Community groups unite to tackle transport challenges in Winchelsea

Representatives from Winchelsea Probus, Lions, Men's Shed, Growing Winchelsea, Winchelsea Star, and the Surf Coast Shire met yesterday to discuss ways to assist the community following the removal of local bus services.

The meeting highlighted that some of Winchelsea's most vulnerable and isolated residents now face significant barriers accessing transport for essential trips such as shopping, appointments, and social excursions.

The groups agreed that by collaborating and making full use of the Surf Coast Shire's Bus Subsidy Program (available until 30 June 2027), the community can take proactive steps to address this gap.

Ideas discussed included:

- Developing a planned annual program of trips coordinated by community organisations.
- Encouraging Seniors groups to use some of their existing funding to continue scaled-down shopping trips.
- Building a case for a permanent community bus service by demonstrating clear community demand and utilisation of the available subsidy.

"After 2027, no subsidy assistance will be available, so now is the time to act—to show that there is a genuine community need and to build momentum for a sustainable, long-term transport solution," said John Tebbutt, President of Growing Winchelsea.

The vision is to create a community bus service that connects residents of all ages and abilities—operating in partnership with local business, community groups, and government. With the right collaboration and community spirit, philanthropic support may also become possible to help bring this initiative to life.

How's your shower?

Back in the 1860's, when our beautiful stone house was built, hot water was manufactured by hanging a large container by a chain over the open fire. The container and chain are still there but haven't been used for many years When we purchased our property on Dickson's Rd. 50 years ago our hot water system depended on a briquette system. Briquettes were sourced from brown coal mines such as out at Bambra, Anglesea and Yallourn. Briquettes are a highly atmosphere polluting material. Also, if you forgot to keep the briquettes up, you had a cold shower.

When we first bought our property, the electric power was provided by power lines running across the front paddock for about 100 metres. Tall posts kept the power lines out of reach and safe. Then one day we got home and found a pole had rotted off and fallen over. The power lines were lying on the ground.

Repairs took about a week. We decided to do away with the pole and put our incoming power lines under-ground. At the same time, we decided to change the briquette hot water system to an electric one. The electrician said it was ok as the rating was 170, (whatever that means), and the lines could carry the extra load.

Then Rochelle and family came back from Vanuatu. We decided to give them the stone house. Prue and I moved into a granny flat with power lines and water connected to the stone house. To ensure we did not overload the electrical system we decided to install a gas hot water system on our granny flat.

That worked very well at first. An awkward problem was the gas bottle running out as you were under the shower. Also, gas was quite expensive.

However, as it aged it became very temperamental. For no apparent reason the gas could shut off and the water landing on you while you while standing under the shower was very cold. It would also take a long time to get organised and start-up. Also, LPG use was not good for the atmosphere, so we decided to up-grade.

Son-in-law Tony suggested a Heat-Bank. A what....? We learnt that Heat-Banks take warmth out of the atmosphere and transfers it to heat the water banked up in a tank. We were told the amount of electricity required to do this is considerably less than conventional electric hot water systems.

So ok. That was the track we went down. It was suggested we contact Joe from Sunworks over at Torquay who is an expert in Heat Bank instillation. That is what we did. Joe and his electrician mate arrived and set to work. They disconnected and removed the old hot water system and installed the heat bank system.

My understanding is that the heat bank starts at 10AM transferring heat from the atmosphere to water in the storage tank and finishes at 2 pm. When it has finished the water is so hot you can't hold your hand under the hot tap and you need to calm it down with cold water. You very much need to test the temperature of the shower before getting under.

While the heat bank was being installed, we also installed a battery to make better use of the solar panels ton the stone house roof. When I have had time to analyse the difference the battery makes to our power bills, I will do a write up for The Star on battery installation.

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Tomato Tips

November is tomato planting time

My tomato seedlings are, so far, progressing well this year, keeping in mind: that one should not count their tomato seedlings until they have produced ample tomatoes!



