INTRODUCTION

Culture in Common is a New Forest programme creating more opportunities for you to see and take part in creative activities.

We're working with residents in different parts of the New Forest to plan inspiring and accessible creative activities for their area. That includes Totton, the Waterside, New Milton to Pennington and Avon Valley.

Our 10-year vision is to spark widespread engagement in a sustainable, inclusive and locally inspired offer that makes arts and culture as synonymous with the district as the iconic New Forest pony.

The cultural richness of the district will be celebrated in a way that's relevant and valued by the community. Our aim is to support everyone to connect with and through arts and creativity and share 'culture in common'.

The programme is driven by three key questions:

- Are more people in the New Forest experiencing and inspired by creativity and culture and what are the most effective ways to achieve this?
- What approaches enable us to deliver on our aspiration for excellence, both in the process of community engagement and the creative and cultural experiences on offer?
- What else are we learning that facilitates better public engagement in creativity and culture?

Culture in Common is part of Arts Council England's Creative People and Places programme (CPP). CPP is about more people taking the lead in choosing, creating and taking part in arts and culture experiences in the places where they live. There are 38 CPP projects, covering 55 local authority areas where involvement with creativity and culture is significantly below the national average. They give local people the chance to enjoy, commission and create their own artistic opportunities.



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IN SUMMARY

In December 2021, Culture in Common was announced by Arts Council England as one of 11 new CPP projects, securing £1 million. The investment covers the first three years of funding, from April 2022 to March 2025.

Since April 2022, Culture in Common has engaged with **49,432** people in total, through a variety of events, workshops, exhibitions and creative clubs. Our events are created with, and led by the community.

- 1 Engage more people from the identified places in a wide range of creative and cultural experiences.
- 2 Empower communities to lead and shape local cultural provision.
- 3 Ensure both the engagement process and the creative and cultural experiences on offer are relevant and excellent.
- 4 Encourage partnerships and collaboration between publicly funded, amateur, voluntary, community and commercial sectors.
- 5 Take an Action Research approach to community engagement in arts, creativity and culture; learn what works best and share that learning.

