'Here I am! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with that person and they with me,' Rev 3:20

'The Light of the World', by the pre-Raphaelite painter William Holman Hunt is recognised worldwide. The original is in Keble College, Oxford, and copies hang in St Paul's Cathedral and in Manchester City Art Gallery. Perhaps you've seen one of them. You will almost certainly have seen the image on a card or in an illustration.

The door is shrouded with tangled brambles and weeds – could it be years since it turned on its rusty hinges? Jesus knocks patiently and waits for a response from us.

Holman Hunt deliberately painted the door without a handle. The only way for it to be opened is from the inside. It's up to the occupant. Jesus allows us to decide whether to open our lives to him and welcome him in. Do we intentionally keep his love and lifechanging presence on the other side of the door?

As a young student, I chose to keep my distance from Christians. I didn't like the idea of having my own agnostic views challenged. Yet when my father died suddenly in my first year at the end of the Christmas term, people from the Christian Union showed me great kindness. I was far from my home and family and the support of new university friends meant a great deal.

I can remember the moment when, in spite of myself, I accepted an invitation to a guest service at All Souls, Langham Place. Through the talk on The Prodigal Son, I heard for myself the loving and forgiving voice of Jesus. I was beginning to know and understand the power and the presence of God's love in my life.

As a 20-year-old student, I understood the reality of the words in Revelation 3: 20: 'I will come in and eat with that person, and they with me.' The Light of the World waits for us to invite him in and break bread with us. Can there be a better way to celebrate closeness than by having a meal together? Cathy Groslin

CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORKER

At the time of writing this article, Epiphany has just been celebrated (6th January), commemorating the visit of the Magi to the birth of Jesus Christ. Magi from far away lands bringing gifts to represent the future life of Jesus - Gold representing Jesus as King, Frankincense bringing lesus to divine status by its use as incense and Myrrh an embalming oil and fragrance embedded on dead bodies indicating that lesus would endure persecution and death. The Magi from far away non-Jewish (gentile) lands show us that the gift of salvation is for us all with no exceptions - offering us all hope.

However, New Year is not always seen as representing a 'new year, new start, new beginning' as this may not be possible in practice for many, especially in light of a loved one passing, struggling with illness, or encountering difficult times financially or relationally. Stained Glass



The Beatitudes

Christ is seated on His throne wearing luxuriously embroidered and jewelled robes, He has an elaborate halo and His right hand is raised in blessing and His left hand open showing the stigmata. This image of Christ sitting as ruler of the world arose within the iconography of the Church at least as early as the 4th century AD, and has been very little altered in its format ever since. Again this window is in the typical renaissance revival style of its era, which we learn from the dedication inscription in the glass at the bottom of the window is from the 1890's.

Each section of the window depicts detailed architectural stonework, and at the top six more Angels preside over the scene. Below Christ's feet is another ribbon carrying the words, "Blessed are you when men revile you". Not included as one of the eight Beatitudes, but what Jesus said directly to his disciples, rather than the crowd, after he had spoken the Beatitudes themselves. Extra vitality and interest is given to the work by the clever use of alternating bright blue and red backgrounds for Jesus and each Angel.

As we move into the New Year we continue to look at some of the stained glass windows in St Mary's Church, Dedham. At the east end of the north aisle facing East is a three-panel window by Clayton and Bell, one of the most prolific and respected manufacturers of stained glass of the mid-19th century.

The window depicts "The Beatitudes" which Jesus enumerated at the beginning of the "Sermon on the Mount" (Matthew 5: 3-10). Centrally we see "Christ in Majesty" also known as "Christ Enthroned" and He is surrounded by seven Angels.

The seven Angels are all dressed in white with differing halos and gold wings and wonderfully curly blond hair. Each Angel carries a ribbon with the words of the first seven of the Beatitudes on them.

Christ has a ribbon over his head with the words of the eighth Beatitude on it,

"Blessed are they which are persecuted for righteousness sake for theirs is the kingdom of heaven".

