NOTES FROM THE YEAR:

- During FY2021, Head Start underwent a virtual Focus Area 1 monitoring review.
 Focus Area 1 reviews provide programs with an opportunity to discuss their
 design, management, and structure, and services: through these reviews, the
 Office of Head Start gains an understanding of the program's design and plans
 for implementing high-quality services that meet the needs of children and
 families. All areas of Head Start and Early Head Start services were found to be
 in full compliance with Head Start Program Performance Standards. No areas of
 concern were noted in the review.
- Children's Friend Head Start staff have begun work as partners with the Rhode Island Department of Education and local school districts on a new federal initiative dedicated to the transition from early childhood education to public school kindergarten classes. This will help children and families be ready for kindergarten, and kindergarten teachers and their schools be ready for children coming from Head Start. This exciting new initiative is currently in the planning phase, and will kick-off in the spring of 2022.
- All Head Start classrooms continue to be Culturally and Linguistically Responsive: this means we take dedicated steps to support our bilingual children and families. Research indicates that supporting bilingualism from early childhood on can have wide-ranging benefits, from cognitive and social growth to employment opportunities and competitiveness in the workplace. Our CLR classrooms are staffed by teachers who have developed sensitivity to multicultural families and their needs; they embrace and highlight the child and family's culture and language(s!) in the classroom. Parents are engaged in their child's education, and children are truly able to succeed as bilingual learners with bright futures.
- Children's Friend staff helped lead the Rhode Island Head Start Association Conference in May 2021. Due to the ongoing inability to meet in large groups due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Conference shifted to a virtual format, with wild success. Parents of children in Early Head Start, Head Start and Pre-K from across Rhode Island were invited, and an average of 50 people attended each session. The Conference's topic was Transitions (of any sort). Topics and speakers included "Navigating the Special Education System in Public Schools" from Lisa Alfonso-Lynes of Children's Friend, "Foster Positive Mental Health Outcomes" from Lindsay Huffhines, Ph.D., Bradley Hospital, and "Transitioning to Kindergarten" from Keynote Speaker Lisa Nugent of the Rhode Island Department of Education.
- Policy Council and site-specific Parent Committee meetings were held on schedule over Zoom to ensure that our entire community was able to participate safely.

SCHOOL READINESS:

School readiness measures whether children possess the skills, knowledge, and attitudes necessary for success in school and for later in life, and the extent that children are ready for school, families are ready to support children's learning, and schools are ready for children.


Each year, we seek to improve School Readiness outcomes for the children in our Head Start, Early Head Start (center and home-based), and Early Head Start -Child Care Partnerships programs. We use the Teachings Strategies GOLD (GOLD)® to develop curricula and track child outcomes. GOLD® is a birth to kindergarten assessment system that assesses school readiness on a per-student level. It is completed three times throughout the school year and provides individualized assessment and feedback to teachers and parents to help identify children's strengths and challenges, and to track student progress. It is also used to assess program efficacy and improvement on a classroom-, center-, and agency-level. The following graphs show the percentages of children in all Children's Friend sites who were meeting/exceeding expectations in the developmental areas of social-emotional, physical, language, Spanish language, cognitive, literacy, Spanish literacy, and mathematics.

Please note the following: In Early Head Start - Child Care Partnerships, we do not have any data on Spanish language or Spanish literacy as these are not components of the program or curriculum. In our Early Head Start programs, our staff received needed training on use of GOLD® for effective measurement in the population they serve, in part because Early Head Start uses a different curriculum. Our Early Head Start programs also operate based on rolling admissions and discharge, so the cohort measured in the fall might not be the same as the cohort measured in the spring. Early Head Start home visits were also conducted virtually during part of the year. Even given these factors, an acceptable percentage of children in Early Head Start met or exceeded school readiness goals during the 2020-2021 program year.
















THE COVID-19 RESPONSE TEAM AT CHILDREN'S FRIEND:

Since the beginning of the pandemic, Children's Friend has prioritized the safety of all staff members and families we serve. The COVID-19 Response Team was formed originally to track cases of COVID-19 throughout the agency and field the questions of staff members related to COVID-19. The COVID-19 Response Team is made up of one administrative member of the Programs team, one member of the Nursing Team, and one member of the Quality team. This three-person team has far surpassed the expectations of its' original design, expanding to provide policy and procedural recommendations for the agency, create easy-to-read bilingual communications for parents to keep their own families safe, and continue to manage COVID-19 cases within Children's Friend.

