

The Riley Tour of Tasmania 2023

Preliminary plans have commenced for the "Riley Tour of Tasmania 2023", hosted by the Victorian Club. On the Tour, we will travel, stay, and tour together as much as possible within the accommodation constraints of this small island.

Tasmania is a magic destination with something for everyone: Historic towns & buildings, scenic landscapes, gourmet foods, arts & culture, natural beauty and of course great touring roads.

Our time in Tasmania is 10 days plus two nights on board the Spirit of Tasmania ferry. The anticipated dates are Tuesday 14th to Saturday 25th March 2023. These dates avoid school holidays and Easter which is early April.

We will tour the eastern half of the state, from Devonport through the Central Highland to Hobart. Around Hobart, go west, south or east. Then up the east coast to the Swansea/Bicheno area. We then head inland and up to Launceston. Explore the Launceston area before returning to Devonport.





THREE TON TOURING

This '49 Riley Roadster was spared a fate worse than rust

LEGEND SAYS the 2.5 litre Riley Roadster was born on the back of a cigarette packet at a New York meeting soon after World War II. A North American World War II. A North American distributor convinced the Riley man he could shift a few roadsters based on the successful post-war Riley sedans. The story continues that the English Riley was good but soon fell sales victim to a copycat – the Jaguar KK120 which was prettier, faster and cheaper.

which was prettier, taster and cheaper.
So the Riley has its place, albeit small, in motoring folklore. And one of the 1949 roadsters has its place in the shed outside my place.
But the Riley was, and remains, a good car. Very much a stylish touring machine while never really a sports car. The English magazine. Autocar, after a deal of praise, said back in September, 1948: "One can readily visualise the car flying across. France, for example, at a 50-plus average,

or again between cities in South Africa or Australia, where 500-mile hops are commonplace. Laking in its stride the deteriorations of road surface by virtue of the excellent qualities of its torsion bar front suspension and long half-elliptic rear springs. Quite right they were, too.

The Riley's big 2.5 litre four produced a factory-claimed 100 bhp at 4500 rpm and through a well-spaced four-speed transmission, a claimed 100 mph.


Autocar's testers managed 98 mph (157 km/h) with a routing speed around 75 mph (120 km/h) from the 4.11 to 1 top gear.

With a little care the Riley is sail quite canable of those

Bred from a well-mannered

Bred from a well-mannered and critically acclaimed English sedan primarily for the export market, the Riley Roadster was a touch trans-Atlantic in style. It retained the front end of the 2.5 sedan with flowing guards and long bonnet narrowing towards a handsome radiator grille. Behind the flat screen came a bench seat for three and then a huge rear end with cavernous boot topped off by the spare wheel.

with cavernous boot topped off by the spare wheel. From the front it could be a bloated T-series MG, from the rear it has been taken for a '40s American refugee. Riley was so keen on that American market it strengthened the sedan's chassis front and rear so the roadster could be fitted with huge bumpers front and rear at the right height for the Yanks' style of driving. The hood was easily raised and lowered, folding in neatly behind the seat, and side curtains attached to



I was curious when I read the article on the left from Wheels Magazine, November 1988 which says a Roadster fully laden is "close on three tonnes".

I asked the Editor to weigh a few things including himself. He reported that all this stuff tops out at less than 190kg. Add two people; that's 150kg. Add fuel at 80kg and the total is 420kg. Add the weight of the vehicle 1356kg and the grand total is under 2 tonnes at 1776kg.

Roadsters must have been heavier in 1988. Or there's been a mis-count.



Early Riley Registrations in South Australia

SA pioneered motor registration in Australia and in 1908 *The Tourist' Road Guide* published the first list of car and motor bike owners with registration numbers.

The vehicles included dated back to 1901. Thereafter additional registrations were published in various newspapers and magazines. These scattered references are the only records surviving of early SA registrations as the Registrar of Motor Vehicles' records were destroyed by a fire in November1924.

The late George Brooks spent more than twenty painstaking years hand copying and later photocopying various sources to assemble the 15744 registrations up to 1922. His handwritten and photocopied pages were later scanned and the optical recognition records have now been made available by the National Motor Museum.

There are some caveats in using these records. Firstly, owners could and did transfer their number to a different car and a new number might be issued. Hence some of the twenty Rileys listed may be the same car with a different registration number. Secondly, optical recognition can find handwritten and photocopied pages a challenge, so odd numerals and letters can be transcribed incorrectly.

I think you can safely ignore any numbers in columns 1 and 4. Ed.





here are few new books in the library and one of them of particular interest to **'Wonder** enthusiasts, especially to those who are working on their own Riley '9' project.

Book No.NZ213 is a collection of the many articles written by Noel G. Wyatt for the Victorian Riley Club's Blue Diamond magazine. Both Noel and Lyn Wyatt served as editors for many years.

During his working life Noel was a much sort after auto manufacturing plant engineer and was responsible for installing Japanese plants in India as that country progressed from just making the famed Morris Oxford.

On retirement Noel became interested in the Riley '9' and restored many different models. His ability to sort out problems and write succinct articles with good drawings about his findings have been a great help to many 'Niners' over the years and until his death in 2015 he was one of go-to men for '9' information.








