

#### Thursday 25 January 2024

A new Cadel Evans Great Ocean Road Race (CEGORR) is coming to the Surf Coast region on Thursday 25 January 2024. The 156km Surf Coast Classic Men's Elite Race is part of the Cadel Evans weekend of world class cycling. A field of 100 pro-cyclists will start in Lorne at 11.00am and race to Torquay via inland roads with the support of Victoria Police.

Disruption to traffic will be minimal and the Great Ocean Road will remain open after a brief 15 minute hold between the Deans Marsh-Lorne Rd roundabout and the Lorne Visitor Information Centre carpark for the race start. See table below for summary.



## For The Love Of Maths And Science


Winchelsea Community can be very proud of the achievements of one of its young adult members, Jamie Phelps.

Jamie did all his primary schooling in Winchelsea. At the end of Year 6, he was accepted into the accelerated learning program at Belmont High School. He continued to excel at Belmont and his Year 12 results were outstanding to the point that he probably could have been accepted into any University Degree course. Alright, I admit it, I am a proud Grandfather but so that I could better understand the full ramifications of just what he had achieved, I asked him for an explanation. Here is what he told me:

#### MY SCHOOL CAREER

Beginning at our own Winchelsea Primary School, I continued to develop my interest and excellence in science and mathematics subjects throughout high school. This continued into Year 12 where I selected challenging maths/science subjects such as Specialist Mathematics, Mathematical Methods and Chemistry, as well as non-science subjects Indonesian and English Language. My performance throughout the year in these classes resulted in me placing in the top 3% of year 12 students nation-wide.

One of my favourite subjects, Systems Engineering, is a class where you are tasked to design and create a mechanical/ electronic system (or more simply, a robot).



I decided to create a Rubik's Cube solving robot. Throughout the year I faced many problems while creating the system, but through perseverance and hard work I overcame these problems and learn from the mistakes I was making. Once I had finally finished the project it could solve any Rubik's cube in under 60 seconds. After my final exams had finished, I returned to Winchelsea Primary School with my Rubik's cube solver to present the project as part of their Digital Technology class. The grade 4/5/6 students saw the system in action, as well as a peek at the electronics controlling the project and the algorithms used to help solve the Rubik's cube. The students then questioned me about many aspects of the development, creation and workings of the system. I was very impressed with the quality of their questions, a few of them I couldn't even answer!

Every year, the VCAA (Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority) hold a 'Top Designs' competition where the top projects or folios are selected for exhibition at the Melbourne Museum. Out of approximately 1000 students undertaking this subject, I was lucky enough to be selected as 1 of 8 projects selected for Top Designs. This means my project will be displayed in the Melbourne Museum beginning 22 March. I was very happy with this result – easily the highlight of all my Year 12 results.

This year I am continuing my journey developing my skills in robotics and science, as I have chosen to attend the University of Melbourne, selecting the Bachelor of Science course with a major in Mechatronics. I am very excited to begin my journey through university and to see where life will take me.

#### What's required?

- The tiny houses are to be on a wheeled trailer base and placed on privately-owned land, subject to an agreement with the host.
- An assessment criteria to be met, which includes legal compliance, environmental impacts, amenity, access, waste management, connection to services and utilities, and safety.
- If successful, applicants will be granted a Temporary Residence permit under the Community Amenity Local Law 2021.

### **WINCHELSEA PROJECTS UPDATE**

### Globe Theatre

Installation of new Australian chestnut timber flooring in the Globe Theatre is scheduled to start in early March, following removal of termite-damaged boards.



The entire hall floor is being replaced and work including sanding, installation of skirting boards and painting will be due for completion early in April.

Termite damage was discovered during inspection last year and subsequent work has included:

- Infestation investigation and treatment
- Floor removal
- Structural engineering inspection including overall flooring structure and footings
- Stump replacement.

Termite barrier treatment is scheduled for late February.

All work is being carried out in accordance with the building's heritage requirements.

The flooring installation start date has pushed out to March due to lengthy lead time securing



Australian chestnut boards, which are specified as required in the heritage permit.

Globe Theatre was built in 1926-27, providing a venue for local soprano Marjorie Lawrence to perform on her journey to international fame, and remains a much-loved community asset used for concerts, movie screenings, weddings, dances and shows.

### Eastern Reserve netball courts

Planning of reconstruction of two netball courts at Eastern Reserve is underway following Council allocation of funds.


A contractor has been appointed for the project, which will see full replacement of the existing cracked asphalt courts with more durable playing surfaces and more robust base pavements to help minimise damage from seasonal ground movement.

The project budget includes allowance for external construction supervision and advice from a Netball Victoria consultant.

### Barwon Water research projects win climate innovation awards

Two innovative climate change research projects undertaken by Barwon Water staff members were joint winners of the Water Minister's Climate Innovation Challenge (WMCIC) award.

The challenge aimed to identify and reward groundbreaking projects addressing climate change within the water sector.

Barwon Water was recognised for both 'Meta-analysis of low carbon cement alternatives for water industry applications', and 'Cellulose recovery from wastewater' research projects', which were declared joint winners of the award.