Each year I save my tomato seeds by placing them on kitchen paper. I have found that it pays to do this diligently, placing each seed on the kitchen paper one at a time spacing their distance so when it comes to potting them, all I have to do is cut a rectangle of 6 to 8 seeds that will fit nicely in each punnet.

I use a commercial potting mix mixed with my compost, maybe a little sand if I have some, but always horse manure

The horse manure was recommended by a neighbour when we first moved to Deans Marsh back in the mid-1980s. He popped in asking if he may gather some of our horse's manure to grow his tomato seeds. He swore it was the best manure for tomatoes.

I plant my tomato seeds early August so they will hopefully be ready to plant in the veggie garden Melbourne Cup week. Planting Melbourne Cup week was another neighbour's recommendation for the Deans Marsh area.

Initially, for several years, my seedlings were raised in the house placing their punnets on trays on a series of little side tables beside north facing windows, I now have a little hot house.

Seedlings are potted up to 3" tubes once they produce their second set of leaves. When established in their tubes they are placed outside during the day to commence toughening up, eventually staying out 24 hours before being planted in the veggie garden Melbourne Cup week.





Paul usually takes over here, planting, staking & good watering in straight away. Later, as they become established, mulching with straw, adding ties as they grow to their stakes. I have found using shredded lengths of old flannelette sheets the best for tying them to their stakes. The flannelette sheets are soft and gentle on their stems.

To pinch out or not to pinch out the laterals?

Laterals are the small 'branches' that grow between leaves on the central leader. We usually start with pinching them out but are not too fussed once they're matured. Once they start fruiting, they are netted! (With the legal extra small-hole net). Gotta keep those birds out, they don't like to share!! We have the poly pipe hoop set up which makes for easier entering, exiting, weeding & picking.

We grow large tomatoes which are excellent sliced thick or thinly also to make chutney & preserve in Fowler's Vacola jars. I love a variety of little toms for their shapes & colours for salads & popping in my mouth as I pick them.



The little red ones I'll take the time to place them in a single layer on a baking tray in the freezer, once they're frozen they go in a plastic bag together. This way, they're like frozen peas they don't clag together but stay separate.

I love a year where I have enough preserved & frozen tomatoes all year to use and I don't have to resort to bought tin tomatoes!

- Maximum size of accepted container is 20 litres
- All containers must have lid and be securely closed
- Packaging is limited to the original plastic or metal paint containers
- A maximum of 100-litres per visit. The volume of paint is measured by the size of the container, not the amount of paint inside.

For example, you can return:

- 5 x 20 litre paint cans
- 10 x 10 litre paint cans
- 50 x 2 litre paint cans.

What happens to waste paint?

Solvent-based paints are converted into an alternative energy, while water is removed from acrylic paints and the by-products are reused in industrial applications. The paint tins/tubs are also recycled.



history of winchelsea

Charles Beal 1821-14 January 1888



Last week we examined Beale and Trebeck, the duo who founded the town of Winchelsea by establishing the Barwon Inn (the Bottom Pub).

Unlike his counterpart, Prosper Nicholas Trebeck, who left the Victorian Colony to pursue his interests in New South Wales, Charles Beal (also spelled Beale) remained in the Winchelsea District his entire life after he and Trebeck founded the town of Winchelsea.

Charles Beal was born in 1821, in Kent, UK, to Thomas Beal, aged 36 and Eliza Marsh, aged 15. He emigrated to Van Diemen's Land aged 17 in 1838.

Arriving at Geelong in March, 1839, he was made manager of the Woolpack Inn, later known as Macks. Before his 21st Birthday he moved to Austins Ford, which was soon to become Winchelsea.

In 1842, Beal opened the Barwon Hotel with Prosper Trebeck. The Beal and Trebeck partnership endured till 1860, when Trebeck went to Sydney. Several grazing runs were held by the partnership. These included Waterloo Plains, Mt. Gellibrand, Mt. Duneed, and the Barwon River run—better known as Bleak House on the Princes Highway, Birregurra.

