Halachic Note: Check it Out!

Purim on Erev Shabbat:

"Why is this Purim Different from all other Purims?!"

With Purim on Thursday night/Friday, Erev Shabbat, this year, we are in a unique Halachic situation regarding the timing for the Purim Seudah - which is one of the main Mitzvot of the day.

You see, it is long standing practice that it is not Halachically acceptable to have an actual (bread-based) meal before Shabbat, because it diminishes from the Kavod due to Shabbat in that we are supposed to have an appetite for our actual Friday night Shabbat meal, which is our mandated Torah obligation.

Therefore, many Poskim advise that we eat the Purim Seudah in the morning before midday. However, with the understanding that having a significant family meal on Friday morning would pose a difficulty for many people, due to school and work schedules - we have opted to go with an interesting Halachic alternative for the Purim Seudah in our community this year.

- We will be employing the Halachic principle of פורס מפה ומקדש. As the Talmud and Poskim explain, in certain unique situations (such as Purim this year) we can convene our meal close to the start of Shabbat (following Mincha) leading into Shabbat.
- Then we'll wash and enjoy a sumptuous Purim banquet and carnival up until candlelighting time at 6:42pm.
- Then we'll hit the pause button, Light candles and Daven (a Quick & Kavodic) Kabbalat Shabbat/Maariv while covering the food & tables (פורס מפה).

Then we'll resume our Seudah as it transitions to a Shabbat meal by saying Kiddush (ומקדש) and uncovering the bread on the tables, continuing with our dinner through benching.

Interestingly, Kiddush will not require the HaGafen blessing, because we already had said the Beracha earlier and Washing and the HaMotzi blessing will also not be required, because we will have already washed and said HaMotzi earlier when we began the meal.

*Please note, these Halachot ONLY apply if you're eating the Purim Seudah in the evening leading into Shabbat, as we are communally. If you are eating the Seudah in the morning on your own or with your family - your Friday night Shabbat meal will be at the regular time in the regular way.

PURIM

While Hanukah represents the victory against forced assimilation, Purim celebrates a victory against genocide. These two Festivals are most important to the Jew for upon numerous occasions the Jew has suffered both, PURIM reminds us that we are "one nation, dispersed and separated among nations" suffering at times-precarious political status: at times never sure of our future. It is in essence one chapter in the history of the Jews and anti-Semitism.

READING OF THE MEGILLAH

The public reading of the Megillah, which is one of the primary rituals of the day, is incumbent upon everyone men, women and children. The obligation includes both the reading at night and during the day of Purim.

One should be careful to listen to every word and not interrupt the reading with conversation. Everyone stands for the recitation of the three blessings. The following four passages, underscoring positive elements and referring to redemption are recited first out loud by the congregation and then repeated by the reader:

- 1. Chapter II:5
- 2. VIII:15
- 3. VII: 16
- 4. X:3

The custom of making noise when the name of Haman is read is a time-honored tradition and should not be discouraged.

MITZVOT OF PURIM DAY **MISHLOACH MANOT**

The Sending of Gifts on the day of Purim. Everyone is required to send to at least one friend a minimum of two varieties of cooked food requiring no further preparation. One can also fulfill the Mitzvah through the YIS communal Mishloach Manot.

This action emulates the Jews of Shushan who shared their good fortune with others in the spirit of generosity and fraternity. Some maintain the practice of sending these in order to involve others in the mitzvah. A mourner is obligated to send Mishloah Manot and gifts to the poor even during the week of mourning. One does not send a The prayer Al Hanissim - for the mourner portions during the that this Mitzvah applies during the day of Purim not the night before.

MATANOT L'EVYONIM

A Jew always remembers the poor in time of joy and is obligated to give money or poor people. This practice comes from the Jews of good fortune with others. us to recognize G-d's gifts to us.

SEUDAT PURIM -THE PURIM FEAST

In the spirit of Purim joy and holiday merriment, a festive Purim feast is served during the day of Purim. It is proper to set a table fit for royalty. Wines and spirits flow in commemoration of the wine feast, which Esther prepared for Haman's downfall. Since Purim also celebrates Israel's heightened awareness and acceptance of Torah it is appropriate for words of Torah to accompany the meal as it says, "for the Jews there was light" (Esther 8:16). The light referred to is that of Torah. The meal is conducted during the day with a festive spirit, fine dining and portions through a messenger elegance. Some have many candles on the table and others have specially baked breads with images and ornamentation.

PURIM PRAYERS

Miracles (Birnbaum p.209, Art year of mourning. Please note Scroll p.274, 276), which recounts the miraculous salvation of Purim, is recited in the Amidah and in Grace after meals.

SHUSHAN PURIM

In "cities encompassed by a wall since the time of Joshua" Purim is prosperity. On Purim everyone observed and the Megillah is read on the 15th of Adar. It was on this distribute food to at least two day that the first celebration of Purim took place in Shushan (Esther 9:18). In unwalled cities Shushan who celebrated their Purim is observed on the 14th of Adar (Esther 9:19).

Making the unfortunate happy In cities such as Jerusalem, which on Purim also seeks to remind is a walled city Purim is celebrated on the 15th of Adar. Elsewhere this day is called Shushan Purim and is observed as a half-holiday.


