There are many contributions to the 110 years and most of them come from our alumnae. We thank you for being part of Women's, for creating the stories and legends, and for your ongoing connection with us and importantly with the women who are now in residence.

#### Celebrating FREDA: five years of connection and pride at The Women's College.

As we celebrate the 110<sup>th</sup> anniversary of The Women's College, it's a joy to reflect on the first five years of our award-winning alumnae magazine, *FREDA*. Launched in June 2020, during a time of unprecedented global challenges, *FREDA* quickly became a beacon of connection for our alumnae community. 










## 110 years of The Women's College

Since 1914, The Women's College has been a place for women to live, learn and be empowered. 1910s This decade saw the establishment of The Women's College. Several prominent public and government figures – including the then Governor of Queensland and his wife – were involved in raising funds for the College, which officially opened at Kangaroo Point on Monday 16 March 1914. Image 1

1920s The College Crest was drawn and the motto—
Capimus ut dividamus "We take that we may share" – was adopted in September 1921. Despite global wars and economic uncertainty, the College more than doubled in size by 1922, which saw 52 graduates. Image 2

1930s On Friday 15 March 1935, the College came of age, celebrating its 21st birthday with a celebratory photo in front of Chislehurst House. In 1938, a committee was formed to begin raising money for the new St Lucia site. *Image 3* 

1940s As it had done during the First World War, the Women's community contributed to the WWII efforts. The 1940s also saw the presentation of Eeyore – which became the first College mascot – and the laying of the St Lucia site Foundation Stone in 1949. *Image 4* 

1950s A new era for Women's began in the 1950s. After the first set of residents moved from Kangaroo Point in 1958, the official opening at St Lucia took place on Saturday 14 March 1959. Lady Aileen Slim, wife of the Governor-General, officially opened the new building. *Image* 5

1960s The 1960s saw growth, with the opening of New Wing and the Freda Bage Common Room, and the Dining Hall and kitchen expansion, all made possible through philanthropy. The Student Club magazine – *Eeyore* – was first published in 1967. *Image* 6



1970s The College celebrated its Diamond Jubilee (60 years) in 1974, the same year in which devastating floods impacted much of southeast Queensland. The College won its first ICC Shield for the women's competition in the 1970s, amidst women's liberation and other social changes.

**1980s** To mark the College's 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary, Honorary Fellowships were introduced in 1989. This was also the year in which computers were introduced, with Women's being the first residential college at St Lucia to install computer facilities. *Image 8* 

1990s The 1990s saw the introduction of Mary Woozer (now known as Mary Wooza), who was adopted as the College's second mascot. This decade also saw further expansion, with the opening of Piddington Wing and the College Playhouse.

2000s The Dining Hall's stained glass windows were a commemorative project for the year 2000, telling the story of the College. Life at Women's was full of sports, cultural and social activities, all while residents continued to embrace the spirit of community. *Image 10* 

2010s 100 years of The Women's College was celebrated in 2014, with several events, further growth, and key milestones. The Maureen Aitken Garden was completed in 2013, while the Centenary Wing opened in 2015 bringing the total capacity to 253 residents. *Image 11* 

2020s We're only (almost) halfway into the 2020s, but much has been achieved. *FREDA* and the Alumnae Awards were launched during a global pandemic that saw great resilience from the College.

We celebrate 110 years in 2024, and confidently step into the future. *Image 12*

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#### A tale of two mascots

#### How Eeyore and Mary Wooza share a special place in the hearts of alumnae

If our mascots could speak, they would tell you many stories about their adventures with Women's College students. But who are our mascots, and how did they come to life?

#### **Eevore**

In mid-1942, a stone sculpture titled The Fawn was presented to the College. This sculpture was handcarved by Leonard Shillam AM, an accomplished Brisbane-based sculptor. A site was chosen in the College garden, where a few months later the sculpture was placed onto a concrete base fixed into the ground. It was immediately christened 'Eeyore' by the residents because it looked like a fairytale character.

Quickly becoming the first College mascot, the nickname of the fawn was also the inspiration for the name of the Student Club magazine. The first editor of Eeyore, Judith Frohlich (alumna 1965 – 1967), wrote in her editorial:

"This being the first edition of "Eeyore", it is necessary to make some sort of a statement (for posterity) about this choice of name. Eeyore, as you no doubt know, lives in our garden. Nobody really knows what his main purpose in life is, since he spends most of the year hidden among the foliage ruminating to himself and looking very wise."

The very same first issue (pictured left) featured an

illustration of Eeyore by Gaye Glanville, who was a First-Year



#### Mary Woozer

Now known as Mary Wooza, this effervescent mascot is a beloved part of The Women's College.

Mary came to fruition in the early 1990s, when resident Lucy Moxon (1990 – 1992; pictured below with an incarnation of Mary Woozer in 1992) constructed a life-sized doll to prank fellow resident Nerissa Lee Long (1990 – 1993). This doll was carefully placed in the doorway of Nerissa's room, to suddenly appear as the door opened. The following evening, Lucy and Nerissa collaborated, repeating the prank, this time on Kath Myers (1990 - 1992).

Word about this homemade doll soon spread throughout the College, and she made an appearance at the 1990 College Ball, and was then subsequently adopted as the second Women's mascot. She was initially named Ginny, but with Principal (1985 – 1990) Helen McBride's intervention, was rechristened Mary Woozer.

This first incarnation of Mary attended many ICC events, becoming well-known among Women's residents and among the other colleges. Later in 1990, Mary became the target of St Leo's College when they stole her and burnt her publically at the ICC Swimming Carnival, igniting a tradition when the Women's College residents attempted to retaliate by capturing the Leonian's "lucky rake".

Since then, Women's students have fiercely protected Mary Wooza.

In 2023, Mary embarked on a journey across the world in celebration of the College's 110<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. She is sharing her adventures with alumnae and current students on her Instagram page @Wooza\_World. - 7. After a few weeks back home which included a rowing session on the Brisbane River with four alumnae – Mary then went to New Zealand with Leah McKenzie (1981 - 1983).
- 8. Mary then travelled to Cabarita Beach (NSW) to visit a 1992 Fresher who earned her Bronze Medallion with her Surf Lifesaving Patrol.



# Women's in the media Then and now

#### Women's College Queensland University

"A well attended drawing-room meeting was held at Government House yesterday, in connection with the proposed residential college for women students at the Queensland University. His Excellency the Governor and Lady MacGregor received the guests in the hall, and thence they passed into the dining-room, where tea was served ...

His Excellency said he was glad to see so many assembled there to discuss so worthy and object ...

If a women's residential college could be established here, it would prove of great value to girls in country districts."

This is an excerpt from (we think) the first newspaper article about The Women's College within The University of Queensland. It discusses the first meeting at Government House on 17 April 1913, when the establishment of a college for women was considered. This article was published on 18 April 1913 in *The Telegraph* (Brisbane), on page 3.


