## Transparency urged for all St. Armands Circle redevelopment initiatives

*St. Armands Circle Residents Association President Chris Goglia says he wants clear communication between the City of Sarasota when it comes to any initiatives or changes at St. Armands Circle. This follows a private meeting City staff was set to have Sept. 8 with a handful of property owners on the Circle, but was quickly cancelled as other owners and residents were alarmed to not be included in the future planning of the shopping, strolling and dining center.*

Last week, a freedom of information act request revealed that the earliest email about the Sept. 8 meeting came on July 22 from commercial property owner Mark Kauffman, who owns the properties across from Speaks Clam Bar where Chase Bank, Garden Argosy, Ancient Olive, and Madison Ave Cafe & Deli used to operate. This is where some developers reportedly want to build a boutique hotel.

In the July 22 email to City Planning Director Steven Cover, Kauffman says that he wants to invite his “activist” landowners and says that Goglia should be invited to the meeting (he wasn’t) and that he would be “outnumbered” and “overwhelmed”.

Kaufmann said in the memo he understands why (residents) would “abhor” a major hotel, but that a “few”

## Sarasota transfers \$400,000 to offset parking revenue shortfall

*City Manager tells the board he will soon bring a proposal for generating sufficient parking revenue on St. Armands to cover the bond payments.*

The Sarasota City Commission voted last week to approve a \$400,000 loan from the city’s General Fund to cover the debt service on the bonds the city issued to pay for the St. Armands parking garage.

Interim City Manager Dave Bullock told the board that he will soon bring a proposal for generating sufficient parking revenue on St. Armands to cover the bond payments.

Kelly Strickland, director of financial administration for the city, wrote, “The St. Armands Paid Parking Fund could not collect parking fees from October 1, 2024 through January 2, 2025.”

This was due to the aftermath of last year’s storms.

The Commission voted 3-2 in 2017 to approve the issuance of \$17.5 million in bonds to cover the expense of the parking garage on North Adams Lane, plus the burying of overhead electrical transmission lines from the Coon Key Bridge to North Washington Drive; signage in the general vicinity of the paid parking area; and the installation of median hard curb end caps.

The expense of the garage was put at \$14,060,865.

City staff had expected the parking meter and parking lot revenue on St. Armands to add up to \$1,530,000 for the 2024-25 fiscal year, which will end on Sept. 30. Another \$464,000 was anticipated to be generated by users of the parking garage.

However, the latest projection for the parking meter and lot revenue is \$884,125, while the garage revenue is anticipated to be \$142,284. The \$400,000 loan was needed to help cover debt service on the bonds.

## USF Sarasota-Manatee to build new \$6.5 million STEM facility

The University of South Florida Sarasota-Manatee campus plans to build a new \$6.5 million STEM academic facility, a project that leaders say will expand access to high-quality lab instruction in chemistry, biology and physics for students across the university system.

The 7,000-square-foot building will include modern labs, prep space, utilities, restrooms, site work, equipment and furnishings. Construction is expected to begin in 12 to 18 months, with the facility scheduled to open in fall 2027.

The new facility follows the expiration of USF Sarasota-Manatee’s lease for lab space at Mote Marine Laboratory, in May. During the 2025 fiscal year, the campus taught 39 sections of biology and chemistry to more than 460 students at Mote. For the 2026 fiscal year, USF Sarasota-Manatee will lease temporary space at the Roskamp Institute until the new labs are ready.

The proposal received support from USF President Rhea Law and Provost Prasant Mohapatra and won unanimous approval from the USF Board of Trustees Finance Committee in late August.

## Hundreds of sidewalk paintings in Sarasota erased by the city following mandate from State

The City erased hundreds of sidewalk paintings as part of the State’s crackdown on roadway art.

The city says it had no choice but to erase the sidewalk art showcasing Sarasota’s history and famous residents, including John Ringling.

At last week’s city commission meeting, the interim city manager said it isn’t just state money to pay for road projects that would be at-risk.

He said all \$67 million the state is set to send to the city could’ve been withheld if they didn’t comply with FDOT before last Thursday’s deadline.

boutique rooms should be okay. The “activist” landowners include #1, #2, #3, #7, #9, and #13--by assessed value. Specifically the invite list included: Shore owner Tom Leonard, Daquiri Deck owner Gavin or John Meshad, Columbia Owner Casey Gonzmart, Matt Rozinsky, A Benderson representative and The Met owner Geoffrey Michael.

