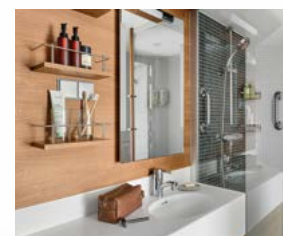
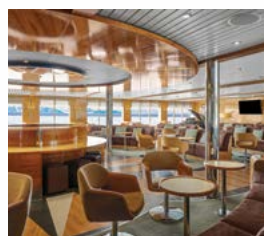
NATIONAL GEOGRAPHIC EXPLORER

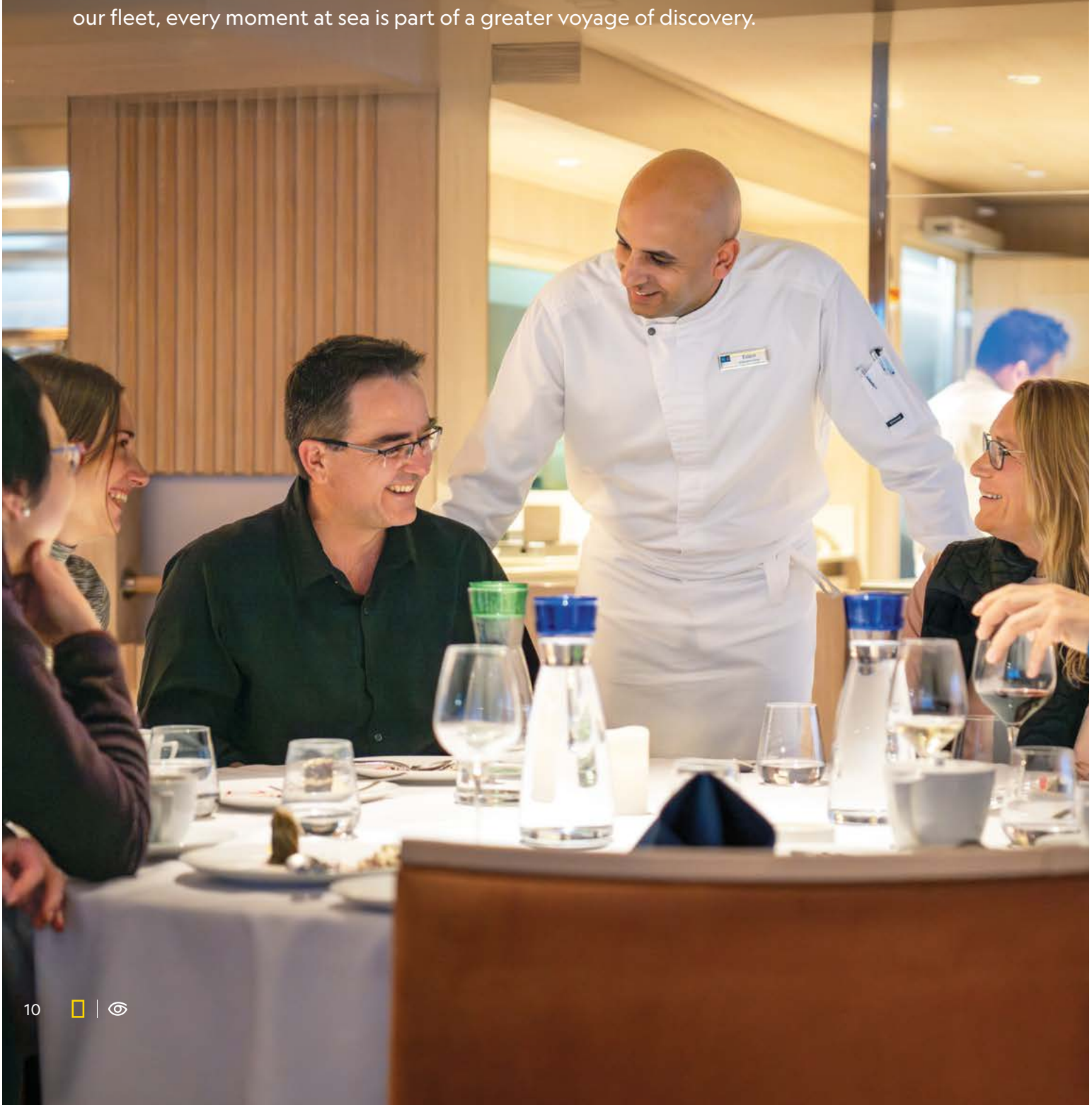

SVALBARD & NORWAY

WITNESS THE WILD BEAUTY OF THE FAR NORTH

Few places showcase the drama of their creation like Norway, where a maze of rock and water cuts the coastline from tip to tail. Sail the country's iconic fjords, or set your sights on Svalbard, an Arctic archipelago framed by snowy peaks and ice-checked waters. On this icy frontier, polar bears outnumber people, and multiple types of whales are regularly spotted offshore.

