home state."

Hampton worked as a defensive analyst for Chad Morris at Arkansas in 2019.

He served as special teams coordinator for Willie Taggart at Florida State in 2018. It marked the fourth different time in Hampton's career that he had joined one of Taggart's coaching staffs, including previous stops at Oregon, South Florida and Western Kentucky.

Under Hampton's guidance, FSU's D.J. Matthews emerged as one of the nation's most dangerous punt returners in 2018, finishing sixth in the NCAA FBS with his 13.5-yard average.

During the 2017 season, he served as a defensive



analyst at Oregon after spending two years (2015-16) as defensive backs coach at South Florida, where he also oversaw special teams in 2016. USF won a school-record 11 games and finished No. 19 in the final Associated Press Poll, thanks in large part to a defensive unit that forced 26 turnovers.

Hampton began his coaching career in the high-school ranks in Arkansas, first as defensive coordinator at Warren High School for four years (2000-03) then as head coach at Dumas High School for two seasons (2004-05). During his tenure at Warren, he helped the Lumberjacks to a combined record of 48-12, including back-to-back Class AAA state championships in 2001-02.

As a player at ULM, Hampton finished his career with 201 tackles, three interceptions and 16 pass break-ups. He served as a team captain as a senior in 1996. Hampton also competed in track and field for the Warhawks in 1993.

Following his collegiate career, Hampton played professionally for the Seattle Seahawks and Jacksonville Jaguars as well as NFL Europe's Frankfurt Galaxy. He started for Frankfurt in back-to-back World Bowls.

Hampton and his wife Yolanda have five children, including four sons: Aaron, Rashad, A.J., a fifth-year defensive back at Northwestern, and Ashton; and one daughter, Kenya.

Bobby Acosta, who spent the last two seasons at Del Valle High near Austin, Texas, has been named UAPB's new offensive coordinator/wide receivers coach.

Acosta comes to Golden Lion Nation with more than 20 years of experience and is known around the country for recruiting top talent and being an offensive play-calling mastermind.

In his first season (2020) as head coach at IMG Academy (Bradenton, Fla.), Acosta's program went undefeated. Offensively, IMG Academy averaged 42 points per game, leading the nation in 3rd-down efficiency and outscoring their opponents, 381-82.

Acosta came to IMG Academy from The College of St. Scholastica (Minn.), where he helped guide the Saints to a 7-3 record in 2019 as the offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach.

The veteran coach served as the Bucknell University offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach from 2017–18.

The Queens, N.Y., native was head coach at Widener (2013) as well as assistant posts at Syracuse, Cornell and Delaware.

Jeff Burrow enters his second season with the Golden Lions as the program's defensive back coach. Burrow came to UAPB after three seasons at Buffalo.

Burrow originally came to UB as the Bulls' director of player personnel and coached the defensive backs position in 2021 after previously coaching the safeties.

In 2020, safeties played a large role in the helping the Bulls finish atop the Mid-American Conference rankings in total defense. He also worked at Kent State, Indiana State, Marshall and Jacksonville State.

The Sylvester, Ga., native was a fouryear starter at Cincinnati and played one season in the CFL for Winnipeg.

David Calloway comes to UAPB as defensive coordinator after spending seven seasons as the head coach at NAIA's Central Methodist University.

In 2021, Calloway led the Central Methodist program to a historic season, a No. 14 ranking in the Football Coaches' Top 25 Postseason poll and their first conference championship since 1975 with a 9-3 overall record and a perfect 5-0 mark in Heart of America South Division play. The nine wins tied for the most victories in school history. As the Heart South

Division Champion, the Eagles clinched their first-ever berth into the NAIA-FCS playoffs.

For his efforts in 2021, Calloway was named the 2021 Heart of America South Division Coach of the Year, and quarterback Paxton DeLaurent was named the Freshman of the Year.

Prior to joining the Central Methodist staff, Calloway spent two seasons as the head coach at NCAA Div. II Texas A&M-Kingsville University. Before being promoted, Calloway spent five years as the Javelinas' defensive coordinator.