Around 1850 Beal leased some land near Tarndwarrncoort from Charles Airey (Namesake of Airey's Inlet) who purchased it from Alexander Dennis.

Charles married Amy Murch on 9 May 1855, in Victoria, Australia. They had 1 son and 5 daughters.

In November 1862, Beal was a member of the Winchelsea District Road Board along with Mr. Maidment, Arthur Hopkins, Sterling, and Anderson. His seat on the council was contested in 1864 by Mr. John Bartlett and seconded by Mr. Thomas Clarke. For many years Beal served as a councillor on the Winchelsea Shire Council, and took an active part in public affairs. In March 1869, Beal was announced a Shire Council Auditor for Winchelsea along with Mr. William Timms of Mount Hesse.

All the while Beal was living and working as a pastoralist at Mount Gellibrand. In April 1870 Beal was a Trustee to the Anglican Christ Church, Birregurra along with The Hon. Charles Sladen, of Ripple Vale; George Armytage of Ingleby; Davenport Bromfield, Birregurra, and Richard Armstrong, Turkeith. The building was designed by Architect Leonard Terry, Esq., Melbourne and cost, £2600.

Beal was magistrate at the Birregurra Police court in 1875 along with Alexander Dennis and Mr. Prime.

Beal retired to Lorne in 1882, and he died and was buried there on 14 January 1888 aged 67 years.

Charles Beal is remembered in Winchelsea by the name of Beal Court, which intersects with Trebeck Court, next to Barwon Park.

Hello everyone, my name is Shannon, and I am a 21 year old up-and-coming model. I live in Townsville these days, but I am originally from Melbourne. This week I have the honour of sharing some insights on my modelling experiences with the readers of the Winchelsea Star.



I was fortunate enough to land a big role for my first shoot, during Melbourne Fashion Week 2022. It was quite special, as it was the most important and professional shoot I've ever done, and I owe the experience to a family friend, the well-known stylist Lana Barker, who has been a great supporter and has guided me in the industry. The shoot, which was for a Melbourne Fashion Week high tea, had a Bridgerton theme from the TV series, and was staged in the Collins Coffee House, Melbourne. 

Dame Nellie Melba, Australia's Songbird Divine

In the realm of opera, few names shine brighter than Dame Nellie Melba. This Australian soprano's voice was hailed as a gift from the gods, captivating audiences worldwide with its beauty, purity, and technical precision.

Born Helen Porter Mitchell on May 19, 1861, in Richmond, Victoria, Australia, Melba's early life showed little indication of future stardom. However, despite strict parents who strongly disapproved of an operatic career for their daughter, Nellie excelled at her vocal lessons in Melbourne, and later, after separating from her husband, she travelled to Paris to study with the renowned Mathilde Marchesi.

Melba's professional debut in 1887 at the Theatre Royal in Brisbane was met with acclaim, but it was her 1888 Covent Garden debut as Gilda in Rigoletto that catapulted her to international fame. Critics raved about her voice, praising its "luminous tone, impeccable phrasing, and dramatic intensity" (The Times, 1888).

Throughout her illustrious career, Melba performed alongside opera's greatest stars, including Enrico Caruso and Luisa Tetrazzini. Her signature roles included Mimi in La Boheme, Violetta in La Traviata, and the title character in Lucia di Lammermoor. Melba's vocal range was remarkably versatile, effortlessly transitioning between coloratura and lyric soprano roles, although she never successfully performed Wagner roles, as they were too heavy for the light timbre of her voice. This caused her a lot of frustration, as Wagner was extremely popular at the time.





Offstage, Melba was known for her fiery personality, strong will, and sharp wit. She was a true diva, demanding the highest standards from herself and those around her. This intensity sometimes sparked conflicts with conductors and fellow performers, but it also fuelled her relentless pursuit of vocal perfection, which ended up creating one of Australia's greatest artistic legends.

