See art under the sea in <u>Cyprus</u>

Wearing a snorkel and flippers to an art exhibition feels a little OTT. But you'll need both to see British artist Jason deCaires Taylor's new underwater sculpture park, MUSAN, in Cyprus. All 93 sculptures sit on the sea floor 200m from the coastline of Ayia Napa, where they attract marine life. "The ocean is the most incredible exhibition space," says deCaires Taylor. "It has amazing lighting effects that change by the hour, explosions of sand and a procession of unique visitors." We meet Sasha Maslov, the photographer who travelled through Ukraine to shoot the country's railroad ladies – the signal controllers who look like they've come from a bygone era

W

hen photographer Sasha Maslov was a child in the 1990s, travelling through Ukraine on a train always meant adventure. "When we would go to Crimea, the

Carpathian Mountains or to visit relatives, we would travel on overnight sleeper trains," he says. "I loved spending my time staring out the windows, and I was mesmerised by the little houses that were just sitting - often surrounded by nothing but the fields - along the railroad tracks. They were magical to me."

These buildings are railroad crossing offices – pretty pastel-hued buildings that housed the traffic controllers of Ukraine's railroads. And, unusually, this job still exists today. All over the world, as similarly traditional, manual jobs die out, in Ukraine the railroad traffic controller has proved themselves to be indispensable. "In a storm, it's often hard to see the lighthouse," says Sasha. "Ukraine's railroad workers are a kind of lighthouse: a symbol of how certain things in this country stand firm in the present as a defiant nod to the past. Unfazed by the passing of trains and time, they are here to stay." Even more unusually? About 80% of these workers are women. "I think it's a hangover from the Soviet era," he says – when the profession was considered a feminine role because it wasn't particularly physical.

From the 1970s right up until today, Ukraine's national railway company, Ukrzaliznytsia, has long been one of the largest and most prestigious employers in the country. But the trains and service have seen vast changes since the sleeper wagons with glass tea holders chugged along the tracks in the Soviet era. The trains today are modern and fussfree. Conductors also play the role of onboard waiter. And they travel a lot faster.

But the level crossings spread all across Ukraine have stayed the same, and that's why there is still the need for the traffic controller. This captured Sasha's imagination, and he spent two years travelling up and down the country's railroads to photograph these female railroad workers. He wanted to explore exactly why this job still exists in the 21st century. And to shine a light on the people who live in the candy-

coloured buildings that are rarely given a second thought by train travellers as they zip past.

The Ukrainian railroad controller's job is simple. As a train pulls in, they hold up their flag or lantern to alert the train's conductor to conditions on the track, while keeping an eye on any activity – pedestrians and drivers – nearby, before sending the train on its way. But much of this can be automated these days, so why has the role survived?

"Interestingly, a lot of their functions *can* be done automatically, and many *are* done automatically," Sasha says. "For example, years ago they would have closed the barriers themselves, but that is now done remotely. So, their main function now is as a watcher – sometimes people try to run in front of the train or try to drive around the barrier if no-one is watching. The railroad controllers maintain safety at the crossing area and make sure things run smoothly. Besides that? They tend to the houses themselves, decorate them, work on gardens around the houses, keep the area tidy." These workers spend 12-hour shifts in their track-side homes. That's why you'll see houseplants and flowers, lace tablecloths and curtains, plus framed posters transforming what is essentially a small office building into a cosy home.

But the real threat to this job may not be technological, but gradual extinction. Workers tend to spend their whole lives employed by Ukrzaliznytsia, often staying in the same role. Which means the position of signal controller is seen as an older or middle-aged person's job by younger Ukrainians – and not something they want for themselves. Luckily, Sasha doesn't think the job will disappear anytime soon. "The railroads have already modernised a lot of intersections, but in my opinion the busiest ones will still have controllers for some time," he says. 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"Standing alone, totally naked, I wonder what to do now"

Would you strip off on a night out? Our writer ditches her clothes and tries out nude clubbing in the French capital

t's midnight on a Friday. I'm hovering nervously outside the doors of a Parisian nightclub, about to get completely naked at a nudist club night. Yes, that's right. Naked. In a nightclub. Oh, and it was my idea. Although now I'm scanning my brain for reasons to head back to the comfort of my hotel. The bouncer pulls open the doors to Le Klub and, inhaling deeply, I go in.

To be clear, I'm not walking into some sort of salacious party. Tonight's event, Beautiful Skin, is about de-eroticising the naked body. The organisers insist: "Behaviour of a sexual nature is strictly prohibited," and pin signs inside the club to remind people to be respectful.

"It's absurd to think being naked instantly has sexual connotations," event co-founder Jérémie Lapeyre tells me when we chat the day before Beautiful Skin. "The philosophy of naturism is to reconnect with yourself and get rid of social barriers by not wearing clothes. No human body is perfect, but we are all beautiful."

After spending months in lockdown, I am well and truly ready to reconnect with everything, from myself to dance floors and bar queues. I'm going to let it all hang loose – literally. And I'm not alone.

"Before COVID-19, a lot of people saw nudist parties as taboo or intimidating. But now we're getting a lot of first-timers," says Jérémie. "We've all lacked human contact and people are thinking: 'Okay, now I want to do things I haven't done before. I want to live more freely'."

I was curious to know how nudity and clubs would gel, with flowing alcohol and nightlife's tendency to attract sleazebags from the shadows. "The vibe is really sweet," Jérémie reassures me. "It's a very inclusive event – everyone feels vulnerable so they're kinder to each other, and by the end it feels like a big Care Bear party!"

