Revelation Two assumes that you have accepted Jesus as your Savior and Lord. Given that you have made a personal commitment to live your life with Jesus, Revelation Two builds upon this necessary first step in discipleship and explores the next step: Are you ready to receive new life in Jesus? We will only experience new life in Jesus when we are totally dependent on God for everything, willing out of love and gratitude to be at His beck and call. Covenant living or union with God presupposes a wholehearted and voluntary offering of self to the other. Our covenant with God is a family bond in which we are inextricably linked with God. Our lives will have purpose only when we offer ourselves wholeheartedly in generous and faithful service to God and His covenant family in response to God's total gift of Himself through His Son, Jesus. The focus in life, therefore, is on the other's well-being and not on self.

Our Triune God has given Himself to us wholeheartedly and with enduring mercy: The Father so loved the world, sinful humanity, so that through His Son we might have eternal life. Jesus laid down His life for us so that through His death we could address God as Abba, Father. Through Jesus' intercession, the Father has given us the Holy Spirit as our Advocate. The Father dwells in our hearts along with Jesus and the Holy Spirit. It is for us to ponder the invitation to let God come into the inner recesses of our hearts: "Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, [then] I will enter his house and dine with him, and he with me" (Revelation 3: 20). God becomes the beginning and end of our life, every question is asked in God's presence, and every answer is received from the Holy Spirit. If we lived life according to our true nature, we would understand that in our relationship with God, we are the satellite and God is the Center of our world. We would therefore seek constantly to be at God's beck and call.



PREPARING FOR THE JOURNEY

In Week One, we will have the privilege of entering the depths of God's tender love for us through His Son Jesus, who tells us who He is and through whom alone we come to know the Father and the Holy Spirit. John the Baptist is the first witness who knows beyond any doubt that Jesus is the Son of God: "Now I have seen and testified that he is the Son of God." John had an impeccable reputation among his listeners, even among the religious leaders whom he castigated for their hypocrisy and corruption. Then we listen to Jesus Himself testifying that He is the Bread of Life, the Good Shepherd, the Resurrection and the Life, the Way, the Truth, and the Life! Only if Jesus is God can He describe Himself is such a manner! Jesus worked miracles in His own name because He was God. And Jesus could testify on His own behalf because His Father too offered His testimony by sending Jesus to us: "Even in your law it is written that the testimony of two men can be verified. I testify on my behalf and so does the Father who sent me" (John 8: 17-18). If you believe that Jesus is I AM, the Son of God, the Bread of Life, the Good Shepherd, the Resurrection and the Life, and the Way, the Truth, and the Life, you are ready to receive new life in Jesus.



PRAYER TO THE HOLY SPIRIT

You will never become comfortable with God's justice if you do not come to a deep appreciation of God's overwhelming love and compassion for you. Because of His tender compassion, God's mercy will always prevail over His justice toward anyone who has a repentant heart. Jesus bought our redemption from sin with the price of His own life and blood. Jesus became our sin so that we might become God's righteousness as Paul tells us in 2Corinthians 5: 21. Because of this, God greatly exalted Him so that every tongue confesses that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. Through His act of redemption, Jesus has restored us to the full stature of God's own sons and daughters. In his letter to the Ephesians 1: 3-6, Paul captures the amazing and baffling reality that we can participate in God's very own life: "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavens..."



It is important to keep in mind that the Father has the same love for us as He has for His Son. The Father can only love us wholeheartedly and completely because He loves us in and through His Son, our Lamb of sacrifice and High Priest. This wondrous gift of sharing in the divine nature is worthy of adoration and praise of God, and is captured eloquently in Revelation 5: 12: "Worthy is the Lamb that was slain to receive power and riches, wisdom and strength, honor and glory and blessing." Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world, heal my soul!

