RURAL MISSIONER

Dear Friends

Summer is long gone and we are now well into Autumn and our season of Harvest Festivals. There is little rest for our farmers as preparations for the next harvest are well underway. The variety of crops varies across our farms, but early October is a typical time to be sewing winter barley for a good yield next summer.

This got me thinking that, as we are celebrating and giving thanks for our Harvest this year, farmers the other side of the world are carefully attending their emerging seedlings in anticipation of good yields.

Around our wonderful world, there is a cycle of life continually happening. Creatures of land, sea and air, plants of every kind are in a constant cycle of birth and growth and death. Yet in whatever place, with whatever crop however sown, it is a miracle of nature that the seeds germinate and grow.

Yes, we can help, but it is God who sustains things and makes them happen, (see Hebrews chapter I verse 3; The Son is the radiance of God's glory and the exact representation of his being, sustaining all

things by his powerful word.)

I was recently reminded of St Francis of Assisi's song 'The Canticle of the Sun'. St Francis, who loved the natural world, composed this song in 1225 and used a repeated refrain 'Praise be to you' as he poetically described the sun, moon and stars, land, sea and air, animal and plants, and of course us humans. He repeatedly said 'Praise be to you' because through the wonder of creation we are blessed by God with all sorts of things; beauty, wonder and mystery as well as food, warmth and shelter for example.

In a children's poem version of Francis' canticle (written by Reeve Lindbergh called 'The Circle of Days') it finishes with:

For all your gifts of every kind, We offer praise with quiet mind. Be with us Lord and guide our ways Around the circle of our days

St Francis recognises our mortality in his song, and as well as a season of Thanksgiving for our food, Autumn includes a season of Remembrance.

There will be the usual Remembrance Sunday services (this year on 9 November). As other years, there will also be "All Souls' Services". These are more personal acts of remembrance in the context of a service to give thanks for loved ones no longer with us. There will be time for quiet reflection and the lighting of a candle if you wish. Whether for a recent bereavement or from further back in time, you would be most welcome to come along.

We can join the song of St Francis and give thanks for creation and of course for the love and care shown us by the special people who have helped us on our way.

Supporting Church music in the Tendring area

The Deanery choir will be singing at St George's Church, Great Bromley CO7 7TS at the I Iam Communion service. The choir will sing 'Ave Verum' by Saint Saens.

Charles-Camille Saint-Saëns was a French composer, organist, conductor and pianist of the Romantic era. Saint-Saëns was a musical prodigy; he made his concert debut at the age of ten.

After studying at the Paris Conservatoire he followed a conventional career as a church organist, first at Saint-Merri, Paris and, from 1858, La Madeleine, the official church of the French Empire. After leaving the post twenty years later, he was a successful freelance pianist and composer, in demand in Europe and the Americas.

As a young man, Saint-Saëns was enthusiastic for the most modern music of the day, particularly that of Schumann, Liszt and Wagner, although his own compositions were generally within a conventional classical tradition. He was a scholar of musical history, and remained committed to the structures worked out by earlier French composers.

This brought him into conflict in his later years with composers of classical elements in his music, foreshadowing works by Stravinsky and Les Six, he was often regarded as a reactionary in the decades around the time of his death.

THE LORD'S PRAYER. THY KINGDOM COME

This passage is taken from an analysis by Archbishop Stephen Cottrell and is titled: Part 3 - God has a purpose for our lives and for the world (Matthew 6: 10)

The kingdom of God is not a place. You can't find it on a map. Its boundaries run through human hearts. It isn't like the kingdoms of the world. It is not driven by the love of power, but by the power of love.

Strangest of all, it is almost a kingdom without a king. Yes of course, we call Jesus "King of Kings" and "Lord of Lords", and He is the one to whom every knee must bow. Yet he's also the one who stoops to wash our feet (John I 3.3-5) who humbles Himself; who comes to us as one who serves (Luke22:27) and who was obedient to suffering death(Philippians 2:6-8). So when we speak about the kingdom of God and when we pray, "Thy kingdom come", we are referring to God's' rule of justice and peace; that the servant hearted leadership that we see in lesus may be the hallmark of the leadership of the world.