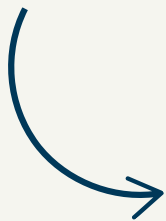

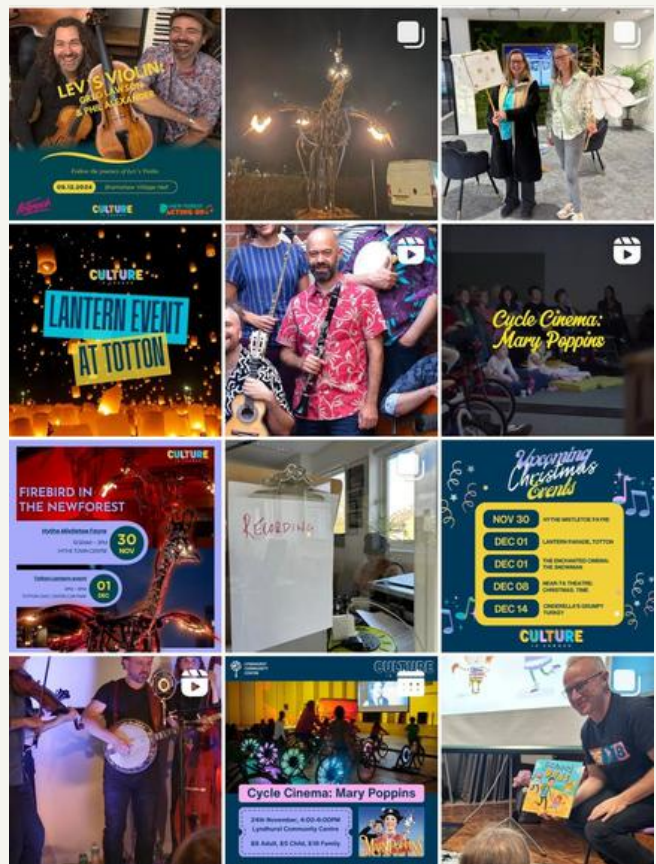

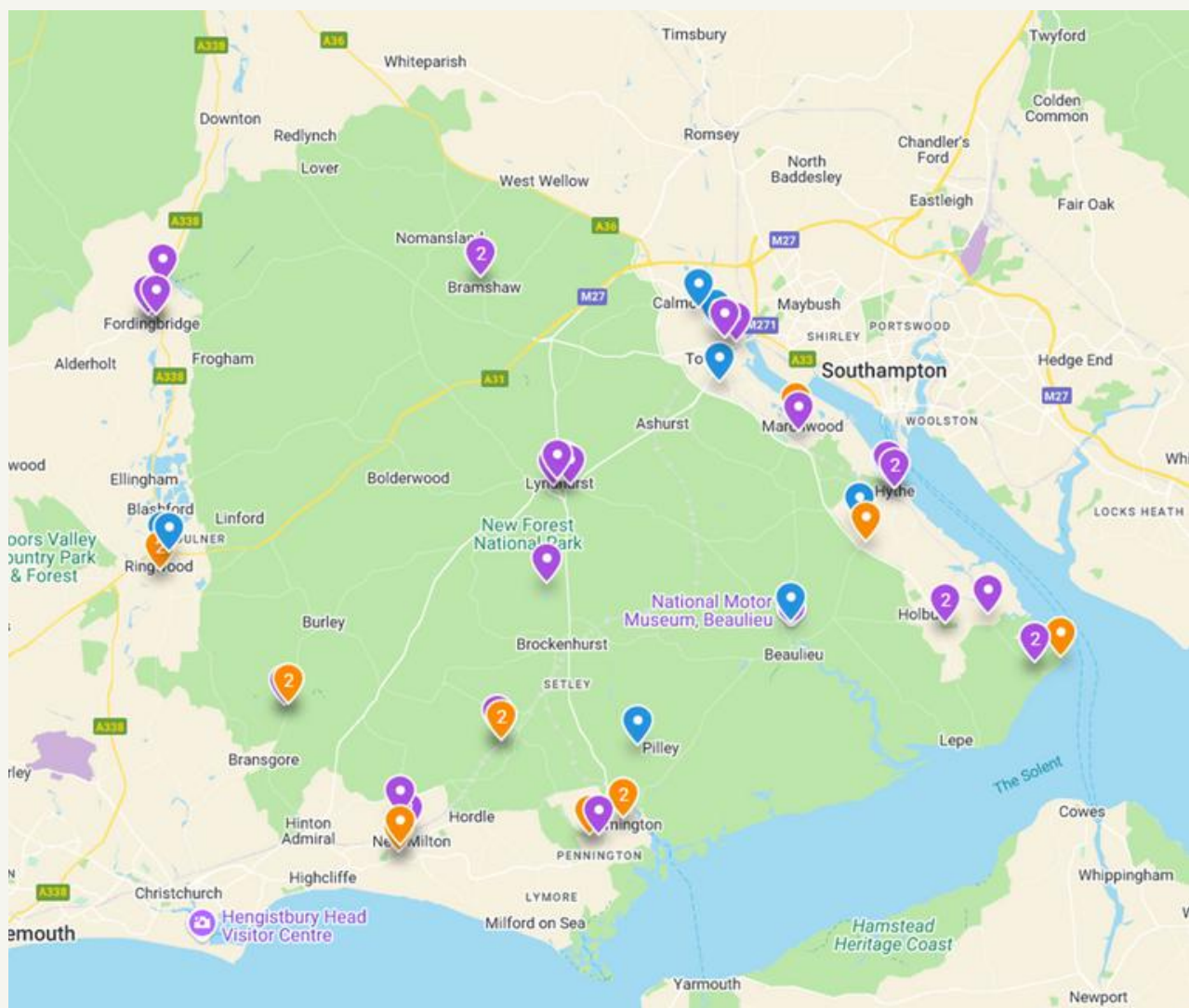

CREATIVE CLUBS

We work across across the district to support a range of creative clubs, including youth theatre, creative walkshops, dance groups, writing workshops and more.