Barwon Water Managing Director Shaun Cumming said he was proud of employees Hayley Vinden and Emma McKinnon respectively for research that puts the organisation at the cutting edge of emissions reduction in the water sector.

"We are thrilled to be acknowledged in the Water Minister's Climate Innovation Challenge. "These victories underscore our commitment to pioneering sustainable solutions in the water industry and achieving zero net emissions by 2030."

'Meta-analysis of low carbon cement alternatives for water industry applications' was a collaboration between Yarra Valley Water, North East Water, and Barwon Water.

It focused on identifying greener alternatives to concrete, a major contributor to global carbon emissions.

Cement, which makes up a significant portion of concrete, generates approximately 8% of the world's carbon emissions.

The winning team, led by Lisa Ehrenfried (Yarra Valley Water), Hayley Vinden (Barwon Water), and Jill Fagan (North East Water), was awarded a \$30,000 grant to explore low-carbon cement alternatives and aims to create a blueprint for global implementation within the water industry.

The second award winning project, 'Cellulose recovery from wastewater', was led by Barwon Water's Emma McKinnon and received a \$20,000 grant. Ms McKinnon's project addresses the environmental impact of toilet paper consumption, a significant contributor to deforestation.

The Australian-first solution explored in the research extracts high-quality cellulose fibres from flushed toilet paper, recovering 82% to 98% of the cellulose content.

The versatile raw material has applications in civil engineering, construction, agriculture, chemicals, energy, and paper and cardboard production, promoting a circular economy and reducing environmental impact.

Notably, the project also offers a 20% reduction in energy consumption in wastewater treatment, a 10% increase in treatment plant capacity, and the potential to save at least one tree and prevent up to 2.5 tonnes of CO2 emissions for every tonne of cellulose upcycled from wastewater.

At Barwon Water's Black Rock Water reclamation plant, this equates to saving 7-8 trees a day and preventing 19 tonnes of carbon emissions.

### About the Water Minister's Climate Innovation Challenge

The Water Minister's Climate Innovation Challenge is an annual initiative aimed at recognising and rewarding innovative projects that address climate change within the Victorian water sector. In collaboration with Intelligent Water Networks and the Department of Energy, Environment, and Climate Action, the challenge encourages water corporations to contribute to the reduction of carbon emissions and the adoption of sustainable practices.

### Can you help by opening your farm to a trainee?

South-west Victorian farmers are being asked to open their gates to help train a new generation of farm workers.

South West TAFE Agriculture Teaching Education Manager Bec Toleman said students need access to animals and different types of farms to get the most out of their agricultural courses.

"We want to provide our students with the opportunity to observe, learn and participate in activities on farms to expand their knowledge," Ms Toleman said.

However, a dearth of options has led to an appeal to the industry for greater input.



"For the past few years, I've been using my own network of friends and contacts but we need to access animals and more farms for all of our ag courses," Mr Toleman said.

Ms Toleman said it was important that students see different types of farms, from family to corporate operations, organic, beef, sheep, dairy or produce.

Students need practical work and can help with on-farm jobs.

"We want our students to gain a wide variety of skills and an understanding of the different farming enterprises in the south-west region. If anyone has animals coming up to drenching, vaccination, if any sheep, beef or dairy farms are doing anything new and innovative that can benefit students," she said.

"It could be doing multispecies pastures, installing new equipment or helping with some fencing, we can come out and use their property to teach the students and also help get the jobs done on the farm."

Last year students helped to drench more than 450 sheep on one property and also watched vets preg testing animals.

"The more input we have from industry, the better it will be for trainees," Ms Toleman said. "If we open our doors to the farms, the farms are going to see the benefits and start signing up trainees.

"We want practical activities, not just coming out and watching but being able to do things that will help students gain knowledge and experience. We're not asking farmers to do the training; our teachers will be there; we just need properties and jobs where our students can get experience."

Access to farms would be once or twice a year and our students would be fully supervised by our experienced trainers.

South West TAFE is seeking host farms anywhere in the south-west, particularly the Hamilton, Colac and Glenormiston areas.

# Local artist Lauren Green selected to breathe life into the Winchelsea railway precinct



Local artist and resident Lauren Green has been selected to bring alive a 42-metre wall facing Winchelsea's railway reserve.

A colourful, vibrant mural will soon adorn the rear north-facing wall of Journey Early Learning Childcare Centre, thanks to the efforts of a Community Project Working Group, led by Growing Winchelsea.

In February, Lauren begins work at 63 Hesse Street, seeking to beautify the blank wall, add interest to one of Winchelsea's key visitor gateways and capture and celebrate what makes the town and district special.

"I am so passionate about improving spaces within our community and when I saw this opportunity pop up, I couldn't even contain my excitement," Lauren said.

"I am proudly Winch and I absolutely adore it for all it is. I have always noticed the lack of public art here though, for such a colourful and diverse community our infrastructure says differently.

"I paint murals for a living and to be able

to paint one in my hometown, on the back of the day care where my two boys attend is an absolute dream come true."