Kingsville led the conference in rush defense four times. In 2010, Calloway's defense surrendered only 57 rushing yards/per game, setting a single-season school record while leading the nation.

Calloway came to Texas A&M-Kingsville after serving as the defensive line coach at Southeastern Oklahoma for a year. From 2004-05, Calloway was the defensive coordinator at his alma mater Langston University in Oklahoma. He also coached the defense at Hastings (Neb.) College from 2000-03.

He began his coaching career at Lane College as the linebackers coach after a sensational playing career.

Kyle Kramer joins Alonzo Hampton's staff as the special teams coordinator and tight ends coach.

Kramer comes to UAPB after spending two seasons as Louisiana-Monroe special team's senior analyst. Following his NFL playing career, Kramer spent more than two decades in the sports performance and marketing industries and returned to the coaching profession as a part of Terry Bowden's staff.

He began his coaching career at MidAmerica Nazarene University, where he produced eight all-conference players in seven seasons.

The McKinney, Texas, native signed as a free agent with the New Orleans Saints in 1995 after lettering as a tight end at Oklahoma in 1994.

Kendric Nord, a former Grambling State quarterback, arrives at UAPB after serving as the tight ends coach in 2014, the quarterback coach from 2015-20 and interim offensive coordinator in spring of 2020-21 at his alma mater. Nord also served as the quarterbacks coach at Fort Valley State in 2013.

Nord's playing experience included a standout career at Grambling before a professional career with the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles and Baltimore Ravens, CFL's Hamilton Tiger-cats, AFL's Iowa Barnstormers, and the New York Dragons and NFL Europe's Rhein Fire.

Kendrick was a three-year starter for Grambling State from 1993–95. He was named the SWAC Newcomer of the Year in 1993 and went on to break some of Doug Williams' passing records.

Derek Rose was recently added to the staff to coach linebackers. Rose comes to UAPB from Blinn College.

He also worked on the football staffs at Millsaps College and the University of Ft. Lauderdale after working in the prep ranks in his hometown of New Orleans.

As a junior, Rose was an AP All-American linebacker at Northwestern State and later played professionally in the arena league.

Steve Wallace enters his first season with the Golden Lions as offensive line coach.

Before coming to UAPB, Wallace was the offensive line graduate assistant at Auburn. During the mid-season coaching change, Wallace was promoted to offensive line coach. Auburn finished Top 5 (FBS) in total yards rushing after coach Cadillac Williams took over the season's last four games.

Prior to joining the Auburn staff, the Atlanta native was a part of the transition stage of turning Arkansas Baptist College into an NAIA school from a junior-college program. In his first coaching stint at Millsaps College, Wallace coached both inside linebackers and earned All-Conference honors.

Ross Williams enters his first season at the University of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, coaching the runnings backs while coordinating the video operations.

Prior to his arrival, the Jacksonville, Fla., native served as the assistant wide receivers coach and video coordinator at Missouri State University. While at Missouri State, he was part of a prolific offense led by head coach Bobby Petrino.

Prior to Missouri State, Williams coached the running backs at Edward Waters University. While there, Williams oversaw a group responsible for a rushing attack that accumulated over 1700 yards.

He was also the wide receivers coach at Atlantic Coast High in Jacksonville. As a player, he was part of a two-time blackcollege national title team at Bethune-Cookman.



Dr. Glover also serves as the immediate past International President of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated.

Dr. Glover and her husband, Charles, are the parents of two adult children, Attorney Candace Glover- Datcher, and Dr. Charles Glover II. They are also the proud grandparents of Langston Emmanuel Datcher, Lincoln Mathis Glover, Everett Miles Glover, and the twins, Logan and Lena Datcher.

In women's basketball, Allen also displayed his knack for discerning talent by securing Auburn's Associate Head Women's Basketball Coach, Ty Evans, to lead the Lady Tigers. Concurrently, he solidified a contract for TSU track and field

legend and director, Chandra Cheeseborough-Guice.

Acknowledging the significance of student-athlete academic development, Allen fostered a partnership with Backfield Motion, Inc. The non-profit, focused on education, literacy, and job skills for at-risk youth, provided internships for over 30 TSU student-athletes.