Dancing on Wheels, New Milton

Dancing on Wheels are monthly wheelchair dance classes, held at the New Milton Memorial Centre.

The classes are accessible and creative, and explore movement, music, rhythm and flow. Sessions are run by experienced dance tutors and are designed to meet the needs of everyone in the class, whether you're a self-propelled wheelchair user, an ambulatory wheelchair user or are accompanied by a companion. The sessions allow participants to improve their physical and mental wellbeing, learn new skills, and meet new people.

Overall, 24 wheelchair users and 23 companions have taken part in Dancing on Wheels this year. 63% of the participants identify as female, and there are a range of ages taking part (42% aged under 39, 17% aged 40-65, 41% aged 65+).



Cartooning Club, The Waterside

Earlier this year, Culture in Common supported a series of six-week cartooning courses held in Dibden Purlieu, Marchwood, and Fawley. They were open to anyone between the ages of 7 and 15, and were led by local cartoonist and children's book illustrator, Simon Chadwick.

Each week explored something slightly different, with the purpose of encouraging the children to discover and develop their own style.

There were 15 participants for Dibden Purlieu, 19 for Marchwood, and 17 for the Fawley sessions. Over 80% of the participants rated the session 'very good', and would want to attend something similar in the future.



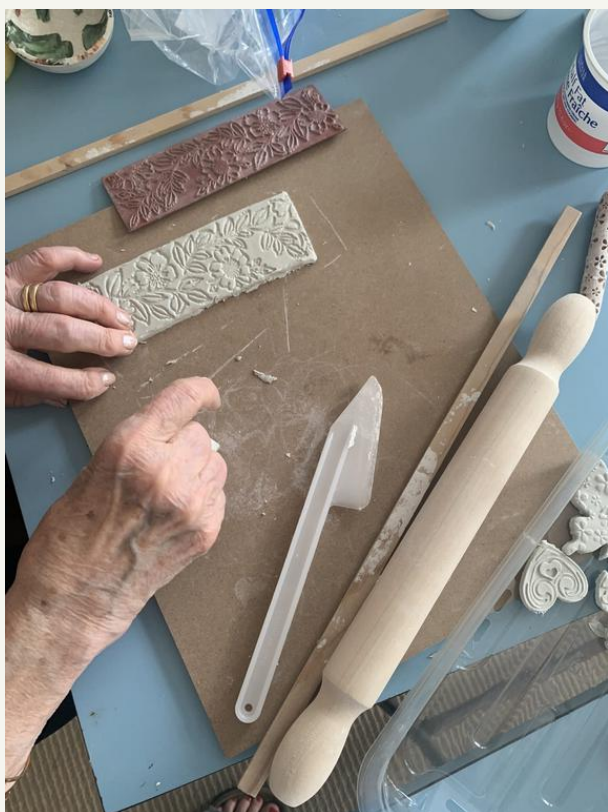


Waterside Creative Cafe

These regular sessions allow participants to explore their creativity and learn new skills in a relaxed and supportive environment. Martin introduces a range of artforms, techniques and themes, supporting development week by week.

The Creative Cafe also invites guest creatives for mini-masterclasses for more in-depth explorations.

Sessions take place on Monday evenings at St John's Hall, Hythe. There are over 10 members who attend regularly with a diverse range of ages.



Dementia Friendly Workshops at SPUD

Taking place in SPUD's new Living Room in Sway, these creative art workshops are for those living with dementia and their carers and relatives, and are warm, friendly and fun.

Sessions are on Wednesday afternoons, and are run by artist Suna Imre, with guest artists hosting sessions to share their particular ways of working. Approaches to creating art are varied and include collage, painting, drawing, working with clay and weaving. No prior experience to making art is needed. Tea and cake is always provided!