By now it has become clear that the nightly review of the day consists of first asking the Holy Spirit to overshadow us and guide us as we reflect on our discipleship. The first step is to thank God for the blessings and graces that we have received. These blessings have been poured out upon us during this day. It is quite possible, however, that the Holy Spirit will remind us of countless other blessings that we have been receiving our whole lives. Within the context of receiving the Blessed Trinity's boundless love and forgiveness, we express our amazement and gratitude. We then examine our own response to God. As our Advocate, the Holy Spirit convicts us when we have sinned and encourages us toward repentance and a firm purpose of amendment. As we examine our conscience, we pay special attention to the Particular Examination of Conscience, seeing how we have fared in addressing the particular weakness or core wound in us. We then make an Act of Contrition and firmly resolve to live out our discipleship generously and wholeheartedly. Thus, the nightly review of the day is a significant practice in a disciple's formation. It always helps to review the impact our morning Face to Face visit with God has had on us. Our reflection can be a valuable source of gratitude to God as well as a stepping-stone toward repentance. During our morning Face to Face with God, we spent time reflecting on God's love and compassion for us. Because of His tender compassion, God's mercy will always prevail over His justice toward anyone who has a repentant heart. We encourage you to journal on the following questions: What is God saying to you? For what are you grateful? For what are you contrite? What spiritual discipline, including fasting, do you need to focus on tomorrow?

JOHN THE BAPTIST'S WITNESS ABOUT JESUS

"Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world. He is the one of whom I said, 'A man is coming after me who ranks ahead of me because he existed before me.' I did not know him, but the reason why I came baptizing with water was that he might be made known to Israel." John testified further, saying, "I saw the Spirit come down like a dove from the sky and remain upon him. I did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptize with water told me, 'On whomever you see the Spirit come down and remain, he is the one who will baptize with the holy Spirit.' Now I have seen and testified that he is the Son of God." - John 1: 29-34

In the Prologue to his gospel account, John clearly identifies Jesus as the Word who was with God and was God (John 1:1). And in verse 14, the Evangelist states that this same Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us, and the Apostles saw His glory as of the Father's only Son, full of grace and truth. From then on, the Beloved Disciple marshals witness after witness to testify that Jesus is the Son of God, full of grace and truth. Equally important, he cites example after example of people who are not willing to accept Jesus as the Messiah and Son of God.



John the Baptist is the first and possibly the most prominent of John's witnesses. John the Baptist is the first person to refer to Jesus as "the Lamb of God." When he first saw Jesus during his baptism ministry at the Jordan, he cried out "Behold, the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world." John is recognizing Jesus as the great Suffering Servant prophesied by Isaiah. One day God would send someone to rescue Israel from sin, and he would do it by suffering "like a lamb that is led to the slaughter" (Isaiah 53:7). Moreover, this servant of the Lord would bear the people's iniquities and "make himself an offering for sin" (Isaiah 53:10). And his self-offering would have redemptive power. Through his sacrifice, many would be made righteous (Isaiah 53:11). John the Baptist, therefore, identifies Jesus as the long-awaited Suffering Servant of Isaiah 53 – the Lamb who would offer His life as a sacrifice for sin, a crucified Savior. And in Matthew 17: 22-23, Jesus referred to Himself as the Suffering Servant: "The Son of Man is to be handed over to men, and they will kill him, and he will be raised on the third day."

The Baptist received a special revelation about Jesus: "On whomever you see the Spirit come down and remain, he is the one who will baptize with the holy Spirit." John saw the Holy Spirit descend upon Jesus at His baptism and was told that Jesus would baptize with the Holy Spirit, a sharp contrast to his baptism of repentance. In the light of his revelations from the Holy Spirit, John knows beyond any doubt that Jesus is the Son of God. And he is endorsing Jesus' self-claims about His divinity: "Now I have seen and testified that he is the Son of God!" Lord Jesus, I desire to receive new life in you!