Melba's impact extended far beyond the opera house, as she strove to bring fine arts to rural areas of Australia. Many a little weatherboard country hall rang with one of the finest voices to ever grace the stages of La Scala and Covent Garden. Many a rural woman and man was transfixed by her glorious trills, a sound they would remember to their dying day.

A fascinating contrast to her public diva persona... Dame Nellie Melba's private life was marked by passion, heartbreak, and independence.

Married life: In 1884, she wed Charles Frederick Nisbett Armstrong, with whom she had one son, George. However, their union ended in separation due to his alcoholism and abusive behaviour.

Love affair: Melba's most notable romance was with Philippe, Duc d'Orléans – a French royal. Their love affair began when Melba gave a spectacular recital in Russia in the court of Tzar Nicholas II. The Duc was so smitten, he broke court protocol by applauding before the Tzar did- earning him an ignominious dismissal from Russia but cementing him in the affections of the diva. This passionate yet doomed love affair inspired some of her most poignant performances.





Motherhood: Despite being forcibly separated from her son George when her ex-husband won full custody, Melba loved her son dearly and made every effort to get him back. Sadly, they were only reunited when George turned 21 and he could return to her without his father's permission.

Personality: Friends described Melba as kind, generous, and witty – a stark contrast to her public persona. She had a surprising penchant for practical jokes, which many notable people discovered the hard way!

Melba was a woman, a mother, an Australian, a diva, an icon, a legend. She persevered to fulfil her calling, despite all the odds. She was the embodiment of the motto "Fortune favours the brave "Her story has inspired generations, as I hope it will inspire you.

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Local news is dwindling globally. Here's how other countries are trying to fix it

Australians and people the world over rely on local journalism to keep them informed, but the sector is in a lot of trouble. More than 200 local newspapers in regional Australia significantly cut their services or closed during the COVID pandemic.

Many other newspaper businesses have centralised operations or made cuts to save money. Publications are increasingly filled with syndicated and homogenised content, meaning news is not always relevant to their audiences.

One potential answer lies in partnerships between local media outlets and public broadcasters.

A sector in crisis

The crisis facing local journalism is a national and international problem. This has prompted a lot of discussion about the challenges facing public interest journalism. In 2022, a parliamentary inquiry into rural and regional newspapers in Australia outlined 12 recommendations to address some of these issues.

One recommendation included support for Australia's public broadcaster, the ABC, to facilitate partnerships with small regional publishers. This could be modelled on a similar scheme in the United Kingdom: the BBC's Local News Partnerships program.

What are other countries doing?

It's against this backdrop that our broader research considers how the ABC might be able to collaborate with existing providers to target "news deserts". These are largely in regional, rural and remote areas vulnerable to losing access to quality local public interest journalism.

Public media in Australia, New Zealand and other countries, including the UK, Canada, Japan, Norway, Sweden, Slovenia, Switzerland and the US are trying to make better quality news by collaborating, in various ways, with small local news outlets.

Public service media organisations also provide training and collaborate during emergencies or natural disasters.

What can Australia do?

Collaboration alone is not the panacea to the news crisis. The issues facing the sector run deep, including impact of big tech companies, the collapse of advertising revenue for legacy media and news avoidance. But it's clear that to solve Australia's news desert problem, working together is essential.

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Could Geothermal energy be part of a clean, green energy plan?

Geothermal energy has huge potential to generate clean power – including from used oil and gas wells

The promise of new engineering techniques for geothermal energy – heat from the Earth itself – has attracted rising levels of investment to this reliable, low-emission power source that can provide continuous electricity almost anywhere on the planet. That includes ways to harness geothermal energy from idle or abandoned oil and gas wells.

Geothermal energy taps into heat beneath the Earth's surface to generate electricity or provide direct heating. Unlike solar or wind, it never stops. It runs around the clock, providing consistent, reliable power with closed-loop water systems and few emissions. Some geothermal power stations can adjust their output to meet demand, rather than running continuously at maximum capacity.