Demonstrating his visionary prowess, Allen embarked on facility enhancement initiatives designed to uplift all 15 TSU sports programs. Leveraging his entrepreneurial background, he established an infrastructure fostering external engagement and fundraising among alumni, corporations, and fans.

Capitalizing on his fundraising acumen, Allen introduced the Tennessee State Athletic Fund, channeling resources toward championing a comprehensive student-athlete experience. His relentless efforts generated over \$3 million in private and corporate support for TSU Athletics. Collaborating with the Paddle Agency bolstered corporate partnerships and marketing.

Under Allen's stewardship, TSU Athletics garnered its most substantial private gift commitment, with NBA star Robert Covington contributing a seven-figure sum towards the Covington Pavilion—a cutting-edge basketball practice facility

for men's and women's basketball programs.

Native to Murfreesboro, Tenn., Allen's academic journey culminated with a doctoral degree in Educational Leadership from Trevecca Nazarene University. He and his wife, Jekia, have two children, Mikenzie and Jansen.



Talent, depth, fortify hopes for Big Blue's return to success

In the second year of Coach Eddie George's tenure, TSU's offense faced challenges, taking a step back in terms of performance. The team's scoring average dwindled to 18.27 points per game, while they were outscored 272-201 in total.

Their **offensive** statistics positioned them at the 5th spot in the Ohio Valley Conference (OVC) for total offense, achieving an average of 314.1 yards per game. Additionally, they secured the 6th rank in total touchdowns, amassing a mere 23. Their offensive efforts yielded 1,459 rushing yards and 1,997 passing yards.

The upcoming season anticipates the return of senior quarterback Draylen Ellis as the starting quarterback. Ellis made his mark in his first season at TSU, passing for 1,807 yards and eight touchdowns.

Notably, he garnered four rushing touchdowns and 55 ground yards. With a cumulative career record of 5,705 passing yards and 41 touchdowns, Ellis's remarkable performance earned him a unique position on the Big South-OVC Watch List.

Backing up Ellis is Deveon Bryant, in his fifth season. Bryant concluded the previous season with one passing touchdown and one rushing touchdown, with 531 passing yards and three touchdowns to his credit. His ground

game included 269 yards and five touchdowns. True freshman Ryder Hagan and Youngstown State transfer Demeatric Crenshaw, an All-MVFC honoree in 2021, are also poised to make their presence felt.

Jalen Rouse, a fourth-year running back, is expected to see the bulk of the carries this season. He secured 613 yards and two touchdowns from his ground efforts across 11 games last season. Additionally, he showcased his versatility with 12 receptions for 158 yards and a touchdown. Rouse has rushed 780 yards in his career.

Supporting the running back position are Tre Boone III and Jordan Gant. Juco transfer Antwone Parker, boasting an imposing 6'1", 225-pound stature, has impressed in training camp, presenting an intriguing prospect for fans. Red-shirt freshman Craig Cunningham adds to the depth.

With the departure of key players, including JJ Holloman, the Tigers are on the lookout for new playmakers in the receiving department. Second-year Tiger Karate Brenson is expected to emerge as a favorite target for Ellis. Having secured 25 receptions for 329 yards and a score, Brenson showcased his potential in 2022. Dayron Johnson, with 49 career catches accounting for 465 yards and three

touchdowns, is set to make a return after missing the previous season due to an ACL injury.

Veterans Gerand Turner, Da'Shon Davis and Chayil Garnett, transitioning from quarterback to wide receiver, provide additional weapons in the passing game. Newcomers Canen Adrian, Solomon Dunn, Avery Williams, 3-star freshman prospect Delanie Majors and Amar Gist have shown promise as well.

To bolster their tight end roster, the Tigers expanded their room to accommodate six players, including a mix of transfers and freshmen. Noteworthy among them is Trenton Gillison, poised to take on the role of the top tight end. Gillison, with experience from 37 career games at Michigan State and Youngstown State, caught 21 passes for 231 yards.