On August 5, City Planning Director Steve Cover asked his admin assistant to set up the meeting that was slated for Sept.8, until it was abruptly cancelled and the City Manager’s office morphed the approach into an all-inclusive kick-off party to explore all things St. Armands Circle, especially resiliency after storms.

Goglia wrote to City Hall last week: “We (SARA) would very much like to be included in this long series of discussions about the future of St. Armands Circle, which happens to be located smack-dab in the middle of our residential neighborhood. Contrary to what some developers have put out there in the past, residents would very much like to see St. Armands Circle revitalized and successful. However, I don’t feel that the discussion of an issue of this magnitude--the future of St. Armands Circle--should be done in haste (or in a closed-door meeting). Residents who are away will start returning in October, with most having returned after the holidays. When people are away, they are less engaged. To maximize resident participation, in-person community workshops should be scheduled in the January-through-April timeframe.”

On Friday, Sept 5, Goglia followed up with the City stating that he had just sent out an email to the commercial property owners on St. Armands Circle to establish a channel of communication, and to specifically ask for their feedback on undergrounding utilities on St. Armands and Lido Keys and on revitalizing St. Armands Circle.

Goglia is also communicating with the Lido Key Residents Association (LKRA), the Lido Shores Property Owners Association (LSPOA), and the St. Armands Circle (Merchants) Association (SACA).

“We’re trying to build a coalition of all stakeholders, and I want you to know that I’ve invited our commercial property owners to be a part of this,” said Goglia.

The City has yet to give dates for its St. Armands series of public meetings to address the issues facing the shopping district and surrounding communities.

## Are prescription drugs truly safe?

*What happens in preliminary laboratory and animal testing does not tell you a whole lot about how humans use and metabolize drugs.*

Are prescription drugs truly safe?  
Depends on how well and how long you look.

When I was discovered on endoscopy to have gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD,) my gastroenterologist told me I should immediately go on proton pump inhibitors, known as PPIs. They were extremely efficacious. “And they’re safe. I’ve been on one for 16 years. You can take them for a lifetime without trouble.”

PPIs were breakthrough drugs. By preventing the production of stomach acid, they worked more effectively at suppressing Barrett’s esophagus, peptic ulcer disease and other common GI ailments than the H2 blockers they replaced. They become so commonly used that patients forget to mention them on drug lists. Patients would tardily remember they were taking a “purple pill” that “did something to my stomach.” Eventually some PPIs went over-the-counter.

Yet recently a Hong Kong Study in the British Medical Journal demonstrated something different. In patients who had helicobacter pylori, the bacterial infection that causes peptic ulcers, and then had that infection treated, the rate of stomach cancer was twice as high as among those taking PPIs than the older, cheaper, older H2 blockers. Other studies have identified PPIs as increasing the risk of Alzheimer’s, particularly important, as many of those on the drugs use them a long time, with many at the advanced age where Alzheimer’s strikes. Other recent studies implicate PPIs in chronic kidney disease and heart attacks. They have for some time carried FDA and other warnings regarding clostridium difficile infections, which kill tens of thousands; hip and spine fractures; pneumonia. Yet they are considered “safe.”

To understand our perception of safety, it’s important to know the natural history of drugs.

### Drugs in Evolution

Pretty much everybody wants more effective agents for the common and uncommon ills of humanity. Drug companies are near the top of that list. Come up with a “blockbuster” and they make billions in profit, often tens of billions, and leave their chief executives very rich. One example: viagra is so profitable billions of dollars of fake viagra is sold every year.

The problem is finding stuff that works and is “safe.”

The human information system is remarkably complicated. So is manipulating it.

Drug companies do a fair bit of basic research. They troll through data bases and use AI to find promising compounds. Yet about 90% of drugs that go to clinical drug trials fail. Sometimes the issue is effectiveness. A very high portion of the time the problem is safety.

What happens in preliminary laboratory and animal testing does not tell you a whole lot about how humans use and metabolize drugs.

