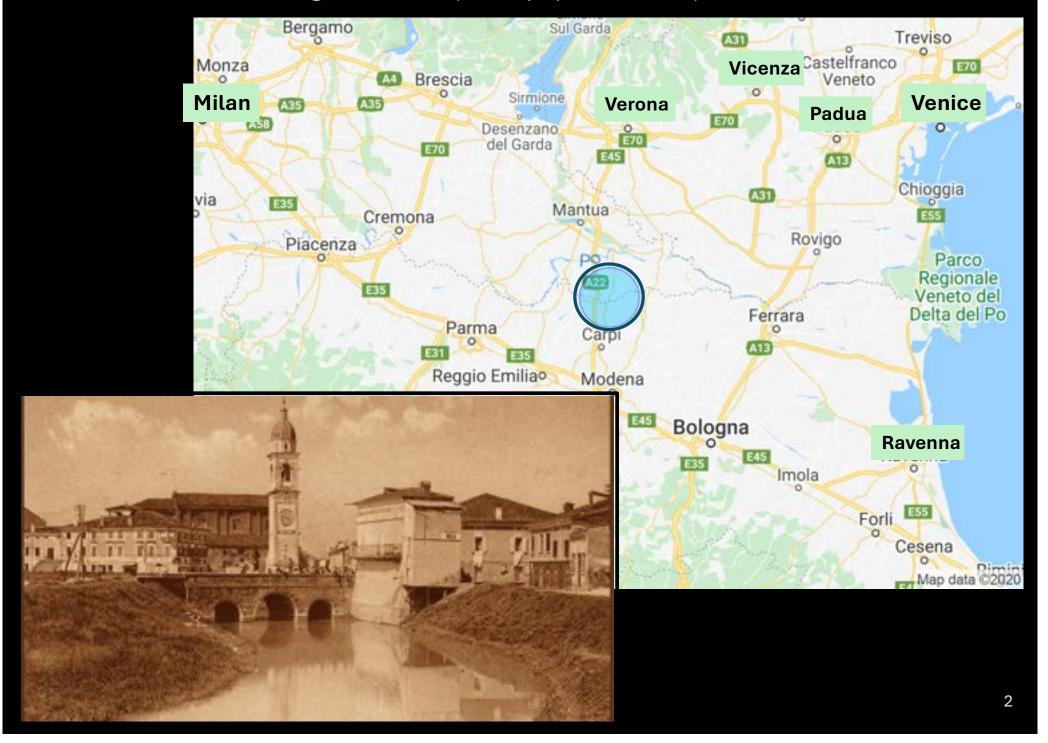

PLASTER CASTS

SCULPTURE: SUBTRACTIVE, involves carving, cutting, removal from a block

Product can be free-standing or RELIEF Marble: durable, light in color



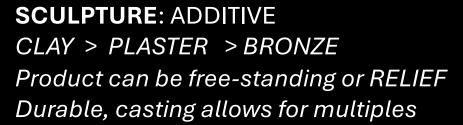


FRIEZE (horizontal band of figures in relief)

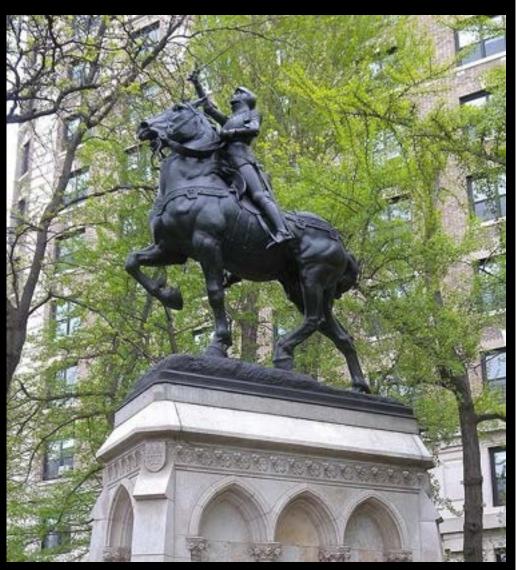

1895 • CONTEXT: Prevailing Sculptural Ethic — "Moral Earnestness"

- Demand for war commemorations
- Centennial Fair, 1876 > retrospection
- Popularity of Columbian Exposition, 1893
- Daniel Burnham's Plan for Chicago, 1909
- Attraction of Paris studios, Ecole des Beaux-Arts City Beautiful Movement, 1920s



