



Mastering Music & Technology

An Exclusive Interview with Michael Wilson-Trollip

Michael Wilson-Trollip is not just a musician

—he's a multi-instrumentalist, composer, and sound engineer who has worked on award-winning films, collaborated with South Africa's top artists, and embraced cutting-edge technology like Dolby Atmos.

In this exclusive interview with Proaudio MusicGear, Michael shares his journey from classical training to composing for Hollywood, the challenges of the South African music industry, and his vision for the future. Whether you're an aspiring musician, a film composer, or simply passionate about music, his insights into creativity, technology, and perseverance are a must-read.





Your Musical Journey

Proaudio MusicGear: You started playing music at a very young age and have mastered multiple instruments. What initially drew you to music, and how has your journey evolved over the years?

Michael Wilson-Trollip: I can't remember a time when music wasn't at my core. Even as a child. I would mimic playing the piano on the carpet at my preschool fortunately, my parents noticed and enrolled me in lessons. That small moment led to 12 years of classical training, eventually earning me a scholarship to Berklee College of Music, where I studied Film Scoring and Music Production. Like any journey, mine has had its highs and lows, but one lesson stands out: in this industry, you have to carve your own path—and never stop learning.

Composing for Film & TV

Proaudio MusicGear: You've worked on award-winning films and a top 10 Netflix movie. What's your process when composing for film? How do you capture the right emotion for a scene?

Michael Wilson-Trollip: My process varies depending on the project, but it always begins with understanding the story and the emotions that need to be conveyed. In a recent trailer I scored, the editor wanted to cut the visuals to my music rather than the other way around.

This meant I had to create my own 'film'—a compilation of images and inspiration clips—to compose to, which presented a unique challenge. Most of the time, though, I follow a more traditional approach. I start by watching the scene multiple times to absorb its pacing, mood, and emotional nuances. Then, I sit at my Nord, load up the Royal Grand patch, and let the piano guide the foundation of the score. From there, I build out the arrangement, layering textures and instrumentation that enhance the scene's impact while staying true to the director's vision. It's all about serving the story and making the audience feel something.

The Role of Technology

Proaudio MusicGear: As a Dolby Atmos Engineer and Nord SA/Sennheiser/Neumann artist, how has technology influenced the way you create and perform music?

Michael Wilson-Trollip: Technology is both a tool and a paradox in music creation. I've seen firsthand how technology expands the boundaries of sound, allowing for more immersive and precise storytelling. But at the same time, no piece of gear can define a performer—it can only shape the way they express themselves. The soul of the performance is never in the equipment; it's in the intention, the choices, and the connection with the listener. However, technology does have the power to alter identity.

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A musician using analogue synths versus a stage piano, or stereo versus spatial audio, becomes a different kind of storyteller—not because of the tools, but because those tools influence the way they think, compose, and interact with sound.

In that sense, technology is both liberating and defining. It does not create the artist, but it does shape the possibilities of their voice. So, I made it my mission to align myself with the 'tools' (technology) that define my voice—and that voice is nonexistent without my Nord.

Working with South Africa's Finest

Proaudio MusicGear: You've collaborated with top South African musicians, including SAMA winners and *The Voice SA* artists. What's been your most memorable collaboration so far, and why?

Michael Wilson-Trollip: This is such a tough question because I've truly enjoyed every collaboration—it's impossible to single out just one! But if I had to choose a standout moment this year, it would be opening for Robbie Williams with GoodLuck at the DHL Stadium. The energy of over 50,000 people erupting as the chorus dropped is an experience I'll never forget. Moments like that remind me why I do what I do.



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Challenges & Triumphs

Proaudio MusicGear: The music industry is tough, especially for session musicians and composers. What's the biggest challenge you've faced in your career, and how did you overcome it?

Michael Wilson-Trollip: I want to speak specifically about the South African industry because it presents a unique challenge. Here, to earn the trust of an artist, client, or director, you have to be more than just a composer or musician—you have to be a producer, mix engineer, mastering engineer, and, in the film world, sometimes even the entire music and sound department. It's like juggling a dozen balls while constantly looking for new ones to add.