This evening, while doing the various steps of the Examination of Conscience, you might want to be attentive to your patterns of behavior that lead you into desolation. These patterns are generally long-standing and deeply ingrained in us. And they lead us into desolation because of their addictive nature. What then would be some of the sources that would encourage addictive behaviors leading to desolation? For today's review, I would like to name three sources: un-forgiveness, an unruly tongue, and the addictive use of the Internet. We become angry, unloving, and bitter when we harbor un-forgiveness. We will possess a tranquil spirit only if we forgive ourselves and others. For various reasons, un-forgiveness being one of them, our tongues can become deadly instruments of sin. James 3: 7-8, puts it very graphically: "For every kind of beast and bird, or reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by the human species, but no human being can tame the tongue. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison." You might want to examine how you used your tongue today. The Internet is another area of our lives that could lead to dissipation and sin. Pornography has become a deadly problem for millions of people. How free are you from lustful curiosity leading to secrecy, guilt, and sin? How would you evaluate the use of your time in making phone calls, texting, googling, etc.? Whenever we overindulge ourselves, we are contaminating our spirits. We then experience the blahs, a lack of motivation, a propensity to postpone carrying out our responsibilities, and feeling distant from God. As disciples of Jesus, we owe it to our Savior to humbly acknowledge our sins and make an act of repentance and contrition. We encourage you to journal on the following questions: What is God saying to you? For what are you grateful? For what are you contrite? What spiritual discipline, including fasting, do you need to focus on tomorrow?

"Amen, amen, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up on the last day. For my flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him. Just as the living Father sent me and I have life because of the Father, so also the one who feeds on me will have life because of me. This is the bread that came down from heaven... whoever eats this bread will live forever."- John 6: 53-58

The Bread of Life Discourse is preceded by the Multiplication of the Loaves and Jesus walking on the Water. Through these two signs, Jesus indicates that His mission is to bring about a second Exodus to establish the New and Eternal covenant. Jesus' Exodus in Jerusalem is foretold in the conversation between Moses, Elijah, and Jesus during the Transfiguration (Luke 9: 30-31). Here, in His Discourse on the Bread of Life, Jesus reflects on the Exodus and Mosaic Covenant as laying the groundwork and pointing toward His Exodus that will establish the New and Everlasting Covenant.



The multiplication of loaves was like the multiplication of manna in the desert. However, Jesus contrasts the manna (bread) of the first Exodus with the manna (Himself) of the second Exodus, when he says, "Your ancestors ate the manna in the desert, but they died; this is the bread that comes down from heaven so that one may eat it and not die. I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world" (John 6:49-51).

Jesus emphasizes the necessity of eating His body and drinking His blood five times in the above six verses! Partaking of blood was taboo in the Old Testament as blood was the source of life and God was its origin and cause. The Israelites had to drain the animal of its blood before they offered it in sacrifice or ate it for food. In asking us to partake of His blood, Jesus is stating categorically that He is God, the Source of Eternal Life. Partaking of His Body and Blood as our food is partaking of God's eternal life. Jesus is very graphic in His description, to allay any doubt about really eating Him when He says that "the one who feeds on me [the way a carnivore gnaws at its carcass] will have life because of me" (John 6:57). Rather than using the Greek word phagon for human eating, the Greek word trogon is used, meaning literally to gnaw or crunch as an animal would. The tense of the verb trogon implies a continuous feeding on the body and blood of Jesus. Jesus also tells us why it is necessary for us to eat His body and drink His blood: "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him."



Through Holy Communion, we abide in Jesus and are given a share in the fullness of God's divine Life: "Just as the living Father sent me and I have life because of the Father, so also the one who feeds on me will have life because of me" (John 6: 57). Lord Jesus, I desire to receive new life in you!