1896 • TO AMERICA, seeking opportunity — EARLY WORK: Collaborations

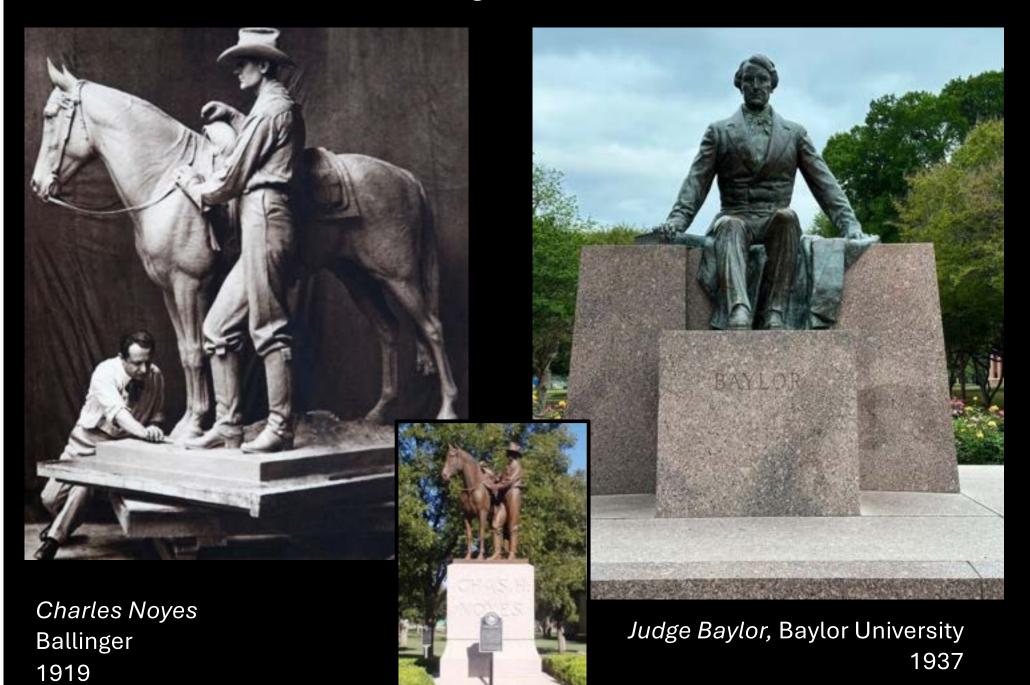

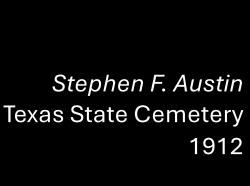

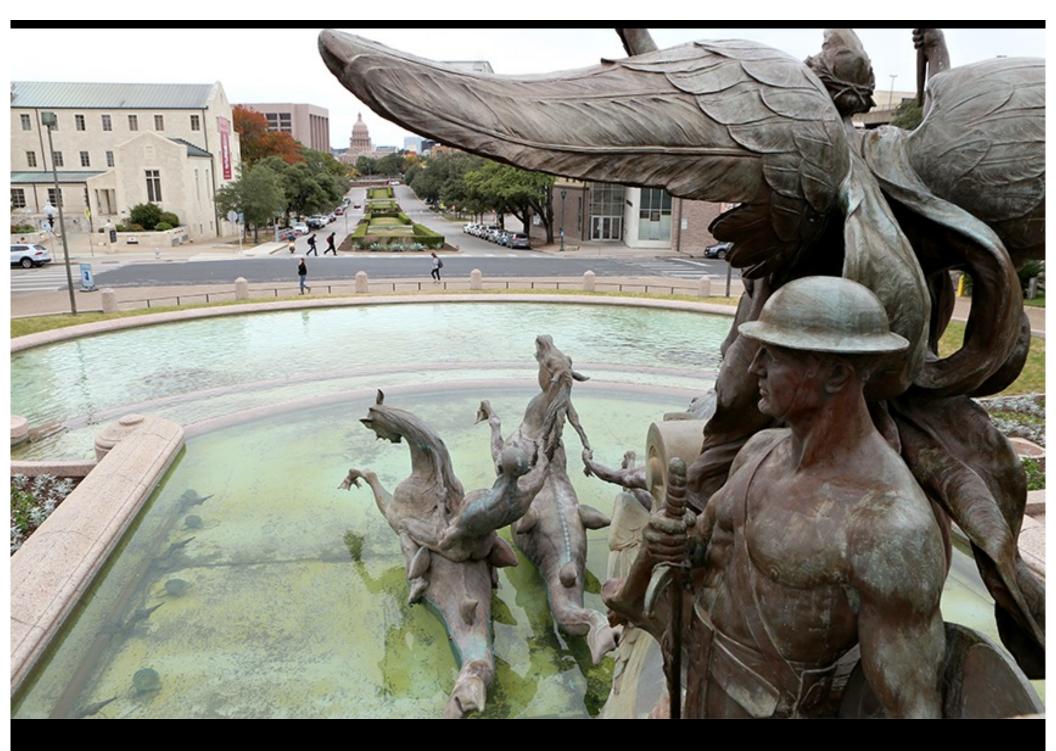

• Spirit of Sacrifice rising from funeral pyre (south face)

(Chapel faces west)

- Spirit of Texas
- Defenders: Bonham + Bowie (east face) and Travis + Crockett (west face)
 Coppini's vision of granite base + bronze figures > design altered by architects > marble
 Detested by J. Frank Dobie, who likened it to a "grain elevator"