Chazan Page stands as the sole returning starter on the offensive line. His performance in all 11 games last season demonstrated his reliability. The arrival of junior-college transfer Nicholas Green positions him as the starting left tackle. Darrell Branch and Alex Valbuena gained substantial playing time as guards during camp. Jamari Freeman is set to play right tackle, while Romello Watson

can play both guard and tackle. Providing depth are Kennedy Wilbert, Austin Peay transfer Aarion Harvey, and true freshman Hadine Diaby.

Transitioning to the **defensive** aspect, Coach Brandon Fisher aspires for his defensive unit to maintain its formidable reputation from last year. Several talented transfers and freshmen have enhanced the roster.

The Tigers showcased outstanding pass defense last season, allowing fewer than 200 yards per game (190.1). Moreover, they claimed the second-best position in total defense, permitting 363.5 yards per game.

Replacing key players in the defensive line, who moved on to FBS and graduation, proved to be a success for TSU. First-Team All-OVC defensive end Terrell Allen,

returning for his second season, emerged as a pivotal player. With 36 tackles, he led the team in tackles for loss (12) and sacks (4½). Chris Walker, boasting 50 tackles, 15½ tackles for loss, and four sacks in three seasons, complements Allen on the opposite end. Cameron Stewart, now in his 5th season, joins Jalen Bell, a transfer from Mississippi Valley State, in the interior. Bell, an All-SWAC honoree, has notched impressive statistics, including 113 tackles, 26½ for loss, and 12 sacks across 31 games.

The linebacking core is led by 7th-year player James Green, who missed last season but brings his experience from 38 career games. Former UAPB all-American linebacker Monroe Beard III, arriving in the spring, further solidifies the middle linebacker position. Ahmad Nelson, Ken Andrews, and Brent Rowe provide valuable depth.

The secondary showcases the leadership of 6th-year safety Josh Green. With 225 career tackles and nine interceptions, Green stands as the team's current leader in these categories. Grad transfer Jeremiah Josephs and 6th-year player Kenyon Garlington are instrumental in their roles. Garlington, expected to start at nickel, returns after missing the previous season. Boogie Trotter, with substantial experience from the previous season, adds to the team's defensive strength. Dion Villiers and Missouri transfer Tyler Jones provide backup at safety.

The cornerback position boasts four skilled players with extensive experience. Bryce Phillips, an All-OVC Second Team performer, excelled last season with 35 tackles and 10 pass breakups. Fondren Hollis III, equipped with 25 games over four seasons, steps into a significant role

at corner. Darius Harper, contributing two interceptions, including a pick-six, in the 2022 season finale, offers depth. Jashon Watkins, who played seven games with 21 tackles, and Jalen McClendon, who demonstrated proficiency in his first two seasons, are poised to make an impact.

In **special teams**, Jackson Foster steps in as punter, succeeding Kaleb Mosley. Foster's journey spans Western Michigan, Diablo Valley, and Nevada before joining TSU. The role of placekicker transitions to James Lowery, who previously served as the kickoff specialist for three seasons. Lowery is 2-of-2 in his career, with a long of 43 yards.

Dayron Johnson, returning after a season's absence, is positioned as TSU's premier return man.

Big Blue 'CEO' all business in managing turn-around

ddie George was announced as the 22nd head football coach at Tennessee State University on April 13, 2021. The 2021 TSU season was the first coaching experience of any kind for him.

"I am excited about being named head coach at Tennessee State University," said George. "All I have done has prepared me for this moment, whether that's my football career, my entrepreneurial endeavors, my acting career.

"Coaching is a full commitment, a duty of service. I take that seriously. I've done a lot of soul searching and due diligence. The more I thought about it, I got more and more excited about it. It was like picking up an old guitar or getting back on a bike, it's familiar but in a different capacity. It's exciting. I'm ging to be innovative creative and fun."

going to be innovative, creative and fun."

Despite his lack of coaching experience,
George quickly showed that he was an excellent
fit to lead a college program.

Big Blue finished the 2021 season with a 5-6 record. In Year 2, George led another young Tigers' team to a 4-7 record.

