

The Godfathers of Deep House SA

— a man often misunderstood, sometimes misrepresented, but undeniably a pioneer in shaping the South African deep house scene and youth empowerment movement.

This is not just a story about music. It's about economic freedom, legacy, and how one man's personal sacrifices continue to shape a generation of young artists in South Africa — and beyond.



The Genesis Project

Planting Seeds for the Future

Long before *The Godfathers* became a household name, there was a bold idea called the **Genesis Project** — a vision to empower the youth through music by creating a blueprint for sustainable talent development.

"It was the beginning of everything," he says. "I called it *Genesis* because we were starting from scratch — building something pure and untouchable. No one understood it back then."

The Genesis Project wasn't just about beats and mixing. It was about **mindset**. It encouraged young people to create original content, register their work, understand royalties, and most importantly — own their space.

"It was my way of saying, 'you don't need to wait for a label, or be discovered in America. You can start here — and be great here."

Many of the key players in today's *Godfather* movement, including now-successful producers and artists, were nurtured through Genesis. "What started as a small idea has now produced international signings, brands, and even young entrepreneurs. That's what it was always about."



"I never centered my life on money."

"you get me, Elster," he begins. "it's been an amazing journey. a lot of people wish they could have done this."

what strikes me instantly is how calm and grounded he is when talking about success. "I've never centered my life on making money. money, as I've come to understand, is a consequence. a consequence of good deeds."

in his words, thieves don't get lucky. "because it's unsustainable," he says. "when you take shortcuts, it either ends badly or doesn't last."

As our conversation continues, he proudly introduces me to his family — his daughter, only 17, has just released an album.

A System of Continuity

"You know, charity begins at home," he says. "If I don't train my kids, then who will?" But it doesn't stop with his family — the system he's developed spans far wider.

When asked about his well-known approach to mentorship, especially through The Godfathers, he gets visibly animated. "If I have what it takes to get them known, why must they go through the long road we went through? We've paid the school fees — let them learn and catch up quickly."

He sketches a simple "S" shape to illustrate the cycle — the journey of an artist. "We rise, stagnate, catch up, and age. But when youth enters at that stagnation point, I can lift them. That's the shortcut. That's mentorship."






Springboarding Youth into Economic Freedom

He doesn't just teach music. He teaches sustainability. "If a 15-year-old like lan Climax - can build a base of streams while still in high school, that's passive income. That's relieving pressure from families. That's wealth generation."

He talks about youth earning royalties, building their brands, and accessing gigs — even international audiences — all from South Africa. "They're bringing in money from China," he says with a smile. "Different currencies, different revenue streams. I get joy from this now."

One such artist, T-Time, is now bottling his own merchandise. "He sent me a picture. I sent him his statement from last month. That's economic independence."





The True Intentions Behind The Godfathers

There's a lot of noise out there. Some critics claim he's using young artists for his gain. But when you hear the real story, it becomes clear how far from the truth those accusations are.

He's transparent: "I started The Godfathers with my own money. I was paying salaries. I never even made money from it in the beginning." He compares it to working at KFC — "If you fry the chicken and get paid monthly, you can't say you're being robbed when they sell the bucket."



It was only when the model changed — when the salaries stopped and the mentorship grew — that people began to gossip. "But that's because they've got an astronomer's view of things. They're far away, looking through foggy lenses. I'm an astronaut. I've been there. I've touched the soil."



Creating Stars Locally, Without Needing the West

He once turned down a major international gig — EDC or Coachella, he doesn't remember which — because he simply wasn't interested. "They don't excite me. I want to build a Coachella here. We even exported Elon Musk, and he doesn't even give us Starlink. Why are we still so desperate for outside validation?"

He reminds me of local excellence: Chris Barnard, the Sundowns now playing at the FIFA Club World Cup, and a 15-year-old signed by Chelsea for R38 million.