The Living Room has wheelchair access and was designed specifically to host small groups so people feel safe and comfortable. Payment is not needed to take part, however voluntary contributions are welcome.

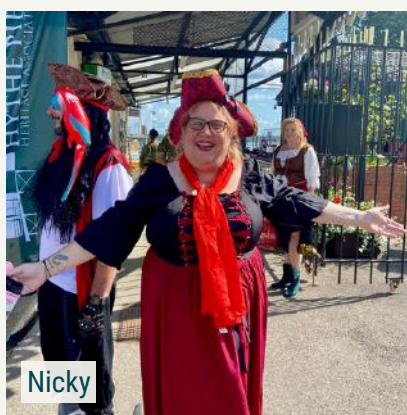


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COMMUNITY ANCHORS

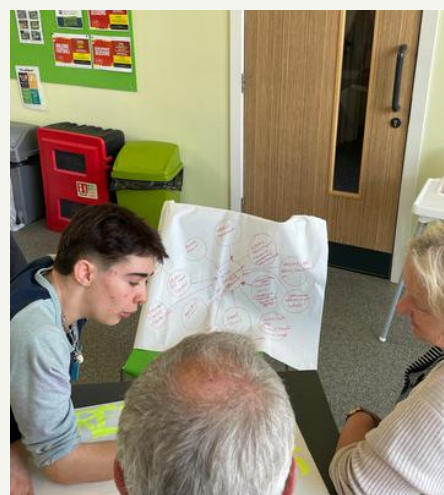


COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT SESSIONS

In June and July 2024, Culture in Common partnered with New Forest District Council to engage Chris Rolls from Collective Sense to carry out action research public engagement activity with a variety of stakeholder and community groups across the New Forest.

The workshops included:

- Town and parish councillors, exploring perceptions of local arts and culture, the early stage development of a culture strategy and councillors' role in developing it
- After-school/home educated young people
- Folio artist network members x2
- Lyndhurst - Heritage Centre community engagement session
- New Milton - Guide HQ community engagement session
- Ringwood - Carvers Clubhouse community engagement session
- Totton & Eling - Shopping Precinct community engagement session
- Waterside - Fawley Jubilee Hall community engagement session

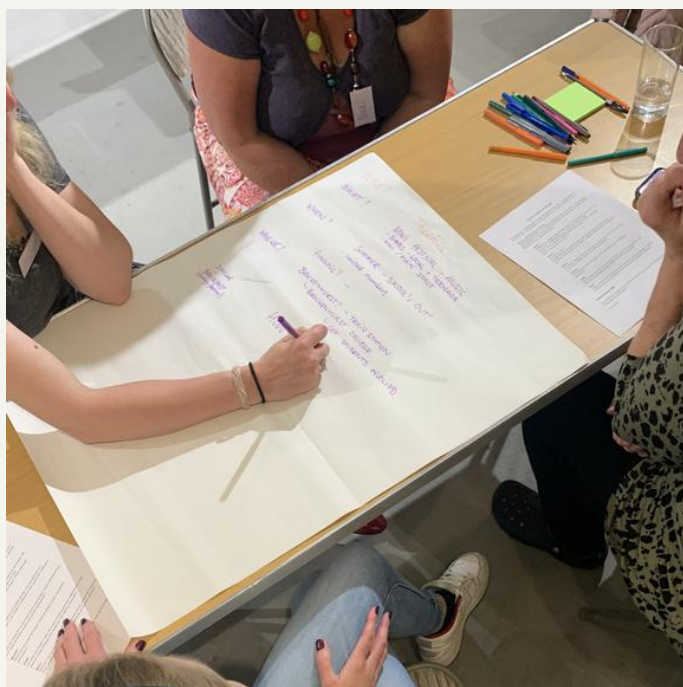


Process

Participants invited to the five Community Engagement sessions were selected through a 'Citizens Assembly' style approach. 40,000 residents from our priority areas received a leaflet and were invited to apply, with an offer of £50 voucher each for attending.