Stained Glass



At the other side of the Church, at the west end of the south aisle, is a stained glass window in a very different though rather mixed style. This three panel window shows depictions of three ladies, each standing barefoot above a label in Latin: CARITAS (Charity), FIDES (Faith) and SPES (Hope).

The figure of Charity or Love, as more recent biblical translations suggest, holds a burning sacred heart, which signifies Jesus' intense love for us.

The figure of Faith holds a crucifix to remind us that Jesus suffered and gave his life on the cross for us.

The figure of Hope is shown with hands held in prayer, signifying that when we pray we are reminded that by God's love and Jesus' death, we are given hope of forgiveness and eternal life.

No doubt this window is intended to remind the viewer of I Corinthians I3, with its well-known description of charity / love.

It was designed by Wilfred G. von Glehn and bears his initials and the date 1909. He was friend and companion of

Caritas (Charity) Fides (Faith) Spes (Hope)

John Singer Sargent, the famous American artist, and both are known for their portraiture and depiction of Edwardian luxury. Von Glehn was also part of the impressionist movement. The window is a fusion of differing styles. The tall robed ladies are almost pre-Raphaelite in style; they are dressed in long robes of dark purples, blues, reds and browns, and the central figure has red hair, whilst the use of glass with gradations of colour within each panel is typical of the Arts and Crafts movement. The shaping of the individual pieces of glass in the background sky give a distinct nod to Glehn's impressionist leaning, but the architectural surrounds retain the renaissance revival style of many of the other somewhat earlier windows in the church. The overall appearance however is very balanced, eye-catching and effective. The window was donated by Ariana Curtis in memory of her late husband, a cousin and friend of John Singer Sargent and presumably of von Glehn.

The Organ Project

ORGAN REPLACEMENT PROJECT – FROM START TO FINISH

Back in 2018, when it was quite clear that the existing pipe organ was on its last legs and was only kept going by the skill of our Organist, Antony Watson & Andrew Stevens the Organ Tuner, the PCC commissioned a small group of people to get together to prayerfully consider the options for replacing it. These included doing nothing (quickly discounted), installing a brand-new pipe organ, reconditioning an old, no longer needed pipe organ, or installing a digital organ.

After a lot of painstaking research, a Report and Proposal was presented to the PCC on the 23rd March 2020, and the recommendation was, "to obtain a fine pipe organ with a good pedigree from a redundant church for refurbishment and installation in Dedham Church". The Report also identified a suitable organ which was no longer needed by Harvest Glasgow (formerly Mosspark Parish Church) and recommended that Nicholson & Co from Malvern be appointed the Contractors for the Project.

After lengthy discussions, hampered by the arrival of Covid and with concerns

about the funding of such a major project, the PCC agreed with the recommendation, subject to the project being agreed by the Diocesan Planning authorities, and it also being fully funded, and the proposal was taken to a meeting of Parishioners and other interested parties in Church on the 26th September 2021.

This confirmed that the project as recommended should go ahead, and following that the long process of applying for a Faculty, (Church speak for planning permission) started. An overall budget of £300,000 was set and over the next 24 months or so multiple fundraising events were held; including concerts by the Kelvedon Singers, the Goldsbrough Consort, Piculet and the Colchester Chamber Choir and the never to be forgotten 24-hour Organathon!!

The required Faculty, which had been preceded by agreement from Historic England, was finally granted in October 2022. The contract with Nicholson & Co was also signed on the 21st October 2022, with a likely installation date of summer 2025.

In August 2022 Nicholson & Co had removed the console from Harvest Glasgow, as they had advised us that they no longer had room for it and were going to dispose of it. Very grateful thanks must go to Scott Hamilton and Harvest Glasgow as their advice and cooperation in the early stages of the project was invaluable, and in addition, they did not charge us anything for the organ.

Without this generosity the project might well not have gone ahead. In January 2023 all other elements of the Glasgow organ were dismantled and transported to storage in Kidderminster, pending elements being moved to the workshop in Malvern for repair and restoration as necessary.

The Organ Project

The skill and the craftsmanship of the Nicholson & Co staff is truly extraordinary, and they have advised that they spent 9,075 hours on the project covering all aspects required to get the new organ designed, built, and in place working in Dedham Church.