George played college football for Ohio State University and won the Heisman Trophy in 1995. That season, George rushed for a school record 1927 yards and 24 touchdowns, an average of

1,927 yards and 24 touchdowns, an average of 148.23 yards per game, while also catching 47 passes for 417 yards and another score. He left Ohio State second in school history

in career rushing yards (3,768) and third in rushing touchdowns (44). The Philadelphia native finished with 4,284 all-purpose yards, 45 touchdowns, and a 5.5 yards-per-carry average.



That strong performance for the Buckeyes not only netted him the Heisman, but he also took home the Walter Camp Award, Maxwell Award, Doak Walker Award, Big Ten MVP and unanimous all-American.

In 1996, George was the first-round draft selection (14th overall) of the then-Houston Oilers. He won the NFL Rookie of the Year award that season, and was the Oilers/Titans' starting tailback through 2003, never missing a start. He made the Pro Bowl four consecutive years (1997–2000), and assisted the Titans to a championship appearance in Super Bowl XXXIV.

His 2000 season was his best as a professional. He rushed for 1,509 yards and 14 touchdowns, and marked himself as a reliable receiving option out of the backfield, hauling in 50 receptions. He led the NFL that year with 403 rushing attempts.



George is only the second NFL running back to rush for 10,000 yards while never missing a start, joining Jim Brown. Only Walter Payton (170) started more consecutive regular-season games than George's 130.

He was a workhorse for the Titans, registering at least 312 carries for all eight seasons he played for the team.

In 2004, George signed a one-year contract with the Dallas Cowboys where he started eight games and finished the season with 432 yards and four touchdowns. He officially retired in 2006.

George's career totals include 10,441 rushing yards, 268 receptions, 2,227 receiving yards, and 78 touchdowns (68 rushing and 10 receiving).

George was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2011 and the Philadelphia Sports Hall of Fame in 2013.

George graduated from Ohio State in 2001 with a bachelor's degree in Landscape Architecture. He later earned an MBA from Northwestern in 2009.

He also started his own business, the Edward George Wealth Management Group. It is here that he forged a positive relationship with TSU President Glenda Glover.

He also owns a restaurant in Columbus called Eddie George Bar and Grille 27.

He graduated from Fork Union (Va.) Military Academy after also attending Abington (Pa.) Senior High near Philadelphia.

Following his playing career, he guest-starred on an IFC episode of Comedy Bang Bang. A year later, he appeared on Broadway in the musical Chicago as lawyer Billy Flynn.

He is married to Tamara "Taj" George and they have two sons, Eriq and Jaire.

Theron Aych is in his second year as offensive coordinator after one season at UTEP coaching the wide receivers.

He worked from 2017–20 as the receivers and tight ends coach at Arizona under Kevin Sumlin, where he developed a consistent quartet of pass catchers in a run-heavy offensive scheme.

This included Shun Brown, who picked up honorable mention All-Pac 12 honors with 43 receptions for 573 yards and six touchdowns.

His previous experience as an offensive play-caller came at Angelo State (2011–15), where he helped the Rams lead Division II in total offense. QB Kyle Washington threw for 27 TDs en route to being named Lone Star Conference Offensive Player of the Year.

The Zachary, La., native has also worked at Houston, Washington and Central Missouri.

Scott Baumgartner joined the TSU staff in March as the wide receivers coach. He worked for over a decade in the Mountain West Conference between UNLV, New Mexico and Nevada in various positions.

With the Running Rebels, Baumgartner worked with the running backs and saw two 1,000-yard rushers during the post-Covid seasons. In his last season in Vegas, Baumgartner added special teams to his duties.

Prior to his time out west, Baumgartner, who has more than three decades of college coaching experience, spent eight years coaching receivers, quarterbacks and special teams at Central Missouri State.

Joe Bowden joined the Tennessee State staff in the spring of 2021 and is coaching the linebackers. Bowden came to TSU after four years at Missouri Baptist.

Bowden worked as the defensive coordinator and linebacker coach with the Spartans.