"It's our resources. If we train youth to succeed here, they'll get noticed from here. And yes, many of my Godfathers producers have now signed with bigger international labels. But guess what? They all mention where they started. They use my credentials — and I'm proud of that."





The Bigger Picture

A Legacy Beyond Beats

"Dogs don't bark at stationary cars," he tells me. "They bark when something is moving."

What he's built — with time, sweat, love, and personal funding — is a movement. The Godfathers isn't just about a deep house. It's about building bridges across generations, transferring skills, and offering economic freedom through the universal language of music.

With hundreds of thousands of views, streams in multiple countries, and youth as young as 9 making waves, the proof is undeniable.

He may not have gone to Coachella, but make no mistake: he's building the next Coachella right here — one beat, one kid, and one future at a time. The truth is, he cares deeply about his reputation. "It's the least of the things I'd ever do — to rob someone. I'd rather give you money."

Even when opportunities from government or housing departments failed to materialize due to red tape or lack of vision, he didn't give up. Now, he's pushing forward with new opportunities.





Freedom in Frequencies

A Mandela Day Collaboration

In July, a new creative spark ignited between Elster and Mr. Masia, the founder of The Godfathers of Deep House SA. To honour Nelson Mandela Day, the two joined forces on a special tribute track titled:

Elster ft. The Godfathers of Deep House SA – "Free At Last"

The original version, crafted by Elster, leaned into electronic dance music — an emotive, energetic celebration of freedom. But then came an idea from Mr. Masia:

"This is already powerful. But what if we gave it that timeless, nostalgic deep house feel — something rooted in our spirit?"



Within just two days, the two transformed the EDM anthem into a soulful deep house rendition that features a stirring excerpt from Nelson Mandela's famous Freedom Speech. The result is more than a song — it's a sonic statement.

"It's not just music," Elster explains.
"It's memory. It's a legacy. It's
everything we fight for, packaged in
one emotional experience."

With layered textures, haunting pads, and a speech that moved nations, "Free At Last" now lives on as both a dance floor anthem and a historical reminder.

BLANKA MAZIMELA Interview Q&A

Your musical journey began with strong influences from your father, brother, and mentor Ryan Murgatroyd. How did each of them shape your approach to music production and performance?



Each of them left a distinct imprint on my musical DNA. My father introduced me to

music in its purest form—he was a connoisseur of music and had a huge collection of music. My favourite part was our holiday trips from Cape Town to the Eastern Cape.

My brother was the one who introduced me to house music - he collected compilations and would play them for me. And Ryan Murgatroyd? He refined my music production technical ability and challenged me to think beyond trends. He taught me to see music as a language—one that needed to speak deeply and honestly.



You've developed a signature sound that blends organic African elements with electronic textures—how do you achieve that balance, and what inspires your process?



The balance comes from intuition and heritage. I'm deeply connected to the

Eastern Cape—it's in my blood, my rhythm, and my soul. I'll often start with a feeling or story that's rooted in home, something ancestral.

From there, I layer organic instruments, vocals, or chants, then contrast them with synths or electronic textures that add movement and depth. Nature inspires me a lot—wind, earth, distant drums... I try to make every track feel like a journey between the spiritual and the modern.

You perform both DJ and live sets. What's the difference in preparation and delivery between the two, and how do you connect with your audience in each setting?

A live set is far more vulnerable. I'm often performing unreleased or

reworked music, triggering loops, playing keys, working with vocalists—it's an evolving performance this is how we created the Bantwanas Showcase.

DJing, on the other hand, is more about curating a mood. With DJ sets, I'm reading the room and responding moment by moment. Both are intimate, but the live set feels like I'm opening a diary; the DJ set is more like guiding a dancefloor through different emotional landscapes.

You're a core member of the Bantwanas collective, which has earned acclaim for its unique live electronic sound. How did you get involved, and how has the project influenced your creative direction?



Bantwanas came from a shared desire to create

something that was proudly African but globally resonant.