Therefore, lesus teaches about the kingdom, and in His own life and ministry shows us what living as a child of God's kingdom looks like. We become citizens of God's kingdom by the free grace poured out for us in Christ by His death and resurrection; but, as a consequence of grace, we are called to live like Jesus as well. As Jesus is compassionate, merciful, hungry for justice and servant-hearted, we must be too. This is how God's kingdom comes and how its boundaries are extended. Jesus Himself taught us that we should receive this kingdom as a child and that children are the greatest in the kingdom. (Mark 10:14-15)

To pray "Thy kingdom come" is to ask the Holy Spirit to make us children of this kingdom. Not childish, but with childlike trust in God, for it is this parent child relationship which is the defining characteristic of our relationship with God.

Therefore, we do not seek our own way or our own dominion over others, but God's.


Serge update: He has been introduced to wearing a harness and is progressing well with his training.

THE GREATEST STORY EVER TOLD BY BEAR GRYLLS



This book is the story of Jesus's life, written as a thriller. It is told from the perspective of five different people that knew him well. Grylls is one of the most famous adventurers in the world and has written over 100 books, but this one was different, he said "I literally woke up one morning and knew I was going to write this thing, with utter conviction" and "I couldn't have not written it". Although he is a high profile character, he has a quiet but real faith and admits he hasn't got all the answers.

Despite being told by my family that it was hardly holiday reading, I really enjoyed it. It was pacy, easy reading with very short chapters.

Grylls wanted the book to be faithful to the Gospel stories and there's no

dialogue from Jesus that is made up, it is all in the New Testament. However, the words were not that familiar to me as they were from versions of the Bible using everyday language, but sometimes different translations bring a fresh perspective.

The way the book was written, chronologically and in the cultural setting of the time really brings the story to life.

The thing I didn't like was the use of Hebrew, Greek and Aramaic names for people and places, it wasn't really necessary- for instance Jesus is referred to as Yeshua. They can be figured out though, and there is information at the end of the book.

Grylls wrote the last words on the back cover before he'd even started the book, 'May the light and love of the Almighty fill your life with truth, peace and strength. Nothing can ever steal Christ's presence from you...'

I'm not surprised it's a No.1 Sunday Times bestseller. It will appeal to believers and non-believers alike and would make a great present.

High Flight

By John Gillespie Magee Jr.

Oh! I have slipped the surly bonds of Earth And danced the skies on laughter-silvered wings;

Sunward I've climbed, and joined the tumbling mirth of sun-split clouds,—and done a hundred things You have not dreamed of—wheeled and soared and swung High in the sunlit silence. Hov'ring there, I've chased the shouting wind along, and flung My eager craft through footless halls of air

Up, up the long, delirious, burning blue I've topped the wind-swept heights with easy grace Where never lark, or even eagle flew—And, while with silent lifting mind I've trod The high untrespassed sanctity of space, Put out my hand, and touched the face of God.

A 1941 sonnet written by Pilot Officer John Gillespie Magee Jr., a 19-year-old American serving in the Royal Canadian Air Force during World War II. Inspired by a high-altitude solo flight—Magee began composing it while soaring at around 30,000 feet in his Spitfire, and finished it shortly after landing.

In September 1941, Magee joined No. 412 Squadron, one of the RCAF squadrons formed under the auspices of Article XV of the BCATP agreement, at RAF Station Digby. His time with the unit was short. On December 11, while on a routine flight, Magee's Spitfire collided with a training aircraft whilst in a cloud. A witness on the ground reported that he had climbed out onto the wing of the stricken Spitfire, but his parachute failed to deploy properly and he was killed. Nineteen-year old John Gillespie Magee is buried at Holy Cross Cemetery, Scopwick, Lincolnshire. Most appropriately, the first and last lines of his poem are included on his headstone.

"Oh! I have slipped the surly bonds of Earth. Put out my hand and touched the face of God."