Prior to MBU, Bowden was hired in 2016 as the inside linebackers coach for the San Francisco 49ers after four seasons (2012-15) of serving as an assistant linebackers coach and assistant special teams coach for the then St. Louis Rams.

As a player, Bowden spent nine seasons playing linebacker in the NFL, primarily with Oilers/Titans. He was a standout at the University of Oklahoma, earning Big Eight Defensive Player of the Year and all-American in 1991.

Michael Brewster is in his second year on the TSU staff as tight ends coach, after working for two seasons as quality control coach at Cincinnati under Luke Fickell.

In his brief career as a coach, he has also gained experience at Orangewood Christian School in Maitland, Fla., Western Michigan and Bowling Green.

He was a 5-star prospect at Edgewater High School in Orlando, which helped earn him a scholarship at Ohio State.

He started 49 consecutive games for the Buckeyes from 2008–11. While in Columbus, he earned Freshman All-American honors, first-team All-Big Ten, first-team All-American and was a finalist for the Rimington Trophy, which goes to the nation's best center.

Keith Burns joined Eddie George's staff at Tennessee State after working the previous three seasons with the NFL's Los Angeles Chargers special teams units.

Burns has also worked with the Denver Broncos and Washington Redskins.

He was an accomplished special teams performer in the NFL himself, playing 13 years as a pro, including time with the Chicago Bears, Tampa Bay Buccaneers and three stints with the Denver Broncos. He was a member of the team during the Broncos' two straight Super Bowl wins. The Alexandria, Va., native played collegiately at Oklahoma State in 1992-93.

Josh Crawford was hired as the running backs coach in July 2023 after serving one year as an offensive graduate assistant at Utah. This marks his second stint with the Tigers.

While at Utah, he worked primarily with the wide receivers, assisting with scouting reports and scout team responsibilities. Crawford and the Utes won the 2022 Pac-12 Championship.

Prior to coming to Salt Lake City, he was a graduate assistant with Tennessee State University. The Vanderbilt graduate worked closely with the linebackers, running the scout team along with coaching second-team all-conference selection James Green.

Brandon Fisher begins his third year as Tennessee State's defensive coordinator. Fisher spent the 2020 season as a defensive analyst at Auburn.

Fisher worked directly with defensive coordinator Kevin Steele throughout the year and took over on-field duties for the Tigers appearance in the 2021 Citrus Bowl after Steele was promoted to interim head

coach. Prior to Auburn, Fisher spent one season as the defensive coordinator at Southern Utah.

Fisher entered the collegiate ranks after eight seasons in the NFL. In his last stint in the professional ranks, Fisher served as the secondary coach from 2015-17 for the St. Louis Rams. He also worked for the Tennessee Titans.

Fisher is the son of former Titans and Rams head coach Jeff Fisher, graduated from the University of Montana in 2009.

Anthony Lewis became a member of the staff as offensive line coach in 2022 after working 10 seasons at Angelo State.

Most recently, he helped develop the skills of TSU transfer Willis Patrick, who earned Division II All-American honors at the San Angelo, Texas-based school.

Patrick and two others each earned first-team All-Lone Star Conference honors in 2021, helping the Rams reach the D2 quarterfinals.

The San Antonio native was an accomplished lineman himself, earning All-LSC accolades in 2013. While there, he helped ASU break the school's single-season record for total yards per game.

Richard McNutt joined the TSU staff after working at Southeastern University as secondary/recruiting coordinator.

He also worked at Youngstown State, where in his first year, the Penguins defense ranked among the nation's best in pass defense.

He has also had coaching stops at Toledo, Kent State, Ohio State, Northern Illinois, North Carolina State and worked in the NFL with the Cleveland Browns.

The Forest Park, Ill., native was a defensive back at Ohio State, where he played on the Buckeyes' 2002 national championship team.

Clyde Simmons joined the Tennessee State staff in 2021 as defensive line coach. Simmons' pedigree includes 15 years as a defensive lineman in the NFL and over 10 years of coaching experience.

Simmons came to TSU after spending the 2020 season at Western Carolina. During his time, the Catamounts ranked 16th in turnovers gained in FCS play.