For the Scenery Seeker: From the waterfall-laced fjords of the mainland to the snowscapes of Svalbard, Norway has some of the most stunning scenery in the far north.

For the Wildlife Lover: Svalbard's snowy shores are as wild as the Serengeti. Set out on an Arctic safari to spot polar bears prowling the ice, walruses hauled out on shore and reindeer prancing across tundra.

For the Active Traveller: Kayak amid sparkling icebergs and soaring fjords, and hike sweeping glacial valleys and jagged granite peaks.

For the Photographer: With epic wildlife, stunning landscapes and endless light from the midnight sun, this is a dream destination for photographers. A National Geographic photographer joins every voyage to help you bring home your best photos.

When to Go: April-June

In spring, Svalbard is covered in ice and snow and bathed in astonishing light. The landscapes come alive in the summer, the best season for wildlife watching.

PHOTOGRAPHING SVALBARD WITH NICK COBBING

 Drawn to the breathtaking Arctic landscapes, National Geographic Photographer Nick Cobbing has travelled to Svalbard nearly every summer since his first visit in 2005—often as an expert for National Geographic-Lindblad Expeditions voyages. Here, he explores the photographic allure of this remote, high Arctic archipelago.



Taking photographs is an important part of the expedition experience because it helps you understand the landscape. What makes Svalbard an inspiring place for a photographer is the diversity. Ice and snow, glaciers, a very powerful ocean—there's a lot to capture here.

With the Zodiacs, we can go ashore to photograph the tundra's grasses, lichen and mosses. There's also the beautiful purple saxifrage flower—a signature of Svalbard—that puts colour into pictures.



Some subjects from my favourite images: Svalbard reindeer, which aren't found anywhere else. Sometimes an Arctic fox might be curious about us. There is also abundant birdlife: kittiwakes, eider ducks and Arctic terns—beautiful birds that come here to feed and forage in the summer.

The glaciers and snow influence the scenery by reflecting light back up, so it seems to rise from the ocean with darker spaces in between. It creates a whole palette that we can incorporate into our photography.

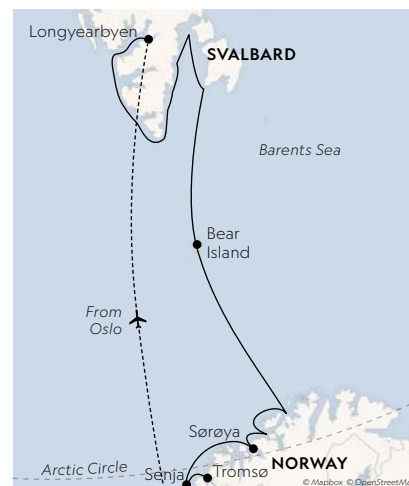

ICELAND & THE FAROE ISLANDS

RICH CULTURES AND VOLCANIC LANDSCAPES

Iceland showcases the drama of our living Earth like nowhere else. In this land of geological treasures, the brightest gems are hidden in remote corners, where waterfalls flow through mossy canyons, glaciers tumble from mountaintops and fjords carve paths from the sea to timeless fishing villages. Let the Viking spirit guide you from these surreal shores to the Faroe Islands, where turf-roofed cottages and archaeology bring the legends of ancient seafarers to life.

For the Geologist: Located atop a geothermal hotspot and at the meeting point of two tectonic plates, Iceland's landscapes were born of geological upheaval—you'll see volcanoes, waterfalls, geysers, hot springs, lava fields and much more.

For the Culture Enthusiast: On remote shores, delve into rich Icelandic traditions, like eiderdown harvesting and herring fishing.

For the Wildlife Lover: Sea cliffs and shorelines are aflutter with a multitude of seabird species: kittiwakes, shearwaters, gannets and colourful puffins. Humpbacks, orcas and several other cetaceans swim offshore.

For the Active Traveller: There are a multitude of ways to interact with Iceland's elemental landscapes, from hiking to waterfalls and volcanic craters to mountain biking into the backcountry and strolling black-sand beaches.

For the Young Explorer: Every Icelandic itinerary features the exclusive National Geographic Explorers-in-Training program for kids and teens 18 and under.

When to Go: May–August

Snow melts into rushing waterfalls in springtime. Puffins arrive in mid-April and stay until mid-August, and whales swim here in the summer.