These common failures affect the drug approval process. Most of the time drugs get tracked in clinical trials for weeks to months. However, the drugs that really make money for drug companies are used for extended periods, years to decades. That is one of the reasons why

antibiotics are greatly underresearched. Once the patient is “cured,” they may never need the antibiotic again. One or two weeks’ use is “not enough” for drug companies to overcome their high cost of drug development.

That’s why drug companies are now being paid directly by governments to research new antibiotics. Public health departments throughout the world recognize that new epidemics of antibiotic resistant infections may kill and tens of millions. Some could represent an existential threat to much of humanity.

But the present drug development model “doesn’t make enough profits” for new antibiotics to get fully researched.

Time also matters. What happens when people are placed on new drugs and followed up? You start to find “side effects” no one imagined. Like kidney disease and gastric cancer and Alzheimer’s with PPIs. Stuff you will never notice given present reporting of medications in the U.S.

For more of the most frightening side effects of drugs take decades to become noticed. Not incidentally, that generally occurs after drug companies have lost their patent protections and peak drug profitability. The “redress” for these often expectable long term side effects often occurs through personal injury court cases. That is not a great place to set public health policy.

Why are PPIs causing so many troubles? It may be that their ability to cut off acid is “too” effective. They appear to markedly diminish acid production is lysosomes, cell organelles necessary to survival through destroying denatured proteins. Not enough acid, ineffective lysosomes.

So finding increases in stomach cancer, heart disease, kidney disease and Alzheimer’s with PPIs may not be so strange after all. The body’s information system is very complicated. Results may slowly ripple out.

### What To Do

It’s obvious that drug effects occur over much longer ranges of time than the drugs themselves are taken. So it would make sense to have long term registries of drugs and their results that could be scrutinized decades into the future.

These registries exist, but are not welly funded. Drug companies are not particularly fond of them. More importantly, such registries should be international, paid for by government public health departments. Users of PPIs in Germany and Britain are not so different from those in the US. Pooling data across countries should identify problems more quickly, so preventive action can be taken.

But there is a stranger dimension to drug surveillance in the US. We are the only large country that allows drug company advertising.

It’s a very big business. And all media, including social media, don’t like losing business.

So when drugs are found to have “unwanted” long term side effects, the results may not be showcased in the media quite as brightly as would occur for other products. Combine multibillion dollar drug advertising with rules that prevent Medicare from negotiating drug prices and it is no surprise drug companies make the lion’s share of their profits in the U.S.

Buyer beware.

## Renaming Gulf of Mexico Drive a bad idea

*This renaming effort does not restore American Greatness –it brings shame and embarrassment to our values, community and country.*

**Longboat Key resident Barbara C. Woods wrote the following to the Town.**

As a full-time and 11-year resident of the Town of Longboat Key, I am writing to express my unequivocal opposition to any proposal to rename Gulf of Mexico Drive to Gulf of America Drive. While Florida HB 575 and HB 549 require changes to state references, these laws do not compel the Town of Longboat Key to change the name of our historic roadway. That decision rests solely with you — and I urge you to reject it. I really cannot overstate the sheer lunacy of forcing thousands of very elderly residents to change their addresses. Renaming the street would be a purely symbolic act that wastes public and private resources and fails to serve any real community need. This lunacy is matched only by the state’s current successful effort to deprive our community of street signs. I feel as if I am a resident of an authoritarian state and am living through China’s Cultural Revolution and Stalin’s Great Purge. This renaming effort does not restore American Greatness –it brings shame and embarrassment to our values, community and country. I am astounded that you would even consider pandering to this impractical, ridiculous, partisan, divisive effort. Do you want that to be your legacy to our community?