Dedham Parish Council Meeting Report - Monday, Ist COUNCIL September 2025

Councillor Resignation

Cllr Chris Martlew has resigned, and a vacancy notice has been issued. Following his resignation, clarification was sought on whether the Council retains its Power of Competence. The Monitoring Officer at Colchester City Council has confirmed that this remains in place.

River, Use of the Meadows, Parking and Anti-Social Behaviour

Cllr Bourn gave a general update on activities regarding the river, use of the meadows, parking by the river and antisocial behaviour. Two meetings were held over the summer period, one with police and Stratford St Mary council, and a larger one, online, with 35 people representing all relevant bodies including Babergh Council, 3 different departments, Suffolk County Council, Environment Agency, River Stour Trust, Dedham Vale national Landscapes and other relevant bodies. Also in attendance at both meetings was a representative from the Boat Yard who reported on the impact of the activity by the river on their business and the anti-social behaviour of visitors. The following items are being considered by relevant bodies:

Extending double yellow lines so that there can be no parking on the side of the road. There has been agreement with Suffolk County Council to have continuous double yellow lines down Stratford Road from the bridge. A budget has been allocated for this work and there will be consultation soon on moving the 30mph sign further down the road.

Public Space Protection Orders and whether or not this is feasible. It is being considered but will need support of all councils on both sides of the river.

Closer monitoring of behaviour by the river. PC Johnson from Suffolk Police gave a report of his findings when he had visited the area over the past few weeks. A police member from the Rural Enforcement Team had also visited. PC Johnson reported he had spoken to and stopped some youths who were going to jump off the bridge. There will be police interaction with the local High School regarding this issue over the next few weeks.

A major issue was the level of trading by companies on the meadows and the evidence that it exceeded the 28 day rule. This is being pursued by Babergh District Council and a formal notice of investigation has been given to the landowner. Parking on the meadows and the road were discussed.

Peter Watson from Babergh Council safety team was present at the meeting and reported that the issues on the bridge is a behaviour problem and not the bridge itself. Signage will help and there needs to be discussion around this.

The question of water quality was discussed, there is the possibility of obtaining a QR code to display on the bridge, showing the water quality. Results from PACE show that Dedham always has the lowest and poorest quality when surveyed.

The river was the number one concern of residents from the initial survey from the parish Plan. The primary school are planning to include activity around the river as part of their curriculum for the new academic year.

The headteacher of the primary school has informed the council that the children in the village are now reluctant to go down to the river as they are frightened by what is going on. The

school will be following this up and working with the children on it.

Parish Plan

The parish drop-in session held in July was well attended, and the submitted questions were posted publicly. Between 40 and 50 responses were received. The most significant complaint—after concerns about the river—was about the language used by the football teams. Suggestions for addressing this issue were also put forward. The results from the session have been circulated to the council, and it was proposed to seek the views of more people. Further consultation will take place later in the year.

Dedham Sports Club

Several areas were discussed, these included the development of the Social Club on Friday evenings for which there was a request for funding. The initiative was welcomed but further material was needed regarding financial business plan before agreement.

It was also suggested that the fish and chip van could move from its current site, which was causing parking problems, to car park at the Sports Pavilion on Friday evenings.

There are issues concerning the insurance cover for the Sports Pavillion. This is being investigated.

Tables and Chairs outside businesses in the High Street

The tables and chairs outside one of the businesses have been removed following request by City Council as the business did not have a licence for trading on the pavement. It was further noted that the business had anyway decided to remove the tables and chairs for the time being.

Planning Group Report

There was concern that the proposed

telecommunications mast at Gun Hill was refused as it would have helped with improving mobile phone reception in the area. Further information was to be requested on the status of the planned developments at the Old School House.It was noted there are regular meetings with planning team from City Councill.

Christmas Fair

The Parish Council has agreed to support this and dialogue is taking place as how to make sure it was a traditional event.

Infrastructure and Community areas

A meeting with NEPP is planned regarding maintenance of car park. Concern was expressed about the removal of the street lights in Mill Lane without consultation with the Parish Council. There are still conversations going on regarding parking in the High Street to make the parking an hour and not two

Pylons Campaign

The Parish Council have received notice that the National Grid has submitted its application for a Development Consent Order to the Planning Inspectorate for its Norwich to Tilbury pylon project.