According to Jérémie, early events have had a majority of male attendees, but he's hoping to strike a gender balance. "We're trying to make the night even more all-encompassing and welcoming, which is why most of the staff are women and many of the DJs are female and trans," he says. "Women tell us they've never felt so safe at a party. That's what we want."

Jérémie and Beautiful Skin co-creator Julien Claudé-Pénégry count themselves among the estimated 2.7 million people in France for whom social nudity is part of their lifestyle. In recent years Paris has embraced 'urban naturism' – a movement that reframes the classic image of naturism from rustic meadow-frolicking and skinny-dipping to a year-round, all-environments practice.

Parisian park Bois de Vincennes now has a designated nudist zone in summer, and the city's nudist association organises activities such as



bowling, swimming and yoga. Now, nudist clubbing has been placed firmly on the list.

I descend a wide staircase and undress in a curved seating area in the belly of the club, next to a dance floor that's filling up with bare bodies gyrating under a rainbow glow of spinning disco lights. The ceilings are low and the air is hot with nervous energy. My clothes stuffed into a black bin bag, I make my way to the cloakroom. My eyes dart around; I'm so incredibly aware that everyone is naked. Except for compulsory shoes and socks, that is (and, in my case, a rule-bending bumbag).

I hand my clothes to the cloakroom attendant, who loops a neon band around my wrist. "No going back now," she says, with a warm smile. She's right. Standing alone, totally starkers, I wonder what to do. While the public nudity feels alien, the nightclub setting is familiar, so I head to the bar. Sipping on my beer, I privately toast myself for getting this far. It's not long before I realise I'm holding myself differently, with more poise and confidence. I feel stronger with every second and can sense myself relaxing.

In the spirit of the night, I boogie over to a body painting station in a brightly lit nook and grab a brush. The woman next to me has manufactured for herself what can only be described as a bodycon dress in a radioactive shade of green paint. I go slightly more subtle, sloshing yellow swirls across my stomach. It feels ice cold on my skin, but this is fun. Moments later I'm daubing orange stripes onto a stranger's back as he wriggles and yelps. He introduces himself as Yann, a naturist from Paris. This event is everything to him, he says. "We normally get banished to the countryside," he laughs. "It's so nice to find a naturist party with great DJs in the city!"

I walk along a narrow corridor to another room. Beyoncé's *Run the World (Girls)* is pounding and bodies of all shapes and sizes are bouncing to the beat. I lose count of all the smiles and thumbsup gestures that fly at me like gifts from friendly strangers. In a normal nightclub this would be weird. But there's a shift here: an unspoken connection between us all. It feels refreshing, and I can see how much of our body hang-ups are just in our own heads.

I wade through the crowd to congratulate Jérémie, just as he finishes a DJ set as his alter ego Loki Starfish. He's really pulled off something special. "People seem really happy to have this safe space to reconnect with themselves and others," he says. I couldn't agree more – the feel-good vibes are through the roof. I notice some even have tears in their eyes. "Dancing and being joyful again together is so powerful," he adds.

It's 4am when I call it a night. I step out onto the street feeling like I've accomplished something deeply personal. I feel fuzzy inside, just like a Care Bear. I've spent a lot of lockdown shimmying around my apartment in the buff but it's just not the same as publicly throwing shapes stark naked. "Dancing and connection is a human need," says Jérémie. Then, laughing, he adds: "It's good to be back."

Norwegian musician Terje Isungset is the brains behind a very unusual music festival, where everything – from the instruments to the venue – is made of ice

he sound of ice changed Terje Isungset's life. Back in 1999, the jazz drummer and composer was going through an experimental period, working with alternative elements in his music, like Arctic birch, granite and slate, when he wondered what frozen music would sound like.

"It was like falling in love," he says of the first time he improvised with ice instruments. "The sound of ice is unique. It's surprisingly warm and gentle... so beautiful and so different from all the instruments I had ever tried."

It was a sound that set Terje on the road to becoming the world's first ice musician. Twenty years on and he is the undisputed leader of the unusual genre, performing more than 50 ice concerts worldwide each year and, since 2006, organising the Ice Music Festival, held every February – originally in his hometown of Geilo, before moving to Finse and now Bergsjøstølen in Ål, Hallingdal. "The festival came from the realisation that there must be so many options for creating something new with ice and snow," Terje recalls. "I wanted to share ice music with as many people as possible, to get a lot of creative people together to see what we could do."

It is, however, "much harder" to stage an ice music festival than a regular festival, he says. Especially when everything from instruments to the chairs that ticket holders sit on are essentially ice sculptures that could potentially melt at any point.

Preparations start early in January, when Terje and his team begin harvesting snow and ice. In the two

weeks before the festival opens, they have 15 people working "day and night" to build the main venue.

The latest Ice Music Festival will also feature several igloo venues, each of which will act as a hyper-intimate musical experience for just a single musician and audience member. "It'll be like going into someone's house for a concert," Terje explains.

Apart from the venues, there are all the instruments to make. The musicians arrive about a week ahead of the festival to work with instrument makers. Some – wind players, for example – will have to have new ones every time they practice or perform, as their breath melts the sculpture, "changing the sound of the music as it's playing".

As the organiser, it's Terje's job to coordinate everything that's being built,

but also to persuade artists to take a chance on his frozen vision. "I need to find those people who are willing to take on this challenge, stay out in the cold, and make fantastic music," he says.

Some artists take a lot of convincing, even after they arrive at the festival. "Once we had some people from Guatemala who had never seen snow," Terje says. "They were frightened to get out of the car."