1. Protecting Residents from Unnecessary Burden and Chaos  
Changing the name of Gulf of Mexico Drive would create needless hardship for thousands of residents, many of whom are elderly. This change would force them to update their addresses with Medicare, Social Security, the IRS, property insurers, the DMV, and countless other institutions. The administrative burden is enormous — not only for residents, but also for local medical and dental offices that would have to update patient records en masse. The likelihood of errors is high, and the consequences could be severe: denied medical claims, missed tax notices, delayed Social Security payments, and other critical disruptions.
2. Risk to Emergency Services and Public Safety  
This street name has been in place since 1957. Emergency services are familiar with it. Changing the name risks confusion and delays in urgent situations — a danger that is entirely avoidable.
3. Preserving Our History and Local Authority  
The state should not interfere with the Town’s ability to preserve its own history. Gulf of Mexico Drive is part of our identity and heritage. The name of our street should not be tied to the political rebranding of the adjacent body of water.
4. Avoiding Politically Motivated Instability  
Political movements are temporary and shift with election cycles. If a future administration restores the name “Gulf of Mexico” to the body of water, would the Town change the street name yet again? Residents deserve a permanent address that is not subject to the whims of partisan politics.
5. No Tangible Benefit — Only Division and Cost  
This statute is the product of extreme partisan views and serves no urgent public need. It is divisive, costly, and burdensome — all for the sake of a symbolic gesture that solves no real problem. The Town should not yield to such pressure.
6. Additional Practical and Economic Concerns
  - Business disruption – Local businesses would face costly updates to signage, stationery, websites, advertising, and legal documents.
  - Municipal expenses – The Town/County/State would bear the cost of replacing street signs, updating maps, GPS databases, and official records — potentially tens of thousands of taxpayer dollars.
  - Impact on property values – Controversy or uncertainty around a street name can temporarily depress property values.
  - Navigation errors – GPS systems, delivery services, and visitors may struggle to find addresses during the transition.
7. Governance and Public Trust
  - Perception of political overreach – Renaming can be seen as an imposition of ideology, especially when driven by partisan agendas.
  - Symbolic vs. substantive change – Renaming is a symbolic gesture that does nothing to address real community needs.
  - Lack of public input – A change of this magnitude should only occur after broad community consultation or a referendum.
8. Psychological and Social Impact
  - Cognitive load – Residents, especially older ones, must relearn and internalize a new name, which can be confusing and stressful.
  - Community division – Renaming debates can polarize neighbors and create lasting resentment.
9. A Practical Alternative  
If the state requires removal of “Gulf of Mexico” from official signage, the Town could consider using “GMD” on temporary signs— a widely recognized and accepted shorthand — without changing the official street name.  
In conclusion:  
For all these reasons, I urge you to stand with the residents of Longboat Key and preserve the name Gulf of Mexico Drive. Do not allow a misguided and temporary political movement to erase our history, disrupt our lives, and compromise our safety.

take a look at legislation that Congressman Steube is considering introducing.

Congressman Steube has been working on legislation to reform FEMA procurement methods, and specifically the Construction Manager at Risk (CMAR) process. The intent of this bill is to streamline such procurement methods as it relates to using qualifications (QBS) as a primary factor, or pricing. As I'm sure you're aware, some states (including Florida) have qualifications as the primary factor, while FEMA relies on pricing. This can lead to many municipalities encountering difficulty using federal funds (as disbursed through their state's respective emergency management department) where state's procurement policies are at odds with federal regulations.

Ultimately, this bill would fix this issue by allowing local governments to use CMARs utilizing QBS procurement methods. This bill would also increase the simplified procedure rate from \$1,000,000 to \$3,000,000, aimed at reducing potential backlogs in FEMA audit reviews.

We'd very much welcome your team's support and input on this bill before we introduce. Please let me know if you may have any questions or concerns. Thanks!

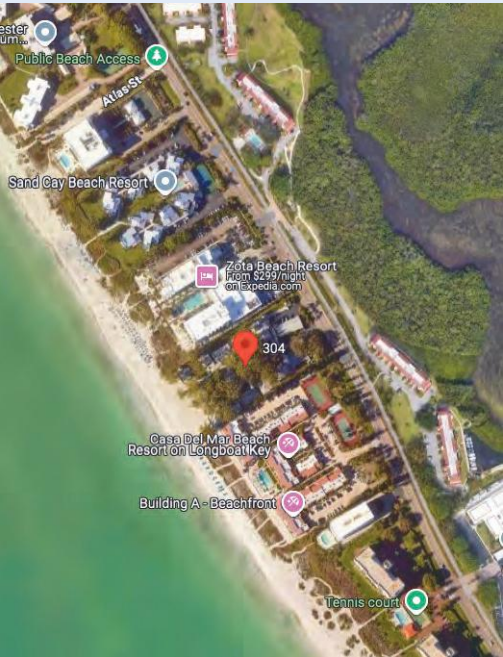

## A day at Myakka River State Park

Myakka River State Park is one of the state’s oldest and largest parks at 37,000 acres. It has enough to do all day as the park features a tram ride, an airboat ride, a bird-walk, a weir and some picnic tables near Upper Myakka Lake where, on a cloudy March day, my wife, two friends and I watched a multitude of avian life.