All the required work went extremely well; so much so, that in December 2023 we were contacted by Nicholson & Co to ask if they could bring the installation forward to the 4th quarter 2024. because of another project they were working on being put back, at the request of the Client.

We were very happy to agree to this, and accelerated certain things, such as a survey by Natural England of the Bats who roost in the Church, and cannot be disturbed at certain times of the year. Fortunately the 4th quarter of the year was acceptable for work to be completed in.

Nicholson & Co had also requested that the existing organ be removed as soon as possible, to allow them to complete the design of the new organ in the existing loft space and this was duly achieved in February 2024.

On Monday 7th October 2024 the first major elements of the new organ were delivered, and over the next 7 weeks they, along with all the other parts that had been delivered separately, were successfully installed in the existing organ loft, and part of the Bell Ringing Chamber. This phase of the installation was completed by 22nd November. The 'new' console arrived on 27th November and the next week work to complete the transmission cabling and system was completed. Week Commencing 2nd December saw the installation of the last remaining pipework, approximately 1500 in total, completing the "voicing" and tuning stage. This lead to Nicholson and Co handing over the organ week commencing 9th December.

The new organ was played at the Dedham Primary School Carol Service that week, and then at the 9.30 a.m. service on Sunday 15th December, and the Carol Service in the evening of the same day. To say that those attending these services were massively impressed by the wonderful sound the new organ made is a huge understatement. Antony Watson recalls someone saying that the sound 'reaches deep into one's soul,' and Antony agrees.

It is a most incredible instrument, built to the glory of God. There are so many people to thank for the successful completion of this huge project, not least all those who gave their time and their talents for free, but without all the generous financial donations the project would never have got off the ground. 55 people kindly made donations, which contributed just under 70% of the total amount raised, and by March 2024 the project was fully funded. In addition, a number of local and national Charities and local Companies supported the project following grant applications being made to them. These were as follows:

A previous edition of the Parish Magazine mentioned that it was planned to hold a special Organ recital and a Dedication Service for the new organ in 2025. This has now been arranged for Saturday 10th May in the evening. The Dedication Service will be led by the Bishop of Colchester, followed by the Recital which will be given by the eminent Organist Jonathan Scott,

described by BBC Radio 3 as "The leading British Organist". A "must save" date for your 2025 diary and information regarding tickets, which will be free, will be in a future edition of the Magazine. David Druitt

As the recently elected Chair of the Parish Council I would like to introduce myself and outline some of the things we are planning to do in the future.

First of all, we are wanting the Council to be more accessible to residents of the village and to encourage greater dialogue and sharing of information and ideas primarily at our Parish Council meetings, where we are hoping to start to introduce timed issues for discussion that can directly involve residents bringing in different perspectives. These for example could include managing the river problems we have experienced, parking and dog fouling.

Secondly we want to develop our committee structure and involve residents more within them as co-optees and to have the sub committees as public events.

Thirdly we are keen to have dialogue with relevant community groups and ensure the Council is servicing and supporting their needs.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR

You may recall from previous articles that I voted for additional money for the highway maintenance budget. This included a priority budget, which I have allocated funds for Dedham in areas such as Mill Lane, Grove Hill and Shoebridge Hill (for overgrown vegetation) in the past. I welcome further submissions to <u>cllr.lewis.barber@essex.</u> <u>gov.uk</u> for consideration of both the general maintenance budget and my priority budget.

We also continue the campaign to improve road safety and traffic management in the village. Unfortunately, we are still waiting for funding to be approved for the revisited plan for Dedham-Langham-Boxted so that a coordinated effort is made to address these challenges. We will keep lobbying for this. I have also joined a multi-agency group to tackle flooding issues, as many of these require cross-agency input. I will keep raising those issues pertinent to Dedham to get them sorted. Please do get in touch with any important issues to you.

Finally, we are likely to get local government reform in Essex in the near future. I am a supporter of local government reform and, at the time of writing, there is an upcoming vote on submitting a proposal to government to implement their reforms locally.