The nightly review of the day is a significant practice in a disciple's formation. The context for our nightly review is our covenant relationship with God. In your morning Face to Face with God today, you heard Jesus make the bold claim that He is God and the Bread of Life: "I AM the Bread of life." In calling Himself the Bread of life, Jesus made the bold claim that He would vanguish the darkness of Satan and sin because He is the source of divine life. He can be our Savior because He is God! Almost every day of our lives, we are confronted with the forces of darkness. Evil seems to be pervasive wherever we look. Our trust in Jesus as the light of the world and the Bread of life is challenged. What spiritual practices did you engage in when you were shaken by disturbing reports in the media? During your review, you can temper these spiritual disturbances through your prayer of thanksgiving. Every single day, God is suffusing our lives with His tender mercies and unconditional love. Every single day of our lives, then, is an opportunity to praise, adore, and thank God for His indescribable goodness and loving kindness. With thanksgiving in your heart, you can go over your day, and see how God has been Emmanuel, with you and in you. You can then do an examination of your conscience to see how you responded in your covenant union with Him. Did you succumb to temptation and did you commit deliberate sin? As disciples of Jesus, we owe it to our Savior to honestly acknowledge our sins and make an act of repentance and contrition. After you have examined your conscience and are ready to ask forgiveness, you can pray the Act of Contrition. We encourage you to journal on the following questions: What is God saying to you? For what are you grateful? For what are you contrite? What spiritual discipline, including fasting, do you need to focus on tomorrow?

Throughout the gospel of John, there is steady and mounting opposition to Jesus from the Jewish leadership. As a religious body, the Sanhedrin was required to safeguard and promote proper temple worship and religious practices. However, they were corrupt and self-serving, imposing unjust burdens upon the people to serve their own selfish purposes. Jesus asked His listeners to do what they (Jewish leadership) asked but not follow their actions. The people did not listen to them because, as Jesus said, they were "thieves and robbers, but the sheep did not listen to them" (John 10: 8).

Jesus is contrasting Himself with them. As opposed to them being thieves and robbers, Jesus describes Himself as the good shepherd that was described in Psalm 23: "The LORD is my shepherd; ... He guides me along right paths... Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me."



Jesus speaks of Himself in similar terms. He contrasts Himself with frauds who masquerade as shepherds: thieves, marauders, strangers, hired hands. For His sheep, Jesus is willing to give His life. In a true sense, His sheep are more important to Him than His very life! He will not hesitate, therefore, to sacrifice Himself on the cross on behalf of His sheep. Furthermore, His mission as Shepherd and Savior is to create a covenant relationship between the Blessed Trinity and us, His sheep. Such a desire would be ludicrous and impossible if it were coming from anyone other than Jesus, because sheep are supposedly dumb and dependent animals. They are unable to survive on their own. They need a watchful and devoted shepherd if they are to survive and thrive in the wild.

We are aptly described as sheep because of the foolishness and danger of sin lurking in our hearts. Through His Holy Spirit, Jesus brings about our transformation so that we will know Him in the same way that the Father knows Him, and He knows the Father. Jesus is talking about an intimate union with us along the lines of Trinitarian union, a Mystery that is beyond our comprehension, and yet stirs our hearts deeply! There are other sheep that need to be brought into the fold. Jesus continues to increase His flock by sending His followers to make disciples of those who choose Jesus as their Good Shepherd and Lord! We are commissioned to be witnesses of Jesus! Lord Jesus, I desire to receive new life in you!

"Jesus told her, "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" - John 11: 25-26

Everything about Jesus' identity and mission hinges on His resurrection from the dead! He has been maintaining that He has come to fulfill the law and the prophets. Every messianic promise and prophecy will be fulfilled in Him. Furthermore, Jesus is bringing about the salvation of the world as the Suffering Servant prophesied in Isaiah. His approach goes radically against the long-awaited expectation of Israel that God would raise for them a political Messiah-King who would oust foreign rule once and for all and establish the Davidic kingdom of Israel permanently. The Fourth Suffering Servant Oracle would describe Jesus aptly in His passion, crucifixion, and death: "Like one from whom you turn your face, spurned, and we held him in no esteem. Yet it was our pain that he bore, our sufferings he endured. We thought of him as stricken, struck down by God and afflicted, but he was pierced for our sins, crushed for our iniquity. He bore the punishment that makes us whole, by his wounds we were healed" (Isaiah 53: 3-5).