As we board the tram ride, an osprey holding a fish in its claws flies over some tall trees. Perched in one of them is a great egret. The tall, stately white bird stands motionless. Along the tram trail we see an osprey in a tree with a fish draped across a branch. Is this the same one we saw earlier?

Adjacent to the parking lot is a grassy area where there are some picnic benches that overlook the lake where airboats go out. There are at least 120 white pelicans, winter visitors to Florida, in the water in a few tightly packed groupings. As we are about to eat lunch one of those massed groups starts to come by, moving with synchronized precision.

These birds are collective hunters, herding fish to shallow water where they feed on them with their enormous orange bills. I’m fascinated as I’ve only read about this behavior before and not witnessed it in numbers of this size. They again come by slowly, but like a parade are soon out of sight. My wife admires how they seem to glide and gracefully turn in another direction. For her they are peaceful. For both of us, they alone make the drive here worthwhile.

As we are about to bite into sandwiches, five black-necked stilts fly in close to shore. These are 14-inch elegant birds with long, pencil-thin red legs and a curved black and white body design. I’ve never gotten as close to these birds as I’d like to, and this seems like the right moment. As I get up, two fly and the others follow.

However there’s a consolation prize. It’s a yellowlegs that’s walking in and around clumps of grass in the water. These sandpipers are so named because of their yellow legs, and this one appears to be a lesser yellowlegs because it doesn’t have a slight upturned curved bill, as do the greater yellowlegs. A friend of mine thinks that they are sedately beautiful birds. I note the brown

pattern on its back and the feeling of calm that it brings. Some boat-tailed grackles are here. The males are large and iridescent black with a long broad tail that resembles an oar. The females are smaller, tawny and lean like greyhounds. When they are in a group there’s something Shakespearean about them.

By now the sun is out and there’s a mystery in the water. There are a number of coots, black duck-like swimmers with white bills and ruby-colored eyes. They are quintessential Florida birds and are sometimes nicknamed “mud hens.” One appears to have a stick in its bill that is trailing in the water. This can’t be nest material or is it? I watch for a while and see one submerge its head and come up with some aquatic vegetation. Partially obscured in a tree near our table to which I’ve returned is a male boat-tailed grackle. It’s calling and stays still while I take a few photos, one showing its clearly open bill. I could stay here all afternoon but we’ve got the airboat ride coming up soon.

As the airboat is preparing to depart, a glossy ibis is feeding nearby. Its long down-curved bill probes the sand below the water for tiny shells. If the day was really sunny the bird’s brick red color and iridescence would show but today it looks uncharacteristically dull.

Out on the boat I’m impressed with the captain’s intimate knowledge of the lake and its wildlife, as I always am. It makes the trip more than just a pleasurable ride. Some white pelicans come flying overhead, their huge

wingspans showing black at the tips. On the far shore an alligator slides into the water while others remain on shore snoozing. One has its jaws wide open showing a pink mouth and those teeth. How’d you like to be its dentist?

Out at the birdwalk a bald eagle flies by. In the grass are five sandhill cranes, large gray birds with tiny heads that have red crowns. These stately birds go

back in the fossil record 2.5 million years, much longer than most other birds. For me, that puts them on a pedestal. There is also a very large feral pig that we see at some distance.

We go back to the parking lot and out to the weir, a small dam where the lowering sun falls on two birds. A great blue heron stands close to the walkout, its body still while it looks straight ahead, somehow looking so alive in its stillness. The scene resembles an outdoor museum. Nearby a white ibis probes the water with its long, down-curved, Lifebuoy-colored bill making concentric circles in the water. Watching those circles I start to feel mellow. It’s a sedate way to end our full day at Myakka River.

