

The three Super Sectors with the least employment for the El Paso MSA in January 2024 were:


- 1. Financial Activities







In honor of **Women's History Month**, WSB wants to recognize women from El Paso who have made a significant contribution and impact on the community:



Dr. Christina I. Paz. The word compassionate describes Christina, according to her friends and coworkers. One of the clinics she helped to establish helps the LGBTQ+ community and provides gender affirming care. Paz said she started it when a transgender woman who worked at the clinic died when she couldn't find a provider who understood her news. Paz Also helped found the Down Syndrome Coalition for El Paso. When her daughter Alessandra was born, she couldn't find any resources to help, which prompted her and her husband, Mark, to work to create those resources. The coalition provides jobs for those with Down Syndrome and established Every Little Blessing preschool in 2017.



Dr. Ivonne Santiago has impacted not only El Paso, but the world. With her students and supporters, she has helped borderland colonias, as well as villages and people in Puerto Rico and Haiti. As chair of the city's Public Service Board, which governs El Paso Water, she challenges staff to be thorough and seek the answers the public needs to know. And as an associate professor at UTEP, she teaches her students to be socially conscious. "Civil engineers can be a source to foster peace more than any other engineering," said Santiago, who works with many programs, including Nerd Nights, STEAM days, Upward Bound and Yes, She Can. "It's wonderful to see how first-generation students see themselves as scientists or engineers," she said. "We show them they can do it." Santiago also works to develop clean transportation as co-director of the engineering research center ASPIRE – Advanced Sustainable Powered Roadway Electrification.





Wanda Helgesen, MSN, RN, is the definition of an unsung hero. As executive director of the BorderRAC, "Wanda basically saved El Paso during the COVID-19 pandemic," said Dr. Shawna Scully, chief medical officer of Emergence Health Network. The BorderRAC – Regional Advisory Council – works with all health entities to provide emergency health care during disasters. Helgesen has been with BorderRAC for 19 years. Helgesen speaks to numerous medical groups about disaster preparedness. "It takes thinking outside the box. 9/11 was a failure of imagination. We didn't imagine people would fly planes into buildings," she said. "No brainstorming of scenarios can be discounted. We cannot have a failure of imagination."

Andrea Tawney overcomes any challenge. Raised by her single mother and grandmother in Sacramento, California, she joined the Air Force to help pay for college. At 21 she fed intelligence to Colombian soldiers and Drug Enforcement Administration agents. Later, she convinced people to fund Devasthali Hall for fine arts at New Mexico State. Now at Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center El Paso, she has, as former Woman of Impact Ginger Francis said, "single-handedly made our medical school stable for the future." "When I came to El Paso, I didn't know anybody, but I knew I could make a difference," said Tawney, who is vice president for the office of institutional advancement at TTUHSC El Paso.
