It's big, bright, and beautiful:

Last week, local artist and resident Lauren Green completed a colourful, vibrant mural adorning a 42-metre wall facing Winchelsea's railway reserve.

The mural on the rear north-facing wall of Journey Early Learning Childcare Centre, is thanks to the efforts of a Community Project Working Group, led by Growing Winchelsea.

Lauren commenced works at 63 Hesse Street in February, seeking to beautify the blank wall, add interest to one of Winchelsea's key visitor gateways and capture and celebrate what makes the town and district special.

"Anyone that knows me, knows how much I love Winch. So, when I got the huge opportunity to paint this massive 42-metre-long wall on the back of my boys' kinder and daycare I was absolutely beside myself," Lauren said.

"This is the project I had been looking for without realising. It feels like all these teeny tiny steps of life led me here to this wall, to the most soul filling, joyful work I've ever experienced."

John Tebbutt from Growing Winchelsea said the project has strengthened the sense of community, with local Winchelsea

Primary School students joining Lauren to help paint during two workshops held on February 14 and 21.

"It has brought younger and older generations together promoting a healthy and active town. I encourage everyone to come and have a look and feel a sense of pride in this project, initiated and completed by locals, and involving our local students," John said.

"It is important we value and support our local artists and acknowledge the key contributions they make to our community."

Growing Winchelsea's Station Precinct Sub-Committee registered the proposal for a community inspired mural project with Surf Coast Shire Council's Community Project Development Program last year.


Everyone has different experiences of the local lakes, and the artists are keen to exchange stories with you on Saturday 23 March 3-5pm at Lake Murdeduke.

Paper Mill Plea: Green light please Minister!

Questions have been asked in the Victorian Parliament recently following Labor's lack of action on the deteriorating state of the Fyansford Paper Mill millrace.

Member for the Western Victoria Region, Bev McArthur MP, asked The Hon. Sonya Kilkenny, Minister for Planning, if she would finally "grant permission for a permanent repair?"

Highton Rotary Club volunteers as well as the broader community are willing to foot the bill and fund the repairs privately, but are awaiting the government's long-anticipated planning approval.

Mrs McArthur said "the repair will not only save an important piece of Australian heritage but will add to the tourist value of the site and in so doing, complete the story of the mill.

"The upgrades will return this truly historical site to its former glory, and also protect the habitats of native Australian fauna which are currently disrupted as a result of the collapsed millrace wall.

"There are all pros and no cons to giving these repair works the green light. It's time the Minister stepped up and finally gave the community the approval they need."

Mrs McArthur followed up her question in Parliament with a letter to Minister Kilkenny, appealing for her intervention to allow the repair to proceed. The diligent and knowledgeable Rotary volunteers and Mrs McArthur hope for a swift resolution from the Minister.

Fyansford Paper Mill is an attractive, heritage-listed historic industrial complex overlooking Buckley's Falls on the Barwon River, near Geelong. In recent years, the site has become home to a number of thriving businesses, mainly tourism. hospitality, wellness and small artisanal workshops. Combined with the beauty and interest of the site and buildings, it now attracts thousands of visitors annually. Volunteers from the Highton Rotary Club run popular tours of the historic Mill Precincts explaining the fascinating history of paper production on the site, and its later use as a WWII sea-mine production and testing facility.

Disaster Relief Fund open for farmers

The Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) has opened applications and is encouraging donations for the VFF Disaster Relief Fund (VFF DRF) in the wake of devastating bushfires and thunderstorms that have hit farmers hard throughout February.

VFF President Emma Germano said many regional communities have been left reeling after a series of devastating natural disasters and the activation of the Fund aims to help farmers doing it tough.

"From Gippsland, to the Grampians and now areas near Ballarat, many of our regional communities have been hit incredibly hard by severe thunderstorms and devastating bushfires."

"Farmers have lost farm sheds, kilometres of fencing, stock, machinery and that's just from early assessments. We know there will be more, so we're getting on the front foot and opening our disaster relief fund applications."

"Assessment of the applications will begin immediately and we hope to be able to begin pay-outs very soon."