The South African industry reminds me of a bonsai tree—intricately developed, rich with talent, yet carefully contained within a tight pot. The potential is enormous, but the space to grow is limited, forcing us to be adaptable, resourceful, and relentless in our craft. Ironically, it's this very challenge that has led me to opportunities I might never have had anywhere else in the world.

From working on nearly 500 episodes—over 10,000 minutes of music and editing—for a single TV show to performing at a biker rally for 2,000 roaring motorcycles, and even sampling a vuvuzela on a Nord Stage 4 to compose a fanfare for the Cape Town Mayor, my career has been anything but predictable. And honestly, I wouldn't change a thing.





Advice for Aspiring Musicians

Proaudio MusicGear: For young musicians who want to break into session work, composition, or sound design, what are the top three pieces of advice you'd give them?

Michael Wilson-Trollip: I know the idea of building a career in music can feel overwhelming right now, but I truly believe that if you give 110% to your craft, someone will notice. Talent is important, but passion, persistence, and professionalism are what set you apart. Here are my top three pieces of advice:

- 1. Go above and beyond. Be the person who delivers more than what's expected—whether that's in your playing, your attitude, or your work ethic. So many people do the bare minimum, but if you push just a little further, you'll stand out—like a Nord Stage 4 in the middle of a concert stage!
- 2. Don't chase perfection at the cost of progress. I know from experience how easy it is to get so fixated on making something perfect that you lose sight of the bigger picture. Excellence is important, but momentum is everything. Learn, improve, and keep moving forward.
- 3. Just start. If you can't see yourself doing anything other than music, take one step every day toward your goal. No matter how small, each step compounds over time. Your journey won't look like anyone else's, and that's the beauty of it.

What's Next?

Proaudio MusicGear: You've just signed a global publishing deal with Peermusic. What exciting projects are you currently working on, and what can we expect from you in 2025?

Michael Wilson-Trollip: I definitely want to keep composing for film and aim for bigger, more ambitious projects, while also expanding my presence in the advertising industry.

But this year, I'm also stepping into a completely new space—YouTube. The channel isn't up and running yet, but that's exactly why I need to do this. There's something powerful about starting from ground zero—about stepping into a space where there's no reputation, no expectations, just the work itself. It's easy to stay in your comfort zone when you've built something, but true growth comes from embracing the unknown.

I've held back from starting for a long time, partly out of fear—fear of not following through, of putting myself out there and not delivering. It's the same reason my social media has been so quiet; I've always believed in finishing the work first rather than hyping something that may never materialize.

But that is going to change—I'm writing it down and putting it out there. Hopefully, someone holds me accountable!



Jimmy Page

HIS TIMELESS GIBSON LEGACY









Early Life and Path to Fame

Jimmy Page, born on January 9, 1944, in Heston, England, is widely regarded as one of the greatest guitarists in rock history. His journey to stardom began in the early 1960s as a session musician, where he played on numerous records for artists like The Who, The Kinks, and Donovan. His exceptional talent and innovative playing style quickly made him one of the most sought-after session guitarists in the UK.

In 1966, Page joined The Yardbirds, initially as a bassist before transitioning to lead guitar. However, it was in 1968 when he formed the legendary band Led Zeppelin that his influence on rock music became truly monumental. With Robert Plant on vocals, John Paul Jones on bass and keyboards, and John Bonham on drums, Led Zeppelin pioneered hard rock and heavy metal, leaving an indelible mark on the music industry.



Musical Style and Technique

Jimmy Page's guitar playing is known for its versatility, blending blues, folk, rock, and psychedelic influences. His distinctive style incorporated rapid alternate picking, intricate fingerpicking, and dynamic riffing. Another iconic Gibson guitar in Page's arsenal was the Gibson EDS-1275 double-neck, which he famously used during live performances of "Stairway to Heaven." This allowed him to seamlessly transition between 12-string and 6-string sections of the song without switching instruments.

Ainsley Kisten is a talented multi-instrumentalist, music director, arranger, and producer with a deep

passion for music. Growing up as a pastor's child, he developed a strong musical foundation in church, which shaped his distinctive sound and approach. His style seamlessly blends gospel, classical, and jazz influences, honed through training with esteemed mentors, working alongside industry professionals, and using cutting-edge gear like Nord keyboards.