Receiving more applications than we needed for each session allowed us to select as diverse a group as possible, prioritising individuals that had the least engagement in the arts to date.

The outcome of the community engagement sessions for New Forest District Council and Culture in Common was richly insightful. It revealed deep reserves of pride in place and the connectedness of locals to the unique landscapes of the New Forest.

CULTURE IN COMMON WITH THE ENVIRONMENT, CONSERVATION & SUSTAINABILITY

In 2024, Culture in Common has been working to combine nature and the environment with artistic projects, to inspire and engage local communities. There has been a particular focus on young people, bringing to life their vision of the Forest and natural environment that surrounds them, as well as their feelings on nature and climate.

Moving forward to 2025 & 2026, plans are now afoot for a major new artistic commission working with CPRE (The Countryside Charity) and the community in Copythorne on the Hampshire Hedge initiative, to create a public art gateway for the start of the hedges that will connect the New Forest with South Downs National Park.

CASE STUDY: FOREST OF CALM

In the spring, Culture in Common partnered up with New Forest National Park Authority and New Forest District Council to deliver a project with home educated students from the New Forest, commissioning The Beardy Gardener (Leigh Johnstone) to co-create a garden inspired by the New Forest with young people.

The garden 'A Forest of Calm' which replicated the iconic heathland landscape that humans and animals share together, including the famous New Forest pony, won gold when presented at BBC Gardener's world in Beaulieu in April.

The Garden was transported to Bramshaw Village Hall where the students meet every week so that the garden can still be visited and enjoyed by them and local residents.



Clare Canning, part of the Broadleaf Home Ed Co-op in Bramshaw said:

CASE STUDY: THE ALICE PROJECT

On Saturday 4th May 2024, the New Forest Heritage Centre came alive with a wonderland of Alices, who joined us for an afternoon of creative activities, games, a sounds workshop and a mad hatters tea party.

There was excitement in the air as Alices, ranging in age from a new-born baby to a 79-year-old, made Alice bands together, played wonderland card games and engaged in a 'Menu of Conversation' over tea and cake to get to know each other and discover what they had in common. On 19th October, all the Alices were invited back to hear a sneak preview of their voices woven into a new sound piece by Platform 4. Platform 4 are a nationally acclaimed performance company who have been creating unique, bespoke projects for 27 years. This new project inspired by Alice in Wonderland, is a gig theatre piece which will tour the UK in Spring 2025, weaving together original music, interviews with the inhabitants of the New Forest, Lewis Carroll's text and voices from 40 contemporary Alices!

THE ALICE PROJECT

CASE STUDY: RED PEPPER, BLACK PEPPER

THE INDIAN ARMY IN THE NEW FOREST

Earlier this year, Culture in Common supported the production of 'Red Pepper & Black Pepper: The Indian Army in the New Forest (1914-1916)'. The exhibition, co-created by Nick Saunders and Devanshi Rungta, explored the fascinating story of two Indian Army hospitals in the New Forest during World War I.

Held at the New Forest Heritage Centre, Lyndhurst, the exhibition explored the spirit of friendship between the soldiers and the local community, as well as the hard-hitting narrative of 55 Indian soldiers who did not survive their injuries. The exhibition delved into a largely forgotten chapter of this period: the time Indian soldiers spent in the New Forest from 1914 to 1916. Through documents, journals, photographs, war diaries, and letters sent by soldiers back home to present day India, Pakistan, and Nepal, this exhibition offered a glimpse into these soldiers' experiences.

Local residents were invited to the exhibition's opening night - one resident had family who were part of the First World War and photographs of them in uniform were featured. To provide more context to the exhibition, acclaimed author and historian, **Shrabani Basu** was invited to deliver a talk entitled **'Turbans in the Trenches, India's contribution to the Western Front in WW1'** on 25th July at Lyndhurst Community Centre.

The exhibition coincided with the annual commemoration by the Friends of the Indian Memorial at Barton on Sea and we were pleased to welcome East Asian communities from the New Forest, Bournemouth and Southampton to share their memories of ancestors.