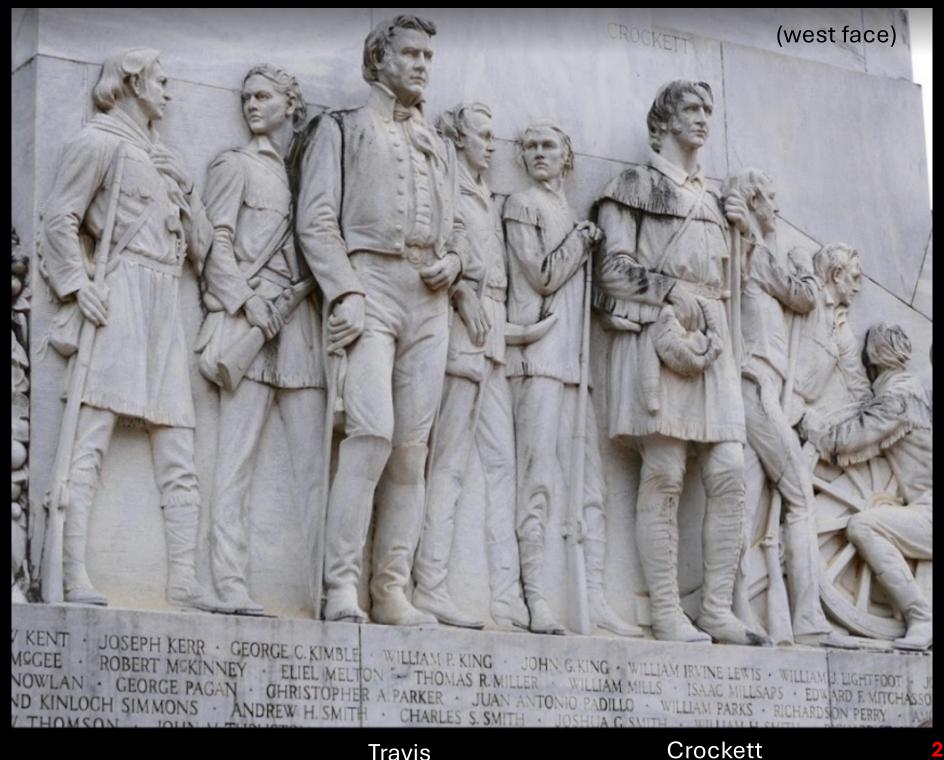

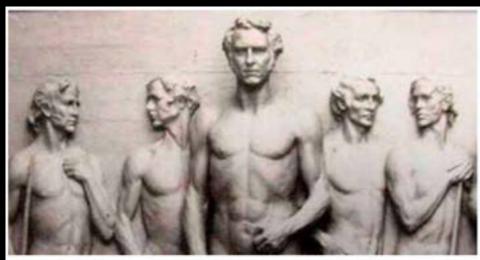

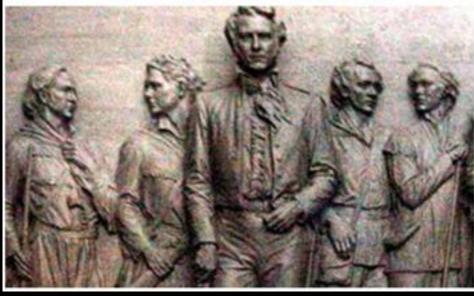

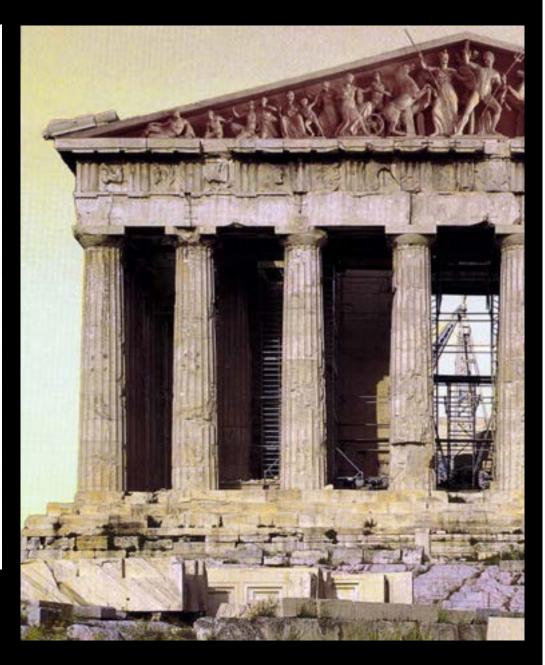