Humanly speaking, such a mission would be doomed to failure if it were not Jesus who is staking the fulfillment of His Father's plan of salvation through His death on the cross and His resurrection!

In his gospel, John is quite aware of the stakes. He offers us seven signs or miracles, and the raising of Lazarus is the last sign that he offers. The Synoptic Gospels do not mention this miracle. There are several ironies that John makes note of in the circumstances of this miracle. In His ministry, Jesus has been projecting Himself as the Source of light and life (John, chapters 7-9). The raising of Lazarus is an emphatic exclamation mark to His assertion. Ironically enough, it is after such an amazing return to life from death that the Sanhedrin makes the decision to put Jesus to death. Because of their blindness to Jesus, the Light of the world, they could not envisage that if they put Him to death, He would indeed rise from the dead! Indeed, the resurrection of Lazarus was a harbinger of the resurrection of Jesus Himself! The raising of Lazarus is a sign of the divine life that Jesus, raised from the dead, will offer to anyone who accepts Him as their Savior and Lord. Despite the crisis that Martha was undergoing because of her brother's death, she came to believe that Jesus was the Messiah, the Son of God, the one who is coming into the world. Her faith was deeply enhanced after Jesus was raised from the dead! We can ask to have the same deep faith and trust in Jesus that Martha had, especially in our own times of crisis.

Jesus is speaking to His disciples in the Upper Room. They are there to celebrate the Passover Feast of the sacrifice of the lamb and its eating in a meal. More significantly, it is going to be the celebration of the Passover Feast of the New and Everlasting Covenant that Jesus will institute through His sacrifice on the cross. He will be the Lamb of Sacrifice! In this celebration of the new Passover Feast, the meal will precede the sacrifice of Jesus, the Lamb of God. Through His death on the cross, Jesus as our Passover Lamb will bring about our Exodus into the Kingdom of God. The world will never be the same after what takes place in the Upper Room and the next day on Calvary.

This gathering then has momentous overtones. The final hours of His earthly life are upon Jesus and the disciples. The atmosphere in the Upper Room is intimate and somber. There is a sense of urgency and set purpose on Jesus' part. His fixed gaze on accomplishing His Father's will is contrasted with the anxiety and uncertainty of the disciples.



Before He departs from this world, Jesus has some important revelations to make. He reiterates several truths that He had expounded upon earlier in His teachings. And He also offers us some new revelations.

Thomas and the disciples are filled with anxiety and uncertainty as to what will happen and where Jesus will be going, even though He assures them that He is going to the Father and will return to take them there: "Master, we do not know where you are going; how can we know the way? In response, Jesus says, "I am the way and the truth and the life." This is one of the seven "I AM" statements of Jesus found in John's gospel. It is Jesus, the Incarnate Son of God, who will bring about our entrance into the Kingdom of God, making us His Father's sons and daughters, through His death on the cross. And His resurrection will affirm the fact that God has accepted Jesus' sacrifice on our behalf!

With great confidence, therefore, we can put our faith and trust in Jesus. Through Him, we will be saved and will rise with Him from the dead! Jesus is the only way, the only truth, and the only life, because He is God: "No one comes to the Father except through me." And He shares the divine life of the Blessed Trinity with us. It is only in, with, and through Him that we can share in God's Life! There is no other savior besides Jesus. One can come to the Father only through Jesus, our Way, Truth, and Life!

PRAYER TO THE HOLY SPIRIT

Come, Holy Spirit, and overshadow me with your gentle wisdom and power as I endeavor to sit at the feet of Jesus during this period of prayer. Purify my mind and heart as I seek to make the teachings of Jesus my priority in life, thinking, speaking, and doing as He desires. You are the Keeper of my soul, leading me into God's heart. May I be docile and submissive to your wisdom and guidance, and may my life be a pleasing offering in your sight, through Christ our Lord. Amen.