There are also always challenges to do with weather, which must be cold enough for the build and

London's Icebox will craft anything from a life-sized car to a life-like cat from ice – but they also host workshops if you'd like a go yourself. **theicebox.com** performances. Rain is the real enemy. In recent years there have been particular issues due to climate change, prompting the move higher up into the mountains to Bergsjøstølen, where it's colder. To limit the risk of melting the venues, only 500 guests can now attend.

This reliance on good, cold weather seems to have kept Terje grounded. After 16 years as a successful entrepreneur in live music, he remains humble, describing his role like that of a custodian rather than an innovator.

"Nature is generous to let us borrow the ice for some weeks. At the end we give everything back," he explains. "Humans have to realise that nature is always the boss."

Despite describing what he does as "99% hard work", Terje has no plans to ever give up. Apart from the Ice Festival,

he performs at festivals from Oslo to Munich, and in 2021 gave a series of indoor concerts with the help of Saami and Inuit singers, bringing 'Arctic Ice Music' to the UK for the first time. He sees it as his ongoing mission to bring the life-changing sound of ice to as many people as possible. "It's not about earning a lot of money," he says. "It's about developing something new. 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Looking for an escape from reality? Abu Dhabi has reinvented itself as the ultimate eco adventure destination

bu Dhabi is no stranger to ambition. From its cloud-grazing skyscrapers to its sprawling mega malls, the UAE's capital is a city where everything is

bigger, better and taller. But now it has its sights set on a more surprising goal – becoming greener. Since work started on urban development Masdar City in 2008, the government has been ploughing money into other eco-friendly initiatives, from the creation of new green spaces in the city, to promoting sustainability in its luxury hotels.

Meanwhile, it's also supporting projects that encourage both locals and visitors to get out of the built-up environment and into a natural one, whether that's hiking or glamping in Jebel Hafit Desert Park, which was opened to showcase the beauty of the emirate's highest peak in the lush garden city of Al Ain, or kayaking a network of once-private marine sites just opened to the public. With the arrival of a clutch of environmentally-friendly resorts - including Abu Dhabi's first eco-retreat earlier this vear - this coastal city sandwiched between the Arabian Gulf and the Arabian Desert is fast becoming one of the world's hottest eco-destinations. Ready to lace up those hiking boots and get exploring? Here are the locations to visit.

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GET YOUR GAME ON

You don't need to travel to Africa for a safari experience. If you want to get up close and personal with gazelles, giraffes and the once-endangered Arabian oryx, hop on board an open-air 4X4 for a game drive across the desert island of Sir Bani Yas. A 25-minute flight or three-hour drive from Abu Dhabi, this paradise in the Arabian Gulf was once the private retreat of late UAE founder Sheikh Zayed bin Sultan Al Nahyan. He launched a conservation programme to breed and relocate endangered species here – including the Arabian oryx. As a result, more than 10,000 oryx have since been released into the wild with 500 roaming freely on the island's Arabian Wildlife Park.

The reserve is also home to some 17,000 other curious animals, including sand gazelles, blackbuck antelope and barbary sheep. If you're a horse rider, head to the stables of Anantara's Desert Island Resort & Spa for a chance to gallop along the island's beaches and dunes on the back of an Arabian horse, a breed ridden by the Bedouins for centuries. It's an unforgettable wildlife adventure.



OUT OF THIS WORLD

Take a trip along the Al Ain Truck Road and you'll find yourself doing a double take. Yes, you are still on planet Earth, even though the otherworldly desert landscape of spiralling sand towers and ridged ledges suggests otherwise. These ancient fossil dunes, which film buffs may recognise from Star Wars: The Force Awakens, are unique natural formations of sand, sediment and salt crystals, shaped by the wind. As the weather changes, so do the dunes, meaning there's always something different to see in this windswept alien art gallery. Also, pay a visit to the nearby Al Wathba Wetland Reserve where you'll find an equally cinematic sight – around 4,000 flamingos in the middle of a desert. Once a coastal salt flat, it was one of the first natural reserves to be established in Abu Dhabi and its collection of man-made and natural lakes are home to more than 250 species of birds and a wide range of aquatic life.

JUST ADD WATER

Take a short walk from the buzz of Abu Dhabi city centre and you'll find Jubail Mangrove Park. This serene spot opened last year to promote the important ecological value of mangroves – shrubs or trees that grow in saltwater and play an important role in supporting biodiversity, protecting the coastline and helping tackle climate change.

Take a stroll along 2km of wooden boardwalks that snake through one million square metres of verdant coastal forest and you'll be able to spot turtles, herons and other animal and marine life going about their business. Various viewing platforms and hides offer a peaceful place to switch off and observe. Or. for a different take, why not join one of the kayaking tours that run through the park? Pura -Abu Dhabi's first eco retreat - is a 10-minute buggy ride from the park. Stay in one of the well-appointed glamping pods and you can enjoy afternoon tea in the company of flamingos or eat grilled fish beneath the stars at its beach restaurant.





PALM SPRINGS

Step back in time to a green space that has fed and shaded inhabitants of Al Ain for thousands of years. Spread over 1,200 hectares in the heart of the city, the Al Ain Oasis is home to the ancient *falaj* irrigation system that has long supplied water to the many farms within the oasis - home to 150,000 date palms of 100 varieties, as well as crops and fruit trees like mango, orange, banana and fig. The country's first UNESCO World Heritage Site, an interactive visitor centre was added in 2016 (highlighting the measures being taken to preserve the oasis), along with a network of palm-shaded paths that allow visitors to explore this tranguil spot. Enter via the West Gate (off Sultan Bin Zayed the First Street) for a free map of the plantations, or to hire a bike. If that sounds like too much effort you can also arrange buggy tours of the oasis.