# BreakPoints



## Focus on the Serve & Volley

*Sometimes my opponent will suddenly start to serve and volley. What is my best strategy to deal with that? Also, when is it appropriate to serve and volley, and when does it not make sense?*

If your opponent starts serving and volleying, focus on the ball and not on the movement of your opponents. Have a preplanned game plan of how you are going to return based on the serve you receive. If your opponent has a strong serve, an appropriate return to neutralize the serve and volley is a lob over the server's partner's head. Down the middle and low is always a good return. Try to make sure if you can't lob or pass your opponent that you hit your shots nice and low at their feet. Positionally, stay one-up one-back as the receiving team unless you are not having success. If you are getting attacked off your return then I highly suggest having the receiver and the receiver's partner at the baseline. Having both players at the baseline, gives the serving team a different look which alone can cause good results. Playing both back takes pressure off the receiver so they aren't pressured to hit a perfect return. If the receiver's partner is at the baseline they have a better chance and more time to defend themselves if needed. The receiver's partner can always resume their position at the net if their partner hits a good offensive lob, or if the serving team stops serving and volleying.

Serving and volleying is a great strategy if you have good mobility, a strong serve, and solid volleys. If you or your

partner have a difficult time moving backward it is probably not for you. I do not suggest ever serving and volleying on a second serve. Serving and volleying can be used as a change of positioning/strategy if you are losing. Sometimes, just making your opponent have a different look can sway momentum. Perhaps your opponents don't have a good lob, or seeing you rush the net puts pressure on them? Sometimes serving and volleying can cause missed return of serves because it makes the receiving team nervous. These are potential benefits or serving and volleying. Also, if you have a big serve and or your opponent has a weak return, serving and volleying makes sense. If you play someone that has an effective drop shot serving and volleying helps take that shot away as well. Generally, throwing in some serve and volleying is a good strategy because you want to take your opponent off guard. No matter how good you are at serving and volleying do not do it every time, because you do not want to be pre-

dictable. Serving and volleying is a great skill set to develop, and when used at appropriate times can be highly effective. Jackie Bohannon is the Director of Tennis at the Bird Key Yacht Club.

## The middle of the pack flows in a glass

*In an era of rapid changes in climate, some regions that depend on a specific feature appear to be losing it.*

Gamblers on the ponies know that place and show tickets keep them in the game. They don't have to pick a winner. The second or third best offers good value at a more reasonable price. The top horse in a stable lends it prestige. The next level horses come close, but fail to reach the heights of the top horses. But for the better, they offer good value for less.

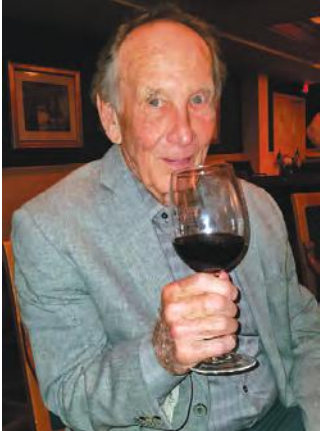
The place and show wines on a wineries' list have the same virtues as the show and place ponies. The grapes that don't quite make the cut for premier wine make great wines for everyday drinking.

Premier French Chardonnay from Burgundy and Rhône white wine blends have price tags of \$40 and up. A top California Chardonnay, say Shafer or Rombauer, sells

for only slightly less. The 2023 Famille Perrin Côtes du Rhône Réserve Blanc (\$14), an intriguing blend of Viognier, Roussanne, Marsanne, and Grenache Blanc, delivers aromas and tastes that give more prestigious wines a run for their money. If the Perrin blend of Rhône grapes doesn't match your preferences, the Rhône region has many other blends to try.

A building trend in winemaking in the USA is leading prestige brands to create new brands in a price tier below that of the prestige brand. The new brand has a distinct name, but the same grape varieties. Why? Because the producer of the prestige wine expects to sell only a limited quantity at a favorable wholesale price to retailers and restaurants. Putting a greater quantity on the market would either increase unsold inventory or force a lower wholesale price. Better to sell excess production of the prestige wine under another brand name to avoid undercutting the market for the prestige wine.

This tactic appears to be behind, for example, the creation of the Lyric brand of California Pinot Noir by the producer of the prestigious Etude Pinot Noir from the Carneros region in the Napa Valley. At twice the price, we buy Etude as a gift for a fellow wine aficionado or for a special dinner; for a more ordinary occasion, the Lyric tastes close enough to the Etude. We have to ask "Is it really Etude under a different label, or a close second?" Winemakers talk about the subtle differences in selection of grapes, skin contact during fermentation, and aging in oak, but these fineries don't add much to the flavor profile of the wine.