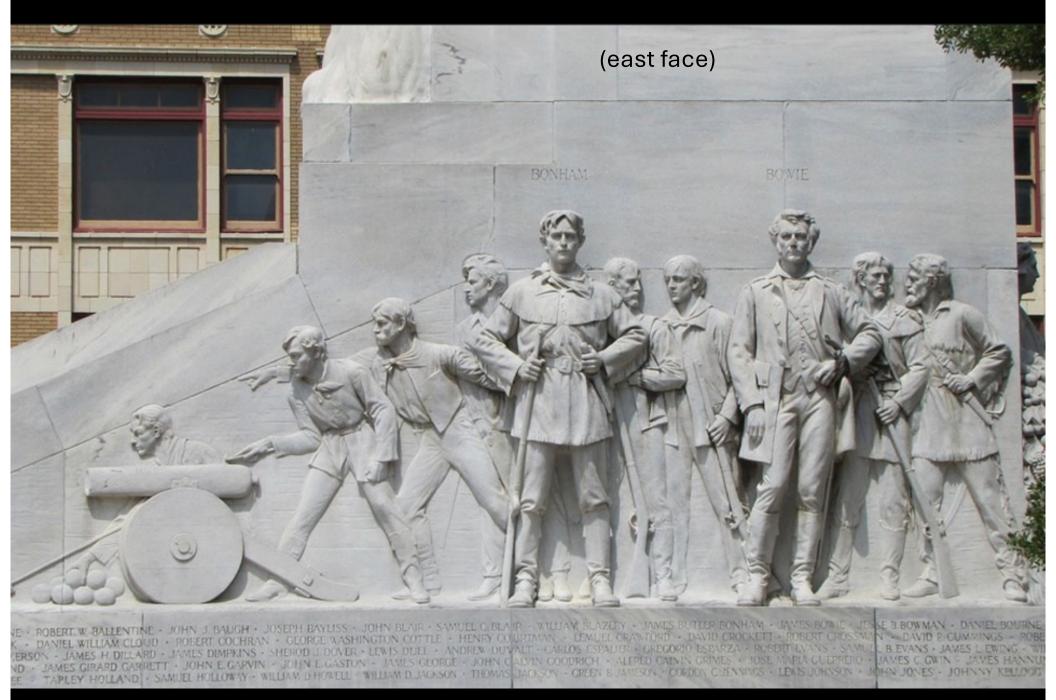




Academic process: Study figures in the nude first, clothe them later