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SANDS OF TIME

You can lie in bed and gaze up at dawn breaking over Abu Dhabi's magnificent Jebel Hafit mountain when you stay in a luxury dome - or better still, one of five bubble tents that have popped up in the Desert Park at its base. The inflatable structures feature transparent roofs that offer unrivalled views of a stunning landscape that counts among the UNESCO World Heritage Sites within the city of Al Ain. Explore the extensive natural cave network that winds beneath the mountain or take a guided hike to learn more about the area's riches, which include 5,000-year-old Bronze Age beehive tombs, a diverse collection of bats, snakes and lizards and some of the UAE's rarest plants. As night falls, catch up with your fellow travellers around the campfire or check out the stars through your tent's telescope before retiring to the pod's luxurious four-poster bed - well, this is the UAE, after all.

We'll cross the road or even jump off the bus a mile before our stop to avoid socalled pleasant chit-chat with a stranger. Unless that stranger has a wagging tail, that is. Because when it comes to dogs, we'll all stop whatever we're doing and cheerfully bleet 'who's a good boy then?' in a baby voice over and over until we're blue in the face.

Londoners can barely go for a casual stroll in the capital without tripping over an extendable lead, getting muddy paw prints on our skinny jeans or a friendly wet nose nudging a ball in your direction. And we love it. So, it didn't surprise anyone when it was revealed that when it comes to caring for canines, London is the best. Yes, the capital was crowned Europe's most pet-friendly city by the experts at *money.co.uk* at the start of 2021.

And a brand-new book backs this up. According to *Dog-Friendly London (Hoxton Mini Press, £17.95)* there are 3,000 parks in London – that's 3,000

secluded squares, wild marshes, glorious royal grounds and more where hounds can sniff, snooze in the sun or chase squirrels. You can choose from well-known green spaces such as Greenwich Park (get that perfect picture by posing with your pooch at the Royal Observatory on the Meridian line) and 350-acre Hyde Park (where the Household Cavalry horses prance about on their morning exercise on Rotten Row). Lesser-known locations include the eerie Abney Park Cemetery in Stoke Newington (with 2,500 plants and trees to nose around) and wild flower-filled Peckham Rye Common, where you're as likely to catch an impromptu steel band performance as a sports match.

With more than 240 dog groomers, and 172 doggy day-care options, life is good for dogs and their owners in London. Our furry friends are welcome on the Underground, buses, trams and trains. And that's not a given in every city. In New York, for example, you have to carry your dog on the subway (good luck with *that* if you have a Great Dane...).

In *Dog Friendly London* we meet some of London's most devoted dog owners. James Knappett and Sandia Chang are the co-founders of Kitchen Table, a Michelin-starred restaurant in Fitzrovia's Charlotte Street. They found running a restaurant can be all-consuming, but having a dog has helped the pair find balance. "It's been a lifesaver for us," says Sandia. "Our whole life revolved around the restaurant, so getting a dog gave us an excuse to talk about something else or forced us to take 10 Libreria in Spitalfields is a digital-free space, meaning you can dive into a book (and reconnect with your pooch)

222 Drink coffee like an Italian

With 20-odd different types, you don't just go for 'a coffee' in Italy. Here's what to order and, crucially, when.

Buongiorno! The best way to start your day is with a **cappuccino** - equal parts espresso and steamed milk.



Caffè macchiato (espresso with a tiny dash of milk) is the only milky coffee acceptable past 11am.

Caffeine and booze? Hit us up. A **caffè corretto** (espresso and a glug of alcohol, usually grappa) is the perfect nightcap.





For a pure shot of liquid energy, an espresso is all you need. A ritual after every meal.



You *can* order **caffè americano** (watered down espresso) in Italy, but no self-respecting tourist should.



An **affogato** (strong espresso topped with ice-cream) is every coffee-lover's dream dessert.

If you go down to the woods today, you're sure of a big surprise. Especially if you're in Copenhagen, where giant trolls made of recycled scrap wood have kick-started a new eco trend 121



hat do you think is the most wonderfully weird thing you're likely to find in your nearest forest? A humongous fungus? A twisted, fairy tale-like tree? A dinosaurshaped rock? A trail of breadcrumbs leading to a sugar-covered house...? Well, just maybe something supernatural or beyond the realms of possibility *is* lurking there without you knowing: an army of massive trolls in unexpectedly everyday poses.

If you do come across these gentle giants, don't panic. They are the creations of Danish recycling artist Thomas Dambo, who works from a self-built studio outside Copenhagen in the town of Roskilde. He's one of the world's leading recycle-art activists, and though these distinctive fairy-tale sculptures may sound like gimmicks, they are actually the forefront of a brand-new sustainability trend.

Many environmentally active artists seek inspiration from life and nature, but Thomas has made a point of tapping into his country's past and, in particular, its love of storytelling and Norse folklore. As the home of Hans Christian Andersen, the writer of The Little Mermaid. The Snow Queen. The Ugly Duckling and Thumbelina, Denmark calls itself the country of fairy and folk tales. and this is evident in film. literature and the country's deep-rooted storytelling tradition. And when you're out and about exploring turreted castles, palaces and swan-filled parklands, it's not hard to picture sprightly gnomes, princesses and ogres lurking somewhere in the dramatic landscape.

It's also not a stretch to imagine you've slipped into the pages of a fairy tale when first setting eyes upon one of Thomas's extraordinary giants. They stand tall – up to 6.5m – and gaze down at you with oversized eyes and a kind of benevolent look, with lips poised as if to say: "Don't worry, I'm not going to eat you."