Geothermal sources are also making other renewable-energy projects more effective. Pairing geothermal energy with solar and wind resources and battery storage are increasing the reliability of above-ground renewable power in Texas, among other places. And geothermal energy can power clean hydrogen production as well as energy-intensive efforts to physically remove carbon dioxide from the atmosphere, as is happening in Iceland.

Geothermal energy is not without technical, environmental and economic hurdles. Drilling is expensive, and conventional systems need specific geological conditions. And the systems do use water, though closed-loop systems can minimize consumption.

Building geothermal power stations does require significant investment, but its ability to deliver energy over the long term can offset many of these costs.

Despite its challenges, geothermal energy's reliability, low emissions and scalability make it a vital complement to solar and

wind – and a cornerstone of a stable, low-carbon energy future.

Australia Post overshoots emissions target and hits 100% renewable electricity at operational sites

The government-owned postal giant says carbon emissions have been cut by 20 per cent below financial-year-2019 levels, beating its original target of a 15 per cent cut by 2025 laid out in its sustainability roadmap published in 2022.

Australia Post was also the first Commonwealth Government Business Enterprise to sign on to the Australian federal government's Net Zero by 2050 target.

Since these two plans were agreed to, Australia Post has rolled out one of Australia's largest electric delivery fleets, with over 5,000 e-bikes, motorbikes, and electric delivery vehicles (eDVs).

Bushfire Risk Management program underway

Chief Fire Officer

Bushfires are a natural part of the landscape, but with the right planning and action, we can reduce their impact on communities, the environment and critical infrastructure.

Forest Fire Management Victoria crews are working to reduce the risk and impact of bushfires through planned burning, nonburn bushfire risk management and strategic preparation.

Leaves, small branches, long grass and undergrowth can fuel bushfires making them faster, more intense and harder to control. Bushfire risk management helps reduce this danger by removing excess vegetation (or fuel), protecting communities, the environment and critical infrastructure.

Less fuel means it's harder for a fire to start and spread, and easier for crews to contain. Last season we delivered bushfire risk management across 109,000 hectares of public land.

The bushfire outlook for spring asks Victorians to prepare for increased risk, particularly in the west, but also the southern coast and around Melbourne. With low rainfall over the past 18 months, the outlook shows increased risk from the South Australian border across to Bendigo, the Otways, and Melbourne.

Our bushfire risk management program is underpinned by a scientific evidence over more than 35 years. We acknowledge bushfire science is continually evolving, and invest in the best available science to inform our management program.

Planned burning plays a key role in our work in reducing bushfire risk. It involves the careful use of low-intensity fire to reduce dry vegetation like leaves and small branches that build up over time

and make forests more flammable.

With drier conditions in parts of the state, we've been able to burn over winter, including at Anglesea, Boggy Creek, Gellibrand, Wilson Promontory and Shelley.

In areas where planned burning isn't suitable, near homes, on steep slopes or close to roads and towns, FFMVic uses non-burn bushfire management techniques. These include mowing long grass, mulching dense vegetation, spraying invasive weeds and maintaining public road networks in forests and reserves.

Over coming weeks, expect to see our crews and contractors ramping up the mowing and slashing program. Timing is important; if grass is slashed too early, before it has cured, it will only encourage regrowth.

Our priority is to protect life, property and the environment from the risk of bushfires. When fires happen, we are ready. We have more than 1800 personnel on the frontline, including firefighters, fire lookout observers and fire support officers; firefighting equipment, including 500 ultralight tankers and 100 heavy tankers, and more than 50 aircraft contracted.

But being prepared for the bushfire season is a shared responsibility. While FFMVic crews are working on public land, everyone is encouraged to clean up around their properties to reduce bushfire risk in their own community.

Cracking down on energy retailers to save you money

Victorian Government

The State Government is cracking down on big energy companies by strengthening consumer protection laws and helping save families money on their energy bills.

Changes to the Energy Retail Code of Practice have been announced, making them the strongest in the nation and putting \$258 back into the pockets of Victorians each year.

Energy retailers will be required to automatically switch customers in payment difficulty, and customers who have had debt on their energy bill for more than three months and over \$1,000 debt, onto their best offer.