"I think we've handled the pandemic in a strategic way and with all of our different programs in mind," said Gabriella Florio, Programs Coordinator and senior member of the COVID-19 Response Team. "By interpreting the guidance put out by the Centers for Disease Control and the Rhode Island Department of Health and selecting the most stringent policies, we've been able to keep kids and families safe. I think our biggest accomplishment thus far is the ability to say we have had no evidence of center-based spread in any of the COVID-19 cases that have come up. We owe this to our careful policy choices, and our regular communications with hardworking staff to let them know about procedures that change. I'm proud to be a part of an organization that values science and data."

During the pandemic, the COVID-19 Response Team has managed over 3,000 emails from staff members, managed 52 instances of classroom closures due to positive cases, met as a team 67 times, held three open question and answer sessions for staff members, as well as a number of other achievements. The COVID-19 Response Team contributes greatly to the success of Children's Friend's management of the pandemic. The Response Team embodies the spirit of all Children's Friend staff members as thoughtful and collaborative stewards.



FAMILY ADVOCACY IN A PANDEMIC MEET ERIN, KEILA AND YARELY:

Early Head Start at Children's Friend delivered crucial services and education to children and families, even in the face of continued challenges posed by COVID-19. Some home visits remained virtual, especially over the winter, with children and families connecting over Zoom. "Virtual visits were difficult, but we made it work successfully. Seeing children and families over Zoom is way better than not seeing them at all!" said Erin Combs, a Family Advocate. As health conditions allowed, virtual visits gave way to visits outdoors and in-person, in parks, and backyards, and corners of parking lots, then to indoor visits, with required masks and social distancing. "It's been wonderful to get back out and see families again: being one-on-one face-to-face, especially outdoors, is great," shared Erin, noting that Zoom fatigue affected everyone, including children. "Two-and-a-half-year-old Yarely even learned how to end a Zoom meeting, and would do so independently, to the surprise of her mom, when she didn't want to do it anymore!"

Whether in-person, on a front porch, or in a park, Early Head Start workers like Erin helped families like Keila and her daughter Yarely, through the past year. Families like Keila's struggled with food insecurity and with continuing to stay home (almost) all the time with their young children. Early Head Start workers continued to provide food donations from an array of community partners. Said Erin: "Even just seeing families for 5 minutes outside when dropping off food was great for them and for me." This sentiment—that any connection is meaningful—was particularly true of Keila and Yarely's experiences this year. Keila is in nursing school and works at a nursing home, and working while also keeping up with virtual classes and homework, and taking care of Yarely, has been exhausting and isolating. Erin shares that she's proud to report Keila stayed in school, but shared that she was so thankful she could connect with and support her. Yarely was born with a hearing impairment, and Erin also supported Keila in continuing to navigate Yarely's continued receipt of speech therapy through Early Intervention, and treatment from an audiologist. "Yarely and Keila struggled to get used to her new hearing aids, and struggled with seeing specialists during the pandemic. I'm happy to say that Yarely is wearing her hearing aids successfully now," said Erin about the struggles Yarely and Keila faced.

Through the Early Head Start Socialization Group Erin and Jasiel, another Family Advocate, ran in a local park, with families masked and on their own blankets to keep everyone safe, Keila and Yarely were able to find connection outside of Erin's services, too. Keila got to connect with other parents, and Yarely was able to run around and play with other children. Erin's group played educational games and got active, with physical games and bubbles aplenty.

Erin shares that she's so thankful Early Head Start at Children's Friend has persevered through the challenges of COVID-19 to deliver high-quality family support and child development services to families like Keila and Yarely's. Yarely is slated to attend Head Start at Children's Friend next fall, and she and Keila both feel ready for this big change. Erin said: "I can't imagine our families facing another winter with all of the COVID-19 related challenges and without connection to our programs and supports like food donations that we brought them. These are really needed services!"