Over the past seven years, Thomas has expanded from his workshop to create more

than 80 colossal wooden trolls and hide them in out-of-the-way locations. So, as well as tucked away in the Danish countryside, his trolls can now be spotted in Belgium, Germany, China and a host of spots in the USA. Some are hidden under bridges or deep in forests, and the only clue they are even there at all is an online troll-hunt map to help you on your way and to inspire a child-like imagination.

For an eco-campaigner like Thomas, this global presence sends a refreshing message that rubbish doesn't have to be negative. Indeed, by turning trash into trolls, the artist has set out to highlight environmental issues and encourage people to explore their own surroundings along the way. Or, as he tells me when I visit him in Copenhagen: "I'm driven to turn something unwanted and vilified into something beautiful."

But for Thomas, the project is deeply personal, and his interest in folkloric characters was first sparked as a child. The artist has created a personal history for each troll, and even wrote a 160-page book about all his characters and the stories that connect them. His newest sculptures have recently appeared in undisclosed locations in Italy and France, with his most recent already a personal favourite because it carries a treehouse backpack that children can climb into.

"This is such a fun project, but it's more important to put out the message that it's easy to recycle trash and scrap wood and make something magical," Thomas says. "Then it's about reminding people where they come from and helping them rediscover and reconnect with nature in their own way.

"That's why the trolls are hidden and you have to find them - to explore and open all your senses to the green spaces around you is part of the project."

For me, it was a bright sunlit morning when I first set off through a sun-dappled forest to seek out Little Tilde, one of Thomas's most famous woodland creations. It is hidden in Vallensbæk Marsh nature reserve, a little-known green lung outside Copenhagen. It really is like stepping into a scene from a Brothers Grimm book, as the forest congregates into oak thickets

I first followed a trail around the interconnected lakeside until the shoreline surrendered to the heart of the forest. I began scanning the trees for an oversized body, a comical face, or a protruding nose. Above, wood pigeons circled, a wind whipped through the trees – but there was no sign of a wooden noggin or ugly character playing peekaboo.

Then, a stroke of luck. Out of nowhere a family came scarpering down a trail that twisted its way out of the woods and a silent nod between us confirmed they too were here to see Little Tilde.

Beyond the forest's shadow lines, I could just about see what I'd come for. At the end of the pathway stood the sculpture, hunched and peering out through the forest and across the mirror-calm water. Hauntingly beautiful, she was made of recycled scrap wood and – on closer inspection – fitted with secret birdhouses for songbirds to seek shelter during Denmark's icy winter. Few things feel as odd as taking a smartphone picture with a colossal troll lurching over your shoulder, but I promised Thomas I'd come back with proof.

This was my first troll encounter, but my journey didn't end there. Over two days, while burrowing deeper into Copenhagen's suburbs, I sought out others. There was Hilltop Trine, who reclines on a hillock in Hvidovre and where you can crawl into the palms of her hands. And Green George, hidden in the heart of downtown Copenhagen and built with trashed wood reclaimed from Oslo's garbage disposal unit. And, lastly, Suttetrolden Sanka, hidden in a children's playground in Denmark's capital and described by Thomas as "the happiest troll in the world". Troll hunting, I found, was strangely addictive.

For the sustainably conscious visitor, there are dozens of others to look for in Denmark and beyond. Forest paths can be followed. Branches picked through. Bridges looked under. Rocky shorelines and tiny islands explored. Only then are the giant trolls ready to return to their shadow homes and secret places, to wait to be found all over again. *Find Thomas Dambo's trolls in Denmark and beyond at* **trollmap.com thomasdambo.com**

The beating heart

Ennis Ćehić goes in search of emblems – and a sense of belonging – on a personal and historical journey through his home country, Bosnia and Herzegovina

W MITH

rance is Paris, the Eiffel Tower, cheese and the Louvre. The UK is Big Ben, red phone boxes and even Sherlock Holmes. The Statue of Liberty, Capitol Hill and McDonald's represents the USA. But, it's harder to think of the icons of lesser-known places. And some cities or nations are not associated with great accomplishments, architecture or art, but with incidents of misfortune. Say Chernobyl, for example, and you inevitably think of the 1986 nuclear disaster.

And for many, mentioning Bosnia and Herzegovina still conjures up images of war, despite it being a place with great natural beauty and a long, rich history. It's high time, then, to change the narrative – to seek out natural and historical icons and shine a light on everything that's good about the country. It's time to create new metonyms, things that better represent my homeland. With that in mind, I recently spent over a month travelling through Bosnia and Herzegovina exploring the places and symbols that make this heart-shaped land of the Balkans so extraordinary.

Down by the river

Let's start with Vrelo Bosne, a public park just outside Ilidža that's home to numerous springs of the Bosna River. The best way to get to this natural wonder is by tram from Sarajevo's Old Town. It takes 45 minutes to get there, and the tram passes, like all traffic, down the main thoroughfare of the



city. Most of the trams are old, with windows free of advertising placards, providing the perfect opportunity to take in the expanse of the capital. As you get further away from the tightly built-up city centre, more of the distant, steep *mahalas* (neighbourhoods) become visible and are there to enjoy without the towering socialist buildings that usually block the view.

The tram's final destination is Ilidža. From there, catch a taxi to the foothills of Mount Igman, where you'll find Vrelo Bosne. Here the Bosna River veins itself through small wooden bridges, swan ponds, tiny creeks and waterfalls before it broadens, becoming the longest watercourse of the country, flowing like a purposeful artery. the Ottomans that first turned this area into a settlement. With an abundance of mineral and thermal waters, they built spas and hammams, naming it Ilica, meaning thermal bath in Turkish.