For many Christians, vocal prayer has been their staple communication with God. One form of vocal prayer is to take the words of others and make them our own. When we do so, we either pray them from a prayer book, or learn them from memory. The Psalms are wonderful examples of prayers that were composed by others in various life-circumstances. In many instances, holy women and men have put vocal prayers together when they were experiencing significant communion, or lack of it, with the Lord. These prayers, therefore, have a ring of authenticity and authority about them. We resonate with their prayers, and slowly but inexorably we make their holy words our own. In this way, we derive comfort from walking in the footsteps of our holy forebears. It is important, therefore, whether we are using the words of others or our own, that we pray from our hearts. Using our own words is especially appropriate when we are burdened and distraught, as well as when we are experiencing deep consolation. Our own words express who we truly are or want to be before God. And as we seek to mean what we say we pay loving attention to the Presence of God to whom we are offering our supplication. Several prayers have been hallowed by generations of faithful believers. They are a combination of vocal prayer with some other forms of prayer, like meditation and the use of imagination. Some such prayers are the Rosary, the Stations of the Cross, and the Chaplet of Divine Mercy. Lord Jesus, I desire to receive new Life in you!



Prayer is the vehicle by which we express our relationship with God. It is the place where we speak to God, and as we mature in the relationship, God speaks to us and we learn to listen and recognize God's voice. The purpose of prayer is to bring us into the Presence of God where we move from communication to communion to union with the Divine. It is important, therefore, whether we are using the words of others or our own, that we pray from our hearts. These words express who we truly are or want to be before God. And as we seek to mean what we say, we pay loving attention to the Presence of God to whom we are offering our supplication. Contrary to what some may think, vocal prayer is an exalted form of prayer that has been used by holy women and men throughout the ages. It is effective prayer that can and does lead one into the heart of God.

The nightly review of the day is a time of intimate and honest contact with the Lord. It is a visit when the Lord reveals His heart to us and in turn helps us to take an honest look at our own love and commitment to Him. The Lord reveals His heart through the Holy Spirit, reminding us how He has been Emmanuel, God-with-us throughout the day. God has overwhelmed us with grace upon grace, suffusing our lives with His tender mercies and unconditional love. Our single greatest blessing is that Jesus is our Messiah, the Son of the Living God! Every blessing flows out of this source of divine life! Indeed, Jesus is our Way, Truth, and Life! Every single day of our lives, then, is an opportunity to praise, adore, and thank God for His indescribable goodness and loving kindness in Jesus. So, with thanksgiving in your heart, you can go over your day and see how God was Emmanuel, with you and in you. You can then do an examination of your conscience to see how you responded as Jesus' disciple. You can assess honestly your commitment to Jesus as your personal Savior and Lord. As disciples of Jesus, we owe it to our Savior to honestly acknowledge our sins and make an act of repentance and contrition. After you have examined your conscience and are ready to ask forgiveness, you can pray the Act of Contrition. We encourage you to journal on the following questions: What is God saying to you? For what are you grateful? For what are you contrite? What spiritual discipline, including fasting, do you need to focus on tomorrow?



Examination of CONSCIENCE

Prayer of Thanksgiving

O my God, I thank you for all the graces and blessings which I have received from you this day. Express to God your gratitude as you recall the blessings and graces that were present today: For what are you grateful?

Examination of Conscience

O my God, give me light to see what sins I have committed, and grant me the grace to be sorry for them: For what are you contrite? What spiritual discipline, including fasting, do you need to focus on tomorrow? Recall your sins of the day and repent in sincere sorrow for the sins you have committed, by reciting the Act of Contrition.

The Act of Contrition

O my God, I am heartily sorry for having offended You and I detest all my sins, because I dread the loss of heaven and the pains of hell, but most of all because they offend You, my God, who are all good and deserving of all my love. I firmly resolve, with the help of your grace, to confess my sins, to do penance and to amend my life. Amen.

- Make an intentional effort to do your Morning and Night Prayer at the same time daily.
- Add your journaling to either your Morning or Night Prayer.