Prior to WCU, Simmons spent one season as the defensive line coach at Missouri Baptist University after two years as an assistant coach with the Cleveland Browns. In Cleveland, Simmons helped groom the top draft pick of the 2017 NFL Draft, Myles Garrett.

ARISTOCRAT OF BANDS



The Aristocrat of Bands is a highstepping, show-style marching band from the historically black university, Tennessee State University in Nashville.

The band's name is commonly abbreviated to the moniker, "AOB." The AOB made history as the first collegiate marching band to win the music industry's highest honor for Best Roots Gospel Album, The Urban Hymnal, at the 65th annual ceremony on Feb. 5, 2023.

The band is known for playing a variety of music such as jazz, classical, contemporary, and popular pieces, and

is heralded for its distinct musical style using clean articulation, expressive dynamics, balance, and technical ability.

The band, much like the stage band of the time known as the Jazz Collegians of Tennessee State University, was primarily student-led organization when it first emerged after the school's founding.

Although band was offered as a class, there was no full-time director

on staff in the early decades of the band's formation, leaving the task to other faculty members, primarily music faculty members, as a supervisory role of sorts.

With the new hire of President Walter Davis, there was a broader vision for the band program for the future. It was upon Davis' request for the band's for the band to be more active in supporting the athletics, which called for a full-time Director of Bands position.

Director of Bands position.
In 1946, J.D. "Chick" Chavis, a well-known musician and music educator in the Nashville area, started the organization with 100 pieces. Originally titled as "the Marching 100", the name "Aristocrat of Bands" was given by a sportscaster at a National Football League (NFL) game.

Chavis' tenure as band director ended in 1951, and the baton was passed to Frank T. Greer. TSU's distinctive style was further developed under Greer.

The band continued to earn invitations to special events.

In 1955, the band was the first HBCU band to appear on national television with their performance at the Chicago Bears versus Los Angeles Rams NFL game.

In 1961, they performed for the inauguration of President John F. Kennedy making them the first historically black college or university to perform at a presidential inauguration. One of the students who

marched in that parade was Edward L. Graves, Director of Bands from 1979 to 2014.

"The Aristocrat of Bands" has shared its characteristic precision and distinctly soulful style with people throughout the country and in foreign lands.

Greer taught us "to dream and to really

work hard." Graves recalled. He taught us "not to be satisfied with just anything. You don't put a man on the moon without a lot of work." He instilled those standards in us. He taught us to excel, "to see the BIG PICTURE."

Students who achieve membership in "The Aristocrat of Bands" adhere to those standards today. Noted as one of the finest and most spectacular university bands in the United States, the Aristocrats are the featured attraction during pre-game and half time performances at all home games and at most out of town competitions.

The band has been invited and performed in Asia, Africa, North America, and Europe.

The band was also named in 2002 the official band of the Tennessee Titans, making them the first HBCU to be named as an official band for an NFL team. They played in the 2022 Rose Parade. On Nov. 15, 2022, the Aristocrat of Bands became the first marching band in history to be nominated for a Grammy.

The band marches in the traditional high-stepping style incorporating Classical, Jazz, Contemporary, and Popular repertoire in its performances. The band is led by four drum majors known as the "Fantastic Four" and is accompanied by The Sophisticated Ladies dance team.

Dr. Reginald A. McDonald has assumed the band director role with Dr. Sean Daniels as assistant band director; Judy F. Gentry, majorette coordinator; and James "Dean" Sexton, director of the Jazz Band.



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CLASSIC PARADE

lassic GameDay gets off to a roaring start, and the Memphis neighborhood of Orange Mound takes center stage with the Classic Parade. More than 10,000 people line Park Avenue between Haynes Street and Airways Boulevard to see a spectacle consisting of floats, rides, clowns, and area high-school bands. Civic groups also participate and display their community pride. To top it all off, Arkansas-Pine Bluff's Marching Musical Machine of the Mid-South and Tennessee State's Aristocrat of Bands perform to elevate this into a Must See Event for the whole family.