It is expected that the government will roll this out nationwide in the near future, with Essex likely to be one of the first tranches. Local government reform will likely be jointly with devolution, giving more powers and responsibility to local areas.

I have found local government too bureaucratic and inefficient. I am hoping these proposals will give our local communities more control with a structure to local government that is far more sensible, leads to better outcomes and saves taxpayers money.

Alice Lee D.Sc


Dedham Parish Councillors, local residents & Vice Lord Lieutenant Roy Clare at Monday 16th December unveiling of Heritage Plaque to mark the fact that Alice Lee D.Sc, Mathematician (1858 – 1939) lived at what is now The Tiptree Essex Rose.



Alice Elizabeth Lee was the daughter of William Lee (1821-1887), born in Sudbury, Suffolk, and Matilda Wren Baker (1822-1903), born in London. William Lee was a master coach builder and he had married Matilda on 29th July 1846 in St Mary the Virgin church in Dedham, Essex.

Alice was born on the 28th June 1858 and baptised in Dedham Church on 15th August 1858 by George Murray, vicar of Dedham (1854 – 1877). At the time of the 1861 census, William and Matilda Lee were living in Upper Park Road (Coles Oak Lane) Dedham with their first five children. This was the likely birth place of Alice in Dedham. In 1861 they were living next to Upper Park Cottage.

During the 1860's the family moved into Dedham High Street because in the 1871 census the family were living in a home attached to William's coach building premises in Dedham High Street. Alice and her two younger sisters were studying at school in Dedham. Both the 1871 and 1881 census allow us to identify the exact location of their home. When these censuses were taken the Census Enumerator followed a specific route when collecting the census forms. The home and premises were on the corner of Mill Lane (Mill Street at the time of these censuses) and the High Street.



The 1871 and 1881 censuse confirm that Alice lived in what is now the Essex Rose after the family moved there in the 1860's.

We know from the census record that Alice was a scholar, presumably at school in Dedham, and as she lived only a couple of doors down from Ivy Lodge which was then a girls school, it was reasonable to assume that she went to school there. This was confirmed by a report in the Essex Standard of May 1876 which published the Cambridge Matriculation results.

Her headmistress was listed as Miss Barber who ran the Girls School in what is now lvy House. 1876 was also the first year of the publication of the Dedham Parish Magazine, Alice and her sister Grace feature in the April edition. Also 1876 was the first year in which girls were named in the exam lists as previously only the number of girls taking the exams was noted.

Alice Lee D.Sc / DELT

In 1876 Alice Lee became a student at Bedford College, London. This college had been founded in 1847 to provide higher education for women; in fact it was the first college in the UK to provide such an education for women.

In 1874, just before Alice began her studies there, the College moved from its first site in Bedford Square to two houses in York Place, close to Baker Street, in Marylebone. In 1879–80 she attended the first mathematics class at Bedford.

Alice was one of the first women to graduate from the University of London (Bedford College was then a women's college of the University), getting a BSc in 1884 and a BA in 1885.

Alice Lee was finally awarded a D.Sc. in 1901, the first woman to become Doctor of Science at the University of London.

In her dissertation, Alice demonstrated that there was no correlation between skull size and intelligence. Through a formula Alice calculated the cranial capacity from the anatomical measurements. The individuals in the groups were ranked in order of decreasing skull size, and identified by name.

The dissertation was completed in 1899 and the findings caused considerable controversy. It was then an accepted theory in craniology that brain power increased with size, hence skull capacity was a measure of mental ability.

As a consequence it was believed that men, who generally had larger heads than women, were mentally superior. Alice's findings shed doubt on that belief and her study drew considerable criticism from her thesis examiners. For a more information - https:// heyzine.com/flip-book/84b3e3f31a.html

Resignations

It was reported that there had been 3 resignations from the Council, Lucy Goodall,Steve Mole and Gill Neville.

New Chair appointed

Douglas Bourn was appointed chair of the Council

PUBLIC FORUM Bins

Wheelie Bins

There were differing views expressed about the value of wheelie bins. The Chair agreed to consult with the Council on what was felt to be most appropriate. It was agreed to have further discussions with our City Council representative about how best to represent differing views to the City Council.