Background and Training

Ainsley's early experiences in church played a pivotal role in building his musical foundation. Being a pastor's kid, he was encouraged to learn multiple instruments, which taught him the importance of musical placement, teamwork, and creating a cohesive musical experience. This upbringing instilled in him a distinctive feel and a fresh perspective on music.

Ainsley's journey began at a young age, starting with drums at the age of five in 1998. When he turned six, his parents transitioned him to the piano due to a need for it in their church and community. This early start in various church meetings, conferences, and gatherings helped him hone his skills.



Studying under Bev Hoffmann introduced Ainsley to the world of classical music when he was just six years old. This guidance laid a solid foundation of music principles.

Later, his time at the Msunduzi Jazz Music Academy opened up an entirely new world of jazz, where he refined his skills under the mentorship of accomplished musicians like Vincent Mthethwa, Nhlanhla Mnikatha, and Mtobisi Mthlane. The fusion of his gospel, classical, and jazz background contributed significantly to his versatility as a musician, both in playing and arranging music.

Learning music theory through the ABRSM curriculum instilled a sense of discipline in Ainsley. He developed adaptability to different musical settings and situations, building grit by taking on challenging exams at a young age. This experience taught him hard work and endurance, qualities that he continues to apply in his professional career.

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Career and Industry Experiences

Working with Lucas Bok, a two-time Grammy and Emmy Award winner, had a transformative impact on Ainsley's career. In 2013, he gained exposure to the professional music industry, mixing with top musicians in the country and learning about various aspects of the music business, including performance, stage presence, attire, and extensive music tours.



Although initially challenging, this experience shaped him into the musician he is today. Starting as an auxiliary keys player, Ainsley eventually took on the role of music director, arranger, and producer for Lucas Bok and Africa in Praise, a significant honor and achievement in his career.

Ainsley believes that great collaboration is built on good musical chemistry, openness to different styles and perspectives, and a shared vision and set of goals. As a music director, he emphasizes the importance of strong leadership, understanding the objectives and requirements of different artists, attentive listening, organizational skills, and technical proficiency.



Gear and Nord Keyboards

Ainsley has been using Nord keyboards for 15 years. His admiration for Nord began in 2011 when he met his hero Buddy Strong, who was playing a Nord Stage EX. Inspired by the sound, Ainsley soon purchased his first Nord Electro 3, with the help of his brother Wayne Rengasamy. Since then, Nord has become a central part of his setup, as he appreciates its authentic sound and design, reminiscent of real pianos he grew up playing.

Ainsley's favorite features of Nord keyboards include the four assignable outputs that allow him to send different signals to the sound engineer for a clean mix, the stereo/mono option for sound control based on the venue, and the dual function that enables him to layer multiple synth, piano, and organ sounds.

He also values the USB integration with external keyboard patches and the ability to control reverb settings individually for each section. His current setup includes Nord Stage 2/3/4 and sometimes Nord Electro 3/5, depending on availability. He also uses other essential gear, such as the Big Sky Reverb pedal, Focusrite Clarett 8Pre audio interface, and a MacBook for auxiliary sounds when needed.

Projects and Industry Insights

Ainsley is currently involved in several projects, including developing a new production company in the Middle East to outsource musicians and artists for private events.





When arranging and composing for different artists or genres, Ainsley focuses on understanding the artist's vision and expectations. Once he grasps the desired outcome, he begins the production phase while staying true to the artist's sound and authenticity. He also ensures that the right team is in place to achieve the project's goals, while incorporating his musical touch.

He advises musicians looking to improve their arranging and production skills to network with experienced musicians, producers, and artists, understand their tools and strengths, seek feedback, experiment, practice consistently, and collaborate with others.





He is also handling arrangements and production for Lucas Bok's upcoming album, launching the African Music Development Initiative in 2025 to provide music training and studio facilities, and working on Jody Naidoo's 2026 Live DVD project. Additionally, he is part of a theater production with his U.S. team, set to tour Europe from May to December.