"We're also collecting donations, if you are willing and in a position to contribute. The VFF would like to express our gratitude to those who have already donated and thanks everyone who contributes, no matter how big or small," Ms Germano said.

The VFFDRF Committee will oversee the collection of donations from the community, assessment of applications, and approval and distribution of individual grants to farmers up to the value of \$5,000, for impacts from storm or bushfire that occurred from 9 February 2024.

Important blue-green algae update for the Barwon River

Amber Clarke, CCMA

Corangamite Catchment Management Authority advises that the Barwon River Geelong from below Baum's Weir to Lower Breakwater is still experiencing an outbreak of blue-green algae.

Warning signs remain in place at key access locations along the waterway, advising the public to avoid all contact with the water.

A combination of hot weather, low water flows and high nutrient levels in the Barwon have contributed to the outbreak. High levels of blue green algae have been found in multiple sampling locations.

CCMA will conduct water samples and test for blue-green algae along the Barwon twice a week. Warning signs and health advice remain in place until two results confirm levels have fallen below the alert levels across 7–10 days.

During algal outbreaks, people and their pets should avoid contact with the water. It is strongly advised that they do not come into physical contact with the water. Contact with blue-green

The Government is celebrating Victorian women who have made the state a better place - through a new digital map that will show important locations connected to the achievements of women.

Minister for Women Natalie Hutchins marked International Women's Day by opening nominations for Finding Her – an online tool that records locations which were named in honour of Victorian women.

Finding Her is Australia's first interactive statewide digital map spotlighting locations connected to the stories, lives and achievements of women in Victoria.

Her Place Women's Museum will research and write the stories of an additional 15 women and add them on the Finding Her website.

The public can nominate any physical site, including statues, monuments, murals in public spaces, buildings, street names and parks, that have been named after women. The call for submissions will run for four weeks.

Her Place Museum has already mapped more than 60 women who have shaped Victoria, linking the places and monuments that they're connected to with videos, stories and photographs of their lives via QR codes on every site.

Protection extended for victims of collapsed builders

Victoria State Government

The Government is extending the Liquidated Builders Customer Support Payment Scheme to help Victorians whose builder has become insolvent without taking out insurance on their behalf – as required by law.

Around 100 extra Victorians may be eligible for payments from the scheme, joining former customers of Porter Davis Homes who were left without Domestic Building Insurance (DBI) through no fault of their own.

The expanded scheme now covers customers of builders that entered into liquidation this financial year – from 1 July 2023 up until 20 February 2024 – including Montego Homes' customers.

All builders should understand that this extension is occurring under special circumstances and will be funded through the previously announced \$13.55 million support package.

The Building Legislation Amendment (Domestic Building Insurance New Offences) Bill 2023 ensures consumers are covered by insurance before providing any money to a builder under a contract for domestic building work costing more than \$16,000.

Under new offences introduced last month into the Domestic Building Contracts Act 1995, if a builder receives money under a Major Domestic Building Contract without holding the required domestic building insurance, a penalty of up to \$96,000 is in place for an individual or \$480,000 for a company.

The new offences are the first in a suite of reforms the Labor Government will deliver to ensure Victorians can build or renovate with confidence.

The Prize delivers on the Allan Labor Government's 2022 election commitment to give 12 young students the opportunity to join a fully funded study tour.



Climate breakdown is knocking the natural world out of sync – and we should all be worried

Just like us, the natural world dances to the rhythms of its seasonal cycles. We all enjoy the first suggestions of spring as trees come into leaf, migrant birds arrive, bees and butterflies emerge.

These signs traditionally mark the start of a busy season of growth and reproduction for many species. But climate breakdown is altering the timing of many of the natural world's seasonal cues. This is knocking different elements of the living planet out of sync with each other, with potentially disastrous consequences for ecosystems.

Spring is arriving earlier throughout the world's temperate and polar regions, but the species that live there are responding differently to the season's advance. This happens because they use different cues, which respond to climate breakdown in different ways, if at all.