Cr Heather Wellington said Growing Winchelsea's Station Precinct Sub-Committee registered the proposal with Surf Coast Shire Council's Community Project Development Program last year.

"Council is helping progress the project, but this is largely community led. The work by Lauren is bright, colourful, and a perfect fit to bring creativity and fun to the space," Cr Wellington said.

Project working group lead and Growing Winchelsea member, Louise Hall, said they were happy to take a lead role in delivering the mural, including sourcing additional funding.

"This project involves the Lions Club, students and teachers from the local school, the Growing Winchelsea Station Precinct group and the childcare centre," Louise said.

"It is a great place-making project that has engaged a local artist with strong links to the town and location."

Lions Club of Winchelsea president Sam Inglis said the mural will brighten the precinct and town.

"We are really looking forward to the end result," Mr Inglis said.

"It's going to be a community asset, and something unique to the town. It also involves the next generation, as the school kids are participating in the production of the mural.

"The community involvement in this project really stood out. That's part of the Lions' charter. We are here to serve the community and that's why we are involved."

The mural is set to be completed by March 2024.



### Youth Cattle Camp revived for 2024

The Western District Youth Camp has been revived for 2024 to introduce a new generation of young people to the world of dairy cattle.

The camp at the Noorat Showgrounds from January 3-5 is the first since 2020 and is fully subscribed with 50 people aged 8-16 attending from Gippsland, Northern Victoria, South Australia as well as locally.

It is being supported by major sponsor DemoDAIRY Foundation.

Organising committee member Lucy Collins said the new-look camp had returned with a broader emphasis.

"Historically the camp had a strong focus on teaching children to show cattle but this year's event has been expanded into a more inclusive opportunity for young people to be exposed to cattle handling, care and husbandry," Ms Collins said.

"It's much more than just showing and there is a strong focus on farming careers." Traditionally there was a close affiliation with Holstein cattle but this year's event also includes Jerseys and other breeds.

Ms Collins said there was strong demand for the camp. "Unfortunately, we had to turn some people away, which is indicative of the appetite for learning about cattle and to have this type of experience with other young people," she said.

Most of the participants have some farming background but some are being introduced to agriculture for the first time.

"It's about connecting kids to other kids to share similar experiences and interests and also expose young people who haven't had the opportunity to experience the agricultural lifestyle," Ms Collins said.

The local organising committee includes formers participants in the camp. "They have benefited from the camps in the past and have now volunteered to share their experiences as group leaders."

Ms Collins said the organising committee was grateful for the contribution from major sponsors Demo DAIRY Foundation.

"The DemoDAIRY Foundation support has been an essential part of reinvigorating the event," she said.

### Council readies callers ahead of this year's Community Satisfaction Survey

Surf Coast Shire resident and non-resident ratepayers could receive a phone call this February, as part of Council's 2024 Community Satisfaction Survey (CSS).

- local infrastructure, facilities, services, and overall council direction.

Cr Rose Hodge said both resident and non-resident rate payers will be surveyed with the results serving as a barometer for Council's performance and delivery.

"The Surf Coast Shire Council opts into taking part in the survey each year so we can get an honest gage on community views," Cr Hodge said.

### Victoria's Cds Hits Over 100 Million Container Deposits

Victorians in every corner of the state have thrown their support behind the Allan Labor Government's Container Deposit Scheme – returning more than 100 million containers, and pocketing over \$10 million in refunds in just two months.

Minister for Environment Steve Dimopoulos marked the milestone today at the new Return-It depot at South Melbourne – one of around 400 convenient refund points across the state.

The CDS is breaking records every week, with a staggering 15.8 million containers collected in the week before Christmas and a record 17.1 million containers returned last week. The biggest day to date was Friday 5

January with 3.18 million containers returned.

The CDS is processing an average of around 10 million cans, cartons and bottles across the state every week, with Victorians returning an average of 129 containers per transaction.

Regional Victorians continue to step up to the challenge in impressive numbers, with Mildura leading the state in container returns having returned over 4.1 million containers. Shepparton rivals this turnout with more than 2.6 million containers collected, followed by Kangaroo Flat (more than 2.1 million) and Ballarat South (2 million).

Melton has been Melbourne's bestperforming refund point, having returned an astounding 3.9 million cans, glass and PET plastics, followed by the Hallam depot with more than 2.6 million.

Of all the containers returned since the scheme commenced, aluminium cans have been the most popular making up 53 percent of returns, followed by PET (26 percent), glass (18 percent).

Container returns continue to increase and Victoria's network of refund points will continue to grow to meet demand, making the scheme the most convenient and accessible in the country.

Victorians can choose to pocket the refund or donate their containers to one of the 1600 participating charities,

sports, community, environmental or educational groups.

Returned drink containers can be transformed into all kinds of new things, including material for roads, furniture, construction, textiles and more – creating new economic opportunities and will support more than 600 jobs across Victoria.

The Labor Government has invested \$515 million to transform the Victoria's waste and recycling system, helping us achieve our target of diverting 80 per cent of all material away from landfill by 2030.