Guide dogs

It was noted that leaving rubbish on the pavements can be a hazard for guide dogs and this needs to be taken into consideration with regard to changes in collections for recycling etc.

Format of Minutes

It was suggested that the minutes of the meeting could they be more detailed and cover more about discussions.

Petalo Lodge

Ongoing concerns were raised about Petalo Lodge and Chair of Council agreed to visit the area and discuss with local residents.

Fishing Club

It was noted that the fishing club is developing well and have helped to form a swan sanctuary on the river.

Parking

Several resident raised ongoing concerns about parking in certain areas on the High Street and in Royal Square. This will be taken up by the Council and will include the installation of more no parking signs.

Dedham Primary School

Cllr Bourn updated the council with the meeting that was had with Dedham Primary School. Cllr Bourn and Cllr Neville had a meeting with the Head of the Primary School and they raised a few ideas for funding. It is the school centenary this year and there will be another meeting with them, to look at ways to support the school in as many ways as we can. The school were thanked for their traffic posters which have been distributed around the village. Thanks were also given to the school for organising an excellent Christmas fair.

Budget and Finances

stop National Landscapes from being blighted by insensitive development. There could be wider implications for the village if similar proposals went through that ignored status of the area.

Youth Club update

MIKE ATKINS 1933 TO 2024

Former Headmaster of Dedham C of E Primary School.



It's well known that cheese and wine mature with age, but it says in The New Scientist that people mellow with age. Well Mike certainly did!! And, by the way, everything written here is with his son Matthew's blessing. Over the last 5 years I have got to know Mike as a good friend, not just the Headmaster of Dedham C of E Primary School and he's been a kind, appreciative, and caring one.

Mike was born above H E Reynolds Newsagent in August 1933 in Dovercourt at 7.45am, just as the papers were coming in. He lived there with his parents and maternal grand-parents and came from a working-class background. His parents bought a terraced house in Dovercourt and he went to Harwich County High School. When his father joined the army in 1939 Mike's mother didn't want him to be evacuated so the two of them moved back to live with his grandparents and three aunts. He was brought up to be hard working, and from a young age, he delivered the papers. His brother Roger was born in 1944.

At age 11 Mike took the Scholarship and got a place at Harwich County High School, leaving with the School Certificate at 16. He was a keen sportsman, and represented Essex County for football, and athletics, signing Amateur Forms with Ipswich Town shortly after leaving school.


He did two years National Service and loved it, followed by a number of jobs, including serving in an ironmonger's, and 2 years in the Air Force Police, where he enjoyed the work and the discipline.

In the early 1950's he met Fay, and after they were married he got a job as Headmaster's assistant at an Approved School, and was responsible for many sports including boxing, cricket and football. His potential was spotted and in his late 30's he went to Teacher's Training College.

After six years' experience in several jobs, he moved to Dedham, where Matthew was born, and he was appointed Headmaster of Dedham C of E Primary School in 1974, where he stayed until he retired in 1998.

Dedham C of E Primary School had an outstanding reputation and was known for its traditional values, discipline, a good solid education, and high standards which was what most of the parents were looking for. Mike ran a tight ship, was not always popular, and many of us had a run in with him over the years, but our children benefited from their time at the school.

Many pupils didn't like the discipline, but as they grew up, they appreciated and valued it, and became friends with him, and he was always interested in them.

Mike was a committed carer, nursing Fay until she died in 2017. Though he had had Labradors for years, he then got Raf, his little border terrier, and they continued living happily in Reynbank.

Mike went into hospital in 2022 for about a month, and then onto a care home to recuperate. When visiting him there, Matthew once asked him why he didn't go into the lounge? Mike replied, "It's full of grumpy old men" and Matthew answered, "You should fit in nicely then!"