For example, some species may react to the temperature reaching a minimum threshold or the melting of the last snow, cues that are happening earlier as global temperatures rise and unseasonable heatwaves become more common. However, others respond to day length, which is unaffected by climate breakdown.

As the timings of age-old seasonal cues diverge with climate breakdown, some species are already starting to breed at different times relative to others they interact with, such as their prey. This can disrupt interactions that are critical to their life cycles. It's a growing problem known as "phenological mismatch".

Take, for example, the birds of European oak woods, such as the blue tit, great tit and pied flycatcher. They all depend on caterpillars to feed their chicks, but the caterpillars are emerging earlier than they have in the past, and the birds are unable to keep up. For every ten-day advance in caterpillar emergence, the birds are only able to bring forward their egg laying by three to five days, depending on the species.

As a result, bird appetites are greatest after the period of peak caterpillar availability, and this reduces their reproductive success. In the Netherlands, this has caused pied flycatcher populations to crash by over 90%.

Such mismatches may be most pronounced towards the poles, where temperatures are rising much faster than the global average. In the tundra of Greenland, the date on which insects are at their most abundant has been advancing by

over a day a year since the mid 1990s. However, the hatching dates of the sanderling, a small shorebird, remain unchanged.

The birds can't breed earlier because that would increase the chance of losing their eggs to Arctic foxes. After two decades of unequal shifting in the food chain, the main banquet is already over when sanderling chicks are born, though more research is needed to understand how this is affecting their population.

Mismatches aren't limited to predator-prey interactions. They can also affect age-old partnerships between plants and their pollinators.

Given the importance of insect pollination to agriculture and the functioning of ecosystems, the potential for such mismatches should be great cause for concern.

Cascading concerns

Perhaps more worrying still, the impacts of these asynchronies are not confined to the species directly involved: they may cascade right through an ecosystem. For example, mismatches between birds and caterpillars may not only be bad for the birds. Now less likely to be hunted in their early lives, caterpillars can significantly reduce a tree's foliage, and this could have knock-on effects for other insect herbivores that graze them, and in turn the animals that feed on these insects.

There is much we still don't understand about climate breakdown's impacts on our fragile nature, and phenological mismatches are particularly complex to study. But what's clear is that species and ecosystems, already weakened by habitat destruction, overharvesting, invasive species and pollution, face a major new threat.

If we are to have any chance of preserving the living planet and avoiding the extinction of a million species, then we need to do more than stop climate breakdown. We need to invest in conservation too, to help wild plants and animals adapt to the changes we've already locked in. Not doing so would be bad news for all of us.



Fall armyworm

Victorian agronomists and growers should be vigilant in crop surveillance for Fall armyworm, following the impacts the pest is having on crops in Queensland. Fall armyworm has rapidly spread across Australia after being found in Queensland in January 2020 and is now established in NSW, NT, WA and parts of Victoria.

Agriculture Victoria Plant Pests and Diseases Manager Chris Pittock said a collaborative effort between government, industry and the community is crucial to effectively manage pests such as Fall armyworm. 'If agronomists and farmers find Fall armyworm on their property, they should seek professional advice for treatment and management.

'Given this pest is established in some parts of the state – we have adapted our practices to manage it. We have been able to watch what has happened in the northern states and learn from their experiences. Detections of concern to us would be if the pest is found outside of central Victoria near the Murray River, and some parts of Gippsland.'

AgVic has been leading the State response for the National Fall armyworm project, which is coordinated by Qld Department of Agriculture and Fisheries. The project aims to support Australian growers with the latest information and tools to manage FAW.

Early detection of FAW is important to ensure producers make decisions in observance with best practice methods of control, and to reduce the likelihood of resistance occurring in the pest.