I started it with a vision to merge live vocals, instrumentation, and deep electronic grooves. The collaborative nature of Bantwanas opened me up creatively. Working with vocalists and musicians from different backgrounds challenged me to think differently about structure, space, and story. It's made me a better listener and more intentional in my production.

Your collaboration with Crazy White Boy on 'Inthombi' was a standout moment. How did that partnership come about, and what was the energy like in the studio?



'Inthombi' was a beautiful collision of styles. I've known Kosta and Ryan from Crazy

White Boy for years—we respect each other's craft, and when the opportunity came up to collaborate, it felt organic. They were working on the Ghetto Tech album, and I happened to be working on 'Inthombi', in Ryan's words, 'It was the perfect song to close the album'. In the studio, the energy was electric—lots of laughs, no egos, just pure creation. We wanted to make something that honoured our shared roots but still felt fresh and hypnotic. 'Inthombi' was the result—a track that resonated deeply with people.

You've recently launched a mix series that's gaining traction. What inspired it, and how do you curate the journey for your listeners?




Homelands mix series was born out of a need to tell stories—stories about where

I come from, who I am, and how that informs the music I play.

I listen to 500 songs on average weekly, and people are not exposed to all the music we listen to as DJs, so the sole purpose is to educate and expose the masses to as much music as I possibly can as Blanka.

Each mix is curated like a pilgrimage, starting from a place of grounding (the intro's) and building toward transcendence. I don't just select tracks based on BPM or genre—I select based on emotional resonance, texture, and how the tracks speak to each other. It's about connection more than curation.



sound With new music set to drop this year, what themes or emotions are you exploring in your upcoming releases?

This year, I'm diving deeper into themes of forgiveness, ancestral memory, and identity. Tracks like

'Shumayela' explore spiritual vulnerabilitywhat it means to be loved by something greater than yourself.

Others draw from dreams I've had or stories passed down from elders. I'm leaning into slower tempos, more silence between the notes, and embracing rawness over perfection. It's emotional, but always rooted in rhythm. I'm writing what I like.

sound You've mentioned being 'well tested' in all kinds of performance environments. Which gig has been the most memorable for you, and what made it special?

There have been many, but the Cercle Festival in France with Bantwanas stands out. Performing live in front of thousands, knowing the world was

watching, and still feeling completely present—it was surreal.

But also, the Meidum Festival in 2023 was powerful. There was something intimate about it—like everyone in the crowd understood the message without me having to say a word. Those moments remind me why I do this.





SET THE TONEWhy Every DJ Needs Goals

There's something beautifully unstructured about being a DJ. You follow the music, read the crowd, and trust your instinct. But when it comes to building a lasting career, one truth quietly rises above the bassline: **goals matter**.

At first glance, goal-setting might sound stiff or corporate—like something more at home in a business plan than behind the decks.

It's not about limiting your creativity. It's about creating direction and purpose in a world that moves fast, where gigs, trends, and opportunities come and go in a flash.



But in reality,

setting goals is one of the most powerful tools you can use to take control of your DJ journey.

Why Set Goals as a DJ?

Being a DJ today means more than just mixing great sets. It means navigating a changing industry, growing your personal brand, producing music, connecting with your audience, and staying mentally grounded—all at once. That can be overwhelming, even for the most passionate artist.

Goals offer something solid to stand on.

They help you:

- Stay focused when you're pulled in a hundred directions.
- Track your progress so you can see how far you've come.
- Stay motivated through the quiet seasons.
- Balance creativity with structure, making space for both.

Imagine two DJs. One takes gigs as they come, posts on social media when they remember, and hopes something big happens. The other sets small weekly goals, reviews progress monthly, and builds slowly but intentionally. Who do you think will still be DJing five years from now?

Keep It Simple, Keep It Real

Setting goals doesn't mean writing a 10-page plan. It means starting small and being honest with yourself.

Write your goals down. Put them

somewhere visible. You're more likely to stick with something when you can see it, track it, and remind yourself why it matters.