Chair of the Council will liaise with relevant local bodies to ensure a common response is given to this.

Communications

The work on the new website is currently ongoing and it is hoped to be up and running soon.

There had been some concern on the ability to access and use the new email system. It was agreed an audit of existing and future IT needs for council members would be valuable.

PUTTING THE GARDEN TO BED

It certainly feels like autumn now with morning temperatures dipping into single figures, September's equinox behind us and evenings shortening as we prepare to turn the clocks back at the end of this month.

In the garden, I've still got a few roses blooming but they'll fade before the middle of the month, and the foliage of Fuchsia magellanica var. gracilis 'Aurea' is a brilliant golden splash in the border with its small flowers like little red jewels.

There are the flat, deep pink heads of sedum (now called the almost unpronounceable hylotelephium) attracting my bees and other pollinators, plus salvias – the deep purple and black 'Amistad' and the brilliant pink 'Cerro Potosi' – cosmos, chrysanthemums and asters all doing their best before winter settles in.

Dedham's Horticultural Society also began its new season last month with our Autumn Show which was another great success. We welcomed several people exhibiting for the first time (we hope you all enjoyed the experience and that we might see you again) – and what seemed like more visitors on a sunny day in the village.

Autumn brings an opportunity to think ahead for our Spring Show (21st March) by ordering bulbs for classes from daffodils and tulips to hyacinths and more. If you're puzzled by the different classes, search 'daffodil' on our website for some help.

It's not all sitting about shopping of course, there's still plenty to do in the garden as the soil is warm and workable (even if the days are shorter and – knowing Britain – probably wetter too). October is all about tidying up and preparation, protection and planting for the year (and years) to come.

Here in my gardening, I'm cutting down most of my herbaceous perennials as the foliage dies back, though I leave some of the sturdier seedheads that might provide food for birds or shelter for over-wintering beneficial insects, like pollinating bees or the ladybirds and lacewings that eat aphids.

Gardening Notes

I've enjoyed growing strawflowers from seed for the first time this year and I'll take some of the seeds from this year's flowers to sow in spring. However, it's possible to sow hardy annual seeds – cornflowers, larkspur, Ammi umbellifers and some poppies – at this time of year as most will make it through winter and actually welcome a period of cold to germinate. You can sow them outdoors where they are to flower or in pots and trays and keep them in a sheltered spot.

As I go through the beds and borders, I'm also checking to see if any of my summer perennials can be divided and planted elsewhere in the garden or used to bulk up existing displays. This works well with daylilies, hostas and geraniums and has the added benefit of making the original plant healthier. Just make sure to replant the divisions as soon as you can and water them in well.

I'll protect tender plants by moving my pelargoniums into a frost-free space. Last year I tried removing them from the soil and storing them 'bare root' but I think the frost still got to them as none made it through, so this year I'll leave them potted up as they enter dormancy. I also decide which of my dahlias to lift and store over winter. Frost and continually wet soil (clay is the worst) can turn the tubers to mush so I usually lift my favourites. I cut down the stems, wash off as much soil as possible and let them dry thoroughly before storing them in cardboard boxes with crumpled newspaper. Sometimes I give them a dust with sulphur powder which helps keep them dry and prevent fungal infections and mould.

If you don't want to lift your dahlias, you can leave them in the ground. If it's free-draining and not in a frost pocket, you can give them a helping hand by dumping a bucket of compost on top of them which can prevent frost from reaching the tubers. I leave some of the dahlias that I grow at my allotment in the ground – the fertile soil is very freedraining and most have made it through several winters.

Finally, I'll turn the compost heaps (there's three in the garden and four on the allotment, but my sister loves helping with the latter). I add anything I've cut back and add some water if the mix is too dry, before turning older green and brown material to aerate the heaps and speed up decomposition. Some of the older compost is now ready to use so I've been using it as mulch on the borders where it will suppress weeds and help insulate plants from the worst of winter.