But Mike mellowed, and when I took him into the village on a Tuesday morning, after we had been to Dedham Church, it was like being out with a celebrity. Parents of children at the school, former pupils, the girls in the Co-op and the boys in the butchers, plus many locals, used to come and speak to him. Though he was 91, he remembered them all, and had little stories about them. Sally said "When we had a car crash my daughter was in hospital for 9 weeks, and Mr Atkins used to come and visit her – he was so kind. He was firm but fair." Judy moved her son to another school for logistical reasons but says "Mr Atkins' love of horse racing was evident, he would follow Charlie's career as a jump jockey, always concerned if he had fall and would get in touch to see how he was."

Tina, known to us from the Co-op says "Mr Atkins was instrumental in getting Aaron work experience, then a job, at Terry's, the Architects, where he still works." He recently wept in the High Street when hearing sad news about one of his former pupils. He was interested in each one, right till the end.

Mike had other passions as well as Dedham C of E Primary School. He was well known for his love of dogs, and always enjoyed horse racing, but most of all, he was devoted to Matthew, his son, Claire his much-loved daughter-in-law, and his wonderful grandchildren, and them to him. The village will miss him – and I will miss a very dear, mellow old friend.

Gardening Notes

HAPPY NEW (GARDENING) YEAR

I hope you enjoyed the festivities and that any events (say games night) brought you together for plenty of fun and just the right amount of competitive spirit.

Winters being what they are these days, the garden is already alive with pops of colour with plenty of plants flowering their little hearts out right now. Bulbs like snowdrops, crocus and iris reticulata are competing with the hellebores, primroses and primulas, while

over them shrubs from mahonia and forsythia to pussy willow and hazel are offering up pollen and nectar to earlyemerging pollinators.

If you're looking for something to do (I know you are), February is a great time to prune roses and give them the best start to the year ahead. Make sure you use your sharpest secateurs to make the job easier and for cleaner cuts that cause less damage to the plant. Have some loppers and maybe a sharp pruning saw to hand for thicker stems, (if you have to strain to cut with secateurs, switch to a bigger tool). Don't make random cuts; always go back to something – just above a bud, leaf or the joint with another stem. Roses are pretty tough, so don't worry too much about how you prune them. You might get a bit of die back or lose some flowers if you cut at the wrong time, but pruning is unlikely to kill your plants.

Bush roses hybrid teas (largeflowered) and floribunda (cluster flowered) flower on the current season's growth, so prune them hard now. Remove all weak, wispy, damaged or crossing stems first. Then take back anything that remains to form an open bowl or cone shape. I know some who traditionally cut hybrid teas back to 60cms each year and RHS Wisley aims to cut out all three-year-old wood in favour of younger more vigorous growth. Shrub roses have a wide range of varieties and need very little pruning. It's fine to do these now too and you can even whip over them with a hedgetrimmer or shears, though I quite like the zen-like use of secateurs. You can also cut

them back in late summer once they have finished flowering.

Then there are the true climbers, flowering from early summer to autumn with single large blooms. Aim to remove about a third of the plant – the oldest, woodiest stems – to maintain a framework, or long shoots trained horizontally so side shoots (which carry the flowers) break from them come spring. You can do this any time after they've flowered but certainly no later than this month. If you do it when the side-shoots have started growing, you'll cut off flower buds.



Roses

Ramblers are also climbers (I know, confusing) but carry clusters of smaller flowers once, around mid-summer. These

don't need a lot of pruning but should be trained and trimmed immediately after flowering as the flowers grow mostly on stems that sprout in late summer.

From roses to grasses – ornamental that is, not the lawn – which are starting to look ragged now. Don't worry about evergreen varieties, like Stipa gigantea, which just need the flower spikes cutting off at the base at the end of this month or in March, and maybe a comb through with your hands (wear thick gloves) to rake out dead leaves.

Instead, focus on deciduous grasses – I have Miscanthus sinensis 'Flamingo' and 'Malepartus', and Calamagrostis × acutiflora 'Karl Foerster' – which should be cut back hard, close to the ground. Right now, the new green shoots shouldn't be too long but be careful not to cut off any that are emerging. If you want to move your ornamental grasses, wait until late May or early June, when they are growing strongly and will have the best chance of surviving.

I hope 2025 has started well for you all and you are looking forward to the year ahead.