That could be:

- Practicing three times a week
- Posting one mix per month
- Contacting one promoter every two weeks
- Learning a new piece of gear by the end of the month

Make Your Goals Work for You

There are many ways to approach goal-setting. Here are a few that work well for DJs:

2. Habit-Based Goals:

Sometimes it's not about outcomes but the process. Instead of saying, "I want to land a residency," focus on building the habits that lead there—consistent practice, relationship-building, and showing up.

4. Vision Boards or

Visualization:

If you're more visual, make it real. Print pictures of clubs you want to play, DJs you admire, or setups you dream of. Keep the dream in sight.

1. SMART Goals:

Keep your goals Specific,
Measurable, Achievable,
Relevant, and Time-bound.
Instead of saying, "I want to DJ
more," try:
"I will post one new mix every
month for the next three
months and promote it on my

Long-Term Goals:

Break your path into stages:

- Short-term: Weekly or monthly goals that build momentum
- Medium-term: Six-month targets (like getting regular bookings)
- Long-term: Big dreams (like touring or producing original tracks)

5. Accountability Goals:

Tell a fellow DJ or mentor what you're aiming for. Check in once a month. It's harder to back out of goals when someone's rooting for you—and expecting results.



Stay Inspired, Not Pressured

It's easy to fall into comparison—especially with social media showing highlight reels from every corner of the world. But your journey is your own. Progress isn't always loud or fast. Sometimes it's a quiet commitment. A late-night mix. A "no" to something that doesn't align. A "yes" to something that scares you.

wnen you eel stuck.

overwhelmed, or unsure, go back to your goals.
Revisit your "why." Adjust when life shifts. Rest when needed. But always return to the rhythm that keeps you going.





You're Not Just Playing Tracks— You're Building a Life

Being a DJ is about expression. Connection. Freedom. But it's also about resilience, clarity, and strategy. Your talent brought you here. Your goals will take you further.

So go ahead—dream big, write it down, take that next step. Build a foundation your creativity can stand on. One day, you'll look back and realise every mix, every message, every small goal brought you closer to the life you imagined.

Your future doesn't arrive by chance. It shows up because you set the tone.



STREAMING THOW DJ Livestreams Changed the Game —and What's Next

In 2010, Pioneer DJ launched something that, at the time, felt almost odd: filming DJs spinning on a radio show. Back then, streaming a DJ set wasn't normal. YouTube had a 10-minute limit, podcasts were just emerging, and people still asked, "Why film someone playing other people's music?"

But the **DJsounds Show**, a collaboration with Ibiza Sonica Radio, had a hunch: people don't just want to hear the music—they want to see the magic happen.

That simple instinct led to a decadelong project that would coincide with one of the biggest shifts in DJ culture: the rise of the DJ stream.

Fast-forward to 2025, and streams are everywhere. From the polished productions of **Boiler Room** to the intimate vibe of **My Analog Journal**, and from the breathtaking views of **Cercle** to the gritty underground feel of **HÖR Berlin**, the livestream has become not only a performance platform—but a cultural phenomenon. What started in a humble radio studio has evolved into a cornerstone of modern DJ life.

From DIY to Global Stage

The early days of streaming had a DIY charm. Boiler Room began in—literally—a boiler room in Dalston, London. With a webcam taped to the wall, DJs played for a small online audience. Fast-forward just a year, and Boiler Room was a global brand broadcasting Thom Yorke and Theo Parrish to the world.

Other platforms followed: DJ Mag, Mixmag, Beatport Live. Each one brought their own flavor.

Mixmag's Lab grew from office mixes to a global series. DJ Mag added prograde sound and cameras. Cercle redefined the art by filming DJs in the Pyramids of Giza, castles, hot-air balloons—you name it.

Meanwhile, DJs themselves evolved

Sets became storytelling sessions.
Artists began preparing like
producers: planning months in
advance, mixing live like studio
recordings, and using the stream as a

Nobody knows exactly. But the road ahead looks wild.


Think:


- AI-powered visuals