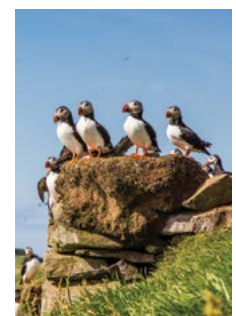
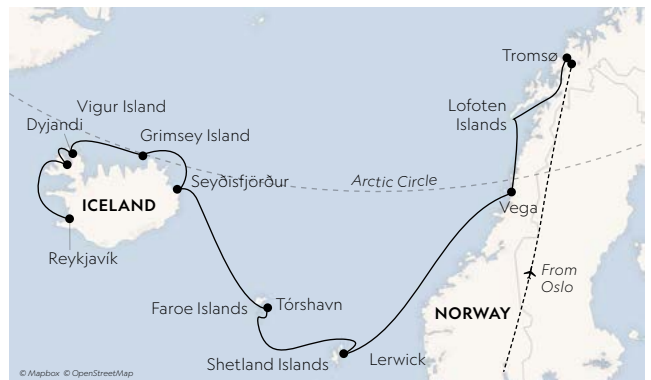

GREENLAND

EPIC ICE AND INUIT CULTURES

An emerging destination for adventure travel, Greenland's glittering icescapes, calving glaciers and dynamic tundra converge in a dazzling tableau that's best explored by kayak, Zodiac and on foot. Go beyond the country's icy surface to experience cultural encounters in Inuit communities at the top of the world. Depending on the time of year, there may also be the opportunity to watch the northern lights paint the night sky in neon waves.

For the Scenery Seeker: Many fjords have dramatic backdrops: sweeping glacial valleys, massive icebergs and glaciers flowing from Greenland's ice cap.

For the Wildlife Lover: Greenland hosts all the icons of the Arctic: musk oxen, walrus and polar bears—plus, its waters are home to 15 species of whales.

For the Culture Enthusiast: Visit farms and villages in the UNESCO World Heritage region of Kujataa in southwest Greenland to better understand the confluence of Inuit, Viking and Danish cultures.

For the Backcountry Explorer: Our polar ships use ice-strengthened hulls and satellite imagery to access little-known parts of this remote wilderness. Disembark on rarely seen shores and feel the thrill of being a modern-day explorer as you chart new paths across the tundra and through the fjords.

When to Go: June–September

Travel around the summer solstice for endless adventure under the midnight sun. Early in the fall, turn your eyes to the sky for a chance to spot the northern lights.

EXPLORING GREENLAND, REGION BY REGION

Greenland is a land of vast possibility, where the world's second-largest ice sheet shapes landscapes as dramatic as they are diverse. From north to south, east to west and deep into its protected national park, each region reveals its own character awaiting discovery.

THE NORTH

The Greenland ice cap covers nearly 80 percent of the country, and it shapes much of its northerly landscapes. Here, small coastal communities live between extremes—months of polar night in winter, followed by the endless glow of summer's midnight sun. Neighboring Baffin Bay, the gateway to the Northwest Passage, is one of the best places on Earth to spot the elusive narwhal.



THE EAST

At the heart of East Greenland lies Scoresbysund, the world's largest fjord system—a vast, secluded maze of icy channels and soaring cliffs that is yours to explore. Along its shores you'll find Ittoqqortoormiit, one of the most remote settlements on Earth, home to only a few hundred residents. A visit here offers a rare window into a distinctive Arctic culture grounded in myth, legend and resilience.



THE SOUTH

Southern Greenland is a land of contrasts, where green pastures and grazing sheep meet icy fjords and rugged peaks. A 1,000-year legacy of Norse and Inuit farming is preserved at the Kujataa UNESCO World Heritage site, with reconstructions of Erik the Red's 10th-century homestead. The winding, mountain-backed channel of Prins Christian Sund carves one of the most dramatic passages in the Arctic.



THE WEST

Archaeology buffs will delight in the UNESCO World Heritage site of Aasivissuit-Nipisat, which preserves hunting grounds dating to 2500 BC; and Uummannaq, where the 15th-century Qilakitsoq mummies were unearthed. The famed Ilulissat Icefjord—also UNESCO-listed—holds one of the fastest-flowing glaciers on Earth. From the new Icefjord Centre or while cruising Disko Bay, you might spot whales surfacing amid the luminous icebergs.



NORTHEAST GREENLAND NATIONAL PARK

Northeast Greenland National Park is the world's largest protected wilderness—vast enough to hold more than 100 Yellowstones. Its 971,000 square kilometres of sweeping tundra, snowy peaks and iceberg-filled fjords remain almost entirely untouched. In this remote sanctuary, herds of muskoxen graze the valleys, walrus crowd rocky shores and polar bears pace the ice floes.