This will save 75,000 electricity and 60,000 gas customers a total of \$27.8 million per year. Customers can opt-out.

Victorians on older contracts often pay higher rates because they haven't switched plans. That's why we're also introducing a reasonable price limit on energy plans over four years old.

This will stop busy working families being ripped off by the 'loyalty penalty' business model where customers sign up to cheap offers, that end up more expensive over time. Around five per cent of customers haven't changed plans in more than five years and are missing out on potential energy bill savings of up to \$730.

Protections against disconnection are also increased by raising the minimum debt amount that customers must have before a retailer can try to disconnect them from \$300 to \$1,000.

Other changes include capping fees for things like paying bills at the post office or paying late, and banning direct debit only offers – so that customers who don't or can't pay via direct debit can access cheaper offers.

For some low-income families, direct debit is hard to manage when payments are taken straight from their account which can lead to additional bank fees or overdrawn accounts if their balance is low, adding financial stress.

Energy retailers now have to check their customers are eligible for an energy concession more often, so customers can access savings of up to \$260 per year, if their circumstances change and they become eligible.

For energy immediate energy bill relief, Victorians with an eligible concession card can apply for the \$100 Power Saving Bonus now.

These reforms were introduced at the request of the Minister and will be enforced by the independent Essential Services Commission (ESC), taking effect in stages, from February 2026.

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Cromwell's Quirks A Name for Any Other Roses

'THE REAL THING. The meaning of democracy.'

Imagine for a moment being a citizen of a democratic sovereign-nation, that shouldn't tax our imaginations so very greatly, it is after all at least a theoretical possibility. Now imagine that in our democracy, we have no vote in our supreme ruler, there are selected Electors who do that. Now we can't just vote on who become the Electors, or even what process will be used to decide who the Electors will be. We certainly don't get to vote on who will decide what that process will be, or even who gets to use the process and actually choose the Electors. We can only vote on the people and parties, who will decide who the electordeciders will be, who in turn will choose, (in whatever way they deem fit), the Electors, who will finally choose our supreme ruler for us. This system is touted by some as the Greatest Democratic System in the Free World, (GDSFW), affectionately known as the "U.S. Collegiate Electoral System". The GDSFW's claims to greatness vest, (according to the Centre For American Progress), in its power to afford the single fairest representation in the world for "all", based on whatever values they "all" actually share together, apportioning equal political power and maximum participation-opportunity to same "all", (admittedly, paraphrased, but leaving nothing out).

Surprising though it might sound, not all sovereign nations have caught the GDSFW bug, but by all appearances there is an awful lot of "democracy" going about these days, and not all strains are identical. It seems like every nation and political scientist wants their system to be called "democratic", arguing at length why their version is the real one.

One example, "Direct democracy" or "Pure Democracy", is a form in which policy initiatives are decided directly by the electorate, with no element of elected proxies or representatives. (Consider the mandatory, public representation and open balloting of the "Popular Assemblies" of the slave owners who first invented "democracy"). This ancient governance tradition is now practiced in its purest form nowhere but three of the Swiss cantons, so for the democracy purists dreaming of "Absolute Democracy", there's still a long way to go.

Another approach to direct-representation is the very de-centralised "Cellular Democracy", where governance is an hierarchically upsidedown model prioritising autonomy at the local level, affording direct citizen participation. Based on multi-level bottom-up structures of small neighborhood governmental districts, (or in some instances, contractual communities), Cellular Democracy divides a county into neighborhoods of, say, 200 households, whereby it can guarantee voters electing more informed councils that drain minimum resources in administration. An happy coinciding with Cellular Democracy is the overlap afforded with elements of the Public Choice Theory as outlined by Duncan Black in "The Theory of Committees and Elections" (1958). The relevant argument goes something like: consider mass-democracies where few ever meet. let alone know their candidates, inherently diverting much social capital towards campaigning. Smaller-group voting on the other hand better reflects public desires and, (hopefully), aims more accurately towards public good. By decentralising power, urban planning facilitates markets better both over more spontaneous and longer terms. Neighborhood level governance allows public finances, (think taxes on income and sales, also what amount to locational levies on rent), to be restructured so as to prevent public goods' implicit subsidy of higher rents, which effectively double-bills tenants into both wages and spending taxes, and higher rents). Definitely not the preferred democracy for those who enjoy palming off their responsibilities so they can complain about others' attempts, nor for those who enjoy how larger economies' financial instruments subsidise their investment-income. Enough of financial theory, this is, after all, about democracy, isn't it? ;-)