For Bosnians, there's an almost obsessive association with this place. The River Bosna is the namesake of the country; it's Bosnia's purest metonym. So, reminiscent of a pilgrim's journey, Bosnians descend upon Vrelo Bosne. Here, the young and the old stroll meditatively before they continue through the park to the grand promenade that takes them past the famous, stately villas of Ilidža. In summer and spring, when they see the water ripple and shimmer, a kind of collective synergy occurs - they begin a ritual I have seen many times. They kneel down and dip their hands into the water. First, they splash it around their hands to feel the iciness. Then they rub the cold water over their necks, and their faces.

Bosnia is divided by seven rivers in total, and all of them gush around the land like slithering winds. But in summer, all across the country, their banks portray a different kind of image of Bosnia. Men and women



lie, sunbaking on its shorelines, chit-chatting leisurely. Children and teenagers jump off make-shift rafts and boards, plunging laughing into the emerald waters.

It's the same sight everywhere – from the clay banks of the Vrbas River in Banja Luka, to the stone-huddled banks of the Neretva River in Konjic. But for me, this spectacle is most enchanting on the Una River in the north. In a town called Bosanska Otoka, there's a small landmass, a kind of island that the locals call Ada. Accessible

only by raft, the island rests between low waterfalls and streams of the Una that runs serenely around it. It epitomises the Bosnian summer bliss. Every time I'm here I wonder: if I hadn't left my village just 35 minutes away as a child, would I have been here every summer, soaking up the view?

Divine beautv

In the small town of Blagaj, just outside Mostar, the early 16th-century Dervish Tekke (monastery) rests against the edge of a cave on the Buna River. It's an ancient landmark, but to me it's a new metonym of Bosnia.

Built by the Sufi people only a few decades after Bosnia came under Ottoman rule, this elegant lodge served as a holy place for Islamic teaching, philosophy and learning - and almost all of it has been preserved. As you descend down the stairs of the main lodge and come under the opening of the terrace that overlooks the pristine water, you'll see a marble plaque

with a phrase from the Holy Quran: "And we have made from water every living thing."

I remember the first time I stared at this inscription, and it left me contemplative for the rest of the day. It's a poetic remark but it felt like a symbol of gratitude to Bosnia's relationship with water. Like many others that have trodden here over the years, the Sufis were mesmerised by its beauty – and especially its rivers.

The hills are alive

As the capital, Sarajevo draws many tourists - but this is also partly due to its welldocumented siege. They want to see the valley where Serbs held the city hostage for four years from 1992-1996, and the Sarajevo Tunnel where food, water and aid was smuggled into the city. They want to take the Siege and War tours and snap countless photos beside the Sarajevo Roses. It's a strand of dark tourism; and while it ensures that the siege isn't forgotten, this can draw the visitors' attention away from Sarajevo's remarkable progress, its process of healing and re-inventing itself.

But most of all, it takes away from the city's spontaneous urbanism; the mahalas that climb up the valley Sarajevo sits in. Their steep and narrow streets that ascend up the slopes of the surrounding hills are like some sort of living, architectural creatures. To me, to see Sarajevo at its greatest, a stroll through the mahalas of Mejtaš, Kovači, Ciglane or Bistrik will give you an unrivalled perspective.

Concrete castles

The Bosnian War took place immediately following the fall of communism. It was an era of transience – of not only a century, but of a millennium drawing to a close, and vast changes occurring in Europe and the rest of the world. Today, there's a tendency to look back at this era with renewed

enthusiasm. From fashion to literature, art and photography, politics and policies, the '90s prompt a reflective idealisation. Bosnia today still bears, albeit lightly, the presence of this nostalgia.

This curiosity has led to the rediscovery of Yugoslavia's Spomeniks. Scattered across every former Yugoslav country, they are abstract, Brutalist monuments, erected between the 1950s and the 1980s as memorials to the Second World War. In 1948, when Yugoslavia broke away from Stalin and the USSR and established a socialist society outside of the Soviet Bloc, Spomeniks were intended to convey this modern, progressive socialism – and to commemorate the victories and sacrifices of the Yugoslav people.

Today, they are largely recognised for their aesthetics, without much understanding of the historical and ideological context that inspired them. Two in particular stand out to me – The Battle of Sutjeska Memorial Monument in Tjentište and the Monument to the Revolution (Spomenik Slobode) in Mrakovica at the Kozara National Park.

Bosnia has always confounded me over the years – the further it distanced itself from me, the greater my curiosity grew. Distilling the country into a single representative image is impossible.

Bosnia is the pristine mountains and swimming banks next to crystal-clear rivers, the sculptural architectural monuments and timeless Balkan villages, the folkloric mahalas and ancient, stonehuddled Ottoman-era towns, and an incorrigible optimism despite centuries of suffering and oppression. It's all these things that make it so exceptional. *Read more in New Metonyms: Bosnia and Herzegovina (newmetonyms.com,* €29) out now

See the work of Italian master Caravaggio this winter

Don't miss this new exhibition at Warsaw's Royal Castle

Michelangelo Merisi, better known as Caravaggio, never ceases to enthral. One of the most innovative Baroque Italian artists and a paintbrush genius, he implemented his own distinctive way of controlling the light, based on sharp contrasts. It's little wonder he had so many followers in the late 16th and early 17th centuries. The new generation of painters inspired by him were called Caravaggionists, and you can see an exhibition of his - and their - work, *The Time of Caravaggio in the Collection of* *Roberto Longhi,* until 10 February 2022 at the Royal Castle in Warsaw.