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SIMMONS BANK LIBERTY STADIUM



n a rapidly evolving national sports landscape, the City of Memphis, with the State of Tennessee and the University of Memphis, announced plans to renovate Simmons Bank Liberty Stadium as part of a \$350 million project that also includes the FedExForum.

The sizable upgrade of the football stadium seeks to enhance the fan experience. This includes several innovative premium seating options, restroom and concessions upgrades and a "Halo Space" surrounding the facility.

Construction is scheduled to begin after the 2023 football season with a target completion date to be September 2025.

This will position the city, as well as the

itself, stadium to attract high-visibility events, which through tourism boosts the local economy.

The last major upgrade to the stadium took place 2012 with the installation of a \$2.5 million JumboTron scoreboard.

The grounds around the stadium significantly were improved in 2010 with the removal of many of the old fairgrounds structures in favor of a greenway and tailgating area known as Tiger Lane.

The original cost of construction was \$3.7 million back in the mid-1960s, and a major \$19.5 million renovation in 1987 brought the seating capacity from 51,000 to 62.380.

Formerly the Memphis Memorial Stadium in honor of the area's citizens who served in World War I, World War II and the Korean War, the facility was built in part to help lure the Liberty Bowl post-season college football game from the Northeast.

The first event held at the facility was on Sept. 18, 1965, when Ole Miss defeated Memphis State, 34-14. It was renamed the Liberty Bowl in 1976 and was given its first naming rights deal with Little Rock, Ark.-based Simmons Bank in the summer of 2022.

It has hosted a number of professional football teams in its time, starting with the Memphis Southmen of the World Football League in 1974-75. The USFL's Showboats called the Liberty Bowl home for their two years (1984-85). A refreshed version of the Showboats returned in Spring 2023. The Canadian Football League expansion Mad Dogs played here in the 1995 campaign, their only season. The XFL's Maniax were tenants during the 2001 season, and more recently, the Express of the Alliance of American Football (AAF) in 2019.

The transient NFL team now known as the Tennessee Titans played its 1997 home games

at the Liberty Bowl after leaving Houston en route to Nashville. The brief soccer

boom of the mid-1970s gave the city a team in the North American Soccer League between 1978-80. Rogues did not post a winning record in any of their three years and moved to Calgary after the 1980 season.

The stadium even hosted an exhibition baseball game involving the Atlanta Braves and Milwaukee Brewers during the 1975 season, as a promotion by the Blues minorleague team. The right-

field fence was just 174 feet from home.

The field was resurfaced in 2012 and again in 2022, both with AstroTurf products incorporating the latest technology.

The newer version installed in 2022, called RootZone 3D3, adds to the durability while reducing stress to players' joints.

The stadium's most memorable events include the final game coached by Alabama's Paul 'Bear' Bryant in the 1982 Liberty Bowl, the frigid 1983 Liberty Bowl game between Doug Flutie's Boston College Eagles and Notre Dame, and the University of Memphis' 21-17 upset of sixth-ranked Tennessee in 1996. That game attracted a record 65,885 fans.




PLAYERS COMPETE ON NEW ADVANCED ASTROTURF

In the summer of 2022, the Stadium installed a high-tech new product called AstroTurf RootZone 3D3, replacing the old AstroTurf which was in use since 2012. The most visible difference between the new and old versions is the decrease in the amount of the infill pellets, which will increase the look and feel to a more natural, grass-like texture.

CLASSIC SCORES

The Southern Heritage Classic began in 1990 to enhance the regional rivalry between HBCU powers Tennessee State and Jackson State. The games have generally taken place in the first half of September — the notable exception being the postponement of the 2001 game (originally scheduled for Sept. 15) until Thanksgiving Day due to the aftermath of the 9/11 attacks. Since 2007, the second Saturday in September has been reserved for the Classic Football Game. In all, 31 games have taken place, and 1,451,527 fans have passed through the turnstiles for an average attendance of 46,823. The TSU Tigers have played in every Classic game – posting a 17-14 record. They have had success of late, winning 13 of the last 18 games dating back to 2003.