So make some time this month to get outside and burn a few calories in your garden everyone. Enjoy.

Dedham in History

In 1937 Gerald Rendall published a book entitled 'Dedham in History' which had three parts, Feudal Dedham, Industrial Dedham and Puritan Dedham. As it is more than 75 years since the author died, the book is out of copyright, we can now use it for articles in the magazine.

The section on Industrial Dedham has been scanned and the text extracted from the scanned images to form articles. The second one, (which includes an original drawing) appears this month.

INDUSTRIAL DEDHAM - WOOL AND WEAVING INDUSTRY. REBUILDING OF CHURCH.

At Dedham the trade never fell into the hands of wealthy monopolists, such as the Paycocks at Coggeshall, the Springs of Lavenham, or the far-famed 'Jack of Newbury' commemorated in Deloney's rhymes, which picture so brightly the departmental grades and processes of manufacture.

Within one room being large and long There stood two hundred Looms full strong. Two hundred men the truth is so Wrought in those Looms all in a row. By everyone a pretty boy Sate making quills with mickle joy. (Sat making quills with great joy) And in another place hard by, An hundred women merrily Were carding hard with joyful cheer

and on the same scale through the several grades of pickers, spinners, shearmen, rowers, dyers and the rest.

At Dedham production remained always on domestic lines, organised by clothiers, great and small, who catered for the distributing centre at Colchester. Hence local work concentrated on the Bays and Says, on which the reputation of Colchester was built, The manual work

was done in cottage homes, which multiplied in Pig Lane, Cooper's Lane and along the whole course of the Black Brook to its passage under Colchester Road. The popular description of Southfields as a the Bay and Say Mill is misleading. It was never a factory but the business residence, storehouse and offices of a leading clothier, of the Sherman family. It is of unique interest, designed on the quadrangular plan of a Tudor mansion: and restoration has not obliterated the main features. It is admirably adapted to site and purpose. The handsome corner fronting South and West, was the owner's dwelling-house; the East front, facing towards the King's Highway, for convenience of cartage, was the storage warehouse for finished goods; the Ground Floor housed cartsheds and equipment, while the upper Floor, approached by exterior flights of steps, was devoted to storage, and (as at the Marlborough Head and Castle House) ventilated by mullioned windows, fitted with adjustable shutterflaps, to meet changes of wind. Roomy basements provided household cellarage, and accommodation for the dyeing vats, with convenient access to the Black Brook, and also to the tenter-frames on the meadowland adjoining. The Gate House was on the North front, flanked on either side by the counting-house, and offices. The remainder was assigned to the necessary household accessories and serving staff. When trade declined, it was among the last to hold its own, and from 1742 to 1820 was occupied by representatives of the Blomfield family, who had long enjoyed a position second to none among Dedham clothiers. There is no trace of weaver windows, and it is unlikely that there was ever a loom in the establishment.

The function of the Clothier was that of the organising middleman, who

unified the successive stages of the manifold processes which led up to the finished article, beginning with the breeding and shepherding of stock, shearing and cleansing of the wool, and passing on through the lighter tasks of sorting, spinning, carding and later of teaseling and burling, mostly committed to services of women, and culminating in the heavier and more responsible operations of the weaver, the fuller, the shearman, the dyer, and finally of the packer and carter. Transport and delivery of finished goods rested with the clothier, in bales labelled with his trademark.

The Tuesday market extending from the Marlboro' to the Sun Inn became a busy scene, largely of clothiers bargaining and handling the successive stages of manufacture, but also for the distribution of agricultural products.

For the development of the weaving trade did much to improve the position of the farmer, through the increase of sheep-farming, and the demands of an industrial population. In the conduct of local affairs the farmer shared honours with the tradesman and manufacturer. At

Dedham clothiers became very numerous, and represent great variety of standing. This is shown by the local Wills, scores of which are cited in Waters' Genealogical Gleanings, the majority drawn by clothiers. Those at the top of the scale had residences on the outskirts, represented by Southfields, Knights, and Castle House.