Fall Armyworm information

- Fall armyworm has adapted to warm tropical and sub-tropical areas in northern Australia and can migrate rapidly and be spread by storm events.
- Fall armyworm feed on maize, sweet corn, sorghum and sugarcane, and experiences in Queensland have also shown a high preference for feeding on corn, even though wheat, millet and sunflowers were nearby.
- Adult moths are 32 to 40mm in length, wing tip to wing tip, with a brown or grey forewing and a white hind wing. Male fall armyworms have more patterns and a distinct white spot on each of their forewings.
- Eggs are pale yellow in colour and clustered together in a mass, which often contain 100 – 200 eggs per mass. Egg masses are usually attached to foliage with a layer of mould/ silk-like furry substance.
- Newly hatched larvae are light coloured with a larger darker head and then develop white stripes lengthwise as the larvae darken and grow to about 34mm in length.

Stop the sale, stop the spread of invasive weeds

All Victorians can help protect our food growing communities, our biodiversity, gardens, lakes and places of cultural significance by helping to stop the sale of two of the world's most invasive aquatic weeds.

Agriculture Victoria Biosecurity Manager High Risk Invasive Plants Angela Constantine said the ongoing illegal trade of water hyacinth (Eichhornia crassipes or Pontederia crassipes) and salvinia (Salvinia molesta) is putting the state at risk.'We're running a campaign helping to raise awareness about the risks of these plants, as they can cause extensive damage by choking rivers, dams, lakes and irrigation channels,' Ms Constantine said.

'The continued trade of these plants helps them to spread fast and once introduced to a new area, these weeds quickly cover waterways. These weeds may look attractive, but their ability to quickly spread harms native plants and wildlife, and reduces water quality for farming and recreation.'

Water hyacinth and salvinia are primarily spread by people buying and selling them to go in ornamental ponds, dams and aquariums.

'It is illegal to buy, sell or give away water hyacinth or salvinia in Victoria, however in most cases home gardeners are unaware of the potential harmful impacts of these weeds,' Ms Constantine said.

When you consider that one water hyacinth plant can produce more than 3000 seeds over summer, you can see how easily they can be spread from a backyard pond – they also have extensive root systems that can generate other plants too. The plants can be carried by birds to other waterways and once established, the infestations can be costly and hard to control.

'Salvinia, also known as "water spangles", is equally invasive, and can cover an entire dam in just one season.'

Agriculture Victoria will safely treat, remove and dispose of State prohibited weeds such as water hyacinth and salvinia, at no cost to the land holder. If you suspect you have water hyacinth or salvinia on your property, please take a photo of the plant and email it to weed.spotters@agriculture.vic.gov. au, or call the Customer Contact Centre on 136 186.

Almost 3 Victorian children die every month due to preventable injuries

Rising childhood injury death rate the focus for Kidsafe Campaign

Kidsafe Victoria is urging families to put strategies in place to reduce the risk posed by common injury hazards such as curtain and blind cords, driveways, and bodies of water, as part of a campaign honouring the 45th anniversary of the organisations establishment.

The call comes as new figures from the Coroners Court of Victoria show that 35 children 0-14 years died in Victoria due to preventable incidents in 2023 – almost 3 children every month.

The major causes of childhood injury deaths in 2023 were transport-related incidents, including driveway and low-speed runover incidents, children as pedestrians, and children as car occupants involved in crashes. Other significant causes included drowning, fires, choking, and strangulation.

Melanie Courtney, Kidsafe Victoria CEO, highlighted how quickly incidents can occur, and the impact they have on families. "A split second is all it can take. Children are particularly at risk due to their curiosity and lack of awareness of danger. Not only did 35 families lose children to preventable injuries last year, but thousands more were impacted by injuries that will affect them for the rest of their lives."

One errant blind cord was all it took for tragedy to strike Kerrie's family. Her grandson Lincoln had been playing in the lounge when he was found with the blind cord around his neck. Lincoln had been strangled by the cord. "Watching your only child lose their child is devastating. The first responders were deeply affected, and the detective iwent home, hugged his kids, and checked his blinds", said Kerrie. She is sharing her story as the face of the campaign in a bid to raise awareness about the dangers that curtain and blind cords can pose, and reduce unintentional childhood deaths. "Maybe it can save another child and another family's heartache. I want something positive to come from Lincoln's tragic death."