There are 40 pieces on display, but the central artwork is by Caravaggio himself: *A Boy Bitten by a Lizard* (1596-1597). The canvas shows a young man who, while reaching for fruit, is bitten by a small reptile hidden between them. An unusual expression of pain and surprise appears on the boy's face, symbolising a loss of innocence and realisation of the duality of a world in which pleasure is inevitably met with suffering. **zamek-krolewski.pl**

The ARTIST Bucharest

There's a revolution going on inside Romania's kitchens, and the team that kick-started the trend is at The ARTIST. Run by husband and wife Paul and Mihaela Oppenkamp, this restaurant set inside a 19th-century villa serves up the most eclectic fine-dining food in the capital. Meissl & Schadn Vienna

We're not sure it's possible to visit Vienna without trying schnitzel. For the most authentic in the city, visit Meissl & Schadn, a light-filled space with chandeliers and tiled floors where the finest golden fried veal is created according to a traditional recipe, and served with a potato salad. **meisslundschadn.at**



Five March Glasgow

Yes, yes, it seems like almost every other restaurant extols the delights of small sharing plates these days. But do they do them quite as well as Glasgow's Five March? The menu at this buzzy restaurant, just a hop, skip and jump from Kelvingrove Park, has an undeniable touch of Ottolenghi influence with its Mediterraneaninspired dishes, but with locally sourced ingredients and a splash of Scottish swagger.

Case in point? A burnt cucumber, watermelon and burrata salad is given a real kick with an apple hot sauce. The bowl of mussels and chorizo is cooked in cider, and a simple salad of artichoke and hazelnut is topped with capers and a truffle mustard. Things have gone so well at Five March that they've

Rooms Hotel Kazbegi Georgia

A former Soviet sanatorium might not sound like somewhere you want to spend the night, but stick with us for a moment here. Rooms Hotel Kazbegi in Stepantsminda, Georgia is actually a luxurious labyrinthine Bond villain-style lair surrounded by the snow-capped Caucasus peaks. And the brutalist, geometric architecture belies the comfort and creative flair inside.

All 155 rooms come with a view – mountain or forest – and are designed in a chic-yet-rustic style (we're talking wooden floors, low-slung lighting, delightfully battered leather chairs and kitsch vintage poster artwork). Creativity extends to the food and beverage options too, with dishes at the restaurant a playful twist on classic Georgian fare. And you'll struggle to stop at just one of the killer cocktails. But our favourite spot? The expansive heated pool surrounded by a glass-panelled wall that offers unforgettable mountain vistas. Bliss.





H15 Boutique Hotel Warsaw

Set inside a spectacular neoclassical building, H15 manages to celebrate historical character and add an injection of fun, thanks to bold design elements such as the pop-culture art by Rita Zimmermann in each room. The sumptuous green-and-pink restaurant is where the city's elite like to while away an evening, so pull up a chair, order the dumplings and try to fit in.



The Barö

<u>Helsinki</u>

Hidden away on an archipelago in Finland, The Barö is a celebration of sustainable living. The hotel's 12 jet-black pine log cabins are set in gloriously rustic surroundings, while electricity is created from solar panels, there's a bio-waste facility and water comes from a well. From here you can explore the local islands – by canoe during the summer or skating over the ice in winter.

What does it take to become a pilot? We talk to two former cadets about the Wizz Air Pilot Academy



ho wouldn't want to be a pilot? Your office comes with extraordinary views, it's exciting and glamorous - and you get to have breakfast in one country, and then lunch in another. But being a pilot is demanding, with hundreds of passengers putting their trust in you to get them safely to their destination, whatever the day might throw at you.

So, what does it take to be that person in the flight deck with the wings on their uniform? For Senior First Officer Krzysztof Jurga, originally from Poznan, it all started when he was a child. "Ever since I can remember, I've always wanted to fly a plane," he says. "I liked the idea of being an astronaut, but decided on pilot as I knew there would be more flying involved with a plane rather than a shuttle!"

Krzysztof took his first flight aged 17 in a small Cessna, and flying quickly became his hobby. That's all he thought it would ever be until, in 2018, he found out Wizz Air was recruiting for new pilots in his home city of Warsaw. After going through a three- to four-month application process, Krzysztof found himself one of the very first cadets at the new Wizz Air Pilot Academy. "I quit my job, stopped my studies and headed to the academy in Nyíregyháza, near Debrecen in Hungary," he recalls.

Krzysztof was here for 15 months, covering the cost of the first five months of training himself. Then, a Wizz Air captain assessed the progress of the cadets. "He evaluated us and if we passed, Wizz Air gave us a loan for the rest of the training."

Becoming a pilot is costly, but Wizz Air's investment in the Wizz Air Pilot Academy means almost anyone can fulfil their dream of flying a plane, regardless of their means. Krzysztof graduated in 2019, and after type rating (obtaining a license to fly certain types of planes) and Airbus training, was soon soaring above the clouds in a Wizz Air aircraft.

Aleksandra Kachamakova started her journey at the Wizz Air Pilot Academy's other campus, in Kavala, Greece. Inevitably she encountered some turbulence over the past two years – Aleksandra was due to finish in October 2020, but COVID-19 meant that everything was delayed by nine months. But not even a global pandemic could stop her becoming a pilot.

"My parents were both cabin crew, and from the moment I took my first flight aged three, I knew I just had to be in the air," she says.

Aleksandra worked as cabin crew for 11 years, but in 2018 started to think about becoming a pilot. "I just knew I loved flying, but I didn't think I could afford to be a pilot." After two years in Greece preparing for exams ("there are 14 major exams, but we had some form of test almost every week"), Aleksandra graduated from the Wizz Air Pilot Academy.