Corner solutions: Phidias, *Parthenon*, 320 BC



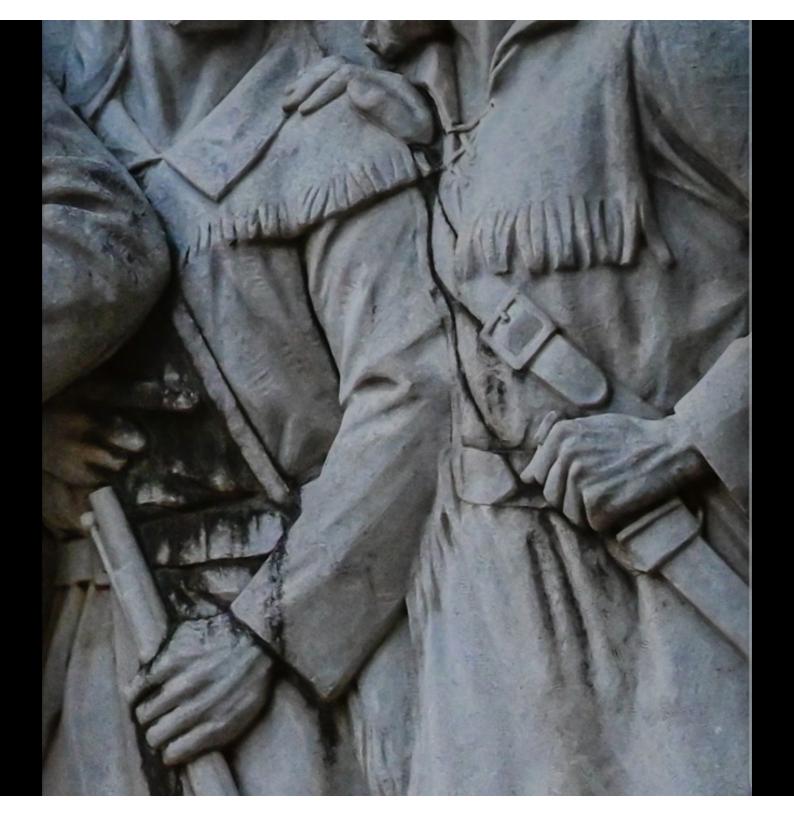

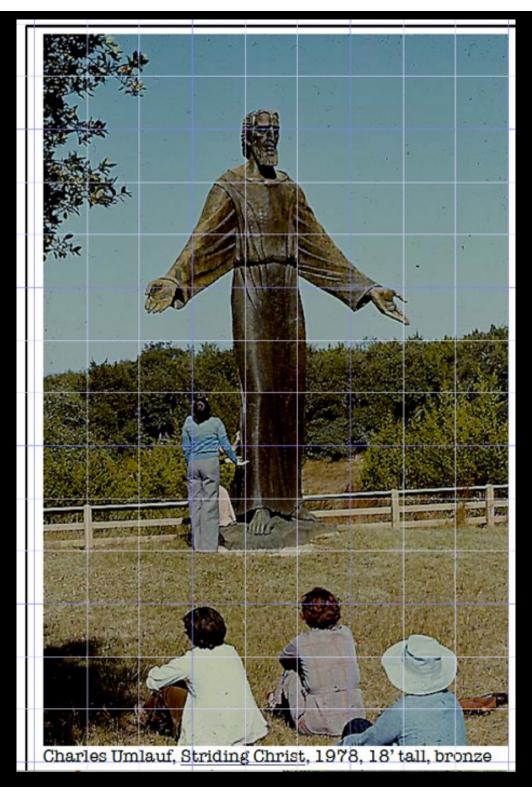

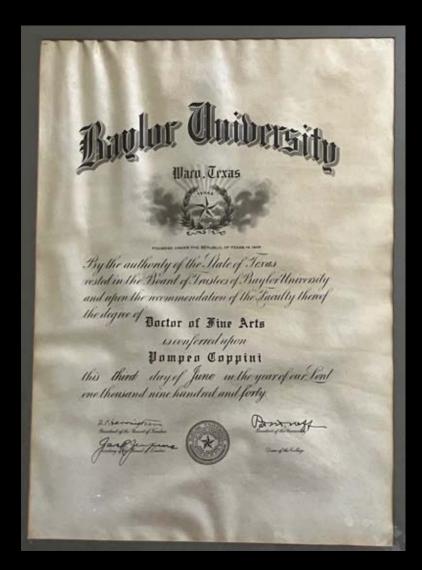