With over 80,000 babies born each year in Victoria, 30,000 of them to new parents and carers, Kidsafe Victoria says it is vital that every family is provided with the tools to keep their children safe.

"We need a system that enables us to aim for zero deaths because no child deaths are acceptable – particularly when they are preventable," said Ms Courtney.

The organisation has released a series of free resources to provide families with practical strategies and knowledge of how to prevent childhood injuries, including their 'Making Your Home Kidsafe -A Guide for Parents and Carers' booklet and 'Baby Safety Guide – Kidsafe Essentials Course'.

Victorian families can order a free curtain and blind cord safety kit from Consumer Affairs Victoria.


More than 6,000 people and around 9,000 dogs are expected to participate at seven Million Paws Walk events across Victoria.

Shopping precinct upgrades and sport and recreation facilities

At Council's February 27 meeting, Surf Coast Shire Council endorsed the application for three funding grants from the state and federal government and approved three already submitted to meet timelines.

The three upcoming grant applications are to the:

- Regional Community Sports Infrastructure Fund for the Spring Creek female friendly change facilities upgrade: \$1 million from the RSCIF, and \$700,000 from Council through the Australian government's Investing in Our Communities Program (total project \$1.7 million).
- Regional Precincts and Partnerships Program for the Torquay CBD and Baines Crescent Precincts projects: \$500,000 from the RPPP, and \$150,000 from Council's Adopted Strategy Reserve (total project value \$650,000).
- Enabling Tourism Fund for the Destination Anglesea -Mountain Bike and Tourism Trail Network Detailed Design project: \$240,000 from ETF, and \$60,000 from Council's Adopted Strategy Reserve (total project \$300,000).

While endorsing upcoming grant applications, Council also approved three applications currently underway. These are:

- Local Sports Infrastructure Fund (LSIF) for the Winchelsea Bowls Club Sports Lighting project: \$112,618 from the LSIF, and \$37,539 from the Winchelsea Bowls Club (total project value \$150,157).
- Council Support Package (CSP) for the Pedestrian / Cycling Connection (Surf World/Torquay CBD) project: \$100,000 from the CSP, and \$130,000 from Council's Roads to Recovery funding (total project value \$230,000).
- Play Well Participation Grant Program (PWPGP) for the Walking and All Abilities Basketball Program: \$15,000 from the PWPGP.

Cr Heather Wellington said the applications reflect Surf Coast Shire community needs. From more inclusive sporting facilities, to boosting the local economy through projects around Torquay's CBD and the Baines Crescent precincts, Council is embodying an enabling communities ethos."

"It's also great to be supporting groups who do so much for their communities, like the Winchelsea Bowls Club. The lights will enable the club to compete at night and expand and make their social bowls program more accessible."

Unsealed Roads Review seeking community input

Surf Coast Shire Council is seeking community input about the maintenance and renewal practices of unsealed roads throughout the shire for the Unsealed Roads Review.

The Unsealed Roads Review will look at maintenance and renewal practices and policies Council uses for unsealed

roads throughout the shire. Recommendations from the review will be used to develop long term and sustainable options for maintain these roads in the future.

Council wants to hear from the community, local road users and local businesses about issues, safety concerns and expectations they have about unsealed roads within the shire. Local knowledge will be critical to ensuring the review considers all available information.

Drop in sessions will be a chance for the community to discuss the unsealed roads with Council officers and complete the survey online:

- 10 March, 9am–12pm, Aireys Inlet Market, Aireys Hall, Great Ocean Road, Aireys Inlet.
- 16 March, 9.30am–12.30pm, Moriac Community Centre, Newling Reserve, 830 Hendy Main Road, Moriac.
- 16 March, 2pm–5pm, Connewarre Hall, 15 Randles Road, Connewarre.

"The community is encouraged to fill in the survey, including an interactive map where residents can place a pin on a road and leave a comment for Council officers to review" Surf Coast Shire Cr Heather Wellington said.

"Over 57% of our roads are unsealed roads and we know most of them are in rural areas, so make sure you have your say on this issue if it affects you."