Or is it? The comfort tales we all hear read to us at night, go something

along the lines of: Democracy can, (like no other system), protect citizens' interests, prevent monopoly of authority, promote equality, guarantee responsible and stable administration, cultivate a sense of obligation towards the citizens, impart political education to the people, help make good citizens, allow little chance of revolution AND help promote change ;-) Seriously, this is what some people tell their Selves, to allay any fears that democracy might not be the panacea it's meant to be. But lets face it, there are others amongst us who grind our teeth at night recalling how, under the banner of democracy, never ending cycles have emerged of mischievous use of public funds and time, systemic corruption, disastrous choice of public servants, the emphasis of quantity over quality, the dragging out and and inflating costs of the decision making process, encouragement and harbouring of immoral practices, and all especially so during the election process. Maybe there's more to this whole democracy lark than at first meets the eye.

But regardless of alleged symptoms of democracy, the root cause is the method. Democracy itself is not a policy of liberal/conservative values, nor monetarist/fiscal, nor private/public, nor those of infrastructure versus economic strength, equality versus fairness, commercial interests versus skills development or any such political tensions. Gordon Tullock proposed in his "Autocracy" (1987), that democracy can be likened more as an attempt to avoid the worst policies, than a means for achieving best policies, i.e. its an exercise in robustness rather than one of optimality. He might have a point there, and if he does, then its going to be tricky to nail a definition down in specific words, but class-theory might help us here, democracy can be seen as, (one of the many), relationships between the governing and the governed.

The Economist Intelligence Unit, (EIU if you're looking it up), has for many whiles now provided regular reporting on the state of world democracy, ranking all nations according to their democratic 'level' under various categories. It really is quite a document, with the categorisations and rankings therein forming the basis for many decision-making processes in international relations. For example, you'll find the likes of all of Scandinavia and Iceland, much of Europe, Australia and New Zealand enjoying "Full Democracy" status. On the other hand, the likes of, Israel, the Dominican Republic, Colombia, Argentina and a very powerful country who we tend not to mention in less than ideal contexts;-), are to be found basking in the "Flawed Democracy" category. Hong Kong, Georgia, Morocco, Fiji, Madagascar, and so on, languish under the "Hybrid Democracy" banner, but understandably so and our hopes are all with them to escape to the dizzying heights of "flawed" sooner than later. Poor Syria, striving so desperately as it is to get the democracy ball rolling, is branded for as "Authoritarian" for its efforts, as indeed are Guinea-Bissau despite their costly defiance against anti-democratic forces, and the Congo where presidents must share power with a prime minister and are permitted no more than two five-year terms.

It's beginning to look like we might not all share exactly the same understanding of just what exactly constitutes good democracy or ill. In the immortal words of Patrick Chalmers, in his article "How do we know democracy is broken if we don't know what it is?" in The Correspondent, 21st of May 2020:

"Until we can better understand how politics works, including our own parts in its dysfunction, there's no chance fixing it."

... I think we find herein at least a kernel of resistance against the sloppy kind of thinking we might find our Selves encouraged to slide into, and so for the word "democracy", (and any other tokens of meaning for that matter), warning us to put on the full armour of semiotics and so satisfy our Selves just exactly what we are talking about. Its quirky stuff to be sure, so good luck with all that, and thank you for your consideration.





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

Final: 4-2 sets, 36-31 games — a great win and a strong start for a new combo

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

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