She now has her commercial pilot's license, and is finishing off her type rating so she can fly Airbus jets. Aleksandra hopes to be based in Milan by January, flying as a Wizz Air first officer.

Wizz Air is playing an important role in breaking down gender stereotypes by encouraging more women to step into the flight deck. "It's more of a male perceived job still," Aleksandra points out. "But it doesn't mean a woman can't do it. It's very demanding, but that has nothing to do with being a woman or a man."

What advice does she give to aspiring Wizz Air pilots? "First of all, make sure you have the passion and motivation as you'll need a lot of determination. And for the women – work hard, and don't listen to anyone saying that this is not a girl's job."

Krzysztof echoes Aleksandra's words. "You might have to sacrifice a lot – you will have to work hard, ask people to support you, get out of your comfort zone and move to a different country. But if it's your dream, it's worth any struggles and sacrifice. If you follow your passion and fulfil your dreams, you'll never feel like you're working ever again."

Please show consideration for fellow passengers and pay attention to the following information. Remember that by purchasing your Wizz Air ticket, you have accepted the Wizz Air General Conditions of Carriage (available in full at **wizzair.com**)

Safe handling of hand luggage

Ensure hand luggage remains safely stowed in the locker or under the seat in front of you for takeoff, landing, and at any time as instructed by the crew. Passengers seated in the emergency rows and first row must store their cabin bags in the overhead lockers. Take care when opening lockers, as falling items may injure fellow passengers.

In case of evacuation all baggage must be left on board and the instructions of the cabin crew must be strictly followed.

Safety equipment

It is an offence to tamper with or remove safety equipment, including adult and infant life vests, infant safety belts or extension belts. You are not allowed to remove or damage any onboard informative placards.

Sharp items

To dispose of any sharp items (e.g. hypodermic needles), please contact a cabin crew member. Do not leave your needle or syringe behind.

Turbulence management

Turbulence can occur unexpectedly. Whenever seatbelt signs are switched on, remain seated, keep seatbelts fastened, and stow away large electronic devices.

Safety of infants on board

Wizz Air has a clear procedure for infant (a child under two) restraint systems. You can only use the single hook infant seatbelt – vests/slings cannot be used with the infant seatbelt. Wizz Air only accepts aft-facing car seats when an extra seat is purchased. However, during take-off and landing, and whenever the seatbelt sign is switched on, infants should sit on an adult's lap with the seatbelt fastened. Life vests for infants are available and are provided whenever flying over water. All lavatories are equipped with a changing table. Do not leave children unattended in the cabin.

Lithium batteries

Portable electronic devices (PED) such as phones, laptops and tablets can contain lithium batteries. When damaged, faulty or overheated, these batteries can catch fire and explode. If you recognise any issues with your device, inform the cabin crew immediately. Charging electronic devices on board using a portable battery charger is forbidden.

Electronic devices

Some electronic devices can be used during the flight with WLAN/Wi-Fi/Bluetooth turned off.

Larger electronic devices that cannot be held comfortably in one hand, exceed ca. 1kg in weight and do not qualify as handheld devices (e.g. laptops, notebooks etc.) must be stowed in the overhead stowage compartments for takeoff, landing and whenever required by the cabin crew. If in doubt, please ask your cabin crew.

Inflight health tips

Read these tips on how to stay fit when travelling.

Before your air travel

Consult your doctor before travelling if you have any medical concerns. Pregnant women and those with heart or respiratory problems, blood diseases or ear, nose and sinus infections should seek medical advice before flying. Crew members are entitled to call for medical assistance pre-flight if they deem it necessary and are in doubt about your fitness for the flight.

Medical supplies on board

Keep any medication you may need in your hand luggage and in its original packaging. **Inform cabin crew of allergies or illnesses.** If you are seriously ill or travelling post-surgery, you will need a medical certificate confirming that you are fit to fly. If you have limited mobility, are hearing- or sight-impaired, pregnant, or unable to understand/react to safety instructions, you will be unable to sit in the emergency exit rows or the front row.

Nut allergy

During our WIZZ Café service we offer peanuts and some snacks containing peanuts/nuts traces. We strongly encourage those with allergies to take all necessary medical precautions before flying and inform the cabin crew during boarding about your allergy.

If you start to feel unwell during the flight, do not hesitate to talk to the cabin crew.

- Harass in any way fellow passengers and/or crew members (including sexual harassment)
- Threaten or be aggressive towards fellow passengers and/or crew members
- Be violent or behave in a hostile, erratic manner
- Damage the aircraft or onboard equipment
- Waste, pollute or contaminate the cabin in any way
- Endanger the safety of the flight by any means
- Consume alcohol that was not purchased on board. Alcohol is served at the crew's discretion to passengers of legal drinking age. The crew reserves the right to stop serving alcohol to any passenger who is, or appears to be, intoxicated
- Be under the influence of drugs or medical substances that may affect your behaviour or self-control
- Film or photograph the cabin crew without their permission

... or face the consequences:

• You are fully responsible and accountable for your behaviour. Unruly or disruptive behaviour on board and before boarding will not be tolerated and will be reported to the authorities. You will be held legally and financially responsible in all cases.

The following consequences* will occur for such misconduct:

- Denied boarding
- Penalty/fine or arrest by local police:
 - Smoking on board, including lavatory: up to €3,000*
 - Unruly behaviour due to intoxication: up to €5,000 and two years in prison*
 - Endangering the safety of an aircraft: up to five years in prison*
- Diversion of flight and arrest
- Reimbursement of cost of diversion: €10,000-€80,000*
- Criminal procedure and court litigation*
- Cancellation of all of your existing Wizz Air flight bookings
- A ban from Wizz Air flights in the future
